

When as an inquisitive infant of six she heard her parents discussing the Reform Bill she asked, childlike, to the told about it. Instead of being sanubbed, as many small folk would have been, her mother, who was witty as well as wise, gave her a sufficient inkling finto the state of affairs to rouse an interest which has never faded during the course of ther long life. At thirteen Miss Spence came to South Australia, and as teacher, journalist, author and politician has worked sindefatigably ever since. To one of her novels, Mr. Hogarth's Will, Melbourne charities owe much. This story dealt with a man who left his money so unwisely distributed that it caused considerable disraster. The reading of the book had such an influence on the late Mr. Wilson that he altered his will, and it is thanks to that alteration that the Wilson bequests are as well known as they are. It was not till she was 68 years of age that Miss Spence ever addressed a meeting—a fact, as she naïvely cremarked, that might encourage many of the women present to think it not too late for them to make a start. Since then she has addressed hundreds, speaking not only in South Australia, Melbourne and Sydney, but in America as well. Nearly all her speaking has been done in the cause of effective voting, which she acknowledges it is the dream of her life to see an accomplished fact.


