A PROCLAMATION

**DETERMINING THE SPECIFICATIONS AND DESIGNS FOR A NEW
SERIES OF ONE HUNDRED POUND AND TWENTY-FIVE POUND
GOLD COINS; A NEW SERIES OF TWO POUND AND ONE POUND
SILVER COINS; AND A NEW SERIES OF FIVE POUND
CUPRO-NICKEL COINS**

Whereas under section 3(1)(a), (b), (c), (cc), (cd), (d) and (dd) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to determine the denomination, the design and dimensions of coins to be made at Our Mint, to determine the weight and fineness of certain gold coins, the remedy to be allowed in the making of such coins and their least current weight, and to determine the weight and composition of coins other than gold coins or coins of silver of Our Maundy money, and the remedy to be allowed in the making of such coins, to provide for the manner of measurement of the variation from the standard weight of coins, and to determine the percentage of impurities which such coins may contain:

And Whereas under section 3(1)(ff) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to direct that any coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount:

And Whereas it appears to Us desirable to order that there should be made at Our Mint a new series of coins of the denominations of one hundred pounds and twenty-five pounds in gold, a new series of coins of the denominations of two pounds and one pound in silver, and a new series of coins of the denomination of five pounds in cupro-nickel:

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said section 3(1)(a), (b), (c), (cc), (cd), (d), (dd) and (ff), and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:

ONE HUNDRED POUND GOLD COIN

1. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of one hundred pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 31.21 grammes, a standard diameter of 32.69 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999.9, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.15 grammes;
and

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.

(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 31.01 grammes.

(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:

‘For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 100 POUNDS ·” and the date of the year, and for the reverse either:

(a) a depiction of Alice and the Cheshire Cat sat in a tree accompanied by the inscription “ALICE’S ADVENTURES IN WONDERLAND”; or

(b) a depiction of Alice and the characters Tweedledee and Tweedledum and the inscription “THROUGH THE LOOKING-GLASS”.

The coin shall have a grained edge.’

TWENTY-FIVE POUND GOLD COIN

2. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of twenty-five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 7.8 grammes, a standard diameter of 22 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999.9, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.025 grammes; and

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.

(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 7.75 grammes.

(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:

‘For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 25 POUNDS ·” and the date of the year, and for the reverse either:

(a) a depiction of Alice and the Cheshire Cat sat in a tree accompanied by the inscription “ALICE’S ADVENTURES IN WONDERLAND”; or

(b) a depiction of Alice and characters the Tweedledee and Tweedledum and the inscription “THROUGH THE LOOKING-GLASS”.

The coin shall have a grained edge.’

TWO POUND SILVER COIN

3. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of two pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 31.21 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of not less than 999 parts per thousand fine silver, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.15 grammes; and

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.

(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(4) The design of the said silver coin shall be as follows:

‘For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 2 POUNDS ·” and the date of the year, and for the reverse either:

(a) a depiction of Alice and the Cheshire Cat sat in a tree accompanied by the inscription “ALICE’S ADVENTURES IN WONDERLAND”. The coin shall have a plain edge with the inscription “CURIUSER AND CURIUSER!”; or

(b) a depiction of Alice and the characters Tweedledee and Tweedledum and the inscription “THROUGH THE LOOKING-GLASS”. The coin shall have a plain edge with the inscription “FOUR TIMES ROUND IS ENOUGH FOR ONE DANCE”.

(5) The said silver coin shall be legal tender for payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

ONE POUND SILVER COIN

4. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of one pound shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 15.71 grammes, a standard diameter of 27 millimetres, a standard composition of not less than 999 parts per thousand fine silver, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.16 grammes; and

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.

(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(4) The design of the said silver coin shall be as follows:

‘For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 1 POUND ·” and the date of the year, and for the reverse either:

(a) a depiction of Alice and the Cheshire Cat sat in a tree accompanied by the inscription “ALICE’S ADVENTURES IN WONDERLAND”; or

(b) a depiction of Alice and characters the Tweedledee and Tweedledum and the inscription “THROUGH THE LOOKING-GLASS”.

The coin shall have a grained edge.’

(5) The said silver coin shall be legal tender for payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

FIVE POUND CUPRO-NICKEL COIN

5. (1) A new coin of cupro-nickel of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 28.28 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of seventy-five per centum copper and twenty-five per centum nickel, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said cupro-nickel coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.75 grammes;

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and

(c) a variation from the said standard composition of two per centum copper and two per centum nickel.

(3) The said cupro-nickel coin may contain impurities of three-quarters of one per centum.

(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(5) The design of the said cupro-nickel coin shall be as follows:

‘For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 5 POUNDS ·” and the date of the year, and for the reverse either:

(a) a depiction of Alice and the Cheshire Cat sat in a tree accompanied by the inscription “ALICE’S ADVENTURES IN WONDERLAND”; or

(b) a depiction of Alice and the characters Tweedledee and Tweedledum and the inscription “THROUGH THE LOOKING-GLASS”.

The coin shall have a grained edge.’

(6) The said cupro-nickel coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

6. This Proclamation shall come into force on the twenty-seventh day of May Two thousand and twenty-one.

And Whereas under section 3(1)(ff) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to direct that any coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount:

And Whereas it appears to Us desirable to order that there should be made at Our Mint a new series of coins of the denominations of one hundred pounds and twenty-five pounds in gold, a new series of coins of the denomination of two pounds in silver, and a new series of coins of the denomination of five pounds in cupro-nickel:

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said section 3(1)(a), (b), (c), (cc), (cd), (d), (dd) and (ff), and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:

ONE HUNDRED POUND GOLD COIN

1. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of one hundred pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 31.21 grammes, a standard diameter of 32.69 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999.9, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.15 grammes; and

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.

(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 31.01 grammes.

(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:

‘For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 100 POUNDS ·” and the date of the year, and for the reverse a depiction of Franklin Roosevelt and Winston Churchill in front of the flags of the United States of America and the United Kingdom accompanied by the inscription “UNITED STATES - UNITED KINGDOM A SPECIAL RELATIONSHIP”. The coin shall have a grained edge.’

TWENTY-FIVE POUND GOLD COIN

2. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of twenty-five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 7.8 grammes, a standard diameter of 22 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999.9, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.025 grammes;
and

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.

(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 7.75 grammes.

(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:

‘For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 25 POUNDS ·”, and the date of the year and for the reverse a depiction of Franklin Roosevelt and Winston Churchill in front of the flags of the United States of America and the United Kingdom accompanied by the inscription “UNITED STATES - UNITED KINGDOM A SPECIAL RELATIONSHIP - 2021 - 1/4OZ FINE GOLD 999.9”. The coin shall have a grained edge.’

TWO POUND SILVER COIN

3. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of two pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 31.21 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of not less than 999 parts per thousand fine silver, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.15 grammes;
and

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.

(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(4) The design of the said silver coin shall be either:

(a) ‘For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 2 POUNDS ·”, and the date of the year, and for the reverse Franklin Roosevelt and Winston Churchill in front of the flags of the United States of America and the United Kingdom accompanied by the inscription “UNITED STATES - UNITED KINGDOM A SPECIAL RELATIONSHIP”; or

(b) For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 2 POUNDS”, and for the reverse Franklin Roosevelt and Winston Churchill in front of the flags of the United States of America and the United Kingdom accompanied by the inscription “UNITED STATES - UNITED KINGDOM A SPECIAL RELATIONSHIP - 2021 - 1OZ FINE SILVER 999”.

The coin shall have a grained edge.’

(5) The said silver coin shall be legal tender for payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

FIVE POUND CUPRO-NICKEL COIN

4. (1) A new coin of cupro-nickel of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 28.28 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of seventy-five per centum copper and twenty-five per centum nickel, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said cupro-nickel coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.75 grammes;

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and

(c) a variation from the said standard composition of two per centum copper and two per centum nickel.

(3) The said cupro-nickel coin may contain impurities of three-quarters of one per centum.

(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(5) The design of the said cupro-nickel coin shall be as follows:

‘For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 5 POUNDS ·” and the date of the year, and for the reverse a depiction of Franklin Roosevelt and Winston Churchill in front of the flags of the United States of America and the United Kingdom accompanied by the inscription “UNITED STATES - UNITED KINGDOM A SPECIAL RELATIONSHIP ”. The coin shall have a grained edge.’

(6) The said cupro-nickel coin shall be legal tender for payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

5. This Proclamation shall come into force on the twenty-seventh day of May Two thousand and twenty-one.

**DETERMINING THE SPECIFICATIONS AND DESIGN FOR A
NEW SERIES OF FIVE POUND COINS IN STANDARD SILVER,
SILVER PIEDFORT AND CUPRO-NICKEL**

Whereas under section 3(1)(a), (b), (cc), (cd), (d) and (dd) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to determine the denomination, the design and dimensions of coins to be made at Our Mint, to determine the weight and composition of coins other than gold coins or coins of silver of Our Maundy money, and the remedy to be allowed in the making of such coins, to provide for the manner of measurement of the variation from the standard weight of coins, and to determine the percentage of impurities which such coins may contain:

And Whereas under section 3(1)(ff) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to direct that any coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount:

And Whereas it appears to Us desirable to order that there should be made at Our Mint a new series of coins of the denomination of five pounds in standard silver, in silver piedfort and in cupro-nickel:

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said section 3(1)(a), (b), (cc), (cd), (d), (dd) and (ff), and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:

FIVE POUND STANDARD SILVER COIN

1. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 28.28 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of 925 parts per thousand fine silver, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.45 grammes;

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and

(c) a variation from the said standard composition of five parts per thousand fine silver.

(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(4) The said silver coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

FIVE POUND SILVER PIEDFORT COIN

2. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 56.56 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of 925 parts per thousand fine silver, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.51 grammes;

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and

(c) a variation from the said standard composition of five parts per thousand fine silver.

(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(4) The said silver coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

FIVE POUND CUPRO-NICKEL COIN

3. (1) A new coin of cupro-nickel of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 28.28 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of seventy-five per centum copper and twenty-five per centum nickel, and being circular in shape.

(2) In the making of the said cupro-nickel coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:

(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.75 grammes;

(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and

(c) a variation from the said standard composition of two per centum copper and two per centum nickel.

(3) The said cupro-nickel coin may contain impurities of three-quarters of one per centum.

(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

(5) The said cupro-nickel coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

DESIGN OF THE COINS

4. The design of the said five pound standard silver, silver piedfort and cupro-nickel coins shall be as follows:

‘For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription “· ELIZABETH II · D · G · REG · F · D · 5 POUNDS ·” and the date of the year, and for the reverse four poppies accompanied by the inscription “AT THE GOING DOWN OF THE SUN & IN THE MORNING WE WILL REMEMBER THEM”. The coin shall have a grained edge.’

5. This Proclamation shall come into force on the twenty-seventh day of May Two thousand and twenty-one.

SCHEDULE

AMENDMENTS TO THE CHARTER OF THE ROYAL COLLEGE OF ART

Delete Articles 1 to 28 and **substitute**:

“1. This Charter constitutes the College as one Body Politic and Corporate with perpetual succession and a Common Seal by the name and style of “The Royal College of Art” (“the College”).

2. The objects of the College shall be to advance learning, knowledge and professional competence particularly in the field of fine arts, in the principles and practice of art and design in their relation to industrial and commercial processes and social developments and other subjects relating thereto through teaching, research and collaboration with industry and commerce (“the Objects”).

3. The College shall be a teaching, a research and an examining body and shall, have all the powers of a natural person including but not limited to the following powers, in furtherance of the Objects and so far as permitted by charity law:

- i) To award degrees, diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions of the College and to withdraw such awards.
- ii) To confer honorary Degrees and other distinctions on approved persons.

- iii) To co-operate with other institutions and individuals for purposes as the College may from time to time determine and to award joint degrees or other joint awards.
- iv) To enter into any agreement for the incorporation within the College of any other institution and for taking over its rights, property and liabilities and staff.
- v) To institute and award Fellowships, Scholarships, Studentships, Exhibitions, Bursaries and Prizes and other aids to study and research.
- vi) To borrow and raise money and give security for loans; and for those purposes the College shall have the authority to enter into any financial instrument which is ancillary or incidental to the exercise of such powers.
- vii) To demand and receive fees, to take such steps as may from time to time be deemed appropriate for the purpose of procuring contributions to the funds of the College and to raise money in such other manner as the College may deem fit.
- viii) To act as trustee or manager of any property, legacy, endowment, bequest or gifts.
- ix) To invest.
- x) To give guarantees.
- xi) To do all such other acts and things whether incidental to these powers or not as may be required in order to further the Objects.

4. There shall be a Visitor of the College who shall be appointed from time to time by the Council and who shall have the right from time to time and in such manner as they shall think fit to direct an investigation into the internal affairs of the College.

5. There shall be a Chancellor of the College who shall be the titular head of the College and shall preside over Convocation and confer degrees.

6. There shall be a Pro-Chancellor of the College who shall, in the absence of the Chancellor or during a vacancy in the office of the Chancellor exercise all the functions of the Chancellor including conferring degrees and shall be ex officio the Chair for the time being of the Council referred to in Article 9 of this Our Charter.

7. There shall be a Vice-Chancellor of the College who shall be the principal Academic and Administrative Officer of the College and ex officio Chair of the Senate and shall in the absence of the Chancellor or during a vacancy in the office of the Chancellor confer degrees.

8. There shall be a Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Provost of the College who shall, in the absence of the Vice-Chancellor or during a vacancy in the office of the Vice-Chancellor perform the functions and duties of the Vice-Chancellor.
9. There shall be a Council of the College ("the Council") which shall be the governing body of the College with responsibility for the management and administration of the whole of the revenue and property of the College and the conduct of all its affairs, purposes and functions.
10. There shall be a Senate of the College ("the Senate") which shall, subject to the Statutes and to the control and approval of the Council, be responsible for the academic work of the College both in teaching and in research and for the admission, regulation and superintendence of the education and discipline of the Students of the College.
11. Subject to the provisions of this Our Charter, the Statutes may prescribe or regulate such matters as the Council may deem fit for the governance of the College.
12. The Council may from time to time, with the agreement of the Senate, by Special Resolution amend or repeal this Our Charter provided that no such amendments or additions shall have effect until approved by Us, Our Heirs or Successors in Council.
13. The Council may from time to time, with the agreement of the Senate, by Special Resolution amend the Statutes provided that such amendments shall not be inconsistent with the provisions of this Our Charter.
14. The Council may make Ordinances and may add to amend or repeal such Ordinances.
15. Subject to the provisions of this Our Charter and the Statutes, the Council and the Senate, respectively may from time to time make Regulations for governing their proceedings and may add to, amend or repeal any such Regulations.
16. (i) It shall be the duty of the Council to refer to the Senate any matters having academic implications and not previously considered by the Senate or which, in the opinion of the Council, ought to be dealt with by the Senate.

(ii) It shall be the duty of the Senate to bring before the Council any matters having financial implications.
17. The College shall be committed to the fair and equal treatment of every person and shall not discriminate on unjustified, irrelevant or unlawful grounds.
18. For the purpose of this Our Charter a "Special Resolution" means a resolution passed at a meeting of the Council; provided that notice of each meeting shall be given to each Member of Council not less than fourteen days before the meeting be held and that the resolution be passed at each meeting by a majority of not less than three-fourths of those present and voting.

19. The property and funds of the College shall be used only for promoting the Objects. If the College is dissolved, the assets (if any) remaining after providing for all its liabilities must be applied in one or more of the following ways:

- i) by transfer to one or more bodies established for exclusively charitable purposes, within the same as or similar to the Objects;
- ii) directly for the Objects or for charitable purposes which are within or similar to the Objects;
- iii) in such other manner consistent with charitable status as the Privy Council approves in writing in advance.

20. In this Our Charter “Statutes” means the Statutes set forth in the Schedule, “Ordinances” means ordinances made by Council pursuant to this Our Charter or to the Statutes, “Regulations”, except when otherwise required by the context, means Regulations made pursuant to this Our Charter or to the Statutes or Ordinances.”.

SCHEDULE

AMENDMENTS TO THE CHARTER OF THE ROYAL VETERINARY COLLEGE

1. **Delete** Article 1 and **substitute**:

“1. The Body Corporate constituted, appointed and established by the Original Charter by the name "The Royal Veterinary College" ("the College" or "the RVC") shall and may sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded in all Courts whether of Law or Equity either in Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and shall have perpetual succession and a Common Seal which may be changed or varied by them or at their pleasure.”.

2. In Article 4:-

(a) **delete** “The College” and **substitute** “The RVC” before “shall mean "The Royal Veterinary College”;

(b) **insert** “;” after “shall mean “The Royal Veterinary College””;

(c) **delete** “College” and **substitute** “RVC” after “shall mean the Council of the”;

(d) **insert** “; and” after “shall mean the Council of the RVC for the time being”;

(e) **delete** “College” and **substitute** “RVC” after “shall mean the Statutes of the”.

3. **Delete** Article 5 and **substitute**:

“5. The object of the RVC is to advance higher education and research and publish the useful results for the public benefit with particular focus in the art and science of veterinary medicine and surgery, biological and biomedical sciences and related subjects.

In furtherance of the above object and so far as permitted by charity law, the RVC shall have all the powers of a natural person including but not limited to the following powers:

(A) To teach and train students in the principles and practice of veterinary medicine and surgery and the sciences which inform them and in biological, biomedical and broader scientific domains and in particular to provide programmes of study or instruction to prepare students for degrees that are registrable pursuant to the Veterinary Surgeons Act 1966;

(B) To award degrees, diplomas, certificates and other marks of distinction of the RVC and withdraw such awards;

(C) To award degrees, diplomas, certificates and other marks of distinction in conjunction with another institution or institutions and to withdraw such awards in conjunction with the other institution or institutions;

(D) To provide facilities for the study of the ways in which animals may be maintained in good health both generally and in relation to the health and well-being of the people at large;

(E) To treat and care for injured and diseased animals;

(F) To investigate and practice methods of preventing and curing disease or injury and for enhancing the welfare of animals and humans in a one health context;

(G) To provide facilities for, encourage and conduct research in veterinary, biological and biomedical sciences and other related branches of knowledge and learning, and to organise, encourage and stimulate post-graduate study in those branches;

(H) To solicit, receive and administer in the interests of the RVC all kinds of grants, gifts, subscriptions, donations, legacies and endowments whether absolute or conditional, to act as trustees for or in relation to any such gifts, legacies and endowments and to retain any such gifts, legacies and endowments in their original form of investment for so long as may be thought fit;

(I) To invest;

(J) To require the payment of fees in respect of programmes of study or instruction;

(K) To acquire, own, maintain, lease, manage and dispose of land and other property;

(L) To erect, maintain, alter and improve any buildings upon any lands held by or belonging to the RVC, and to provide the same with all proper and necessary fixtures, fittings, apparatus, instruments, appliances and conveniences;

(M) To provide or arrange for the provision of student accommodation and other places of residence and recreation for students and others whether on property of the RVC or elsewhere;

(N) To borrow or raise money at interest upon banking account or otherwise and to secure or discharge any debt, liability or obligation, whether of the RVC or any other person, upon such security as the RVC may think fit for the furtherance of the purposes of the RVC and for those purposes the RVC shall have the authority to enter into any financial instrument which is ancillary or incidental to the exercise of such powers;

(O) To enter into guarantees, contracts of indemnity and suretyship and to draw, make, accept, issue, execute, endorse, and discount any instruments and securities, whether negotiable or otherwise, as the RVC may think fit for the furtherance of the purposes of the RVC;

(P) To act as trustees or managers of any property, endowment, legacy, bequest or gift for purposes of education or research;

(Q) To publish and distribute in any suitable physical or digital media information of an appropriate character;

(R) To exploit for the RVC's benefit any facility or resource of the RVC, including study, research or knowledge, or the practical application of study, research or knowledge, belonging to the RVC whether alone or jointly;

(S) To subscribe to any charities, and to grant donations for any charitable purpose, and to provide or join in any superannuation fund or scheme for the benefit of the members of the staff of the RVC;

(T) To employ staff in such positions as may be required and prescribe their conditions of service;

(U) To prescribe rules for the discipline of students and to provide procedures for the hearing of complaints by students;

(V) To co-operate and collaborate with other institutions;

(W) To incorporate into the RVC any other institution, or any branch or department of another institution, and take over its rights, property and liabilities, for any purpose not inconsistent with this Our Charter;

(X) To carry on any activity whatsoever and in such manner that is not inconsistent with the charitable status of the RVC and that in the opinion of the Council is conducive to the furtherance of the purposes of the RVC; and

(Y) To do anything else necessary or convenient, whether incidental to these powers or not, in order to further the object of the RVC.”.

4. In Article 7, before “shall ensure the effective management and control”, **delete** “Principal” and **substitute** “Chief Executive” .

5. **Delete** Article 8 and **substitute**:

“8. The RVC shall show no discrimination on account of political belief, gender, sexual orientation, gender reassignment, disability, age, marriage and civil partnership, race, ethnic origin, religion or belief, social background and pregnancy and maternity against any person in determining whether he or she is to be admitted as a member of staff or Council, or as a student, or to hold any advantage or privilege of the RVC.”.

5. **Renumber** Articles 10 to 17 as Articles 11 to 18.

6. **Insert** new Article 10:

“10. The RVC shall take such steps as are reasonably practical to ensure that freedom of speech within the law is secured for its students and members of staff and for visiting speakers.”.

7. **Delete** Article 13 as renumbered and **substitute**:

“13. No addition to, repeal of or alteration in the Statutes shall have any force or effect unless and until the same shall have been approved by at least two thirds of those present and voting at a Meeting of the Council provided that no Statute shall have any force or effect if it be repugnant to the provisions of this Our Charter or to the laws of Our Realm.”.

8. In Article 14 as renumbered **delete** “Part II of the Companies Act 1989” and **substitute** “Schedule 10 of the Companies Act 2006”.

9. In Article 16 as renumbered **delete** “provided that so long as the College remains a College of the University of London no such alteration, amendment or addition shall be repugnant to the Statutes and Ordinances of the University of London”.

10. **Delete** Article 17 as renumbered and **renumber** Article 18 as Article 17.

11. In Articles 2, 3, 6, 7, 9, 11 to 12 and 14 to 17 as renumbered **delete** “College” wherever it occurs and **substitute** “RVC”.

The Secretary of State for Justice, after giving ten days' notice of his intention to do so, has, under the Burial Act 1853 as amended, made representations to Her Majesty in Council that, subject to the exceptions below, burials should be discontinued in:-

- 1) the Churchyard at St Michaels Church, Lumb, Rossendale, Lancashire (as shown hatched on the plan);
- 2) St Peter and St Paul Churchyard, Church Lane, Tasley, Shropshire (as shown hatched on the plan).

The exceptions are that:-

- (a) in any vault or walled grave in the churchyard, burial may be allowed but every coffin in such vault or grave must be separately enclosed by stonework or brick work properly cemented;
- (b) in any existing earthen grave in the churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons previously buried in that grave, but no part of the coffin containing the body shall be less than one metre below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave; and
- (c) in any grave space in which no interment has previously taken place, the burial may be allowed of any person for whom, or any member of the family for which that grave space has been reserved and appropriated, with the exclusive right of burial there, but no part of the coffin containing the body shall be less than one metre below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

Her Majesty in Council is pleased to give Notice of these representations and to order that they be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on 7th July 2021.

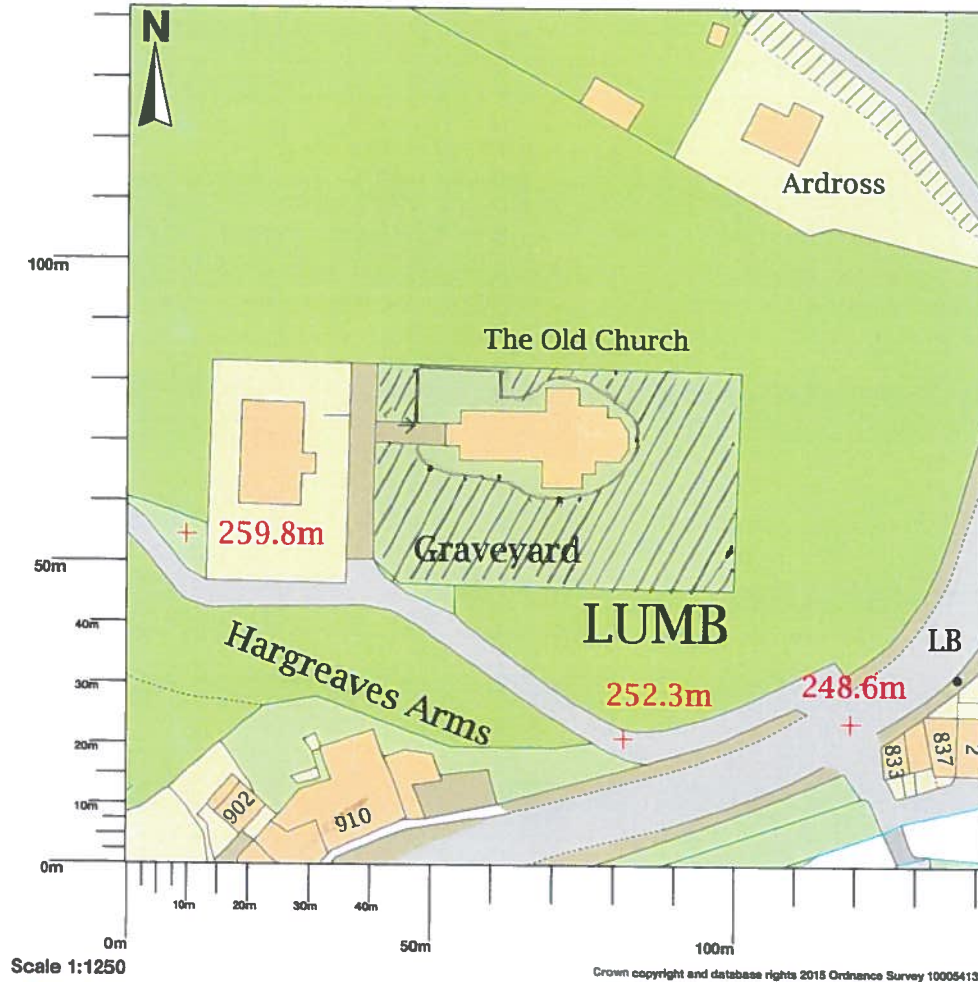

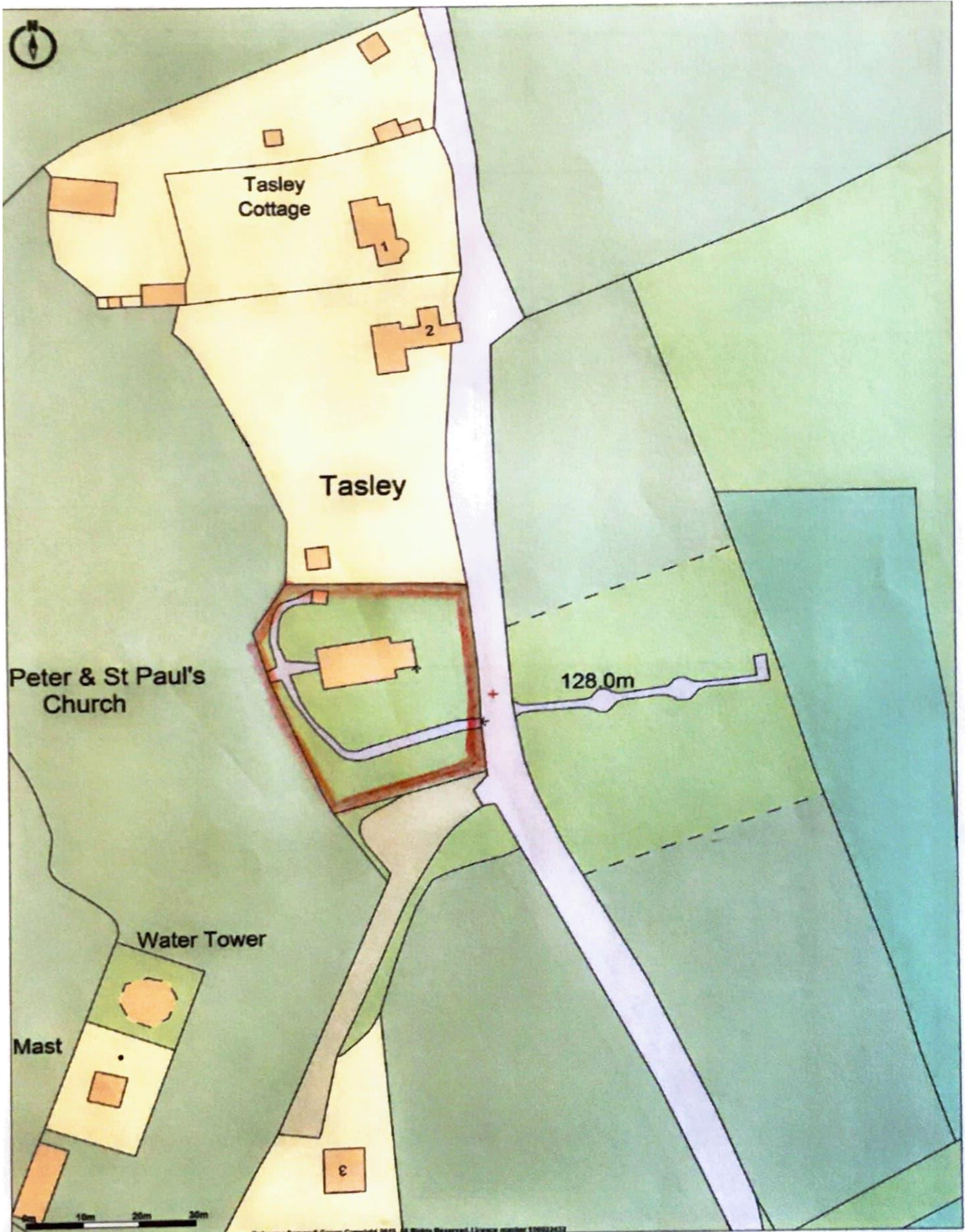


The Old Church, Burnley Road East, Rossendale, BB4 9PQ
