BRIGADIER GENERAL THOMAS HAMMOND

The German high command, during World War I, would have been a lot happier if a certain young Captain Thomas Hammond hadn't been around when the famous Rainbow Division entered the fight. For his exploits, and those of his buddies including Brigadier General Douglas MacArthur, made one of the most brilliant pages of American history. Captain Hammond's part in writing that page is evidenced by his citation for bravery and his promotion to the rank of Lt. Colonel before the Armistice was signed.

Today, Hitler, Hirohito and that other fellow would be a lot happier if a certain Brigadier General Thomas Hammond weren't around to direct the activity of the Chicago Ordnance District, and to act as probably one of the greatest purchasing agents in the world. He and his staff are charged with procuring for the army, roughly four billion dollars worth of trucks, guns and jeeps. When the army wants anything from the smallest bullet to the largest tank, General Hammond's office gets it for them -- on or ahead of schedule. To assist him in his tremendous task the General has 120 officers and 4875 civilian employees in his organization.

Born in New York state, General Hammond's family moved to Chicago while he was a boy. He attended the primary schools in Chicago and graduated from Hyde Park High School in that city where his ability as a football player first became evident. The year after he completed high school, he entered the University of Michigan Law School. There he was a member of "Hurry-up" Yost's famous pointa-minute team - which ranked then and now as the best football squad in the history of Michigan. He graduated in 1905, and the following year he coached the University of Mississippi football team through a highly satisfactory season.

However, Thomas Hammond decided, that year, that he had enough of sports and that it was time he started his business career. As he had no particular desire to become a practicing lawyer, he entered the employ of the Whiting Corporation in 1907 as an office boy. During the ensuing years he worked in practically every department, and when he went on active duty in the first world war, he was Secretary of the Company. When military duty called him again in January 1942, General Hammond resigned as President of the Whiting Corporation to take his present command.

The General's principal hobbies include riding, golf, flying and farming his 400 acres at Aurora, Illinois, where he resides. Before the war, he frequently commuted by plane from the farm to the Whiting plant in Harvey, a pleasure the

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General has had to forego since his office is now located in Chicago.

General Hammond is married and has two sons, each of whom has followed one phase of his father's dual career. One is on active duty with the U.S. Army, the other assisting in the management of the Whiting Corporation.
