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The minority members of the Court, Justices Benj. R. Curtis and John McLean, dissented from the opinion of their colleagues, maintained, that every free person born on the soil of a state, who is a citizen of that state, is also a citizen of the U. S. ^{They} Judge Curtis cited the old constitutions of several states, to prove that, when the National Constitution was adopted, ^{and laws} all the free inhabitants of those states were citizens, and entitled to vote, if they possessed the necessary qualifications.

They also maintained the old doctrine estab. by the courts, that "all slavery has its origin in power, and is against right," and ~~exists only~~ ^{exists only} requires, as essential to its existence, municipal regulations, ^{for} which the constitution does not provide. They state that in eight instances, beginning with the first Congress, had Cong. included slavery from the ter. of the U.S.; and in six instances had ~~earlier~~ ^{earlier} Congress recognized and continued slavery in organizing territorial governments. And these acts had been signed by the first six presidents.

The denial to the people of a territorial condition the right to control slavery was considered as an abandonment of the doctrine of popular sovereignty, which had ~~been~~ ^{been} counted their fundamental right "to form and regulate their domestic institutions in their own way."

The subject of slavery, ~~with its collateral~~ ^{with its collateral} has, either directly or indirectly, ~~been the~~ ^{been the} chief or constituted the chief grand issues between the two great parties united within the last few years. Hence justice to our ~~study~~ ^{study} of history of parties requires at least a brief ~~more~~ ^{more} reference to their views and measures ^{practices} during this eventful struggle, which terminated in the overthrow of slavery.

Original proposition to establish only one ter. (Nebr.) ~~Douglas proposed~~ ^{Douglas proposed} a number of free and slave states being equal, 15 to 15, the admission of that ter. as a free state ~~at~~ ^{at} within a short period, as was probable, would give to the free states a ~~preponderance~~ ^{preponderance} of representation. Hence, to preserve this equilibrium, the proposition was ~~so~~ ^{so} it was proposed to divide the territory held to form two a government for each portion, the northern to be called Nebr. ~~the southern, Kansas~~ ^{the southern, Kansas}, which was certain to remain free; the latter, Kansas, into which it was designed to introduce slavery.

Incidentally after the passage of the Kansas-Nebr. act, immigration from slave states commenced. It was the object of the settlers to establish slavery in the ter. They were soon followed by large numbers from the ~~other~~ ^{other} free states, with the view of ~~counteracting~~ ^{counteracting} defeating the purposes of the slaveholders. Meetings were held in the ~~territory~~ ^{territory}, and resolutions adopted, declaring that ~~proportions~~ ^{proportions} they would afford ~~no~~ ^{no} protection to ~~an~~ ^{an} abolitionist as a settler, and ~~declaring~~ ^{declaring} that recognizing slavery as already existing in the territory, and advising slaveholders to introduce their property as ~~soon~~ ^{soon} as possible.

John Woe: On the evening Nov. 1854, an election, ~~offered by Geo. Bledsoe~~ ^{offered by Geo. Bledsoe}, to choose a delegate to Cong. The ~~election was declared in~~ ^{election was declared in} John W. Whitfield, a pro-slavery man was declared elected; but his opponents, who had voted for J. A. Washfield, ~~declared~~ ^{declared} pronounced the election unlawful, as large number of the votes for the former had been given cast by citizens of Missouri, who returned after voting, returned. According to a report of a committee of investigation appointed by the house of Reps. of Cong. in a map of ~~and~~ ^{and} the election districts, of the aggregate number of votes, more than two-thirds were non-white.

The State Gazette says the first settlement in Ashknights was made in the N. W. part of the town in 1807, by Abram J. Colton, Benj Perry and Augustus Burnham from the east part of this State. Their lands, however, were not articulated later. Aaron Wilson was said to have settled in 1809 and Nathan Eaton in 1810, both of them however, at the 1810, though their articles are not dated in 1809. Amos Johnson and Benj. H. Jones, & Benj. where prowled the bear and the wolf
and the fleet deer. The bears and wolves
not very welcome neighbors - coming

it is true that at that time there were not
very plenty, but Mrs. Black relates the
fact of their seeing a bear and two cubs
pass along, one day, near their hut, right
where their two young children, but a few
moments before, were at play. I indeed

with perseverance and industry they
soon had and now have good, well

Jesse Reed was born in Windsor

had to cut their way, for three miles or
more through the woods to get to
his place, with his oxen, and goods.
They hastily provided a place for
lodging by throwing a few logs together
covered them with ~~baswood~~ ^{baswood} logs, covered
with baswood logs grooved and lapped
one on to the other, and covering with
baswood logs split and grooved and lapped
on to each other. That, the very rudist of
the mode, of pioneer tenements, served
for sleeping room, kitchen and parlor
till they could build better. With a
fire outside, and a few culinary articles
they managed to live in good, pioneer
style.

Like other pioneers, they had to contend
with wild animals, frequently joining with
parties in bear and wolf hunts.

They had two children - Euphemia, who
married some years ago and went to Michi-
gan, and Stephen W. who is married and
lives on the old homestead of his father's.

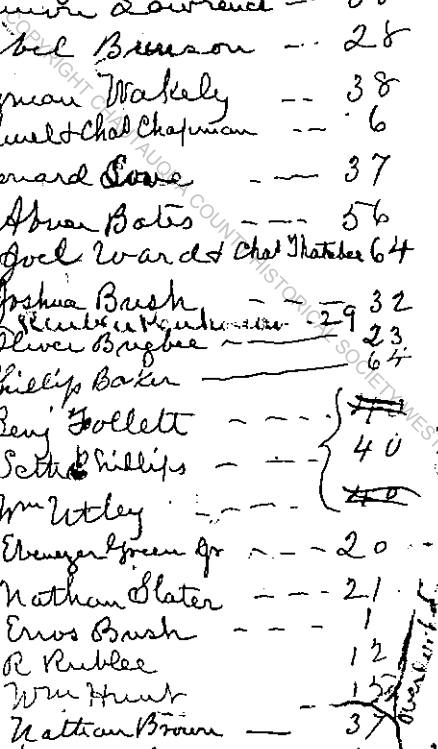

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DEAR SIR: To secure the publication of the History of Chautauque County at the earliest day possible, I respectfully request those who feel an interest in this enterprise, to assist in collecting the desired information in their respective towns. The principal subjects are the following:

Name of the first settler, when and where; and other early settlers for 10 or 12 years, and, as nearly as you can, the year of their settlement, and the part of the town, as the north part, or the south, or east, or west part, or the north-west, south-east, &c. Settlers who remained but a short time in the county, and none of whose descendants remain in it, need not be mentioned.

The first *birth* in the town;

The first *death*;

The first *marriage*;

The first *school*, where and by whom taught.

The first of each class of mechanics and other business men; as blacksmiths, carpenters, hatters, saddle and harness-makers, masons, tanners, shoemakers, tailors, tavern keepers, merchants, physicians, lawyers. To the first one of each class, you may add one, or two, or more of his early successors.

Who built the first saw-mill, and who the first grist-mill, and the year, and the place, and the name of the stream; to which you may add those built a few years later, and the present mills and the names of their owners.

The same facts in regard to carding machines, fulling mills, and all other manufacturing establishments propelled by water or steam power.

The first church formed in the town, the names of its first members, or as many as are recollected. If the number should exceed 10 or 12, you may omit females, and also adult males who were least known, or who have long ago removed from the county, and left no descendants here. The same in regard to churches of all other denominations; and the years and the places where their meeting-houses were built; the names of their first officers and ministers. To save time and labor in procuring these sketches of churches, I suggest that you get the pledge of some efficient member of each church to prepare it. It can be more easily done by some person in the church; but to procure sketches of the whole by one person requires much labor. The person who assumes this labor should understand, that if the desired sketch be not furnished, a suitable notice of the society can not be given in the book.

The year in which the post-office in your town was established, the name of the first postmaster, and, if you can, of one or more of his successors.

The names of Masonic and Odd Fellows' lodges, date of organization, and names of their first officers.

To all of which you will please add any incidents, anecdotes, and occurrences during its early settlement or at a later period, which you may deem suitable for a history of the county. Send in your notes in as rough or imperfect a style as you please; I will put them in order.

A number of copies of this Circular will be sent to some person in each town, who is requested to distribute them for use to such of his fellow-townsmen as he may think proper, and to whom they are to make their returns at as early a day as they can conveniently do the same.

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Alvin Plumbe's Family

Alvin Plumbe was born at Paris, Oneida Co., N.Y., Sept. 6, 1802, and came with his family to Fredonia, in 1816, with his elder brothers, Joseph and Ralph, who established a store at that place. From 1820 he was a clerk in stores at Rochester and Genesee for several years; and at the latter place also attended school at the academy. In 1824, he commenced the mercantile business at Jamestown, and continued it until 1832 or 1833. He was also engaged in the milling business 4 miles below James on the creek, near its junction with the outlet of the lake. ^{Chautauque} lake. In 1843, he was elected clerk of the county. He was a member of the Assembly in 1833, and again in 1837. In 1843 he was elected County Clerk. After the expiration of his official term, he removed to Westfield, where he was for many years engaged in the purchase and sale of lands in the county. He was the first to propose the running of a steamboat on Chautauque lake. A company was formed for this purpose, and a boat commenced ^{from Jamestown to Mayville} running the 4th of July, 1828. In the 21st of Aug. 1871, Mr. Plumbe was on the steamboat Chautauque as she was about to land at Mayville, her boiler exploded, killing 8 persons and seriously injuring several others, among whom was Mr. Plumbe, who was badly crippled for life. He has been an active friend of the temperance and anti-slavery causes. He ^{was} married at Westfield, in 1832 to Mary Ann Davis of Westfield, and had 5 children, of whom two died young. 1. Elizabeth, wife of ^{Capt.} Harmon J. Bliss, who died in the late war in the battle of Chancellorsville, leaving a son, Harmon J. 2., Arthur R., who also was in the late war, and was severely wounded in the second battle of Bull Run. He resides at Carthage, Missouri. 3. Samuel Davis, who married Sarah Ingraham, and resides in Milton, Niagara Co. N.Y.
