Subsequently Foote came into possession of a number of pension allipications from residents of Chautauqua County, which now make up the greater part of this volume.

In this microfilm edition only the materials Foote pasted in the volume was microfilmed. Pages from the original ledger were not microfilmed, thus altering the page number sequence.

REVOLUTIONARY PENSIONERS.

In Chautauqua County In 1840—An Interesting List in the Library.

At the Prendergast library there is a volume published by the government in 1841 giving a list of Revolutionary pensioners living when the sixth census was taken in 1840. The list gives the names of the pensioners, their ages and the names of heads of families with whom such pensioners resided June 1, 1840. ipal government for some of the towns of the islands as are prepared to adopt representative control over their own civil affairs, and which may have become applicable to others as soon as they demonstrate fitness for self administration.

General Otis considered the report made by this board to be satisfactory and in general orders under date of March 29 he made it a law. The details of the regulations are conceded to be excellent. Under it these people are granted more latitude and freedom than they have ever before enjoyed. The matter of suffrage is determined as follows:

1—Those who prior to the 13th of August, 1898, held the office of municipal captain, gobernadorillo, lieutenant or caheze de barangay.

2—Those who annually pay 30 pesos (\$15 in gold) or more of the established taxes.

This whole matter of municipal governments is tentative and its success problematical.

BECKHAM GOVERNOR.

Washington, May 21.—The Kentucky governorship case was today decided by the United States supreme court in the interest of Beckham, affirming the decision of the Kentucky court of appeals.

Washington, May 21.—The opinion of the supreme court in the Kentucky case was not unanimous. Justices Brewer, Harlan, Brown and McKenna were dissenting justices. The opinion was handed down by Chief Justice Fuller and the case was dismissed for want of jurisdiction. He said the court should be the last to overstep the bounds limiting its own jurisdiction and that the determination of the cases of this character contests for state office, must necessarily be settled by the political branch of the government.

HAZEL APPOINTED JUDGE.

Washington, May 18.—Original appointments under the provision of an act of congress approved May 12, 1900: John R. Hazel, to be United States district judge for the western district of New York; Charles H. Brown, to be attorney of the United States for the western district of New York; William R. Compton, to be marshal for the western district of New York; George B. Curtiss, to be attorney for the northern district of New York; Theodore L. Poole, to be marshal for the northern district of New York.

I procured the list, \$ 1.852 from the War Office in Washington City under the special permission of President Fillmore given under my pledge of honor that I was not in any way engaged in procuring pensions and that I would not permit it to be copied or in any manner used or examined for that purpose. The Secretary of War first declined permitting me to examine the returns or permit me to make copies but after a full explanation he with considerable hesitancy permitted me to make the copies. He said they always refused copies or even to permit a pension applicant to examine them. I have kept my promise secretly that I made to Pres. Fillmore & the Secretary but I cannot conceive the necessity of keeping copy from being made a history of Chautauqua County. - March 1873

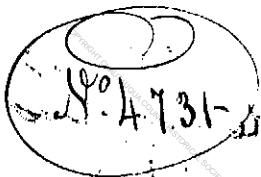



SAMUEL SINCLEAR

AND DAUGHTER OF A REVOLUTIONARY SIRE LIVING.

Distinguished Family—Descendants of Mr. Sinclear, Who Were Born at Sinclairville—The Son Resides in Gerry—Their Father Served in the American Army in the Revolutionary War.

Hon. Obed Edson of Sinclairville writes for The Journal an interesting historical sketch which is especially timely, now that societies of descendants of those who took part on the American side in the war of the Revolution are being formed in Chautauqua county. Few sons and daughters of patriots who participated in that struggle are now living, and no other life is known where two children of the same Revolutionary sire are alive, save that of which Mr. Edson writes. Samuel Sinclear was the founder of Sinclairville, this county. The sketch follows:

Samuel Sinclear.

Events in this last century have moved so fast that time since the war of independence seems longer than days, and a living son or daughter of a soldier of the Revolution seems like a traveler from a distant land—a sojourner that has lingered long after his time.

There are but few immediate descendants of soldiers of the Revolution living, and those few are rapidly diminishing. No perfect list has yet been made of them. None that I have seen contain the names of George W. Sinclear and Virtue E. Cole, a son and daughter of Samuel Sinclear, a soldier of the Revolution. There is perhaps no other instance, at the present time, in which there more than one child of a soldier of 1776 living. This remarkable circumstance in connection with the interesting facts relating to the life of Samuel Sinclear, his distinguished son-in-law, and the story of his services as a soldier, are worth relating.

Virtue E. Cole, the youngest daughter of Samuel Sinclear, was born in Sinclairville, Chautauqua county, New York, Feb. 3, 1816. She was educated in the village school and was in early life a school teacher. May 6, 1835, she was married to Chester Cole by Rev. James Schofield, a Baptist minister, the father of Gen. John M. Schofield, late commander in chief of the army of the United States. Her husband has been for many years deceased. Mrs. Cole is now over 84 years of age, and is in full enjoyment of her health and mental powers. She was always a great lover and reader of books. She resides in Hillsdale in the state of Michigan.

George W. Sinclear, brother of Mrs. Cole, and son of Samuel Sinclear, was born on the 4th of July, 1811, in Sinclairville. He was the first child

to the American cause, and himself assisted in loading it, and then turned it upon the retreating enemy. This was a remarkable incident of the battle, and has been often related in the written histories of the Revolution.

After the surrender of Burgoyne, Mr. Sinclear marched southward with his regiment, where he went into winter quarters at Valley Forge. The regiment there lost 40 or 50 men from exposure and the want of sufficient food. Among those who died was his brother Bradbury. Samuel Sinclear was with his regiment in the battle of Monmouth. The day was fearfully hot and he saw many English soldiers lying dead by a stream of water without a wound upon them. His regiment in 1779 marched with the army of General Sullivan against the Indians in western New York, and participated in the battle of Newton near Elmira, which was fought with the Indians under their great chief Brandt. After this battle the army moved forward to the Indian towns on the Genesee, which were destroyed, with their fields of Indian corn. When his three years of service in the army were completed he was honorably discharged. He was then but 18 years of age.

As soon as he was discharged he returned to his native state. Soon after, he purchased land at Vassalboro in Maine, built a sawmill and got out masts and ship timber upon the Kennebec river for the market. Before 1795 he had removed to the borders of settlement in New York and settled in Utica. We next find him at Cherry Valley, where he remained about a year; he then moved on further west and in 1796, was residing in Madison county, New York, then an almost unbroken wilderness. He was one of the earliest settlers at Eaton, and also of the village of Madison in that county.

Much of Mr. Sinclear's life was spent upon the frontier; he was accustomed to its hardships. He was an unusually strong and resolute man, familiar with the expedients of border life, and skilled in all its methods; he was therefore inclined by the habits of his life, to move with the line of settlement as it extended westward. Nearly as soon as the rich and fertile lands of western New York, known as the Holland Purchase, came into market, led by his natural partiality and fitness for pioneer life, he sought a home still further west. In 1809 he traveled through the wilderness, and purchased 1530 acres of land, which includes the present site of the village of Sinclairville, in the heart of Chautauqua county, which up to that time, had remained an unbroken forest. That year before the blow of an ax had been struck at Jamestown or Dunkirk, he and his partner, William Berry had made the beginning of a settlement at Sinclairville. In September, 1810, his family, consisting of 10 persons, left Madison for Chautauqua county. The family goods were carried in five covered wagons, each with a water pail and tar bucket dangling from the axletree. They drove along with them a number of cows and oxen. They passed over the Cherry Valley turnpike, a leading

road in the celebrated duel with Gen. Butler of Kentucky. The grandmother of Governor Benjamin F. Butler of Massachusetts, and the mother of Samuel Sinclear were sisters. The John G. Sinclear, a brilliant and distinguished leader in the Democratic party of New Hampshire, often candidate for governor and senator, was Samuel Sinclear's nephew.

Brilliant as were the achievements of our countrymen in the last war with England, and with Mexico. In the Civil war, and in the recent remarkable war with Spain, they do not outshine the achievements of the men of the Revolution. It was they who planned and won our independence and laid the foundation of the republic, which in a century has grown to be one of the five or six greatest powers on the earth, and the freest nation upon which the sun has ever shined. The story of the spirit, the courage, the patience and the poverty, in which they prosecuted the long war for independence has the firmest hold upon the heart and the imagination of our people. The memory of the Old Continentals in their ragged regimentals, will always stir in the breast of an American, the highest measure of patriotic enthusiasm. But none of those old heroes is with us now. There is only left for us to say of them, as was said of the chivalric knights of old:

"Their bones are dust
Their good swords rust,
Their souls are with saints, we trust.

Sinclear became a noted marksman
and noted hunter. He is now over
88 years of age and until recently,
has made an annual visit to the for-
ests of Michigan to hunt deer and to
fish. He was a man of physical pow-
er and nerve and was fond of athletic
sports. He was always temperate,
industrious and energetic. In
his early years he engaged
in the milling business. Later
he bought a good farm in the town of
Gerry, near Sinclairville, and which
he skillfully carried on for many
years. He is a man of intelligence
and still takes a lively interest in the
political and general affairs of the na-
tion. He resides with his son-in-law,
George Wheeler, on his old farm in
Gerry.

Mr. Sinclear and Mrs. Cole have
good reason to be proud of their ances-
try. Upon their mother's side were
soldiers of the Revolution. Samuel
Sinclear, their father, was born in
Nottingham, N. H., May 10, 1762. He
was a nephew of Colonel Joseph Cilley,
one of the bravest and most ef-
ficient officers of the American army
in the Revolution. Colonel Cilley suc-
ceeded John Stark in command of the
famous First New Hampshire regim-
ent.

At the commencement of the war,
then but 14 years of age, Mr. Sinclair
attended his uncle Colonel Cilley, as
servant or assistant. June 29, 1777,
when but 15 years of age, he enlisted
in his uncle's regiment and served
three years. His brothers, Bradbury,
Joshua and John Sinclear, and Eben-
ezer Sinclear, a kinsman, enlisted in
the same regiment. His father, Rich-
ard Sinclair, and many other of his
kinsmen enlisted in other regiments.
Samuel Sinclear was with his uncle's
regiment at Ticonderoga upon the ap-
proach of Burgoyne. Colonel Cilley's
regiment rendered valuable ser-
vice at the battle of Stillwater, some-
times known as Bemis Heights, and a
few weeks later at the battle of Sara-
toga.

The New Hampshire regiment car-
ried the enemy's position but not un-
til after one of the most desperate en-
counters of the war. During the con-
test Colonel Cilley captured a brass
twelve pounder. The British re-took
it. It was again captured by the
Americans, who lost it a second time.
It was finally recaptured by Cilley
who mounted the cannon, dedicated it

on the Cayuga lake in a ferryboat, and
traveled over bad roads to Buffalo,
then a settlement of perhaps 40 or 50
houses and less than 200 inhabitants.
This was before it was burned by the
British. From Buffalo they followed
the shores of Lake Erie to Cattarau-
gus creek, passing along the beach
around the capes or points of land that
extended into it, they arrived at Rich-
ard William's log tavern at Canada-
way, now Fredonia, in October, having
been just three weeks on the road.

From this point, before Mr. Sinclear
could proceed further, he had to con-
struct a primitive road into the dense
unbroken wilderness 15 miles further.
When this was accomplished, 12 days
later, he arrived with his family upon
his purchase at Sinclairville. He
built there a number of houses, among
them the first frame building erected
in the central and eastern part of the
county. He built a grist mill and
saw mill, and laid the foundations of
the village which was first called
"Major Sinclear's," after its founder,
and afterwards Sinclearville, the spell-
ing of which, many years later was
changed to Sinclairville. Mr. Sin-
clear was the leading and most influ-
ential citizen of the central part of
the county, many years representing
his town on the board of supervisors.

He died in 1827. Nearly 75 years
have passed since his death, yet many
incidents and anecdotes of his life are
still preserved and are fresh in the
memories of the people where he liv-
ed. His grave occupies a central and
conspicuous position in a burial place
which he donated for the public use,
now known as Evergreen cemetery,
the most beautiful in western New
York. His grave is marked by a
headstone cut from the native stone
of the county, and gracefully lettered
and inscribed with Masonic symbols
and emblems, by a pioneer artist of
unusual taste and ability.

Mr. Sinclear married Sally Perkins
for his first wife, and Fanny E., widow
of Obed Edson for his second wife. He
had 17 children.

The father of Samuel Sinclear was
Colonel Richard Sinclear. He was a
soldier of the French and Indian war.
In 1760, he enlisted in Colonel John
Goff's regiment, raised in New Hamp-
shire for the invasion of Canada. This
force cut its way through the wilder-
ness for a great distance and suffered
many privations. He also served in
the Revolution with his five sons, but
in a different regiment. Early in the
war, held a captain's commission; in
1789 he was made a major of the 10th
New Hampshire regiment.

Samuel Sinclear came from a noted
family of New Hampshire. His moth-
er Mary (Cilley) Sinclear, was a sis-
ter of Colonel, afterwards General
Joseph Cilley. Mr. Sinclear has
many distinguished relatives besides
his famous uncle. His kinsman (also
named Joseph Cilley) was lieutenant
in Colonel Miller's regiment at the
battle of Ludg's Lane, and helped to
take the British battery captured by
Miller. In 1846 he and John P. Hale
were elected senators to represent the
state of New Hampshire. Mr. Sin-
clear was also a cousin of Jonathan
Cilley, who, while serving as a mem-
ber of congress from Maine, was kill-

CHARGED WITH FORGERY.

A Warrant Is Out For the Arrest of Oscar Cheney of Poland.

Tuesday morning Oscar Cheney of Poland, a young man well known in that town and in this city, drove his team to the creamery at Levant and after unloading his milk left the horses at the home of Irwin Bedient and came to Jamestown. Later in the day it was learned that he had forged the name of Mrs. Bedient to at least two notes, the total value of which was about \$300, and secured the money on the same at one of the Jamestown banks.

The money was raised on these notes some time ago but the discovery of their spurious character was not made until Tuesday. The bank, it is understood, will not lose anything by the transaction, as in addition to the forged signature of Mrs. Bedient the notes contained the genuine indorsement of two other responsible parties, who will be obliged to meet the obligation.

Complaint as to the crime was made to Police Justice Hazeltine Tuesday afternoon and a warrant was issued for the arrest of Cheney, charging him with forgery in the second degree. It is thought that nothing can be learned of his whereabouts. He has not been seen at his home nor in this city since the warrant was issued and it is believed he is now a long distance from the county.

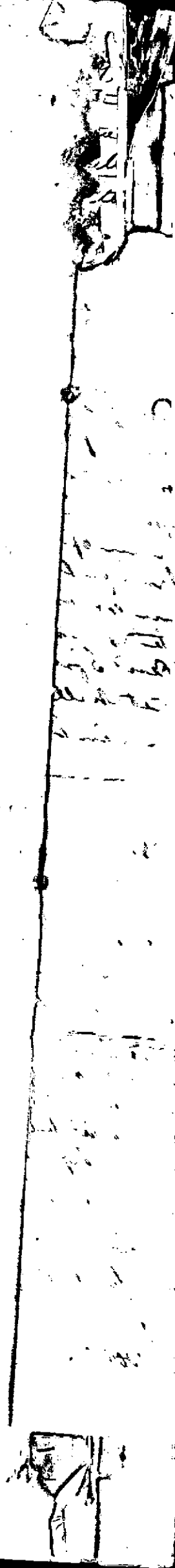

On the twelfth day of May, 1818, before me, the subscriber, one of the Judges of the court of common pleas in and for the county of Chautauque in the state of New York, personally appears Jonathan Nichols, aged sixty three years, resident in the town of Ripley in the county and state aforesaid, who, being by me first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled, "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war." That the said Jonathan Nichols enlisted at Swanzey in the state of New Hampshire about the middle of August, 1775, into the company of Capt. Jonathan Whitcomb in the regiment of Col. Reed and the brigade of General Sullivan of the New Hampshire troops, and was honorably discharged at Charlestown in the state of Massachusetts, in the beginning of January, 1776. That he enlisted again in January, 1776, for one year at Swanzey aforesaid, in the company of Capt. Carlsile of the regiment of Col. Brittle of the New Hampshire line; that he continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States, until he was honorably discharged at Charlestown in the state of New Hampshire, the first of April following, the company having been dismissed. - That in August, 1776, he enlisted, at Mount Independence near Concord, into the company of Capt. Ebenezer Green of Col. Brittle's regiment, then commanded by Lieut. Col. Wait of the New Hampshire troops, and continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States, until he was honorably discharged at Saratoga in the state of New York, in the beginning of January, 1777. - That about the first of July, 1777, he enlisted at Swanzey aforesaid into the company of Capt. Joseph Whitcomb of Col. Hubbard's regiment in the brigade of General Stark of the New Hampshire troops; that he was

tinued to serve in the said corps, until the first of October following, when he was honorably discharged from service in the State of New York, not far from Bennington in the State of Vermont. That he was in the battle at Bennington, and that he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support, and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services. -
