

That lovely stretch of water, the Laidley Creck, runs along the route, and no doubt is a great boon to the farmers in drought seasons. Mulgowie is the terminus of the railway line from Laidley, and in good seasons large consignments of farmers' agricultural and dairy produce are forwarded on to the main line to find the markets in the minimum of time. Timber, chieffy hardwood, is also handled in large quantities, much of which goes to the railway workshops at Ipawich.

Some seven or eight miles further along, at Thornton, there are also some very fine farms, and the farmers have had most successful results, as is evident by the neat homes to be seen dotted one atheretic otted along the route.

The lucerne paddocks are amongst the best I have seen in my travels, and in conversation with some of the farmers it was gleaned that the young plant lucerne this season is the best that has been grown along the valley for the past 15 or 20 years. These crops look the picture of luxuriance. It is no wonder the cattle are so sleek and fat, because there appears to be an abundance of feed everywhere an abundance of feed everywhere.

To show what beautiful areas exist these localities, it was pointed out to this scribe that one lucerne farm and homestead, containing 100 acres, recently changed hands for £3000 Without doubt, it is some farm ash. but it is not singular-there are score just as good as this one.

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
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
