# THE CORONATION: AN INTIMATE RITUAL

JUNE 2nd 1953 dawned a wet summer's day. But the whispering ran through the crowds camping out in London: a Sherpa and a New Zealander, members of a British-led team, had climbed Mount Everest. The mightiest mountain, which had claimed so many lives, had been conquered. It was a fitting symbol of the New Elizabethan age.

The damp throng lining the route from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey looked forward to the pageantry of the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth The Second. They were joined for the first time by millions who had huddled around small black-and-white screens — television had arrived. The ceremony that followed was, as customarily, according to tradition and precedent. It had been drawn up by the Archbishop of Canterbury with the Dean of Westminster and some advisers.

Today we mark the fiftieth anniversary of Her Majesty's Coronation. We take this opportunity also to remember that it is fifty years since the Honours of Scotland were presented to The Queen in Edinburgh and that this is the Four Hundredth Anniversary of the Union of the English and Scottish Crowns.

Our service this morning takes four aspects of the original ceremony as its basic structure. A brief explanation of the Coronation's significance introduces each section. Last year's joyful celebration of the Jubilee of Her Majesty's Accession gives way to a quieter, more reflective service to mark the anniversary of the Coronation itself. As in the Coronation there are readings, prayers and music, but no sermon. But, whereas at the Coronation Her Majesty dedicated herself to a servant leadership, on this occasion we, the congregation both in the Abbey and elsewhere, in respectful homage make her commitment our own.

#### THE BIDDING

FROM Christmas Day 1066 until June 2nd 1953 this Abbey has resounded to the acclamation of the people for their Sovereign. For here is held the ceremony of coronation, the anointing and crowning, as the Monarch commits herself to lead and serve the nation. It is very public but also an intimate ritual.

It begins with the presentation to the congregation and their formal recognition of their 'undoubted Queen'. On this the fiftieth anniversary of the Coronation, we join Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Second, Our Queen, as she again presents herself to God and we, the congregation, recognise her by thanking God for her leadership and for the values for which she stands, as Queen and as Head of the Commonwealth.

But we shall not place on her renewed responsibility for all the duty and service to the nation. On this significant anniversary, with quiet but deep respect and affection, we stand with Our Sovereign and each and all of us commit ourselves anew to that duty and service which are both hers and ours.

We shall take four aspects of the coronation rite — faith, service, responsibility and respect — and reflect upon them. And we shall pray that they may be marks of our common life as individuals, as a nation, and as citizens of the Commonwealth and the world.

But first let us express our thanks for these fifty years of service of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second, by the grace of God, Queen.

Let us pray:

ALMIGHTY God, who rulest over all the kingdoms of the world, we give thee hearty thanks for that thou hast set thy servant our Sovereign Lady, Queen Elizabeth, upon the throne of this realm. Let thy wisdom continue her guide and thine arm strengthen her; let truth and justice, holiness and righteousness, peace and charity, abound in her days; and direct all her counsels and endeavours to thy glory, and the welfare of her people; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

## **COMMITMENT TO GOD**

The coronation is set in the service of Holy Communion and is therefore a religious ceremony, presided over by the Archbishop of Canterbury. But before that rite begins there are two ceremonies. First, the congregation 'recognises' the Sovereign. For the second, 1953 saw an innovation: the Bible was presented by the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, saying: "Here is Wisdom; This is the royal Law; These are the lively Oracles of God."

## COMMITMENT TO THE SERVICE OF OTHERS

'Coronation' means 'crowning', but the heart of the ceremony is in fact the anointing. Dressed simply, the Sovereign is anointed with oil by the Archbishop, the ceremony being hidden from the gaze of the people by a canopy held by four knights. Anointing sets someone apart for a sacred, and often sacrificial, function. The reading that follows describes the yearly ceremony which has come to us as 'The Royal Maundy'. The Sovereign no longer washes feet, but instead gives purses of silver coins to the recipients. This establishes service as the style of royal leadership.

Then he poured water into a basin, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel with which he was girded.

When he had washed their feet, and taken his garments, and resumed his place, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord; and you are right, for so I am. ## **COMMITMENT TO RESPONSIBILITY**

The Monarch is given symbols of office, the orb and sceptres, and finally the crown. It is the moment when it might look as though absolute power rests in the Sovereign. But to lead does not imply power over others rather authority to represent them. The Sovereign is crowned and takes on this awesome responsibility, reminded by the words above the altar that, "The kingdoms of this world are become the Kingdom of our God and of his Christ."

The respect of a monarch for her people

ANNIVERSARIES are important events in all our lives. I felt that the Golden Jubilee was more than just an anniversary. The celebrations were joyous occasions, but they also seemed to evoke something more lasting and profound — a sense of belonging and pride in country, town or community; a sense of sharing a common heritage enriched by the cultural, ethnic, and religious diversity of our twenty-first century society... It was a time to remind ourselves... that we must never forget the plight of the disadvantaged and excluded, that we must respond to the needs of someone in distress or despair...
