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HISTORICAL ADDRESS BY HON. A. HAZELTINE.

Mr. President and Fellow Citizens:

This is a truly historic day. As was said prophetically by one who was greatly instrumental in giving it that character, it will be celebrated with guns, bonfires, illuminations and universal rejoicing. We are this day, in part fulfilling the noble and farseeing prediction of the venerable patriot by whom it was made in the hour of joyous excitement. And with us, it is a matter of rejoicing, that we are the descendants of those who achieved the independence we enjoy, an independence not only from foreign thralldom, but also from all despotic rule. And although there were those in all of the thirteen states who have been claimed as the fathers of the revolution, for our fathers certainly had bold, wise, and sagacious leaders, to whom great honor and lasting gratitude are due, yet had it not been that there was a community worthy of their leadership and ready to accept it, the glorious result would not have been accomplished. So whilst we revere, and give all due praise to such great names as Franklin, Washington, Henry, Jefferson, Otis, Adams, Livingston, Jay, Hamilton, Laurens, and a long roll of other worthies of a similar spirit, who might be named if time and space permitted, we should not forget those humble names, without whose ready cooperation the great event we celebrate would not have gone into history.

In designating me as your historian for this occasion, I assume that you had respect more to my years than to any fancied ability to perform the duty assigned me. I also assume that it was not expected or intended that I should produce even in a very condensed form, the great facts of our national history, which men of learning and ability, after years of toil and research, have given to the public in many ponderous volumes. The most you could have designed was, that I should produce from the store-house of my memory some fragments of local history which otherwise might not be gathered. These particulars relating to our own section of country, to this goodly village and its surroundings, though not adapted to general history, have an interest for dwellers here, and those here assembled.

It is nearly sixty-one years since I came to this place, and became an inhabitant of this county. It was just after the close of our last war with Great Britain, sometimes styled our second war for independence. The vestiges of that war were then everywhere to be seen, and this section of country was almost wholly a primeval forest. The city of Buffalo, now the third city in the state, was then a very small village. Before the war it had attained some importance, but near its close was laid in ashes. When I passed through it, it had only a few unfinished buildings all on one street, two or three stores and two taverns, and looked much more like a deserted village than the germ of a great city. Its appearance is plainly photographed upon my memory, and insignificant as it then was, I was strongly impressed with its prospective importance.

At that time there was one mail route through this county, along the lake road as it was called, from which there was a side route from the "Cross Roads," now Westfield, to Mayville, to comply with a congressional enactment which required that there should be a post office at every county seat. Our nearest post office was then at Mayville.

When I arrived here, on the 2d day of Nov., 1815, our goodly town was a mere hamlet. There were then within the territory first incorporated as Jamestown, thirteen families, all living in unfinished houses—which we should now regard as rude cabins—and a number of men without families. Within the territory which has since been added, there were then a few families, two or three at Cass' Mills, since known as Dexterville and East Jamestown, and one living in a two-story block house near the park and fish ponds.

During the succeeding winter and spring there was a considerable accession of new inhabitants, and we began to fancy that our little

village was a place of importance. In the summer and fall following, the boatman's horn heralding the approach of boats from Pittsburgh, laden with flour, whiskey, dried fruit, hollow ware and other trinkets, frequently echoed through these solitudes. They were, however, nearly the closing notes of that musical instrument, although a few boats and canoes laden with that too much used and too greatly esteemed beverage, "old rye," in later years, occasionally found their way through.

I suppose that but few of our citizens are aware that we once had a canal with locks here, and that the boatman's horn was sounded to warn those who had the charge of the locks, that a passage to the lake was required. A large portion of our supplies, in those days, came from Pittsburgh, and our business relations were then much closer with that city than any other place. Indeed, almost every thing we did not produce ourselves was bought in Pittsburgh. We then knew the merchants of that city much better than we did those of Buffalo. My first law library was purchased in Pittsburgh. Until the construction of the grand canal, we had very little commercial intercourse with Buffalo. Salt and dry goods came to us through the old river and lake lines of transportation which brought them to Black Rock, not then, as now, a part of Buffalo, but a few miles below it, and its most dreaded rival.

As I have said, in the summer of 1816, having had large accessions to our population in the winter and spring previous, we regarded ourselves as a people of some consequence, and a little previous to the Fourth of July of that year, a meeting was held to make arrangements for celebrating the approaching anniversary. It was a meeting of the citizens without respect to party, and the object was to have a union celebration, for it must be said, although I regret to say it, it was the custom of those days to have party celebrations, in which it was not so common for the orators to laud the fathers for their glorious deeds, as to attack their fellow citizens as political heretics. It is often said and supposed, that we have deteriorated as a people, and we often mourn over the degeneracy of the times; but I fancy that we are not much worse than those who have gone before us. In some respects, I hope and even think we are better. I do not believe a party celebration of this glorious day would now be tolerated. It was then a matter of course, and caused much less surprise than a union celebration. There were those then found who could not unite with their neighbors in celebrating the birthday of their nation.

Those who assembled on the occasion I have mentioned, resolved to have a union celebration. As is customary on such occasions, a president of the day was selected, and a committee of arrangements, orator and reader were appointed. No historian was appointed, as our history was yet to be made. The president of the day was James Prendergast, Esq., the founder of our village, who, as will be supposed by all who knew him, presided with decided dignity and grace. The orator of sixty years ago is the historian of this occasion, who thinks it fitting to record the fact, that sixty years ago, this day of history was celebrated in brotherly style without any note of discord by the citizens of this place and the adjacent country. The reader of the declaration of independence, was Jesse Smith, Esq., now an aged and venerable citizen of Panama, who performed its duties in a very creditable manner. The celebration was held in the second story of an unfinished building erected by Mr. Nathan Cass, which occupied the site of the Jamestown House. Notwithstanding the small population then occupying southern Chautauqua, there was a good attendance, and I have reason to believe that good fellowship and kindly feelings were largely promoted.

It should be told, however, I suppose, that there were a few in Jamestown and its vicinity who did not think it fitting to unite with us, and who got up a separate celebration in another part of the town, where those who assembled were

addressed by Levi Leonard, Esq., and who it is understood, gave political heretics such castigation as the prevailing spirit of the times then demanded.

The progress of our village and its surroundings was not uniformly onward. The summer of 1816 was known throughout the country as the "cold season," and many of the new settlers suffered severely. The corn crop, then the most important of any in the country, was largely cut off. The consequence was that for two or three years, nearly as many removed from southern Chautauqua as came into it. The emigration to Indiana, Ohio, and Western Virginia was very large, considering the amount of our population. Among those who left were some of our earliest settlers, who had considerable improvements. Stephen Frank, Esq., the pioneer of "Frank Settlement" and the largest farmer in this vicinity, was among those who left.

In addition to the cold season, the disordered state of the currency added much to the discouragements that prevailed. Perhaps no section of the country suffered more severely from that cause than did this. But these difficulties and discouragements were gradually overcome, and our progress has since been all we could reasonably expect. But the large emigrants of which I have spoken, are not wholly chargeable to the causes I have mentioned. They were in part due to the restlessness of the American people, and are strictly characteristic. Our people have always shown a manifest tendency to press to the frontier and form new settlements. What occurred in the years succeeding the "cold season" has often occurred elsewhere. The first settlers of Chautauqua were many of them people in middle life, and came here with large families. Many of them were natives of the older New England states, but came here after a sojourn of several years in Vermont and the central counties of this state. Like Abram, that distinguished emigrant of old testament times, they dwelt some time in Haran before they reached this Canaan.

For several years after I came here, we were within the hunting grounds of the Seneca Indians. Frequently have I seen half a dozen Indian tents at a time on the south side of the creek in this village. The men, during the day, were engaged in hunting, and frequently returned at night laden with venison. The squaws were engaged in the manufacture of baskets. Their stay usually was only for a few weeks, and they were generally peaceable and inoffensive. As the settlements increased and the forests disappeared, game disappeared also, and our Indian neighbors ceased to visit us.

But I may have tired you with my reminiscences of these by-gone days. Those of you, who have only known our county as it now presents itself to view, abounding with green pastures and cultivated fields, stocked with herds of fine cattle and flocks of sheep, with steam boats, railroads, and comfortable drives, who have only known our commodious hotels, our neat farm houses and superb dwellings, our school houses and our churches, can hardly realize the days of log cabins, the days when the traveler was guided through the forests by marked trees, fording the streams or crossing in canoes. But these days have passed away. Our fathers have cleared away the forests and subdued the soil, which their fathers declared free and independent on the glorious Fourth of July, 1776, just one hundred years ago. Rejoicing in what has been accomplished, and in the goodly heritage we possess, let us remember and honor the toil, the struggles, the heroism and the wisdom of those who laid these broad foundations, especially remembering with due thankfulness and gratitude, the mercy and goodness of that benevolent Being, who not only gave us this goodly land, but also gave us those heroes and patriots who achieved those mighty deeds we this day celebrate.

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First town meeting of the town of Ellicott

The Proprietors and inhabitants of the town of Ellicott, qualified by law to vote in town meetings, assembled at the dwelling house of Joseph Akin in said town on the first Tuesday of April (6th day) eighteen hundred and thirteen, agreeable to law organizing said town. John Silsbee Esq. Justice of the Peace being the nearest magistrate to said town was present and presided at said meeting assisted by Laban Case as moderator, chosen by a vote of the said meeting at the organization of the same.

Voted to proceed to the choice of town officers

The following persons were declared duly elected to the offices annexed to their respective names:

Memorandum by E. T. Foote

There were no overseers of Road Districts chosen
at the first town meeting, as there were no officers
(Comrs of Highways) to form road districts previous
to the first town meeting. After the first town meeting
the commissioners chosen, made road districts,
appointed overseers and taxed the people to work on
the highways, and although not strictly legal, I believe
no difficulty arose among the people I have
never seen any record of said proceedings but

James Prendergast, the first supervisor of the town of Ellicott, was the son of William and Melitable Prendergast and born in Pawling N.Y. March 9 A.D. 1764. His father was the son of Thomas and Mary Prendergast and born in Killkerry Ireland Feb. 2 1727 and emigrated to this country young and unmarried. He married Melitable the daughter of Judiah Wing of Beckman N.Y. She was born in Beckman's foreword March 24 A.D. 1738.

James Prendergast remained with his parents (while young) to Pittstown N.Y. In the general removal of the family to the west A.D. 1805 he accompanied them and first entered the present county of Chautauque in the fall of A.D. 1805, but made no purchase. He returned to Russellacee county where he sometimes afterwards married Miss Nancy daughter of Alexander Thompson. She was a native of Galway Scotland and born on or about August A.D. 1771.

They removed to Chautauque County A.D. 1810 and to the present site of the village of Jamestown in the spring of A.D. 1811. John Blowers his tennant had removed there the preceding fall. He erected a dam on the outlet & saw mill the year 1811 - The dam received the water in the lake so as to overflow much land about the lake and caused sickness, and the mill dam was indicted as a nuisance and after trial in court of Gen. Siphire ordered to be shot in the face of A.D. 1812. He removed the old dam and erected a new one on the present site, and proceed to remove and erect new mills. He was the first appointed Justice of the Peace in the town by the Governor and Council of Appointments.

At the first town meeting in April 1813 he was elected Supervisor of the town and reelected A.D. 1814 & also 1815. He was appointed associate judge of the Court of Common Pleas A.D. 1814 and held the office about one year.

He was appointed first Post Master of the Village of Jamestown Decr. A.D. 1816, and held that office until Octr. A.D. 1824.

He continued to hold all his real estate about the village of Jamestown (which he first laid out A.D. 1815) except the lots which he sold. (Some small exceptions.) on or about the A.D. 1836.

He sold all his unsold real estate in and about the village of Jamestown, unto a company, and soon removed to the town of Ripley N.Y.

On the 4th of January A.D. 1839 Mrs Nancy Prendergast his excellent wife died at Ropley A.E. 68

About the year A.D. 1841 he removed with his son and only child Alexander Thompson Prendergast to his farm in the present town of Redاختure, which he had purchased (or most of it) A.D. 1809

He died on this farm Novr 15 1846 A.E. 82

His son Alexander T. inherited his large estate. He and his wife were both interred at the Prendergast family burial ground on the farm of Col. William Prendergast on the West side of Chautauque Lake in the town of Chautauque. By profession an agriculturist. In politics a Federalist. He was benevolent to the poor.

He was about 6 feet tall. In good health weighed about 220 to 230 Black eyes. His hair perfectly white for many years before death but not bald. He was plain in his apparel and strictly temperate I think however used ancient spirits himself, but furnished to his labor. An honest man in his dealings & lenient to his debtors.

Ebenezer Davis, the first town clerk of the town of Ellinotte was the son of Samuel and Deborah Davis, and was born in the town of Milford Mass May 18 A.D. 1779. His father was a native of Mendon Ms, and born April 1st A.D. 1752, and died in Wardsboro VT, A.D. 1836. His mother Deborah Chapman was a native of Milford Iowaria and born June 10 A.D. 1757, and died in Wardsboro VT Octr, 1 A.D. 1811.

Ebenezer Davis removed with his parents to Wardsboro when a wilderness country and resided there until his removal to the town of Ellinotte A.D. 1812. He married Lydia the daughter of Capt. William Hall, in Dover VT, where they had a number of children. Mrs Lydia Davis was a sister of Misses Samuel, Jones, William, Sarah, Eliza & Oris Hall, emigrants to Chautauque Co. Ebenezer Davis first visited the town of Ellinotte July 3rd 1812 to explore. He purchased the East part of lot 28 Town 1 Range 11 to which he removed with his family in the fall of A.D. 1812 or early in 1813. He resided on his aforesaid farm until his death. He was a good player on the violin. A man of much mirthfulness. He raised a large family of some ten children. He entertained a high interest

and visited with the Baptist church (now First) about 1818, of which I believe he continued a member until his death. He was reelected town clerk in 1814 & 1815. He died on the farm where he lived, in 1812, on the Leistica side of Stillwater of "Acute Pneumonia" January 9th 1846 A.G. leaving a widow and many children among them Rev. Luke Davis a Baptist clergyman. Davis was a farmer and in politics a Federalist. A good neighbor & worthy citizen.

William Deland one of the first elected Assessors of the town of Ellicott was the son of ... Deland and born in Sandefield Mass about Jan'y 16th 1771. He emigrated to Vernon N.Y. about 1798. He married Mary Bullard birth in Berkshire County Mass. She was among the early settlers of Vernon (See Annals of Caledonia N.Y.). It is said by some that he first settled in New Marlboro Mass where he married his wife and born which he emigrated to Vernon. I think he first infused his hope in Christ in Vernon and visited with the Congregational Church in that town about 1801. He removed to what is now the town of Ellicott in the spring of 1811 & settled on Lot 149 Town 2 R 11 there an entire wilderness and not a house in farmstead except John Brown's erected the previous year. At the formation of the first church in Ellicott (Roxbury) he rented with that Congregational church and when the 2^d Cong Ch of Ellicott was formed (now in Princeton) transferred his relation to that church in which he was elected a Deacon in July 1817 and held that office until his delivery to the office of a clergyman he usually took the lead in religious meetings. He was reelected an assessor in Ellicott 1814 & 1815. A Farmer by occupation but somewhat a mechanician made the wood work of a large shore of the "bull pines" used in the vicinity in early days. He had sons Alonzo C, Edwin, Eli, William living in 1859 save Edwin who died (near where his father located in 1811) - d. 1849 A.G. 46 leaving a widow and children. He had two or more daughters married James Shaw of Ellicott and another, Julia, married Cornelius Elston. Mary Deland, wife of Green Deland, (who was born in New Marlboro Mass May 17-73) died Sept. 24. 1839 A.G. 66 a worthy woman.

Deacon William Deland died near here he first located in Ellicott (then residing with his son Eli) - on the 24th day of July A.D. 1843 A.E. 72. An agriculturalist. In politics a Federalist. A decided Christian - A good man.

Solomon Jones one of the first elected Assessors of the town of Ellicott in 1813 and reelected to the same office in 1814 and also A.D. 1815 and appointed a Justice of the peace A.D. 1814.

Benjamin Covell one of the first elected Assessors of the town
of Ellicott with his large family were pioneers to the town of Ellicott
He was the son of John Covell, and born in Harwick Barnstable
County Mass. \$1761. His father was born in Chatham Mass \$1733
his mother's name was Rijoce Smith of Barnstable County of said

John Covell and Rejoice his wife (parents of Benj cov) removed to Pittstown N.Y. where he died A 1806.

Benjamin Covell enlisted in the Continental Army of the Revolution A. 1778 and continued in service until A. 1783. In A. 1785 he went to reside in Washington Connecticut where he married (1785) ^{she was born} Sibbie Durkee daughter of Abijah Durkee in Washington aforesaid A. 1763.

In A. 1786 They removed Pittstown N.Y. where they resided about 24 years and where most of their large family of children were born. In A. 1810 they removed with family to the town of Pomfret now Ellicottville and settled on land of Judge James Pendryast, where they resided for a short time. They subsequently removed over the Conewango ^(East side) and resided there for many years and until his death. He and his sons and nephews formed a neighborhood and ^{then} frequently called "Coveltown".

Benjamin Covell I think resided on the farm now 1857 owned and occupied by Rufus Green Esq.

Benjamin Covell was subsequently constable and constable and collector of the town of Ellicott.

He died on the East side of the Conewango now Carroll Street - 27-1822 A. 61 and was interred in the burial ground near his residence. A former and hard working man honest in his dealings, and a man of good sense but always poor. He was I think a member of the Baptist Church - A Democrat in politics.

For a history of his family see History of Ellicott Vol I.

William Sears one of the first elected Commissioners of Highways of the town of Ellicott was the son of Isaac Ebenezer Sears and born in the town of Dorset VT March 29th A.D. 1787. His father was a native of Rochester Mass his mother whose maiden name was Jane White was born in the same town. They both died in Dorset VT.

William Sears was married to Miss Ruby, daughter of Ebenezer Charney at Danvers forenoon April 27 A.D. 1809. He first came to settle in Dorset in March A.D. 1811. With Nathan Lasall he first purchased land in lot 37 T. 1 R. 11 made an improvement which they sold to Capt David Boyd who settled there and died until his death. Mr. Sears removed to the present town of Ripton A.D. 1811 having purchased land in lot No. 11 T. 1 R. 11 where he resided until his death. He cleared up a large farm, and finally opened a tavern in his 1½ story dwelling house on the East side of the road in the present village of Ripton a little south of a small gulf. He soon built a two story front to his tavern. At the sometime kept a small stock of goods & had a blacksmith shop. He finally sold that tavern stand and a part of his farm. Then built a large two story tavern house on the West side of the road north of the aforesaid gulf, and good barns and outbuildings and opened another tavern to which he devoted his entire attention. Rept on of the best country taverns in that day. It was opposite this last tavern where Elisha Lasall opened the first store in Ripton subsequently acquired by James Hale then by T. Morgan - then by Levert Brown. Sears sold a number of building lots on his farm along the road. He was a man of great industry and popular as a landlord. He was elected const of Highways again in 1815 subsequently to other town offices. He was a volunteer in the militia from Chittenden County under Lieut Forbes. He raised a large family and was an affectionate kind father. He died at his residence in Ripton (in the above mentioned 2nd tavern house) August 10th A.D. 1827 A. 110 leaving a widow and a number of children, among whom is Nathan Lasall, also Clinton W. Sears, a clergyman in the Methodist Ch. His widow left the town some years after his death and finally moved to Charles Troy of Driftville and died at Hunterville Chittenden Co. In politics Mr. Sears was a Democrat.

Michael Frank one of the first elected Commr
er. of Highways of the town of Ellicott was the son of
Capt Lawrence Frank and born at Frankfort Park Co.
N.Y. Decr 18th A.D. 1788. He married Elizabeth daughter of Stephen Steward
of Rushfield N.Y. She was a native of Rushfield. They resided for
some time now Ellicott February A.D. 1811, near where they resided
in 1808. Lawrence Frank & Stephen moved in some time

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Labarr Case one of the first elected Comr of Highways of the town
of Ellicott was the son of Jonathan Case and born in Hoosic NY
Sept 5th 1781 Jonathan Case and his grand father Nathan Case
were natives of the State of Rhode Island. Labarr Case married
Miss Sally Akers daughter of Joseph Akers in 1803. His wife
She was born in Poulling NY May 26 A.D. 1783.

He was chosen moderator at the first town meeting. He was
a man of unusual mirthfulness and wit. A kind and
affectionate neighbor - a good citizen. He removed with his
family to Cincinnati Ohio (date not recollect) but in a few
years returned and settled in the present town of Busti
where he died.

leaving his widow and family. Joseph Case, his son, is one of
the most respectable farmers of the town of Busti (1859)

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12 Stephen Frank one of the first elected overseer
the Poor was the son of John Frank, and purchased
the 120 acres of Lot 60 Town 1 Range 11 and for which
he was assessed in the town of Pomfret 1811

He was born in the town of Frankfort Herk Co NY
(writing further facts for John Jones)

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James Hall the first elected Collector and Constable of the town of Ellicott, was the son of Capt. William Hall of Dover Vermont and a brother of Samuel, William, Josiah, Eliza, and Oris Hall. All of them emigrated to the County of Chautauque at an early day. They were among the pioneers of the County - one of the brothers, Lewis Hall, remained in Dover where he still resides (1858)

James Hall - was born in Dover July 16th A.D. 1790. He married Mary the daughter of Ebenezer Cherry of Dover 27 September A.D. 1810.

They removed to Pomfret now (1858) Ripton in A.D. 1812 and continued to reside on the same farm until his death.

He was elected constable and collector of Ellicott on the organization of the town April A.D. 1813. He declined the some office the next year. He was elected an assessor in said town in the years 1816, 1817, 1818, 1819, 1820, 1821 and 1822. He was elected by common consent and perhaps no man ever served the town in that office more acceptably. He dealt considerately in lands and was a good judge of the value of property.

In A.D. 1823 he was elected Supervisor of the town of Ellicott and continued to be reelected in said office until the town of Carroll was set off in 1826. His residence was then within the town of Carroll.

He was elected supervisor in the town of Carroll on its organization and reelected from year to year for some years until he positively and unequivocally declined serving any longer in that office. He was highly esteemed in the board of Supervisors as one of its most judicious, intelligent, and discreet members.

At a pretty early period (I am not now able to give the precise date) he was appointed a Justice of the Peace which office he held from reappointment or reelection for many years. He was universally esteemed an honest and discreet magistrate - excellent judgment and did much to effect settlements between litigants. He was a peace maker among the people.

He was an agriculturist and pursued that avocation exclusively for some years after his return to Ripton. He labored hard in the wilderness and made frugal and economical in all his expenditures.

Few men in the com mencement of life was more impetuous, and subsequently more uniformly prosperous.

After having settled on his farm, and built a good log house and cleared a few acres of land, and his house well furnished for a new country, and his crops harvested and threshed his grain in his log house chamber. The nearest neighbor Mr. Sears one fourth mile distant through the woods. Thus situated he went to attend a public meeting at French Mills to consult about means of defense in war of 1812, while he was thus absent, his wife took her only child & went for a walk on his lot, Mrs. Sears; on returning, after two hours absence, she found the house burnt & every thing in it. Nothing saved but the clothes they wore. A gloomy day for that good man and his wife. He immediately built another house and he and his wife full of hope and energy commenced their struggle again in the wilderness. They were industrious, economical & prosperous & were blessed in their labors. About the year 1818 he commanded over cattle buying on a small scale opposite Sears last town stand but still carried on his farm. He seemed to be profited in all his business matters, and accumulated a large property. As a creditor he was eminent, as a neighbor kind and obliging, to the poor benevolent. Committed in the proper place to say that he was elected to the house of Assembly 1833 and served with credit to himself and approbation of the people. As an evidence of his popularity with the people it is proper to state that the political party opposed to him elected their candidate the year before by more than 1700 majority.

When somewhat advanced in life he rented with the Congregational church and remained an acceptable member and a pillar in that society. For some years before his death he became partially palsied and gradually mortified away and died August 21st 1846 A.D. 56 at the same place where he located in the wilderness in March 1812.

His first wife Mary died Octr 31st 1828 by whom he had Abigail the wife of Brig. T. Morgan, Lewis now (1858) merchant of Jairstown and Eliza Foster Hall attorney at law in the city of New York.

His second wife Abigail the daughter of Ebenezer Cheney died April 1 1838 A.D. 28, without issue. His third wife Maria daughter of Ebenezer Cheney (by whom he had Erie a merchant in Jairstown, Abby Maria, and James) still survives her husband with her three children

James Hall will long be remembered by the pioneers settlers and those who knew him as one of the most useful men in town. I think it might be said in truth he had no enemies and that he was universally respected. In politics he was a Democrat.

Joseph Akin one of the earliest pioneers to the town of Elicott (now Raintree) and at whose house the first town meeting in Elicott was held, at which meeting and at subsequent ones he was elected overseer of the poor, was a son of John Akin, and born in the town of Pawling Dutchess County New York on the

day of Dec 1761. His mother maiden name was Patience Howard. His parents were originally from Rhod Island and both died in Pawling.

Joseph Akin married Elsa Halloway a native of Pawling. They removed to Pittstown N.Y. where they resided many years, and had a large family. Some of their eldest children were born in Pawling.

Early in 1807, he came to Chautauque County before the townships about Chautauque and Cane wangs were divided into lots. He selected the land (Lot 29 T-1 R-11) turned over to the sale of that year. The lots had just been surveyed. He purchased his land at Batavia; it was then in the town of Chautauque in the County of Genesee. His sons and their families came on with him and all settled contiguously to each other. He had pecuniary means to make all necessary improvements. He soon built a saw mill on Stillwater Creek near his home below when the front road crossed Stillwater. He subsequently erected a leanto addition to his saw mill and put in a run of rock millstones to grind corn etc. He divided the lot in which he selected I think in 1808 and articed land in the vicinity, on which his sons James & Elijah settled. Labor Core who now his eldest daughter moved from Pennsylvania County and settled near him in 1808. Mr. Akin soon cleared sufficient land to raise a surplus of provision beyond his own wants and materially aided other settlers in coming into that vicinity. He had cut and opened the road from Penndale at Creek (now Judge Nathan Pinday's) to his residence land, also opened an understanded road for his residence to the head of the rapids at the present Steamer Boat Landing on the outlet, and also along an Indian Trail to Pennsylvania from whence he derived early supplies. His house was a home for early pioneers in moving in and did much in as a temporary shelter to open roads to their land and provisions until they could get supplies elsewhere. He was an athletic, healthy man. Spoke habit, light complexion, blue eyes, about 5 feet 11 tall, and an estimable temperment very determined.

"His wife was a most humane kind and obliging neighbor" and practised midwifery for recompety and pretty extensively until physicians came into the country. She was much esteemed & kindred and benevolence - The latter part of her life she became somewhat infirm and continued so until her death. She died some years before her husband I think in April 1832 A.D.
Joseph Stein died on the farm and same spot where first located on the day of December A.D. 1842 A.D. 84.
Mr. Charles Ruppell whose wife is a daughter of Mr. Stein now owns most of the old homestead farm residence there or Mr. Stein had cut a village plot near his residence about the year A.D. 1845, but he offered the lots for sale on such terms as did not seem to attract settlers to them. Stillwater Creek in early days was considered a pretty good mill stream but the improvement of the land along its borders and head branches has materially lessened the volume of water until it is now of little consequence for a mill stream except in high water.
