

Even after all these years, I still get a thrill when I walk into our lunch room, half way through a Zap day. Early in the morning, parents and children gather in the London townhouse where Kidscape maintains its office. They climb the stairs, slowly, and often silently, even reluctantly. Parents look wary, but hopeful; the children resigned, fearful or resentful - now and then a few have run away, or burst into tears. My staff are ready with the stick on name tags and the jolly chat, until the group parts, the children off to their own meeting, the parents getting ready for their separate gathering.

There's the one with autism, who's dropped out of school since tall staircase here at the bully broke his leg. There's the girl with red Kidscape. hair, who carved her arm with a penknife when the teasing became impossible. And those who are solitary, friendless, loathing their lives, and themselves - their wounds are invisible, but damaging.

> By lunchtime we'll see the beginning of the changes. Amidst the debris of a pizza lunch, the laughs ring out - in one corner a group of boys compete to see who can eat the most pizza (that would be nine slices), two girls are giggling over a joke, and a group is playing tag. I remember a father who could hardly stem his tears as he watched - "It's been years since I've seen other children actually play with my son," he said, touched that this most vital part of childhood might again be part of his son's life.

Is it that simple? No - but for most, the sense of camaraderie, the assertiveness techniques they're taught, the recognition that they have a right to be safe, begin a transformation that, with their families' help, will equip them with new skills, and new attitudes. For 80-90% of them, they'll be able to end their bullying. It is, for many of these children, truly life-saving.



What is Kidscape?

Kidscape's expertise with children's issues has developed over the last 24 years since Michele Elliott, a school psychologist, started the charity. Though its original goal was to keep children safe, as Kidscape's impact grew, Michele received more and more requests for help with children being bullied in schools.

ZAP Workshops

Children come away with real knowledge - a "toolbox" of skills. Even more importantly, they begin to make friends, as they look around and see other children in their situation who are bright, funny, kind or interesting. Many keep in circle of friends.

"When I came to Kidscape and sat down with the other parents, I felt as if I were among friends. It wasn't just that I could speak freely, and feel understood - or that I heard other stories that were much worse than ours. It was helpful to hear just what we can expect from a school, to figure out some new approaches, and to learn the proactive and practical things Kidscape teaches to help the children. When John came in that afternoon with a big smile on his face, I thought we were really on our way, with ideas and the strength to carry on."

PAZAP

The box of tissues is prominent when parents gather for their own PAZAP, an informal meeting led by a staff member or two that offers guidance, and follows the needs of the group.

Most groups are very disparate - different backgrounds, accents, geography, parenting style may at first make it seem they might not work together well. But they share many experiences - the frustration of being able to protect their child, the difficulties of dealing with schools that may be ignoring the bullies and blaming the victims, or staff who use inappropriate and ineffective anti-bullying techniques. Often these are caring parents who have raised thoughtful and kind children, whom the bullies look on as easy targets.

We furnish all with Kidscape's printed materials to take home, then open discussion - many want to ventilate, others, to weep, still others bring innovative ideas to share with the group, as well as information about, for instance, home schooling. The Kidscape trainer teaches the techniques that are being learned by their children - as the family is very much a part of the process of helping the children with these new skills.

There is no other charity in the UK providing such free, face to face workshops, and demand is very high.

"I am training as a therapist, and planning to work with children, so my part-time job at Kidscape is just perfect. I have learned to be a good listener - often people need to talk. I want them to know they are understood, that there are things they can do, and that no one has a right to bully. The stories can be awful, and it's so satisfying when the caller says she feels like she knows what to do now. Helping your child can require lots of courage and energy, and people are welcome to call back. And we can suggest they apply for a ZAP to get the changes started."

"The 'Stand by your Child' organisation here in Poland was a very new idea when we began it in 1998. There was no thought of how to deal with bullying, among other children's problems. By 2004 we began to concentrate on bullied children, and soon made contact with Kidscape, after we found them on the internet. We received a grant from the British Council in Warsaw that enabled us to begin, even travelling to London to receive training, then bringing Claude Knights to Warsaw. This year we trained more than 500 teachers, and organised workshops for psychologists and pedagogues from all over Poland, and workshops for children, too. In June we received a large grant that will keep us going for another two years, and underwrites closer cooperation with Kidscape. It means our relationship with Kidscape is not only a summer love but a long term partnership!" Joanna

Helpline

Our phone lines (08451 205 204) are constantly busy discouraging to those who can't get through. This year we had more than 8,000 calls that we were able to answer. Parents and other adults - we get grandparents and teachers, too - may need an hour to talk through their concerns and discuss the next steps. We help parents learn how to support their child, how to boost their assertiveness, to know children's rights and schools' responsibilities, and how to work effectively with a school. We monitor calls and collect information from callers that gives us an insight into patterns of school aggression.

This year we concentrated on recruiting and training new phone advisors, and exploring extending the hours when an advisor is available. At present we are open Monday-Friday from 10am-4pm, and we are raising funds to extend these hours.



Training

As a small charity with big ambitions, we rely on our training arm to spread the knowledge widely. We serve schools and community organisations like foster carers with a wide range of workshops, both inhouse and onsite - and even abroad, where Kidscape has been instrumental in several anti-bullying initiatives in the U.S., Australia, and Poland. We offer:

Website and Publication

Our website (www.kidscape.org.uk) is the first step for many in their search for help with bullying. Our goal is to offer information for parents, teachers and children, an introduction to our services and resources, as well as a warm welcome. Our in house team work constantly to fine tune the site and to add timely information - as technology adds more ways to bully, we offer more ways to block it, for instance. And usage is up by 25%, to more than two and a half million successful page visits.

Our web services were improved this year by spinning off an independent website dedicated to activities and information to increase the impact of Anti-Bullying Week. With the click of a mouse, a teacher could download posters, or get a good grounding in strategy; a child could discover innovative ways to raise money or stage an activity. We hope to add to and tailor this website each year.

Our website also offers a bargain - many of our pamphlets and informational booklets can be downloaded for free, a real convenience to many. For the first time, we are able to offer online ordering and payment for those who would prefer a printed publication, or a bulk order; orders are consequently up. New this year, too, is a book that's the result of two years' work - "Dealing with Bullying: a training guide for teachers of children and young people with special needs" is ground-breaking. Children with special needs - those with autism and asperger's syndrome, asthma, cancer, learning difficulties have all been among the children who come to our Zap sessions; that some of the most vulnerable among the school population are the targets for often violent bullying is a sad truth.

Fundraising

Kidscape has no formal fund-raising department, no consultants or street soliciters or telephone cold callers. We are very lucky in having so many wonderful supporters who provide us with money for our core costs, or special projects, as well as corporate staff who work with us when we have something big to produce, such as a recent attempt to stuff 2,000 envelopes with DVDs and material. However, there has been some special help, besides the wonderful Kidscape party described above.

Television ad

When AMV came to us and offered to make an anti-bullying television ad, we were thrilled; as one of the top ad agencies in Britain, they have been responsible for some unforgettable campaigns. The process was fascinating as they had several meetings to focus what was important to us to convey, and what of Kidscape's mission could be translated to film. Weeks later, it was finished, a startling and persuasive short film that has as its premise what would happen if adults were bullied the way children are? It was a striking ad - and won the ad agency several awards, and Kidscape some much appreciated attention.

General Fund Raising

Other donations came from ardent athletes who signed up for several marathons and even the London Triathlon to raise money for Kidscape and one did a benefit sky-jump. Children raised money with bake sales, Great Britain Tennis Girls had a "Wimbledon Ball", and Harry Potter - who was bullied as a child - and his new book raised some money for Kidscape when The Book Warehouse donated their profits from July sales of "Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows".

As a registered charity, Kidscape is entirely dependent on grants from public and statutory bodies as well as donations from the general public. We do not have a fundraising or marketing budget - our funds go directly to helping those children and families who need it the most.

- £50 will provide over fifteen self-esteem guides to children attending Kidscape's ZAP assertiveness sessions.

- £5,000 will enable us to run ZAP sessions, teaching severely bullied children strategies to help them regain their self-confidence.
- £10,000 will pay for our trainers to run over 20 sessions across the UK, disseminating Kidscape's knowledge and experience.
