Welcome to the class!

This will mark the final time this course is offered at The University of Denver. For the past 8 years, The Cable Center & C-SPAN have partnered to create a stimulating, unique academic experience for the DU students. This quarter promises to build on the success we've had in past quarters, as we complement our political science & communication classes with a vibrant and interactive course.

With the Republicans now in control of the House of Representatives, a new political approach by the Obama Administration in dealing with a divided government, and the 2012 political season already underway, this is a fascinating time to study the process (legislatively, politically and with our modern media.)

The 2010 mid-term election resulted in the 3rd consecutive "wave" election. In 2006 the Democrats re-gained control of the U.S. House of Representatives, only to see it lost in the recent November elections. And of course, in 2008 the Republicans lost control of The White House to Barack Obama.

Now, the stage is set for a divided Congress & a White House struggling to put together support for its agenda items, which is evident currently in the budget debates.

This course is fast-paced, highly interactive, multi-media and thought provoking. We apply the traditional academic requirements at the University of Denver, while adding the unique elements that a distance learning class can offer: Interesting guests; lively discussion with students from other parts of the country; historic video from C-SPAN and the National Archives; and video from events as they happen this quarter (as we look at the first draft of history through the current news cycle.)

As we examine and analyze the political, legislative and social issues facing our country, we will take an in-depth look at the issues and events shaping the agenda for 2011 & for next year's presidential election. Our focus will also include the process of public policy making and the role the media plays in shaping the debate and ultimate results.

With the extensive use of the C-SPAN archives and presidential libraries, this distancelearning course will offer a comprehensive and lively seminar on the media and legislative process. The course will be active AND interactive, which means a key component to your final grade will be your PARTICIPATION.

Members of Congress, White House officials, journalists, historians, and former elected & government officials will join us on a regular basis. Guests will be selected based on their expertise in the field of politics, the media, history, and government.

<u>2.) RESEARCH ESSAY& BOOK REPORT: "HARDBALL: How Politics is played – Told By One Who Knows the Game</u>" <mark>50 POINTS</mark>

In this book, Chris Matthews writes: "This is not a civics book. It is not about pristine procedures, but about imperfect people. Hardball is clean, aggressive Machiavellian politics. It is the discipline of gaining and holding power, useful to any profession or undertaking."

12-14 page IN DEPTH ESSAY:

From "HARDBALL" to a divided government – What is the state of American politics in 2011? What can we expect as we move into the 2012 presidential campaign cycle? Is Washington broken, or is the system working like our Founding Fathers designed?

As the Quarter comes to a conclusion, use "HARDBALL" as the framework for this essay/ research report, and then expand the topic to answer the questions listed above. NOTE: You MUST include the following:

- Identify FIVE things that you learned from Hardball
- Summarize the lessons learned from the 1994 mid-term elections & whether they apply to the current administration
- Incorporate comments/ views/ opinions from guest speakers
- Research a cross-section of views (i.e. editorial, essays, blogs) on the current state of Washington
- Offer a historical perspective on where we are today lessons from the past
- Assesses the state of American politics and summarize with your own conclusions
