

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Minver Ward Profile

Population

Total Population

The population of the St Minver Ward has increased by approximately 11.8% in the last ten years from 2,210 in 1991 to 2,470 in 2001 ^{2, 3, 4, 5, 6}.



The population of St Minver Highlands Parish was recorded as 735 in 1981, increasing to 825 by 1991, and is estimated to have increased by 23.8% between 1991 and 2001 (*Figure 3*): ^{2, 3, 4, 5}







Employment Deprivation

In the St Minver Ward, 10.5% (national rank 3068) of individuals who wanted to work were excluded from employment because of unemployment, sickness or disability. The St Minver Ward was the eleventh least deprived ward in North Cornwall in terms of employment deprivation ⁴⁶.



In January 2003, the Unemployment Claimant Count ⁵⁰ indicated that 1.2% of all claimants (13 individuals) in North Cornwall lived in the St Minver Ward. January to June 2003, the Unemployment Claimant Count indicated that the numbers claiming Job Seekers Allowance in the Ward had decreased by 15.4%. The average percentage decrease in numbers claiming Job Seekers Allowance in North Cornwall from January to June was 25.6%.

In July 2003, the Unemployment Claimant Count ⁵⁰ indicated that 1.3% of all claimants (11 individuals) in North Cornwall lived in the St Minver Ward. In December 2003, the Unemployment Claimant Count indicated that 2.1% of all claimants (21 individuals) in North Cornwall lived in the St Minver Ward. July to December 2003, the Unemployment Claimant Count indicated that the numbers claiming Job Seekers Allowance in the Ward had increased by 90.9%. The average percentage increase in numbers claiming Job Seekers Allowance in North Cornwall from July to December was 21.7%.











Business and Industry

There were estimated to be 125 VAT Registered ⁵⁴ enterprises in the St Minver Ward in March 2000, which was approximately 2.5% of the District total of VAT Registered enterprises.

Retail Businesses

The Community Facilities Survey indicates that there were 57 retail businesses in the St Minver Ward in 2003 ⁵⁵. Retail businesses surveyed included pubs, general stores, craft and gift shops, restaurants and cafes, hairdressers, etc.











"Most people regard easy access to GP surgeries, corner shops, supermarkets and public transport, for example, as important, but people in rural areas do not find it as easy to get to many basic services as do people in urban areas. However in many rural areas, local services are declining and accessing basic services can be difficult." ⁹³

The Countryside Agency conducted a 'Rural Services Survey' in 1997, and again in 2001. For more information see the North Cornwall Profile.

North Cornwall District Council conducted it's own Community Facilities Survey ⁹⁴ in 2003/04, which surveyed all the towns, main villages, and minor villages within North Cornwall. This survey concluded that:

St Minver Highlands and St Minver Lowlands Parishes share the main villages of Polzeath/Trebetherick and Rock/Tredrizzick. Polzeath/Trebetherick village has the key services of 2 combined general store and Post Offices, a village/community centre, pubs, and a daily bus service. It has the other important services of a part time GP and a mobile library. Other services available in the village include restaurants and cafes, public conveniences and beach shops. Rock/Tredrizzick village has the key services of general stores, a Post Office, village/community centres, pubs, a daily bus service (including a travel-to-work service to Padstow), and a primary school. It has the other important services of a petrol station/garage and a mobile library. Other services available in the village include restaurants and cafes, a bakery, hairdresser and public conveniences ⁹⁴.

St Minver Highlands Parish's minor village St Minver has the key services of a Post Office, a village/community centre, a pub, and a daily bus service. It has the other important services of a mobile library and a playgroup. Other services available in the village include a church and vehicle repair garage ⁹⁴.

Outside of these main and minor settlements, the two Parishes has other services which include car parks, a general store, and a public convenience ⁹⁴.

Access Deprivation

The St Minver Ward (national rank 755) was the fourteenth most/least deprived ward in North Cornwall, as far as geographical access to services is concerned. Rural wards in North Cornwall fare particularly badly with regard to geographical access to services ⁹⁵.



The National Trust has acquired a good deal of the headlands at Polzeath and Pentire 110, 111.

There are two Open Areas of Local Significance; one is the wooded valley side in Old Polzeath running south-east from Coronation Park to Shilla Mill, the other the Tristram car park and adjoining land 110, 1111.

Built Environment

Polzeath/Trebetherick and Rock/Tredrizzick are the main villages within the St Minver Ward area ¹¹².

Polzeath, New Polzeath and Trebetherick are closely linked and form a straggling settlement at the mouth of the Camel Estuary, some 11 km (7 miles) to the north-west of Wadebridge. There are approximately 460 dwellings within the village. Polzeath is situated around a small stream which flows into Hayle Bay and was used to drive the 16th century Shilla Mill. New Polzeath consists mainly of large detached houses and bungalows built since the 1920's together with a terrace of seaside villas of late Victorian

character. Trebethereick consists mainly of large houses and bungalows built on a piecemeal basis since the 1920's 113 .

Rock/Tredrizzick is the collective name used to describe the settlement, which until comparatively recent times consisted of separate groups of houses at Tredrizzick, Pityme, Splatt, Penmayne, Stoptide, Porthilly and Rock. There are approximately 705

dwellings within the village. These areas have now merged through a combination of infilling of frontages and a number of residential estates, to form a continuous linear settlement based around the Rock Road. The oldest buildings are found at Porthilly with the Grade 11* listed 12th century Church of St Michael and the nearby 16th century Porthilly Farmhouse. Across Porthilly Cove stands a 19th century warehouse and quay which was converted to a sailing clubhouse during the mid 1970's 113.

St Minver village, with about 50 dwellings, is the minor village within St Minver Highlands Parish. The Parish also includes the smaller settlements of Govena/Menfreda Way, Churchtown and Trevanger ¹¹².

The Historic Environment

Lawrence Binyon, while sitting on the Rumps, wrote his poem "To the Fallen", which is read every Remembrance Day at the Cenotaph 114 .

In St Minver Highlands Parish there are 47 listed buildings ¹¹⁵, which include one Grade 1, two Grade 2*, and forty-four Grade 2. These include:

- 9 houses:
- 1 windmill tower;
- 1 folly;
- 2 barns;
- 3 gatepiers;
- 1 bridge;
- 1 slip;
- 1 church; and
- 37 headstones/tomb chests/ledger stones.

There are three scheduled monuments 116 within St Minver Highlands Parish.

St Minver Ward Profile

At Daymer Bay, there is a small church called St Enodoc which is reputed to have been founded in the 3rd century. Before being restored in 1863, the whole church had been almost completely buried in sand for several generations, and only accessible through the roof. The church bell came from the an Italian ship, the 'Immaculata', wrecked off Greenaway in 1875. Sir John Betjeman knew this area well, and it inspired his poems 'Trebetherick', 'Seaside Golf', 'Greenaway' and 'Sunday Afternoon Service at St Enodoc's'. He is buried in the churchyard among the tamarisk hedges ¹¹⁷.

St Enodoc Golf Course has 'Jesus' Well', which legend has Jesus himself tapping the dry ground with his staff during a visit to this country in the 'missing years' of his life and formed the well which was credited with great healing powers. At Greenaway, the 'Doom Bar' exists, which is a vast sand bank that stretches across the mouth of the estuary and which has been the cause of many a ship's demise ¹¹⁷.

In St Minver Lowlands Parish there are 22 listed buildings 118 , which include one Grade 1, one Grade 2*, and twenty Grade 2. These include:

- 4 houses;
- 2 churches;
- 1 quay; and
- 17 headstones/tomb chests.

There is one scheduled monument ¹¹⁹ within St Minver Lowlands Parish.


