

### Anniversaries

Two Florida-based training squadrons celebrated their 25th anniversaries: the **HT-18** Vigilant Eagles, NAS Whiting Field, in March and the **VT-86** Sabrehawks, NAS Pensacola, in June. Future helicopter pilots train at HT-18, while VT-86 provides the advanced Naval Flight Officer curriculum.

### Rescues

On 6 February the **NAS Key West, Fla., Search and Rescue** (SAR) team coordinated with the Florida Marine Patrol (FMP) to retrieve the pilot of a downed



Cessna 172 from the waters off Key West. The UH-3H *Sea King* crew pilot Lt. Steven Stempinski, copilot Lt. Mark Howell, AD2 Bradley Thompson, HM3 Terry McIntosh and AO3 Edward Hart—arrived minutes after the civilian plane hit the water. Rescue swimmer Hart assessed the pilot's injuries and assisted him from the aircraft into an FMP boat for transport to shore.

February continued to be a busy month for the Key West SAR team as they conducted three medical evacuations from commercial fishing trawlers. On 11 February, the Sea King crew-pilot Lt. Robert Wallis, copilot LCdr. Mark Regelmann, Lt. Mark Pennington, AD2 Thompson and HM2 Donald McNeil—airlifted a crew member who had suffered a seizure aboard Kelly Ann. On 24 February, the SAR team was dispatched again, this time with pilot Lt. Andrew Ricciutti, copilot LCdr. Regelmann, AT2 Daniel Day, HM2 McNeil and flight surgeon Cdr. William Whitehead to pick up a sailor on Honey Bee who was suffering from a knife wound to the stomach. Four days later, the UH-3Hwith pilot Lt. Wallis, copilot LCdr. Regelmann, Lt. Pennington, AO3 Hart and AME2 Jonathan Ferguson—evacuated a Sierra West crew member who had suffered a stroke. Each of these victims was transported to nearby Lower Florida Keys Medical Center for treatment.

#### VF-101, HS-5 and VS-41,

embarked on *John C. Stennis* (CVN 74), all contributed to the successful medevac of a Sailor suffering a heart attack aboard *De Wert* (FFG 45) on 21 January. Acting Naval Air Force, Atlantic detachment medical officer LCdr. Mark Hoffman, assigned to VF-101, was flown to the frigate by an HS-5 HH-60H *Seahawk* crewed by LCdr. Jamie
