To Break Ground For 63rd St., East River Tunnel

The Metropolitan Transportation Authority, with the coopera-tion of the Queens Chamber of Commerce, will officially break ground for the \$69,480,000 63rd Street East River transit tunnel at ceremonies in Queensbridge Park, Long Island City, on Mon-day, Nov. 24th, according to an announcement by Chamber President Louis D. Laurino of Flush-

Gov. Rockefeller, Mayor Lindsay, President Laurino, Queens Borough President Sidney Leviss and the City's four other borough presidents will speak briefly at the groundbreaking, slated to begin at 11:30 A.M., with MTA Chairman William J. Ronan presiding.

Other key elected officials and Chamber Transit Committee Chairman Harold Strauss of Rego Park will also be on hand.

Following these ceremonies, kicking off construction of the 3,140-foot-long tunnel for which the Queens Chamber and civic groups throughout the borough campaigned since 1950, MTA guests will adjourn to Riccardo's Restaurant, 21-01 24th Avenue, Astoria, for a reception-luncheon hosted by tunnel contractors, Slattery Associates, Inc. of Maspeth, Peter Kiewit Sons of Omaha, Neb.; and Morris-Knudsen Co., Inc. of Boise, Idaho.

The new tunnel, according to MTA Chairman Ronan, is a primary element in a \$2 billion program to improve both Transit Authority and Long Island Rail Road facilities serving the metropolitan region.

"This tunnel", Laurino de-clared, "is the key to new rapid transit for Queens. The Chamber has been asking for it for nearly 20 years. Credit for this accomplishment must to to the late Simeon Heller who served as chairman of our Transit Committee during all those years... and also to the many civic groups in Queens who campaigned along with the Chamber for this urgently-

needed transit facility.
"We are pleased, too, that this tunnel embodies an original Cham-ber recommendation: four tracks. to accomodate both L.I.R.R. and subway trains.

"The real hero on Nov. 24th, however, will be Dr. Ronan, without whose leadership this tunnel may never have been built."

According to Laurino, the sub-way-railroad tube, upon its completion in seven years, "will open the door to vast new transit services for Queens and Long Island."
