

### Isaac's Heroics Upset Dukers

# Somebody Hollered 'Shoot'

NEW YORK — "I heard somebody holler 'Shoot,' and I looked at the clock and saw that there were just five seconds to go.

"I knew that I couldn't drive, so I let the ball go."

Warren Isaac was explaining how he scored his 35-foot field goal, with three seconds remaining in the game, to give Iona College of New Rochelle a 63-61 upset over Duquesne last night in the opener of the collegiate doubleheader in Madison Square Garden.

Davidson beat NYU 82-73 in the nightcap.

Isaac, a 6-6 senior who is No. 10 scorer among the major colleges in the nation with a 25.6 average, climbed above that mark against the Iron Dukers, finishing with 30 points.

He also grabbed 13 rebounds, a bit below his 20.4 mark, which is good for No. 3 rating in the country.

"I was supposed to pass the ball to (Tom) Qualter and cut off him, and take the lead pass," said the Power Memorial graduate in the noisy Gael dressing room.

"When I saw that I couldn't get past my man, I just looked at the clock and let the ball go when I heard the yelling.

"I wasn't sure that the ball would go in, even though I saw that it was headed in the right direction."

**Passes 1,000 Points**

Isaac's 30 points enabled him to climb above the 1,000-point mark for his 3-year varsity career. He now has 1,025 and needs 336 in his remaining 14 games to shatter the school record owned by Richie Guerin, the new St. Louis Hawks' coach.

Earlier in this campaign, Warren tallied 50 against Bates, netting 21 field goals in the process, to break two other Iona

standards set by the ex-New York Knickerbocker.

When this was brought out in the dressing room, reporters asked Isaac about his pro ambitions.

"I think I can make it," was the reply. "I played with and against some of the pros the past couple of summers up in Harlem. Wilt Chamberlain, Kevin Loughery and Harold Hairston were some of the players at the playgrounds."

Since he is a bit lean — 200 pounds on his 6-6 — the Gael cager was asked where he felt he could make it in the play-for-pay ranks — back-court or in the corner?

"I really don't know," answered Isaac. "I'll try it anywhere. I know that the pros are interested in me."

**'He Can Make It'**

"He can make it," said Jimmy McDermott, who coached Guerin and also Dick McGuire when the former Knick-Detroit Piston was at LaSalle Academy in Manhattan.

"I feel his best spot is in the back-court, and if I had another man 6-8 on the team, I'd use him more back there.

Iona took the lead early in last night's game, 12-9, on a 3-point play by Qualter, and built it up to 31-24 as Isaac wound up with 16 for the first half.

The Gaels lost the advantage at 38-37, when Frank Miniotas connected on a 12-foot jumper, and never regained it until Isaac's final shot.

Willie Somerset, the Dukers' All-American back-court man, paced his club with 19 points, collecting 11 of the squad's final 13 points.

Ed Curtin did the defensive job on the 5-9 senior in the first half, holding him to 6.

Qualter finished the night with

14 points. McCullough and Kauffmann each hit 7.

The victory was sixth in a row for Iona, which will carry an over-all record of 7-2 into its first MECAA game tomorrow

night against LeMoyné of Syracuse in O'Connell gym on the New Rochelle campus: The loss was third in 10 outings for Duquesne.

N.Y.U. The Violets had led, 39-36, at intermission, before having their 3-game winning string snapped. N.Y.U. now has a 6-3 record.

Ira Harge has graduated. So have Claude Williams and Mike Lucero. Nevertheless the New Mexico Lobos again are in the forefront of college basketball teams.

Coach Bob King's boys from Albuquerque won their 10th straight and upped their record to 11-1 by whipping Arizona State 69-48 Thursday night. At this rate the Lobos may better their 23-6 record of last season when they tied for the Western Athletic Conference championship and finished runner-up to Bradley in the NIT.

Dick Ellis, a junior from Indianapolis, led the Lobos to their home-court victory with 16 points.

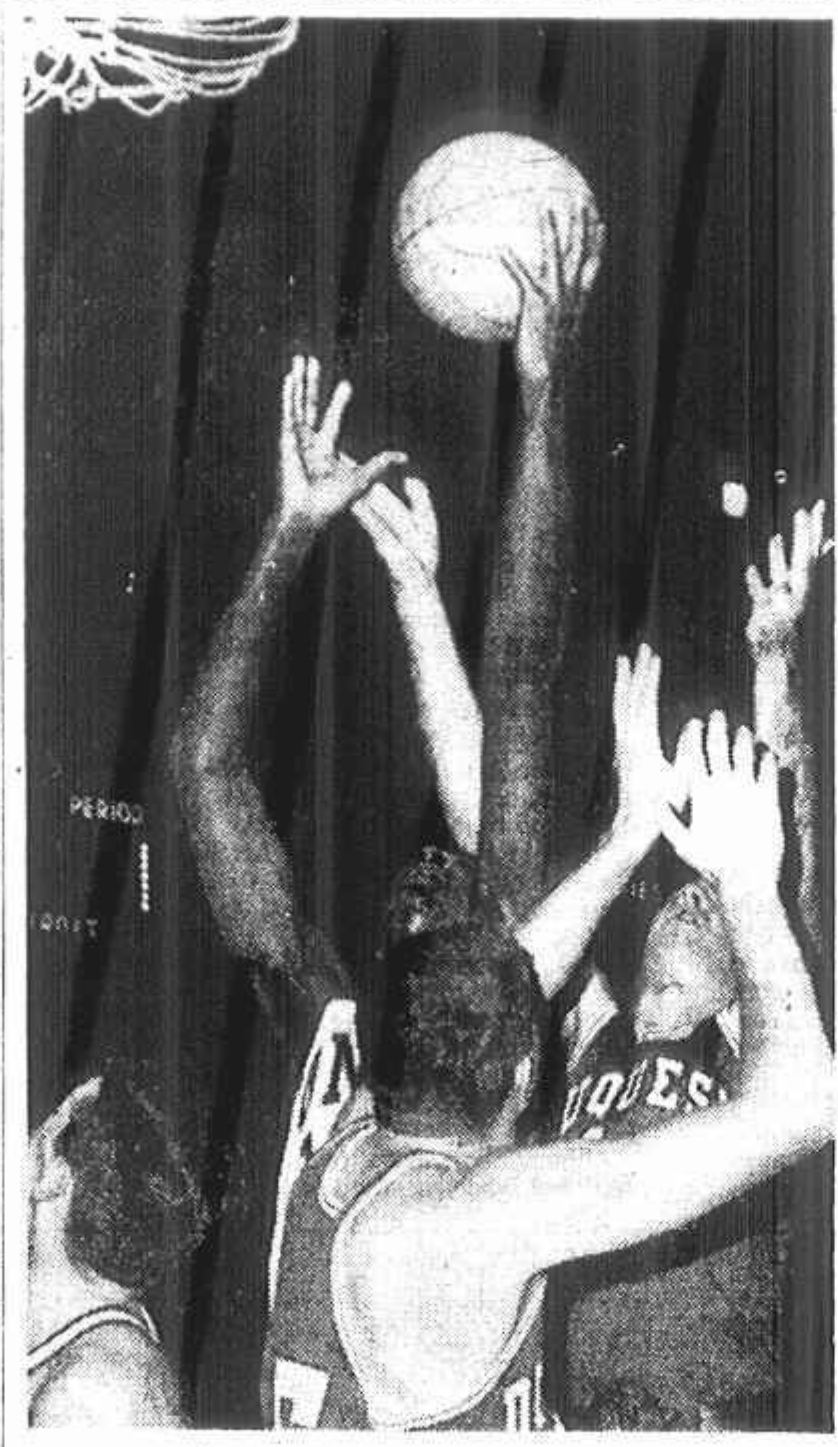

## New Plan To Revive Sick Sport

MIAMI — Television killed boxing so it seems slightly ironic that promoter Chris Dundee has devised what may be a way for TV to give the peak busting business a saving shot of adrenalin.

Down through the bloody years not even the larcenous combination of mobsters, assassins, fixed bouts and payoffs by the light of the moon was able to destroy the "game" or stem the constant flow of new fighters.

Television did it by chewing them up in a steady flow of weekly headed the idiot eye features, until they were punched out and the fresh faces were battered beyond recognition before they had the experience necessary to reach appealing stature.

But Dundee believes that there are enough good fighters

left, going or coming, to put on one star bout twice each month.

The gimmick is to televise these single bouts into arenas across the nation on closed circuit as feature bouts for "live" local preliminary cards.

**Discussion Stage**

The plan already has gone beyond the "thinking" stage. Dundee, a voluble, black-hatted man, has had discussions with promoters from New York to San Francisco.

"All of them agree that it would be a means of developing new fighters on a local level while still drawing in the fans for a 'name' feature bout," he explained. "Not only that, but the televised feature could be thrown in for free unless, of course, it was a heavyweight title fight, or something like that."

His reasoning is that with two shows a month for one bout, the line charges would average out less and the member promoters soon would pay off the cost of their own projection equipment.

"We would stimulate interest in boxing on a national scale," he asserted, "and at the same time develop local talent. By putting on two headline TV events a month at let's say 30 cities we would be having an average of eight or more strictly local bouts. That's work for 480 fighters twice a month."

The best part of the scheme seems to be that the boys "underneath," as the fight mob describes the preliminary bouts, wouldn't be getting rushed on to television or be overmatched before they were ready to step up.

**Young Prospects**

"There are some good young fighters around," says Chris, whose brother Angelo is manager of Cassius Clay. "I've got some good local ones right here in Miami."

His viewpoint of a fighter being "local" is a tipoff on the state of boxing today. Fighting on his cards are light heavyweight Billy Manquard of Winnipeg, who is managed by Rocky Marciano; light heavyweight Dick Gambino of Boston, and middleweight Don Lutz, who is from a Miami suburb called Midvale.

Maybe Dundee's plans have holes in them but, at least at first glance, they would seem to have merit if you're a fight buff. And don't sell Dundee short. He has been around the fight game seemingly since John L. Sullivan wore rompers.

Chris, as a teen-ager in South Philadelphia, managed his elder brother, Joe. Dundee the elder was a middleweight who could punch a hole in a wall. Later, Chris worked with Tommy Loughran and Benny Bass and subsequently managed flyweight champion Midget Wolgas and middleweight Ken Overlin.

He's "legit," as they say on the tin ear circuit, so his plan has a real good chance of succeeding.
