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2006 POPULATION ESTIMATES BY PLACE

The Census Bureau recently released the 2006 Population Estimates by Place. Three Tulsa suburbs lead the growth of cities with over 10,000 persons followed by three Oklahoma City suburbs. There are currently 40 cities (of the 594 incorporated places) in the state with over 10,000 persons and 224 cities with over 1,000 persons

The following table displays the top 10 places in Oklahoma in 2006 and the fastest growing places above 10,000 persons from 2000 to 2006.

2005 TOTAL PERSONAL INCOME AND PER CAPITA PERSONAL INCOME

The U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis recently released 2005 income information. The State per capita personal income (PCPI) in 2005 is \$29,948, and only five counties have a higher PCPI. The percent change in total personal income between 2000 and 2006 was 25.9 percent.

2006 POPULATION ESTIMATES BY AGE, SEX, AND RACE AND HISPANIC ORIGIN

The Census Bureau has released the 2006 Population Estimates by Age, Sex, and Race and Hispanic Origin for Oklahoma. Hispanics have grown at 10 times the overall state average between 2000 and 2006 (38.01 percent to 3.73 percent). Hispanics now give Oklahoma three minorities with over 200,000 persons each: American Indian; 287,700, Black; 278,800, and Hispanic; 247,500.

Below is a table for Oklahoma by race and Hispanic Origin with the Census 2000 count, 2006 Estimate, and percent change between the two. Detailed information by age (5 year age groups), sex, and race and Hispanic Origin is on the Commerce website. For more information about these estimates, contact the OCDC.

2006 AMERICAN COMMUNITY SURVEY RELEASE SCHEDULE

The first of three releases for the 2006 American Community Survey (ACS) data will be released on August 28. The next two releases will be on September 12 and September 27. Data will be released for all geographies that meet the 65,000 population threshold. The August 28 release will include ACS data on income, earnings, and poverty and is in conjunction with the annual release of income, poverty, and health insurance from the Current Population Survey.

The second release on September 12 will include demographic, social, economic, and housing characteristics and the September 27 release will include group quarter information and population profiles for selected population groups by race, Hispanic Origin, and ancestry. This release will also include workplace geography tables.

The OCDC will make summary data and tables available for all Oklahoma geographies as soon as possible after each release on the Commerce web site. Detailed tables will be available as needed by request.

QUARTERLY COMPUTER CENSUS TRAINING CONTINUES

The remaining two quarterly computer Census training sessions conducted by the Oklahoma Census Data Center and the U.S. Government Documents Division of the Department of Libraries will take place in September and December. Morning and afternoon sessions are scheduled for each day on September 18 and December 11. All sessions will be held at the Oklahoma Department of Libraries, 200 NE 18th in Oklahoma City. Sessions will begin at 9 a.m. and 1 p.m.

These three-hour workshops feature hands-on computer sessions and address American Community Survey and Census 2000 data products and their accessibility. Topics include the new American Community Survey, 2000 Census data, Census geography, and other upcoming data products. The free workshops are open to anyone, but pre-registration is required. On-line registration is available through the Commerce website. You may also contact the OCDC to register or for more information.
