

C.E.M.S. TO DISCUSS S.P. BETTING LAWS

A motion condemning the proposed legislation to legalize "off the course" betting, and pledging active opposition to this proposal, will be among the matters to be discussed at the State Conference of the Church of England Men's Society, which will commence at Pittsworth tomorrow.

Delegates from as far north as Mackay, and as far south as Victoria will attend the conference, which will be presided over by the chairman of the C.E.M.S. Executive Council (Rev. Noel Tomlinson, of East Brisbane).

The Victorian representative will be Rev. L. G. Ball, who will deliver an address on "The Crisis of Our Lives" at the opening session to-morrow morning, and will again speak at a later session.

Other speakers will be Mr. N. S. Connal, B.A., Principal of the Church of England Boys' School, Toowoomba, and Rev. Ivor Church, M.A., Principal of St. Francis' Theological College, Brisbane.

The visitors, who will be billeted at private homes during the week-end, will be shown over the Pittsworth cheese factory to-morrow afternoon, and later will be taken on a tour of wheat lands in the district.

Move to Form Choral Society

A public meeting convened by Mrs. Neil Gibson will be held at the Soldiers' Memorial School of Arts next Wednesday night, with the object of forming a choral society at Pittsworth.

After a lapse of many years, increasing interest is being shown locally in good music, and the proposed society is to be commended as a worthwhile cultural project, which could be of immense benefit to the community, and would help Pittsworth to re-gain the reputation it held many years ago as a particularly strong musical centre.

PRICES OF TREES

A wider appreciation of the value of trees on farms is being shown by landowners, and extensive planting has been carried out or is being planned on many farms in the Pittsworth and Millmerran districts, more especially on plain areas.

Many people who intend planting windbreaks, forestry plots, or even some ornamental trees will be interested to know that the Forestry Department supplies a wide range of trees at very nominal costs.

Trees are supplied in "tubes" and are generally six to nine inches high. Availability of certain species can be found out by contacting the Forestry Department, George Street, Brisbane.

Their price list is as follows:—Windbreak and ornamental species: Tubed, 80/- per 100. Trees for accredited forest plots: Tubed, 30/- per 100, plus deposit on tubes, 15/-. Trees for public bodies: 72/- per 100.

For tubed stock, to which the general rate of 80/- per 100 applies, lesser quantities sell at:—1 for 2/6, 2 for 4/-, 3 for 5/-, 6 for 9/-, 12 for 17/-, 50 for 55/-, 100 for 80/-.

In addition to the above prices, a packing charge is to be added, namely: 1-24 plants 1/6, 25-49 plants 2/6, 50 or each multiple 3/6. For instance, the packing charge for 60 plants would be 3/6 plus 1/6 (5/-).

Adult Education at Pittsworth

NOTED CHOIR TO VISIT PITTSWORTH

Tentative arrangements have been made for the well-known Queensland choral combination, the Services Choir, to give a recital at Pittsworth on Saturday, 27th November.

Because of the limited platform accommodation available, only 70 of the 125 members of the choir are expected to take part in the recital.

The Services Choir, winners of a number of championships at Eisteddfodau in Queensland and N.S.W., was formed in 1944 as a male voice choir of servicemen, and under the conductorship of staff-sergeant Alan B. Carter, rapidly attained a high reputation.

In 1947, membership was broadened, being no longer restricted to ex-servicemen, and in that year, a ladies' choir was formed.

Following the resignation of the original conductor, leadership was placed in the hands of Miss Ivy Brennan, who was well-known for her brilliant work with the Rockhampton Musical Union.

In addition to competing at Eisteddfodau, the choir has made numerous radio broadcasts, appeared at civic concerts, and has provided programmes to assist various charities.
