

BULL FORTUNE WON, SHE DIES

Mrs. Vaughan Succumbs to Consumption on Day Will Case Is Settled.

WEST LEBANON, Me., July 18.—Six hours before the time set for the hearing in the Probate Court at Alfred, Me., for the settlement of the famous Bull will contest in her favor Mrs. Olea Bull Vaughan, the contestant of the will of her mother, Mrs. Ole Bull, died here to-day.

The death of Mrs. Vaughan was due to tuberculosis and was not unexpected. During the will trial at Alfred she was unable to be present owing to her illness. Her deposition was taken and several of the lawyers interested in the case interviewed her, but the court did not require her attendance at the hearing.

The will of her mother, Mrs. Ole Bull, the widow of the famous Norwegian violinist, bequeathed the greater part of the property, estimated at half a million dollars, to certain persons in India. The trial lasted nearly two months and developed an unusual line of testimony in which the contesting lawyers sought to show that Mrs. Bull's disposition of her property had been influenced by reason of her beliefs in certain Hindoo doctrines.

Before the hearing in the Probate Court had been finished an agreement was reached and the case was continued until to-day.

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
