2021 SABR Annual Report Appendix 1: Chapter Reports

Rickwood Field Chapter (Birmingham, AL)

COVID-19's ripple effects were again felt throughout the year. The Rickwood Classic, which had been scheduled for June 8, 2020, was canceled in the wake of Major League Baseball's decision to scrap the entire minor league season. Although we had planned for the Classic to return in 2021, MLB's COVID-19 restrictions will not allow the game to occur. After consecutive "rainouts", we remain hopeful that MLB will allow the 24th annual Rickwood Classic to be played in 2022.

Other casualties to the virus were the **18th Annual Southern Association Baseball Conference**, which would have been held at Rickwood Field in early March 2021, and the **Jerry Malloy Negro League Conference**, which had been rescheduled for late July 2021. However, with case counts lowering and the arrival of vaccines, we are confident both conferences will go forward in 2022.

As always, several members have been busy with research and writing projects. Joe DeLeonard, Ben Powell, Lamar Smith, and Jeb Stewart have started the **Rickwood Hall of Fame Project Committee** to confirm every member of the Baseball Hall of Fame who appeared at Rickwood Field as a player, manager, coach, or umpire. So far, they have added 30 new Hall of Famers to the previous total of 107. We will report our findings next year. Jeb Stewart also contributed a chapter on Greenlee Field in SABR's recent book, *Pride of Smoketown: The 1935 Pittsburgh Crawfords*. And in July, chapter members were thrilled with the release of Art Black's latest book, *Fame and Fortune in The Show: Baseball at Rickwood Field and Beyond in the Middle 1900s*.

Last year, the Chapter conducted a poll of its members to vote on the best Barons, Athletics, and Black Barons at each position from the Rickwood-era in Birmingham baseball (1910-1987). As a follow-up, from May 30 to June 21, 2021, the Chapter conducted a Facebook poll to determine the best team in Rickwood's history. 16 teams were selected from the Birmingham Barons, Black Barons, and A's. Clubs were seeded based on their records, winning percentage, regular season pennants, post-season performance, statistical data, and anecdotal evidence based on the pitchers and player rosters of each team. After two weekends of voting, just four teams remained.

The final four featured the 1958 Birmingham Barons, the only Barons team to ever win the Southern Association pennant, the SA Playoffs, and the Dixie Series in the same season. Their opponent was the 1948 Birmingham Black Barons, who won the Negro American League pennant and appeared in the last Negro League World Series. The '58 Barons prevailed by a single vote.

The other side of the bracket included two Dixie Series winners. The 1931 Birmingham Barons won the SA pennant and an exciting Dixie Series over Dizzy Dean's Houston Buffaloes. The Barons opponent was the 1967 Birmingham A's, who had three future Hall of Famers on the roster (Reggie Jackson, Rollie Fingers, and Tony LaRussa) and won the Southern League pennant before defeating the Albuquerque Dodgers to win the last Dixie Series. SABR Chapter voters overwhelmingly favored the A's in this imaginary matchup.

In the final contest, the '67 A's squeaked by the '58 Barons by just one vote. For more information, please like the Rickwood Field SABR Chapter on Facebook.

The vote for Birmingham's best team was more than just a fun baseball distraction during the pandemic. The biographies for each club provided members with new information about the teams, players, leagues, and seasons, and will prove helpful in updating Rickwood's championship list on the third base grandstand.

On Saturday, March 6, 2021, Rickwood Field hosted the Chapter's annual meeting, which was well attended. Attendees were treated to grilled bratwursts and Italian sausages and watched a slide show of about 350 photographs from the Friends of Rickwood's collection of 2,000 photographs from 1931-1987, which the organization obtained from the *Birmingham News*.

It was nice to spend an afternoon talking baseball, even while social distancing and wearing masks. The event raised \$236 in donations for the Friends of Rickwood in the organization's efforts to restore Rickwood Field, America's Oldest Ballpark.

As a bonus, Miles College played Stillman College in a doubleheader that afternoon. The Golden Bears swept both games from the Stillman Tigers, 11-10 and 16-2. For most of us, it was the first live baseball game we had attended in person in over a year.

A few years ago, the author came across two WWI military documents indicating that several future Hall of Famers served together briefly in a Chemical Weapons Service training unit in June 1918. Mathewson was the Lieutenant in charge of the unit, which was clearly intended for propaganda purposes. Yet its very existence has never been mentioned anywhere — in the press of the period, in biographies, or in histories. Accounts of Mathewson's and Ty Cobb's exposure to gas in France in the fall of that year do not reference the earlier training. What can account for this? In his forthcoming novel (Summer Game Books), the author shares the papers and offers one possible explanation — a

century-long effort by baseball and the military to cover up a terrible, and in the circumstances, highly embarrassing event. The story is fiction. But if *this* never happened, what did?

Stephen Bratkovich—*The Baseball Bat: From Trees to the Major Leagues, 19th Century to Today.* The author combined the two topics he loves, trees (wood) and baseball.

Yahoo Chat Group

This chat group was initiated in July 2018. It was not very active and has been discontinued this year.

Projects and Newsletters

- **July 2020:** All-Time Padres Team. The project was managed by three of our members: Geoff Young, along with Dan Boyle and Greg Funk. Selection of the All-Time Team was guided via a vote by chapter members.
- **August 2020:** Padres 2020 Opening Day: 9 Viewpoints. Nine chapter members wrote essays concerning the unique 2020 Opening Day that was delayed by the pandemic.
- **November 2020:** Padres 2020. This was a look back at the Padres' pandemic-shortened 2020 season. Five essays were contributed along with the results of a survey of members regarding the season. The report's Appendixes provided an extensive historical review of the season.
- **February 2021:** Newsletter. Seven articles were included.
- **June 2021:** Newsletter (in preparation)
- June 2021: Grave Marker. Our Steering Committee has approved an annual effort to prepare and install historical baseball markers in San Diego. For this year we will complete a grave marker for former MLB player Joe Quest. His career covered 10 seasons (1871 and 1878-1886). He was part of the major league's first rookie class (1871) and given credit for originating the term "charley horse." Andy Strasberg took the lead on this project.

City of San Diego Library (Baseball Research Center) Partnership

The Library's Baseball Research Center (BRC), now called the Sullivan Family Baseball Research Center, was created in 1999 in partnership with our chapter. Our general functions are to: (1) coordinate with the Library on the processing and organization of new material, (2) offer input related to acquisition of newly issued baseball-related items, and (3) provide items for BRC displays.

The Library has a staff position who provides liaison with our chapter, and serves as an ex-officio member on our Steering Committee. Until promoted recently, Bob Surratt served in this position. A process is underway to select a replacement.

Thanks to three SABR members, significant donations were received by the BRC in the past year:

• **November 2020:** The Joseph P. Murphy Jr. Baseball Autograph Collection consists of 10 volumes accumulated by lifelong fan and long-time SABR member Joe Murphy. There are 1,300+ items in the Collection, which includes authentic autographs, stat sheets, and

biographical clippings. There are autographs of Baseball Hall of Fame members such as Babe Ruth, Ted Williams, Lou Gehrig, and Honus Wagner.

- **December 2020:** Through the generosity of Jim Wohlenhaus, a SABR member from Flagler, Colorado, we received another 53 *Baseball* magazines from 1942, 1943, 1946, 1947, 1952, 1964, and 1965. These filled gaps in our collection to the extent that we have a near-complete run.
- May 2021: The entire run of *Baseball Gold* publications was donated by SABR member Fred Rodgers who was editor/publisher of the publication. The monthly publication existed from September 1982 through June 1986 and focused on San Diego Padres' players from those years plus San Diego baseball history.

Ray Nemec Baseball Archives

In April 2019 baseball research material from the Ray Nemec family was donated to our chapter. Included are player records, unpublished minor league averages, and minor league box score-game scrapbooks. These scrapbooks represent 344 league-seasons between 1934 and 1950. Chapter members engaged in digitization of the books and to date nearly 30% have been digitized. However, progress has paused because most of the remaining books are in bad shape (mainly due to the glue holding the box scores has disintegrated with the result that a large number of the box score clips, which are undated, are loose).

Oscar Charleston Chapter (Indianapolis, IN)

May 9, 2020 meeting

Thank you to Professor Todd McDorman for presenting and to Andrew Reinbold for running the trivia, at the Oscar Charleston SABR Chapter meeting on Saturday, May 9, 2020.

Professor McDorman built off of his 2019 Cooperstown presentation called "Nobody's Perfect': Armando Galarraga's (Im)Perfect Game and Instant Replay." Professor McDorman analyzed the controversial (and almost certainly botched) call on what would've been the final out of Galarraga's perfect game, when Galarraga's Detroit Tigers played the Cleveland Indians on June 2, 2010. We can view this episode through Kenneth Burke's idea of perfection, which helps analyze social rhetoric. According to Burke, humans constantly seek perfection and when we fail to achieve it we seek redemption in one of two ways: tragedy or comedy.

Viewing the Galarraga episode as tragic redemption, some commentators blamed umpire Jim Joyce for his call, blamed Commissioner Bud Selig for MLB's inaction in remedying the call, or advocated for better instant replay, to avoid future mistakes. Here, tragedy means scapegoating and victimization. Viewing the episode, however, as comic redemption, other commentators observed Galarraga's forgiveness, Joyce's contrition, and baseball's imperfect beauty. Here, baseball as comedy means humility and compassion, despite the conflict. Professor McDorman noted that in MLB's desire to perfect the game, it might also fall into Burkean tragedy with the Zapruder-like parsing of each umpire call. Instead, Burkean comedy acknowledges—even embraces—the fact that no one's perfect.

Finally, as for trivia, Professor McDorman claimed victory, scoring seventy of ninety possible points.

Thank you to everyone who attended. I'll be in touch as July approaches with information about our next gathering. July 25, 2020 Meeting

Saturday, July 25, Bruce Schumacher, chairman and chief executive officer of the Indianapolis Indians spoke to the Oscar Charleston Chapter of the Society for American Baseball Research. We

met at the beautiful, new Elements Financial Club at Victory Field. Bruce answered several questions, which I'll summarize under three categories.

First, Bruce addressed the canceled 2020 Indianapolis Indians season. The Indians received a loan of just over \$900,000 from the Paycheck Protection Program, and the organization has also tried to make the most of Victory Field in the midst of the canceled season. This summer, Victory Field has hosted the College Summer League, which features around 270 college baseball players. These games maintain Covid-19 safety measures including mask requirements, temperature checks, unidirectional

foot traffic lanes, prepackaged concessions, and a cap of 3,500 attendees. Beyond the College Summer League, Victory Field has hosted (or will soon host) high school baseball tournaments, a blood drive, a nine-hole golf course, and a classic car show.

Second, Bruce shared his thoughts on the MLB-MiLB working agreement negotiations. He foresees longer agreements than the current deals, which are a minimum of two years. This discussion also touched on the historical, and probably continuing, consolidation of MiLB. MLB has proposed moving toward a uniform, four-team (AAA, AA, A, and Rookie League) MiLB system. This contemplated contraction stems, at least in part, from changes in some teams' talent development strategies; these teams believe that they can save money with fewer MiLB teams, while relying on advanced metrics and scouting to find and cultivate sufficient talent.

Third, Bruce touched on how the Indians' name fits into the recent conversations regarding sports team names. He mentioned that the team's nickname originally stemmed from our state's and city's names of Indiana and Indianapolis, both of which lead neatly into the "Indians" nickname. Despite this, Bruce indicated his openness to addressing suggestions or concerns from any local Native Americans or Native American advocacy groups. Saturday's meeting didn't touch on the Indians creation of a committee to review the name, which was announced on Tuesday, July 28.

Finally, Bruce mentioned that, recently, for the first time in several months, he was able to visit his dad, Max, who's 87-years-old. Max is the Indians' former chairman and chief executive officer. Closing with good news, Bruce said that Max is doing well and in good health.

January 28, 2021 Meeting

 - Tom Gilbert, on Athletic president Col. Thomas Fitzgerald
 - BASEBALL QUIZ(!) and Lunch/Break
 - Tyler Kepner, Q&A
 - J. Daniel, talked about the 1980 season and 1980 Phillies
 - Matt Lieb, presented on the disgraced pitcher Jim Devlin
- February 2021: a new chapter website was created to establish a traditional online presence. The site https://phillysabr.com/ hosts general chapter information, Mack Chat recaps, and offers space for member research publication (if desired). Links to the main SABR website and SABR 43 are also included.
- February 2021: Matt Aber transferred the chapter's Twitter admin duties to Matt Albertson. Aber lost his battle with cancer later in the month. The chapter mourns is passing and

- appreciates the work he put into the Twitter account. Rock Hoffman maintains the chapter's Facebook account.
- April 2021: chapter member Stephen Glassman became the chapter's first secretary and takes notes of the weekly Mack Chats.
- April 27, 2021: co-chair Rock Hoffman acted on an idea raised in a Mack Chat to add Dick Allen's name to the chapter's title. Quebec Chapter (Montreal, QC)

In spite of a worldwide pandemic that disrupted several aspects of our daily lives, the SABR Quebec Chapter is pleased to report another fantastic year.

It began in late January when we gathered at our usual Montreal restaurant to hear Patrick Carpentier and Marcel Dugas talk about the evolution of French baseball terms in the Province of Quebec. Up until the late 1940s, most baseball terms were not translated and the English vocabulary was used in French newspapers. For the Expos' first game in 1969, several newspaper people developed a complete French baseball vocabulary. Our very own Jacques Doucet was one of them. He told us how he contributed to the effort and how several of the terms he invented are still in use today.

Our next meeting was a virtual one. Christian Trudeau made a presentation on his research into the life of Charlie Culver an African American player who signed a contract in 1922 with Montreal in the Class-B Eastern Canada League, 24 years before Jackie Robinson broke baseball's color barrier. Culver played only a few games before being transferred to a semi-pro club outside of Montreal. Christian's research has raised significant interest, with an article published in Montreal daily La Presse and an another in the *Baseball Research Journal*.

We usually gather in Quebec City in August to attend a baseball game. The covid situation in Quebec was so good that we had hoped that small gatherings might be allowed but it never materialized. We decided to skip our summer meeting altogether.

We next met through Zoom in November to hear Daniel Papillon talk about the history of baseball in Quebec City as seen through ten great baseball players who played in the city. Daniel was the cofounder of our chapter together with Bill Young, and it was a treat to have him entertain us about a subject to which he dedicated a lifetime. As a bonus, Bill told us a few stories from his teenage years, including the time when he had a conversation with Jesse Owens, who visited Quebec City with a barnstorming Negro Leagues team, the Indianapolis Clowns.

As mandated by our chapter by-laws, we held an election in October in order to select our chapter leaders for the 2021-2022 term. Patrick Carpentier and Robert Duval ran unopposed and were elected president and vice-president, respectively. Philippe Cousineau was asked if he wanted to continue as our chapter secretary. He gracefully said yes. So, our chapter leadership remains the same for the next two years.

The pandemic had a welcome positive effect in that many members who live too far away from Montreal to attend our meetings now virtually could. This was the case of Christian Trudeau and Daniel Papillon, whom we could have never heard without the Zoom platform. As a consequence, our meetings were well attended, more so than before the pandemic.

Our membership is also at its highest level since 2011. Our promotional efforts on social media and a couple of articles in newspapers enhanced our visibility in the community. Several new Quebec-based members joined SABR and therefore our chapter.

Our website has seen record traffic in 2020, thanks to added content and stories. Website visits have almost doubled while pages seen increased by more than 40%.

2020 was a strong year for our chapter. We expect 2021 to follow the same trend.

A nonscheduled highlight occurred when a technical glitch arose in the Zoom presentation. A solution to correct it was provided by Herman Krabbenhoft's grandson, who (by my eyeball guess) was about 9 years old.

Another Zoom session is scheduled for Wednesday, June 23, from 8 to 10 P.M. There will be three presentations.

Meanwhile, the chapter is looking for a new venue for its June in-person meetings starting in 2022. Our traditional meeting site, McCoy Stadium in Pawtucket, is pretty much shut down because the Pawtucket Red Sox have moved to Worcester. The new ballpark in Worcester is eyed as a possible new site, but no decision has been made yet.

Rogers Hornsby Chapter (Austin, TX)

Like much of the world, the Rogers Hornsby Chapter shifted all meetings to online to cope with the impact of COVID-19 from June 2020 to May 2021.

Thanks to video conferencing, the chapter maintained its streak of consecutive months with a meeting to 174 months, a streak dating to December 2006.

Among the brightest highlights were having Oakland Athletics' utility player and former Houston Astros player Tony Kemp and former major league pitcher Ross Ohlendorf join us for our online winter meeting in January 2021. The winter meeting also featured longtime Round Rock Express broadcaster Mike Capps. It was the 15th Annual Bill Gilbert Winter Meeting.

During the summer of 2020, many of our online discussions were about the pandemic's impact on Major League Baseball which had its season shortened and delayed. We also talked about professional baseball occurring in other parts of the world such as Japan, South Korea and China.

In November, the chapter bestowed the Rajah Award to Jim Kenton, the creator of the chapter's BasebALZ reminiscence program, which has continued to offer online programs for Alzheimer's patients and caregivers throughout the year. In addition, program leaders continue to work with other SABR chapters in hopes of expanding these programs elsewhere. The program is now in its seventh year.

The online format gave our chapter members a chance to meet and interact with SABR members from across the country, making for interesting baseball chatter beyond the usual discussions. Being online

also helped us attract a number of guest speakers and book authors that we normally would not have heard from.

Longtime Astros broadcaster Bill Brown joined us in October 2020 to talk about the recent passing of Hall of Fame player Joe Morgan, and his new book, "Sportscasting 101: The road to play-by-play."

In March 2021, Halsey Hall Chapter member Dan Levitt told us about baseball's first drug scandal involving Hal Newhouser's use of Novocaine injections (relatively new at the time for ballplayers) to help pitch during the 1945 World Series in which he won two games, including a complete-game win in the clincher.

In February 2021, former award-winning baseball broadcaster Dan Taylor shared stories from his new book, "Lights, Camera, Fastball: How the Hollywood Stars Changed Baseball," about the Hollywood Stars in the Pacific Coast League.

On SABR Day, Pee Wee Reese Chapter member Kelly Park shared anecdotes from his book, "Just Like Me: When the Pros Played on the Sandlot," and stories about his 10-year interviewing and writing project.

A member of the Larry Dierker Chapter in Houston, Scott Barzilla talked about his newly published book, "The Hall of Fame Index Part II," in December 2020.

During our online meetings, we've enjoyed hearing stories from one of the chapter's newest members, Joe Gallagher, who had a long career in baseball broadcasting. He worked as a producer for the New York Mets television and radio broadcasts and NBC's Game of the Week in the 1960s.

Ernie Banks-Bobby Bragan DFW Chapter (Dallas, TX)

The Ernie Banks-Bobby Bragan DFW Chapter had several events during the last 12 months as we went to a virtual format due to the pandemic. During his long career, Art signed over 70 future major leaguers, including Bo Jackson. Art was interviewed by chapter member **John Mayeron**, who was a long-time friend of Stewart's, as Stewart recalled his long history in the game. The chapter had 34 people on the conference call. Sadly, John Mayeron passed away just a few months later from complications following a bicycle accident.

On November 11, 2020, the chapter hosted a Zoom meeting with special guests Rangers' manager **Chris Woodward**, followed by **Jon Matlack**, former Mets and Rangers pitcher. We owed

special thanks to **Katherine Sartain**, Director of Special Events for the Major League Players' Alumni Association for securing Jon.

On February 3, 2021, the chapter hosted a Zoom meeting with special guest new Rangers general manager **Chris Young** and also had a lively baseball discussion led by recently retired award-winning baseball writer **TR Sullivan**.

On April 22, 2021, the chapter hosted a Zoom meeting again featuring **TR Sullivan** who discussed the prospects for the Texas Rangers in 2021 and beyond. In addition, we heard from **Dan Taylor**, author of the recently published *Lights, Camera, Fastball: How the Hollywood Stars Changed Baseball*, a great read about the Hollywood Stars and the old Pacific Coast League.

The pandemic ended the 2020 Division I college baseball season after teams had played 25% or fewer of their games, so for the first time in 28 years the chapter did not award its annual **Howard Green SABR Metroplex Collegiate Player of the Year Award** which is named in honor of the chapter's founder, the late **Howard Green**.

Since Division II, Division III and NAIA college teams were able to play about one-third to one-half of their 2020 schedules before the pandemic ended their seasons, the chapter did award its the ninth annual Carroll Beringer SABR Metroplex Collegiate Division Player of the Year Award, named for Carroll Beringer, long-time chapter member, former Texas League All-Star and Player of the Year (1959) and major league coach with the Dodgers and Phillies. Beringer, who passed away in 2011, was very active in supporting college baseball in the area. The award is for the top Metroplex collegiate player from four-year colleges playing Division II, Division III, or NAIA baseball. The ninth award winner is outfielder AJ Liu of UT Dallas.

Liu, a 5-10, 185-pound outfielder from Plano, Texas, started all 16 games for the Comets as a transfer from Swarthmore where he starred during the 2018 and '19 seasons. The junior gardener led the America Southwest Conference with a .492 average to go along with six doubles, four triples and one home run. He also drove in 16 runs (one per game) scored 18 runs and reached base safely in all 16 games. Liu also managed 11 multi-hit contests with six three-hit games and one 4-for-6 outing. Liu led UT Dallas with a 1.307 slugging percentage, batted 65 times, belted 32 hits, had a .754 on-base percentage, recorded 49 total bases. Before he came to play for the Comets, he batted .309 with 14 doubles as a sophomore starting outfielder at Swarthmore in '19.

Chapter president **Paul Rogers** and chapter Vice-President **Bo Carter** presented the award to Liu in a pre-game ceremony at home plate on April 25 before a UTD game versus LeTourneau University.

He joins inaugural recipient Chase Brown of UTD in 2012 and Brandon George in 2015 as three winners of the DFW SABR Chapter Beringer Award from the Comets program in nine seasons.
