- Making the village centre safer for pedestrians whilst protecting its special character.

Introduction

Welcome to Milford-on-Sea Parish Vision 2020 - a 15 + year action plan, expressing the wishes of the village for the village.

Many small towns and villages have taken part in the Government's Health Check Initiative. The following is a description of a Market Town Healthcheck taken from the New Forest Community Planning Guide, November 2005.

" Market town healthchecks have been initiated by the South East Economic Development Agency (SEEDA). The healthcheck provides a process for examining the economic, environmental and social aspects of the town and its surrounding countryside. A series of worksheets help focus on the strengths and weaknesses of the community which ultimately forms the action plan." Milford-on-Sea accepted the challenge in the spring of 2005. After a summer of public meetings, an enthusiastic group of volunteers established the Steering Committee in October 2005. Their brief was twofold: to conduct surveys under the headings of Economy, Environment, Social & Community, and Transport and to devise a means of consulting every household in the village to establish the wishes of its residents for the continued success. of Milford-on-Sea. A detachable Love/Hate/Wish flyer was produced and included in the November/December 2006 edition of the local Village Voice magazine. Throughout the summer of 2006 the Committee manned stalls at most fairs. festivals and events in the village to elicit as many responses as possible from residents and visitors. 906 residents were engaged during the 2006 events, representing 19% of the community. The Committee was thus able to draw up a concise list of hates and aspirations from everyone who took part. A list of the events attended follows.





The results of the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats from the original surveys and the information from the flyers enabled the Committee to draw up a consultation document of 50+ actions.

This consultation document was launched in early October 2006 at a well attended public meeting in the Church Hall. It was subsequently distributed to all households in the village. In total 712 replies were received following the Public Consultation Day, representing approximately 15% of residents. A total of 1,618 responses were received during the consultation process of the PV2020 project.

Finally, all replies were analysed, and in May 2007 a draft action plan was presented to the Parish Council and New Forest District Council (NFDC) for endorsement.

Milford-on-Sea, named "Melleford" in the Domesday Book, is the last coastal village in Hampshire, with magnificent views of the Solent, Christchurch Bay, the Isle of Wight and the Needles.

The village has many interesting, historic buildings, foremost of which is Hurst Castle which was built for Henry VIII and dates from the 1540's. Charles 1st was imprisoned there in 1648. Between 1860-1872 the defences were enlarged to meet the threat of French invasion. The Castle is in the stewardship of English Heritage and open to the public.

Newlands Manor, a substantial property in very large grounds, was rebuilt in Gothic Style in 1803 for Admiral Cornwallis but is now divided into separate dwellings.

Milford House, near the village centre, was built in the Georgian era on land once owned by the Knights Templar and is divided into separate dwellings.

There are numerous other listed properties both inside and outside the central conservation area. Four churches stand within the village, the oldest being the Anglican church of "All Saints", part of which dates from the 12th Century. There are also Catholic, Methodist and Baptist churches, which all have regular congregations.



The five historic inns - The Red Lion, The Smugglers Inn, The White Horse, The Royal Oak and The Gun Inn - are popular with locals and tourists alike.

Enlarging the conservation areas which include buildings of special interest, would provide welcome protection of the special character of the village.

The Village Green hosts many popular events during the year including May Day celebrations, a Plant Fair, a three day Festival of Art and Music, a Dog Show, a Carnival and Christmas celebrations.







Milford-on-Sea benefits from a part-time library based in the Village Hall. A wide range of Clubs and Societies caters for all age groups and are well supported. However a permanent youth meeting place is lacking.

In June 2007 a Community Centre was established in Sea Road, using the building once leased to a children's nursery. However, a lottery grant has been applied for to build an all-purpose Community Centre to provide additional leisure facilities, including cinema, art, evening classes and a permanent youth club base. The decision of the Lottery Board will determine whether a new Community Centre is built on the site or whether the existing building is extended.







Of the 200 businesses identified in Milford-on-Sea, most are go-ahead and fit for today's "high tech" world of commerce. A survey of businesses was carried out in four main areas: 36% of those questioned were High Street shops; 10% were on the two small Trading Estates; 42% were various home based businesses and 12% were Hotels and B&Bs.

47% of employees were from Milford-on-Sea. However, local recruitment is a problem as there is a shortage of affordable housing available and the population is largely elderly.

Milford-on-Sea has a unique shopping area. At the beginning of the survey, 54% of traders were confident about trading in the village but recent shop closures have caused some concern.

The instigation of a Milford Business Association (MBA) to promote the benefits of the village as a one-stop shopping experience would raise awareness of the local shops, public houses and restaurants. (The MBA is now formed and playing an active role in promoting Milford-on-Sea's commercial business enterprise.)

This association could also help with training, education and skills development. Holding farmers/craft markets and summer open evenings, possibly in the High Street or on the village green, could also be promoted and administered by this association.

The re-use of farm buildings should be encouraged, with the help of government agencies, to increase local job opportunities.

Lack of suitable public transport, pedestrian safety and parking restrictions also deter elderly residents and nearby communities from coming into the village. Innovative ideas are necessary to solve these problems.







Aims, Aspirations and Actions:

- Engender a vibrant Milford-on-Sea village by encouraging local patronage of our shops, public houses, restaurants and village services to help maintain a sustainable community. This can be achieved by extolling the virtues of Milford-on-Sea's onestop local shopping experience which offers shops on your doorstep, energy efficiency by saving fuel, convenience, home-delivery and friendly, welcoming staff.
- Encourage and make more welcome, visitors and hinterland communities to Milford-on-Sea, e.g. by holding regular village centre/green farmers/craft markets controlled by MBA.



• Strive to bring closed/unused shop premises back into commercial retail use.



- Improve existing trading estate at Laundry Lane and enhance use of Barnes Lane Business Park.
- Further enhance seafront improvements by the careful selection and provision of interesting and varied activities and facilities in keeping with the existing ambiance, to encourage hinterland communities and holiday makers to visit.
- Where appropriate, encourage business diversification to help attract more tourists, shoppers and young people to increase local trade and sustain the village.





Milford-on-Sea is a unique village on the South coast and a thriving tourist destination, with its close proximity to the sea and the New Forest National Park. It is easily accessible by road with rail links some 4 miles away and a bus once an hour to and from Bournemouth. There are a number of busy caravan parks in the village and an abundance of B & B's and guest houses.

However, not enough is being done to



encourage tourists and visitors to eat in the local public houses, inns and cafés or to shop in the village centre. At present many eat in their caravans and day visitors go to the seafront, without necessarily visiting the village centre.

A Tourist Information Point is necessary to promote the wide variety of shops, walks and places of historical interest, (e.g. Hurst Castle).

This could be achieved by making extra space

available to put up displays and information promoting forthcoming events in the village.

The local tourist industry is currently threatened by plans to begin gravel extraction close to the village. This would endanger the ambiance of the area as large numbers of heavy vehicles would be using the narrow, rural roads surrounding the village.

Global warming is another threat which Milford-on-Sea, with its coastal location, cannot ignore.







Aims, Aspirations and Actions:

- Raise the profile of Milford-on- Sea to emphasise the value of Hampshire's last remaining coastal village.
- Promote the places of historic and scenic interest, the wide variety of shops, holiday accommodation and eating places in and around the village.
- Maintain, manage and enhance all seafront and village facilities.

- Set up a Tourist Information Point in the village centre providing information on village events, "things to do" and public services.
- Ensure all flood defence measures are enhanced in line with the threat of climatic change.







Milford-on-Sea parish has a wealth of areas of both landscape and wildlife value. This includes the coastal cliffs and foreshore, Hurst Spit, the saltmarshes and part of Keyhaven Marshes, Sturt Pond and its reed bed, the Pleasure Grounds, Studland Common and the Avon Valley. This has resulted in important national and international designations for nature conservation reasons. These are supported by other amenitybased designations. A tranche of the Local Plan's policies is directed towards ensuring that the best features of these areas are protected and enhanced.

Much of Keyhaven village and the inner, older parts of Milford-on-Sea village are designated Conservation Areas. Elsewhere in Milford-on-Sea there are designated Areas of Special Character where the existing form of



development is seen as worthy of protection. Local Plan policies have been established to ensure that change within the two villages is beneficial to the local communities. The hamlets of Lymore and Downton lie within the defined Green Belt, which constitutes all the land outside the two villages. Development here will be restricted to that which is normally permissible in the countryside.

Planning control for the parish falls primarily under the provisions of the New Forest District Council's Local Plan (First Alteration) which was adopted in August 2005. A Village Design Statement, produced by the community and adopted in 2002, provides Supplementary Planning Guidance. The eastern part of the parish now lies within the recently defined New Forest National Park. With the introduction of new planning legislation, the Local Plan will be replaced by a Local Development Framework.



Environment

Aims, Aspirations and Actions:

 Protect those areas of special nature conservation value by the designation of Sturt Pond, the Pleasure Grounds and Studland Common as Local Nature Reserves. Enhance biodiversity by encouraging public ownership and appropriate management, using voluntary community conservation groups.



- Improve amenity and educational value and further protect existing natural and seminatural community and privately owned land. This includes the Pleasure Grounds, Studland Common, Sharvells Copse, Sturt Pond, the cliff top scrub and grassland, the Avon Valley and Great Newbridge Copse.
- Protect Pleasure Grounds and adjoining flood plains from development.

- Set up work group to protect against light pollution especially along the seafront.
- Protect Sturt Pond (LNR) from sewerage overspill and pollution by taking action (where appropriate) against irresponsible public service bodies.



- Support the enhancement of the sewerage infrastructure, especially to dwellings and local nature reserves.
- Maintain village and hamlets' individuality and independence and thus avoid ribbon development.
- Maintain the traditional character of Milfordon-Sea and Keyhaven villages and especially of their Conservation Areas.



Environment



- Support, utilise and update the existing Village Design Statement.
- Promote activities which will reduce pollution and CO2 emissions.
- Promote the best use of existing local resources.
- Increase the amount of waste recycling by extending the New Forest District Council scheme.
- Campaign against gravel and sand extraction in close proximity to local villages, hamlets and holiday parks.
- Promote walking and cycling for health reasons and for the conservation of resources.







Social & Community Health and Public Safety

Milford-on-Sea, due to its location and climate, is a healthy place to live, with life expectancy above the national average.

It is well served by a thriving Medical Centre, a much loved Community Hospital (now under threat of closure), a dispensing chemist, a dental practice (still treating existing NHS patients), 2 chiropodists, a chiropractor, nursing and care homes and home care services.

The closure of Milford-on-Sea War Memorial Hospital would reduce access to some outpatient clinics, recuperative and postoperative care.

A new, purpose built hospital has recently opened at Lymington, some 4 miles away, (not 24 hour casualty).

In order to access major hospitals at Southampton or Bournemouth for major surgery, radiotherapy, etc. one needs to travel some 15-20 miles. With a growing proportion of elderly residents, there will be an increasing demand for support services and this will, in due course, put a strain on the existing provision.



The Village is considered to be a low crime area but due to reduction in police resources and the disposal of the Police House, there is a fear of crime amongst some residents. There is an increasing problem of anti-social behaviour by a small number of local youths which affects residents' quality of life. A regular police proactive rather than reactive presence, would encourage a greater sense of security.



Social & Community Health and Public Safety

Aims, Aspirations and Actions:

- Retain and enhance Milford-on-Sea War Memorial Hospital to provide support services for recuperative and elderly care.
- Provide local, 24 hour minor injuries service and retain hinterland 24 hour casualty service medical centre.
- Promote pro-active policing and warden presence. Reinstate the "beat bobby" to secure a high level, crime prevention police presence.







Social & Community Population and Housing



Milford-on-Sea has a vibrant, somewhat numerically unbalanced population compared with the New Forest and Hampshire generally. At the last census in 2001 the figures of all three areas were as follows:

There was an increase of 269 (6%) persons in Milford-on-Sea between the 1991 and 2001 census. The number of people wishing to live in Milford-on-Sea is rapidly increasing and the opportunities for developers to expand their building programmes continues. These property developments are often at the expense of local infrastructure and local, young families who can no longer afford to remain in their home village. Brownfield and previously developed sites have long since been utilised, thus the only option open to developers is to continue to build inside the existing village envelope (infilling) or in the greenbelt, something we find inherently unpalatable and unacceptable! However, if one reflects that in 1086 Milford comprised just a few properties clustered around the village centre to house the 50 or so residents, then it is obvious that all our properties have subsequently been built in the greenbelt. However, in order to retain a village status any future development on greenbelt land should be monitored extremely carefully.

The village generally has a good mix of housing - freehold, leasehold and rented, comprising detached, semi-detached, terraced, flats, apartments and retirement flats in very good condition. However, very few fall into the category of 'affordable' housing.





Social & Community Population and Housing



Properties in the area are very expensive and because of a lack of reasonably priced housing, there is growing concern locally that young people and families have difficulty in gaining a foothold on the property ladder. In addition there are very few rented, low cost houses being built.

Developers prefer to build flats and apartments rather than houses and residents are concerned that infilling sites are often used to build houses of unsympathetic and inappropriate design. Ownership schemes e.g. shared-equity, are needed to enable local people, especially the young, to buy homes and remain within the village.

Milford-on-Sea is keen to preserve its existing special character from over-development and to ensure that the surrounding countryside, which is partly in the National Park, is protected.



Aims, Aspirations and Actions:

- Protect villages and hamlets to preserve their special character.
- Extend village conservation areas where these are of special character.
- Resist intensive "infilling" where this would constitute over-development.
- Promote fully integrated housing schemes which provide mixed communities.
- Promote the provision of affordable housing in perpetuity for local, young families by lowering site thresholds i.e. the point at which developers must make a meaningful contribution towards local affordable housing need.
- Encourage developers to build appropriate houses of good design, in all sizes, tenures (i.e. rented low-cost and shared-equity) and in all price ranges.
- Encourage owners to improve existing local building stock.



Informal Open Space:

Milford-on-Sea, as a coastal village and community, enjoys the benefit of extensive informal, public, open space. It has magnificent sea views over Christchurch Bay, the Isle of Wight, the Needles and the Solent. There are gentle cliff-top walks along Hordle Cliff, Hurst spit to Hurst Castle, to Keyhaven marshes, Sturt Pond Nature Reserve and along the newly revitalised seafront promenade.



Inland, we have superb walks along the Ancient Highway, on Studland Common, through Sharvells Copse and in the Pleasure Grounds woodlands, which after 100 years of neglect, are now being managed at a measured pace by the Parish Council, with voluntary help from the Milford Environment Group and the Wildlife Recording Group. The Danes Stream meanders gently along from Shorefield Country Park, through the Pleasure Grounds and behind the village shops, to Sturt Pond. Much of the Danes Stream has a formal footpath running alongside the water's edge.

These amenity areas are being under-utilised for educational purposes. Local conservation volunteers are currently enhancing the various habitats to encourage biodiversity. Swallow Drive and Grebe Close have two small areas of open space used by youngsters and dog walkers.

Formal Open Space:

Milford-on-Sea has relatively few formal open spaces. These include the old, unused Putting Green alongside the Bowling Club, the larger grassed area to the east of the Bowling Green, the newly formed grass banked area immediately to the east of the Needles Eye Café and the small grassed area adjacent to Milford Bridge, known as Centenary Copse, which now has two seats and is being carefully nurtured by volunteers from the Milford Gardeners Club. Additionally, the parish has two children's play parks. The Park at



Carrington Lane benefited a few years ago from a £50,000 grant from Onyx.

In 2005, the District, County and Parish Councils in partnership provided a new, long overdue, seafront Play Park which is used to capacity for much of the year. The village green is a hive of activity with several summer events and is annually used for village fêtes, the Dog Show, the Plant Fair, the Carnival and Arts & Music Festival. However, for much of the year it is under utilised. The green could be used more extensively, e.g. for traders and craft markets.

Sports Provision:

Given the size of the community, there is a modest mix of community based sports facilities, including one senior and two junior Under 10's football pitches at Barnes Lane Recreation Ground. There is a cricket square used by both senior and junior cricketers, also at the Recreation Ground, and an excellent seafront Bowling Green in Hurst Road. The Club makes one bowling green rink available for public use.



There is a private tennis/squash club with junior coaching available to non-members and private sailing and yacht clubs at Keyhaven. Shorefield Country Park provides membership for multigym and swimming, but the price of these private facilities may be too expensive for the many young families of the village. Horse riding and carriage driving through the village and country roads is also available with yoga, pilates, keep fit, belly-dancing and table tennis available in the various small community halls which are often fully booked.



Although adults generally have a wide range of facilities available to them, young people have little local access to BMX or Skate Park facilities. Two Milford junior football teams already have to play their home games outside the village, showing that an additional area for formal sports is required to meet present and latent need. In addition, all generations would benefit from an indoor, multi-use games areas (a MUGA) with a multi-gym facility and space for all-weather outdoor sports pitches.





A recent Forest-wide survey carried out by an independent consultant as part of the NFDC's Local Development Framework, suggests that the farmland site between School Lane and the Primary School (known as the MS-2 District Local Plan policy site at 1.92 hectares) should be given high priority to help provide a MUGA, a senior football pitch and 2 junior football/sports pitches (subject to the retention of the two existing mini-pitches at Barnes Lane Recreation Ground).

Dressing/Changing rooms would also be required, together with suitable, off-street parking. This could also help address the longterm school parking problem on the B3058, Manor Road and Knowland Drive.

Milford-on-Sea is situated equidistant (4 miles) from Lymington and New Milton railway stations. Milford-on-Sea's main transport problems arise from the lack of regular public transport (buses) and the need to rely on private cars. Within the last 10 years, Hampshire's car and van ownership has risen 15%, and in the village, 49.6% of people have at least one car against 44.8% within the New Forest and 42.8% in the county.

The original survey results showed the need for greater pedestrian safety, especially within the village centre and on the route to the primary school.



Particular problems highlighted included poor parking by private car drivers, the difficulty of lorry access for retail deliveries, vehicle speeds, lack of policing of illegal parking, the poor state of some pavements and footpaths, the cleanliness of streets (and beaches) and inadequate school car parking facility.



Lack of provision for cyclists was also highlighted, especially where dual use of footpaths caused confusion.

Many residents wanted to see improvements at certain junctions, in particular Park Road, Carrington Lane, Kivernell/Westover Roads, Solent Way and the Church Hill exit onto B3058.

Finally the survey results showed that for the economic survival of Milford-on-Sea's shops and services, an innovative approach was required to bring visitors and residents into the village without relying on the private car.



Aims, Aspirations and Actions:

• Reduce vehicle speeds and improve pedestrian safety within the village centre, including the slowing of vehicular traffic, plus paving and road crossing enhancements. Milford-on-Sea has a population of 576 children and young people under the age of 18. Milford-on-Sea Primary School is situated half a mile from the centre of the village. It is a Church of England School with a positive attitude towards work and behaviour within a Christian framework of values and beliefs. The children tend to perform above county and national average. The school currently has 300 children on roll, the vast majority of whom live in the village.

There are no secondary schools in the parish. The nearest are Priestlands in Lymington, Arnewood in New Milton and Highcliffe School in Highcliffe. Brockenhurst College caters for sixth form students and further education.

The parish has a reasonable range of childcare facilities available within the area. There is a Day Nursery in Keyhaven and a Pre-School attached to the local primary school. Kid Ease, a Day Nursery for children aged 3 months to 5 years has recently closed leaving a gap in the provision for children of working parents. There is an after-school club and a holiday club which is run from the Pre-School and there are other extra-curricular activities for children, such as Brownies, Rainbows, Scouts, Cubs and Explorers.

The village also has Milford Youth Football Club, a junior cricket club (part of the senior club) and, after an absence of ten years, the Youth Group which will be based in a temporary building located in the Sea Road car park. This has planning permission until December 2009.







In January 2006, the Steering Committee appointed a teenager to their team whose role was to gather the views of the youth in the parish. The first task was to reach as many of them as possible with "Love it ~ Hate it ~ Wish it" flyers and to analyse the data. Children in the school were asked to participate and flyers were also delivered to the youth groups, school buses and clubs and organisations.

Approximately 50% of the target population responded.

It was discovered that what the youth loved was:

- The Shops
- The Beach and Sea
- The Parks and The Green
- The School
- The Pubs and Clubs
- The Social Events

What the youth hated was:

- The Litter
- The Shops
- Being Bored
- Being Scolded
- The School

And what the youth wished for was:

- Youth Centre
- Youth Shops
- Fun Things To Do
- Cinema
- Swimming Pool

Following this survey, children were asked to give their views on the consultation document. Owing to the extensive detail in the main document, it was felt helpful to prepare a simplified version which was more tuned to the language of the youth. This was circulated to the school and youth groups and the outcome of that survey suggested the need for the actions listed below:





Aims, Aspirations and Actions:

- Provision of a permanent youth meeting venue.
- Development of a Community Centre and youth facilities to accommodate theatre, leisure, evening classes and cinema.
- Acquisition of land to provide new, purpose-built and safe skateboard/BMX facility.
- Acquisition of land to provide additional youth football and other sports pitches. (See Social & Community - Sport, Leisure and Open Space.)

- Provision of Central indoor multi-purpose games hall for sports and art. (See Social & Community - Leisure and Open Space.)
- Encouragement of business diversification to help attract more young people and to increase local trade.
- Local sites to watch, enjoy and learn more about nature.





Milford Community Partnership (MCP) The Future



In order to ensure the progression of the Aims, Aspirations and Actions listed in this Plan, the Steering Committee of Parish Vision 2020 and the Parish Council have agreed a Partnership Document which has been signed by both parties.

The Milford Community Partnership came into being on the publication of this Final Plan. The Management Committee of this Partnership will oversee the progress on each of the aims (or projects) listed, each aim having a nominated leader. Copies of the Project Profiles are available from Milford Community Partnership.



It is inevitable that some aims will be easier to bring to fruition than others and early completion of an aim does not necessarily mean that it has been given a higher priority than that shown in the Consultation and Results document. Some aims will require the acquisition of funding/land/planning permission which is likely to take longer to achieve.

It is hoped that this Plan will be of great interest to all residents of Milford-on-Sea and its surrounding hamlets. So much so that some will wish to become involved in furthering the aims. New volunteers are always welcome and anyone interested should contact




