

Roffer Wins Section I Title; Rye's Robinson Takes Two

WHITE PLAINS—

White Plains High built up a commanding early lead Saturday night and held on to successfully defend its Section I swimming championship.

Before a capacity crowd at their home pool, Coach Herm Frey's Tigers scored 79 points, 13 better than runner-up New Rochelle.

Rye was third in scoring with 35 points followed by Mount Vernon with 30, Mamaroneck 28, Lincoln 17, Port Chester 15, Yonkers 12 and Harrison and Peekskill two each.

Five meet records were broken during the finals—including three that were bettered in the qualifying trials Friday at the same pool.

Butters Own Times
Terry Robinson of Rye, who lowered the meet marks in the 200-yard freestyle and 100-yard butterfly on Friday, cut the standards further in the finals.

Robinson, the only public school swimmer to go under 2 minutes in the 200-freestyle broke his own record of 1:58.7 with 1:54.7 Friday and, in the final, won in 1:53.3. He broke Glen Partelow's butterfly record of 57.3 seconds with a 55.1 clocking in the trials and Saturday won in 54.6.

For his achievements in the meet, and throughout the season, Robinson was chosen by the coaches for their inaugural Outstanding-Swimmer of the Year Award.

The White Plains' 200-yard medley relay team of Bill Ho-

man, Pete Kahn, Jack Gresko and Paul Matthews bettered the record of 1:48.5 set in the trials by winning the final in 1:46.7.

The other two new marks came in the 400-yard freestyle and the 200-yard freestyle relay.

Partelow Wins
After being shown of his butterfly record, Partelow grabbed himself another when he won the distance freestyle in 4:19.0. This was eight seconds faster than his qualifying time and clipped the record of 4:25.5 set by New Rochelle's John Lane.

Mamaroneck's freestyle relay team missed the record by 4.10ths of a second Friday and predicted it would smash the mark in the final. It did, finishing in 1:36.6 to wipe out the old record set by White Plains. Members of the team were Perry Celestino, Alan Randall, Roy Pinney and Eggers.

In four other events, the winning times were less than a second over the meet records.

Bill Eggers of Mamaroneck and Partelow, who qualified with 27.4 clockings in the 50-yard freestyle trials, repeated the time in the final but Eggers

was given first place on a decision of the judges.

Roffer Beats Kahn
Barry Roffer of Lincoln won the 100-yard breaststroke in a thrilling race with Kahn of White Plains. The Yonkers swimmer was clocked in 1:07.7 and Kahn in 1:08.0.

Dave Abramson of White Plains was a surprise winner in the individual medley, with Homer Lane of New Rochelle second and Roffer third.

Tim Ward won the 100-yard freestyle and Kevin Fitzpatrick the backstroke to give New Rochelle a pair of individual firsts.

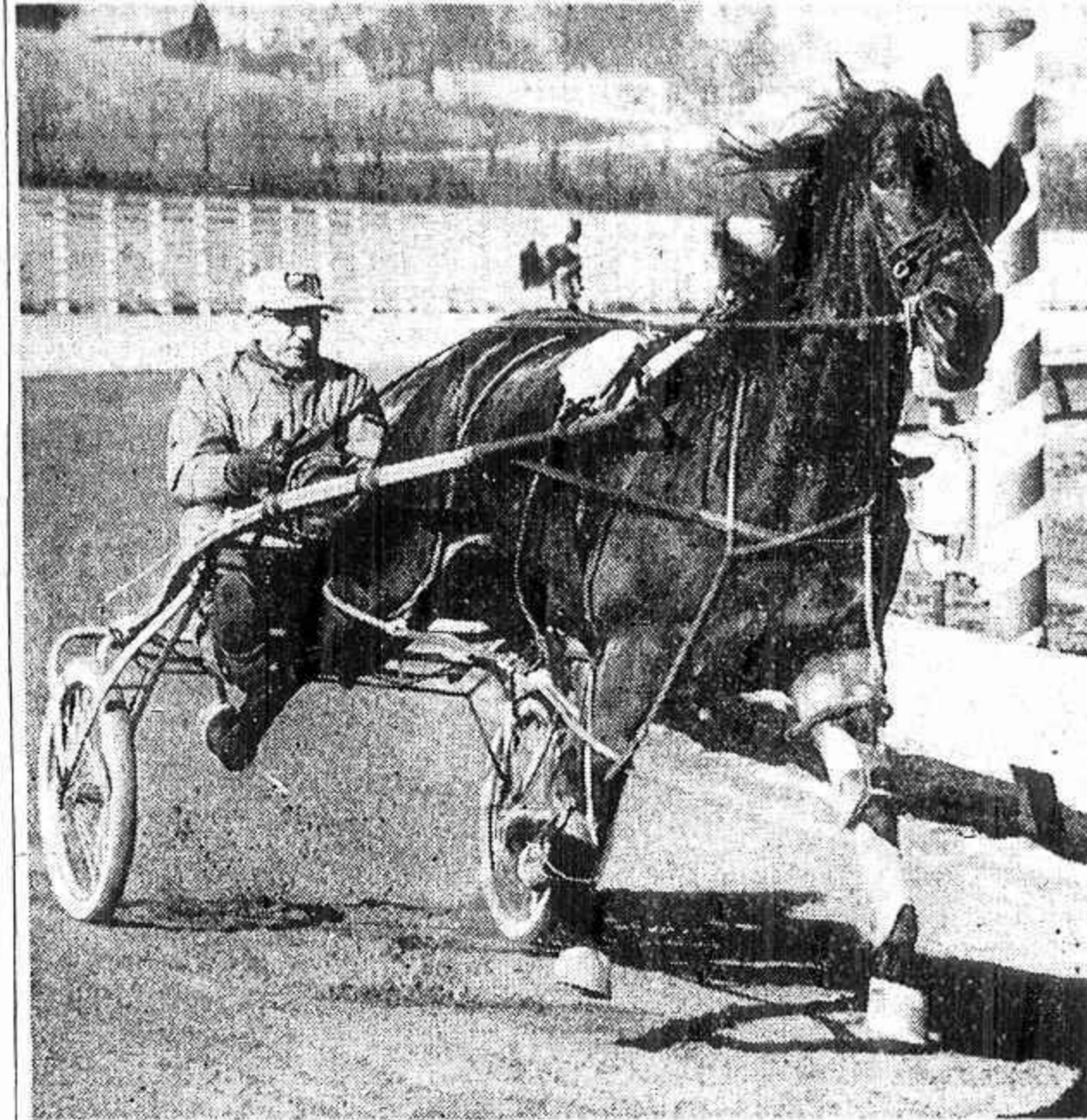
Butler Guides Gaels To Swim Loop Title

Phil Palazzo, one of the county's top swimmers, could compete only in outside meets because of a transfer rule.

Adios Pacing Series Begins On Thursday

The fourth annual Adios Festival pacing series will get underway this Thursday at Yonkers Raceway with two qualifying events for \$12,500 up for decision. The series, which is comprised of three qualifying rounds, two consolation and a championship final, is worth a total of \$87,500.

For the first time in its three-year history, the Adios Festival will be raced at Yonkers during a Spring Meeting instead of in the Fall. As in the past, contenders will be invited from the ranks of pacers just under the free-for-all class by racing secretary A. E. (Ted) Gibbons.

Conditions for the Adios Festival call for a limit of three horses from one stable. Stable entries and conflict of interest horses will be seeded by Gibbons. The remaining starters will be drawn by lot. Gibbons plans on having 24 starters in the elimination tests, thus he hopes making for three eight-horse fields.

The three elimination events are named the Adios Boy, the Adios Butler and Adios Harry for three of Adios' most illustrious sons. The Adios Boy and Adios Butler races will be contested Thursday and the Adios Harry on Friday. All qualifying events are at a mile.

Iona Five Wins Finale; Isaac Ends With 1,341

NEW ROCHELLE— Iona College scored an 83-82 victory over Rider College on Saturday as one of the Gaels' all-time greats, Warren Isaac, closed out an illustrious college career.

Big Warren connected for 16 points, leaving his with a career total of 1,341—just 30 short of Richie Guerin's Iona record. Guerin is now player-coach of the St. Louis Hawks.

Isaac, the nation's top rebounder among major college performers this season, did manage to set five new Iona marks, however. He has the record for a season's scoring with 550 points as well as the marks for field goals and rebounds in a year with 210 and 480, respectively. Isaac finished with a career total of 507 goals and 1,124 rebounds, both new standards.

Isaac wound up the season with 39 points and 74 rebounds in his last three games. Over a three-year span, he averaged 21.6 points for 62 games.

Iona, which finished at 12-11 while Rider concluded its season at 13-11, trailed in the early going. The Gaels were behind, 39-21, and pulled to within four, 39-35, at the half.

Section I Wrestlers Shut Out

ITHACA — The entire entry from Section I was eliminated in the first round of the State Public High Schools A.A. inter-sectional wrestling championships at Ithaca College Saturday.

However, there were two notable performances, by Sinclair Brown of Mount Vernon and Rocky Mondello of Lakeland High.

Section 4, the Binghamton-Finger Lakes area, won the sectional championship with 125 points, ahead of Nessau's Section 8, at 79, and Suffolk, Section 11, at 63. Section 1 was shut out for the first time in the 3-year history of the inter-sectionals.

Mondello, at 106 pounds, battled Jim Taylor of Freeport to a 2 all tie with his takedowns, matched by two escapes. The Lakeland youngster lost out on riding time, 3-2. Taylor lost in the final to repeat-State champion Ken Melchior of Lindenhurst.

Brown, at 141, lost out in overtime on a referee's decision to a Sidney grappler who dropped the championship scrap to Richard Kroneg of Sheburne.

Other Long Island titlists were John Walter of Calhoun, 123, and Mike Fitzerald of Mepham, 176. Eric Watts of Suffolk won at 115.

Upstate's winning crowns also went to Claude Poole of Ithaca, 98; John Shaltok of Shaker, 130; John Sorichin of Union-Endicott, 113; Claude Shaw of Sidney, 157; Ken Haines of Horseheads, 168; Noel Kovia of Sidney, 183; Jerry Beach of Ithaca, heavyweight; and Doug Smith of Dryden, unlimited.
