

### **Director Study Abroad**

### **About UJ**

The University of Johannesburg was established on 1 January 2005. It is the result of the incorporation of the Soweto and East Rand campuses of Vista University into the Rand Afrikaans University - which took place on 1 January 2004 - and the merger of the Rand Afrikaans University (into which the two Vista campuses had been incorporated) and the Technikon Witwatersrand on 1 January 2005, to create the University of Johannesburg (UJ).

The Technikon Witwatersrand had been in existence since 1925, the Rand Afrikaans University since 1967 and the Vista University since 1982. UJ has four campuses spread over Central Gauteng: the Auckland Park Kingsway Campus, the Doornfontein Campus, the Auckland Park Bunting Road Campus, and the Soweto Campus. A fifth campus, the East Rand Campus is currently dormant. With over 48 000 full-time students and 3000 permanent employees, it is one of the largest residential universities in South Africa.

The incorporation and merger which led to the establishment of the University of Johannesburg was part of a major programme of the restructuring of higher education in South Africa. The National Plan for Higher Education, published in 2001, charted a course for a major revamp of South African higher

education institutions. The most important consequence of the restructuring exercise conducted by the Department of Education was the reduction of thirty-six universities and technikons into twenty-three higher education institutions. This reduction was achieved by mergers and incorporations of existing higher education institutions, the planning and implementation of which was executed from 2002-2004. The final decision of the Minister of Education on the restructuring of higher education institutions was published as Government Notice 855 in the Government Gazette of 21 June 2002. As a result of the restructuring exercise South Africa now has eleven traditional universities (offering traditional formative degree programmes), five universities of technology (offering vocational and professional programmes) and six "comprehensive institutions" (offering both formative degree programmes and vocational programmes).

The University of Johannesburg falls into the category of comprehensive institution. The term "comprehensive institution" is an instrument of educational policy and has no statutory definition. Each of the "comprehensives" has developed an identity that best suits their own strategic objectives.





### **Education for the 21st Century**

As one of the largest residential university in South Africa without distance education programmes, the University of Johannesburg's teaching and learning programmes result in degrees and diplomas in array of subjects, ranging from Fine Arts to Engineering, from Business Management and Accounting to Haute Couture and from Theology to Homeopathy. The university has nine faculties located in greater Johannesburg and accommodates a diverse student body of four campuses in Doornfontein, Auckland Park and Soweto. Although these campuses are fairly recent additions to the urban landscape of the city, each is located in an area that made a significant contribution to its history and growth. For example, the campus in Doornfontein was developed in the heart of one of Johannesburg's oldest suburbs, which was laid out in 1889, shortly after the discovery of gold in the Witwatersrand. The Soweto Campus, where major development commenced in 2008, is set to become the flagship of the new generation university and will contribute significantly to its surroundings. The Bunting Road and Kingsway Campuses in Auckland Park, a suburb laid out in 1895 have brought a vibrant new student population to this suburb.

### First-year experience

## Facilitating Teaching and Learning

As all students enter university with the aim of attaining a tertiary qualification, UJ seeks to support first-year students who need to negotiate the transition between school and university successfully, if they are to succeed academically.

Both internationally and specifically in the South African context, students tend to find this challenging, resulting in many students dropping out during the first year. In response to this challenge, UJ has implemented a First-Year Experience initiative. The FYE aims to create an ethos and way of life at UJ that facilitate effective Student transition from school to university and support an institutional climate and culture conducive to first-year students' success. The FYE assists and guide students to take up the challenge of adapting to university life and becoming fully fledged and productive members of the UJ academic community.

The FYE has given strong motivation for the wider implementation of tutorials, which provide students with opportunities for active learning and critical discussion of themes and topics, as well as opportunities for making friends.

The University of Johannesburg comprises four campuses spread across the heart of the economic and industrial hub of Africa, the City of Johannesburg, whose name it shares.

### Registration 2012

#### **Arrival**

Plan to arrive between 10 and 14 January in order to settle in, acclimatize and find accommodation.

## Registration procedures for 2012

Registration for all University of Johannesburg students starts on 23 January until 3 February 2012.

Senior students register from: 23-27 January and 1-3 February

First years students register from: 30-31 January

The various faculties register on specific days. If you are a first-year student consult the Orientation brochure for the registration date of your faculty.

Please follow the steps set out below carefully when you arrive on campus to register. You need to report to the International Student Admissions Office FIRST before continuing to register. You will not be able to register unless the International Student Admissions Office has controlled and confirmed your study permit and medical cover.

**IMPORTANT:** International students are not able to register online.

Please note: If you do not follow the steps below in the correct order you will experience some difficulties in registering!

#### Step 1

When reporting to the International Student Admissions Office please make sure that you bring the following documents:

- your passport containing the appropriate study permit for the University of Johannesburg;
- proof of your medical cover;
- proof of payment of your fees from the bank.

### Please note the following:

- Ensure that you bring two certified copies of all relevant documentation to the registration venue.
- All international students need to pay full fees for the year 10 working days before registration (This includes asylum seekers and refugees.)
- Your medical aid cover needs to be paid in advance for the year of study, and must be a South African registered Medical Aid.

### Step 2

Present the proof of the payment of your fees to the Student Finances Department. Payment should include tuition fee, registration fee and the international levy. After submitting proof of payment you may proceed to the registration venue. You will find Student Finance at the following venues:

### **Definitions**

We identify our international students according to the following categories:

### Full-degree/Diploma students:

A full-degree/diploma student registers full-time for a complete programme i.e. a three year degree.

### **Exchange students:**

An Exchange student is nominated by a partner university as defined by the institutional memorandum of understanding.

### **Study Abroad students:**

A Study Abroad student is a full-time non-degree seeking student registering for a variety of modules from one or more faculties, for one or two semesters at a time.

#### **Orientation**

### Programme of orientation activities

There is a brochure for first-year student orientation in which you will find further information about the following activities:

### **Faculty orientation**

Each faculty conducts its own faculty orientation programme during the first week of the general orientation programme. The content of the programme as well as the amount of time and number of sessions scheduled are determined by each faculty. Faculty orientation sessions are faculty specific and students will receive information in this regard directly from their faculties.

### **Subject orientation sessions**

Each faculty offers a subject orientation session before the academic registration. These sessions are compulsory as important information and documentation will be made available. Knowledgeable staff will be available at the subject orientation sessions to advise students.

#### **Academic registration**

After the subject orientation, the academic registration will start from 23 January 2012. In order to ensure that the registration proceedings are successful, it is imperative that students adhere to the registration schedule. Except for reporting to the International Students Admissions Office FIRST international students follow the same procedures as local students. (This is the process indicated in this brochure.)



#### International Student Orientation

Above all, international students are assisted in order to adjust to their new environment. In the orientation programme provided by the International Office, the international student's needs are the main focus as well as providing students with vital information and a tour of the campus and city surrounds. This orientation is compulsory for all students.

First part of orientation will take place on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> of February 2012 from 14:00 – 16:00. Thereafter students will be welcomed by the Vice-Chancellor at the Fountain Court on the Kingsway campus starting at 16:30.

#### **Parent Orientation**

As a child is a parent's most prized possession, the International Office understands that most parents will feel some apprehension when their children leave for university, especially at an overseas institution. The Office thus thoroughly orientates all students, we focus on the following areas:

### We also recommend that parents assist their children in the flowing manner:

- Don't remind them constantly that they are far away
- Encourage them to participate in the orientation programme and campus activities

- Before ending a phone call, repeat the information, summarizing what you have said, making sure you and your child are on the same page
- Guide them to solve their own problems
- Keep in touch, even if they don't as it creates a sense of security
- Inform the International Office of possible concerns

### Study Permit

### How to Apply for a Study Permit

The University is <u>NOT</u> permitted to register you until you have produced your <u>VALID</u> study permit. It usually takes at least 6 weeks for your study permit application to be processed. It is also important for you to note that your Study Permit is issued to study at one institution and you would have to apply for a change of status, should you want to change institutions. This can be done in country in the city applicable to the new institution of study.

You are required to apply for a study permit at the South African High Commission, Embassy, Consulate or Trade Mission in your country of residence. If there is no South African representative in that country, you must apply to the nearest South African High Commission, Embassy, Consulate or Trade Mission.

The following are the current requirements to be submitted to the South African Embassy/Consulate in your country to obtain your Study Permit:

- A passport valid for not less than 30 days after intended studies.
- Administrative fee of R425 (as at December 2006)

- Confirmation and proof of payment of a South African Medical Aid Cover with a medical scheme registered with the SA Medical Schemes Council. Cover must remain valid for the duration of the calendar year.
- Letter of Offer from the University stating the duration of degree, confirming that the student is not taking the place of a local student and undertaking to inform the Department of Home Affairs when the student deregisters.
- A Medical and Radiological reports (less than six months old).
- Yellow Fever vaccination certificate, if relevant.
- 7. Relevant certificates if married, widowed, divorced or separated.
- 8. Details regarding arranged accommodation while in South Africa.
- 9. Proof of sufficient funds to cover tuition fees and maintenance.
- A police clearance certificate for the past 12 months or longer since the age of 18
- 11. A cash deposit or a return ticket to country of origin.

Nationals of African countries are not required to pay this deposit if their Government undertakes, in writing, to cover all costs relating to any repatriation action that may become necessary. You are advised to submit the documentation as soon as possible to the South African High Commission, Embassy, Consulate or Trade Mission - <u>DO NOT</u> sent the documentation to the University. We, however advise that you keep a copy of your submission and all receipts safely.

Some South African Embassies, High Commissions, Consulates and Trade Missions require a letter of undertaking from University of Johannesburg stating that a student will not be taking the place of a South African citizen and that the University will inform the Department of Home Affairs should the student

discontinue his/her studies. While this is not necessary according to the regulations; if you require such a document, the University will be able to facilitate this request.

### **Endorsement to study part time**

New interpretations of the regulations have been issued to the conditions of part time studies on a work permit. If you are a holder of a Work or Business permit you may apply for an endorsement to study part-time

The endorsement will only be valid for the period of the holder's prospective Business or Work permits.

To apply for the endorsement you will complete form BI1739

- There is no cost for the endorsement
- Letter of acceptance/firm offer letter from the University
- Original Passport and Work Permit
- Proof of Medical Aid
- · Proof of Finance
- Confirmation of Employment Letter

### **Extension of a study permit**

The following should be submitted to the Department of Home Affairs:

- BI1739 form (R425.00 ? application fee) (Form to be completed in black ink)
- 2. Spouse ID & Marriage Certificate
- Proof of Registration with an Institution (letter from the Faculty to include current year of study and end date of when the permit is to be extended to)
- 4. Proof of Payment of Tuition Fees
- Proof of Funds Available (balance to reflect tuition and living allowance for the year)
- 6. Proof of a South African based Medical Aid Cover

- 7. Police Clearance (Home Affairs have requested that applicants who have been in the country for more than 12 months provide a police clearance from South Africa. Due to a delay in the processing of A police clearances in South Africa Home Affairs have made a provision that applicants provide letters confirming that A police clearance would be submitted within a period of 6 months of issue of permit)
- 8. Proof of Repatriation Deposit Paid (Original Receipt)
- Proof of Guardianship for Minor if Applicable
- 10. Passport (Original)
- 11. Apply within a minimum of 30 days before Permit Expires

Your application for extension of a study permit needs to be signed by a representative in the UJ International Office before it is submitted to the Department of Home Affairs. All though the UJ will make copies of these documents for your student file, it is advised that you retain it your own records.

### PLEASE NOTE

The holder of a study permit for studies at a higher education institution may conduct part-time work for a period not exceeding 20 hours per week during term and full time when the University is closed.

## Changing conditions of a study permit

A change of conditions of a study permit refers to a situation where you hold a valid study permit with a condition to study at another institution in the republic other than the one you are applying to. This is usually the case of learners and students

studying at South African high schools, colleges and other academic institutions and their permits would therefore be endorsed with a condition to study at institutions in any of the categories above. In order to register at University of Johannesburg the permit will need to be endorsed for the applicant to study at the University of Johannesburg.

Application for change of conditions of a study permit constitutes a new application of a study permit. Though the applicant will need to complete a separate form, the requirements are the same as for the initial application of a study permit. These forms are not available on the internet. They can only be collected at any of the South African Visa Issuing Authorities (Home Affairs Offices, Consulates or Embassies).

### Medical Aid

All international students need to comply with the visa regulation as determined by the Immigration Act, Act 19 of 2004.

Regulation 10 (1) (i) determines the following:

An applicant for study permit is required to provide proof of medical cover with a medical scheme registered in terms of the Medical Schemes Act, Act 131 of 1998, recognized in the Republic.

Although you may, with some other foreign insurance product, secure a study permit from a South African diplomatic mission, the University of Johannesburg in accordance with the Medical Schemes Act, does not recognize such medical cover for registration purposes.

The university requires proof of full Medical Aid cover with a South African based medical aid scheme for each full academic calendar year.

The cover must be valid until 31 December of the year of study in order to qualify to register.

Study Abroad and Exchange Students must secure medical cover for the duration

of their stay. A minimum of six (6) months cover is provided by medical aid companies.

It is thus advisable that international students make the necessary financial arrangements for the medical aid cover prior to entry into South Africa. Should the student rely on sponsorship, he/she should ensure that the sponsor is advised of the requirement at the onset of the sponsorship of the admission offer from the institution. Most intuitions do not accept a letter from the sponsor in lieu of payment. Payment for the required medical aid cover fee is made directly to the medical aid company, separately from the tuition fee.

The following are medical aid companies with developed student focused products that are registered in terms of the Medical Schemes Act. They also offer the minimum benefits that a student may need whilst in South Africa. They are also accepted by the Department of Health's medical facilities:

### The Buddy System

The University of Johannesburg buddy system is a special programme that was established for the purposes of providing support to international students and cultural integration. The system also assists to integrate international students with student life at the University of Johannesburg.

### What is a Buddy-System?

A buddy is a student that takes a group of new international students (freshmen) under his/her wing and helps them adapt to the UJ environment and also to South Africa in general. The duty of a buddy stretches further than just the student; the freshmen are also introduced to the culture of UJ as well as the South African culture through social events and excursions.

All buddies report to a buddy coordinator who resorts under International Office. The Buddy Coordinator will take up matters with International Office when need be.

### Who can apply to be a buddy?

Any registered student of the University of Johannesburg, whether South African or foreign. The applicants should at least be in their second year of study.

### Advantages of being a buddy

- Receive formal training from the International Office.
- Receive a certificate after completion of the term as a buddy, proving extracurricular participation at the University. This can add to an impressive CV.
- The opportunity to learn about foreign cultures.
- The opportunity to build international contacts.

## The following characteristics are required from a buddy:

- social responsibility;
- good interpersonal relations;
- empathy/sympathy;
- true interest in others;
- responsibility;
- sensitivity to the religions and cultures of others and lastly but most importantly,
- to be committed to the cause of being a buddy.

## Role and tasks of a Buddy. A buddy should:

- Treat freshmen with integrity;
- respect the culture and religion of the freshmen;
- hold a positive outlook towards South Africa an UJ:
- help international students adapt academically, by providing information about UJ. This information includes services to international students, the Library, PsyCaD, Academic Development, the Student Representative Council and the relevant faculties:
- assist international students to adapt socially by, for example, introducing them to friends, exposing them to cultures in South Africa and to introduce them to societies on campus;
- instill a sense of belonging for international students;
- take the freshmen on a campus tour;
- provide guidance and support to freshmen;
- provide basic information to freshmen such as public transport (bus routes) medical facilities, shopping centers and other information that could make the day to day life of the students more bearable:
- meet with freshmen on an informal basis as often as possible;
- meet once a month with the freshmen on a formal basis on a date set up by the Buddy Coordinator;
- meet with the Buddy Coordinator a day or so after the formal meeting with the freshmen to discuss relevant matters;

- report any problems, complaints or suggestions that might need attention to the Buddy Coordinator. The Buddy Coordinator will in turn report it to International Office for further investigation/ action.
- attend feedback sessions at the end of each term with the International Office.
- participate in a final written evaluation at the end of September.

### **Culture Shock**

Coming to a new country is both exciting and somewhat nerve-racking. The key to preventing going into a stress related panic is to allow yourself to ease into the new environment and to ask questions. In South Africa especially, the people around you will be glad to help, but do take precaution, and do not be too trusting, foreigners are sometimes easy targets for theft.

### Homesickness

When the excitement wears off, a person is confronted with daily life in the new society, where everything can be quite different from what you are used to back home. Make use of our Buddy system to meet new people, make friends and get to know your new environment.

After about nine months you will feel more familiar with the environment and begin to see the good side of the new culture. You will gradually adopt the new ways of living. The university does offer counseling if you experience any difficulty in adapting. Please enquire at the International Office.



### **Socials**

The International Office, the buddies and the University of Johannesburg International Student Organisation (UJISS) arrange several social events during the two weeks of registration for international students. By attending these international students can meet each other and South African students. Other events during the year include the welcoming function just after registration; a day outing to the Cradle of Humankind (a world heritage site) or a visit to a museum or maybe a night at the movies or just having a burger.

### **Annual International Festival**

The International Festival is presented by the International Office with the assistance of the international students. The International Festival has always been a great success. International students are given the opportunity to showcase their various cultures to the UJ student community. You are encouraged as an international student to bring traditional recipes, traditional costumes and other items from home representing your country for this wonderful event.

### **Fees**

Please note: When an international student is accepted for study at UJ the full amount for the entire year is payable 10 working days before registration. This includes the registration and tuition fees as well as the international levy.

All students (local and international) who register at the University of Johannesburg are required to pay a non-refundable registration fee of R490. Please note that no cash transactions are permitted on campus during the registration period. Please pay your fees at the bank before proceeding to the University for registration and submit proof of your payment at the Student Finance Office. (See UJ banking details)

The following fees are payable before registration:

### **Undergraduate students**

#### **Students from African countries:**

Prescribed tuition fees plus an international levy of R1 500.

#### Students from other countries:

The prescribed tuition fees plus an international levy of R34 000 per year.

### Postgraduate students

All postgraduate students pay the tuition fee as prescribed plus an international levy of R1 500.

### **Exchange students**

Tuition is waived for students participating in official University of Johannesburg exchange agreements. However, the student is financially liable for any courses that are not provided for in terms of the agreement, as well as the registration fee, ICT levy and accomodation.

### Non-formal courses

Extra curricular courses: An international levy of R750 is payable when registering for an extra curricular course.

Short courses: An international levy of R750 is payable when registering for a short course.

Non-degree purpose / occasional / practical training: An international levy of R7000 is payable when registering.

#### Financial assistance

Unfortunately financial assistance is only available to permanent residents of South Africa. However, merit bursaries are automatically awarded to deserving full-time international students from SADC-countries from their second year of study. All international students are eligible for postgraduate bursaries and should apply for it. For more information you may enquire from the Bursary Division, Student Finance

### **Access control**

### **General Security**

While the University endeavours to provide a safe and secure campus environment, safety and security is also a personal responsibility. The University has an internal mail system for inter-faculty correspondence. The nearest post office to APK and APB campuses is in the shopping mall, Campus Square in Melville just across from the APK campus. A postal facility is also available from Postnet in the Student Centre on APK campus.





### **Banks**

South African banks are able to accommodate all international transactions. Banks are open from Monday to Friday (09:00 to 15:30) and on Saturdays from 08:30 to 11:00. There are Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs) on all campuses, although not all banks are represented. These operate 24 hours a day.

It is recommended that international students open a local bank account. It is a relatively simple process to open an account at one of the major banks. ### South Africa

### Location

South Africa lies at the southern tip of the African continent between latitudes 22° and 35° south. It is flanked in the west by the Atlantic ocean, in the south and the east by the Indian ocean, in the north by Namibia, Botswana and Zimbabwe, and in the north-east by Mozambique and Swaziland.

#### Size

South Africa covers an area of 1 127 000 square metres, about one-eighth the size of the USA and nearly five times the size of the United Kingdom.

### Climate

The climate is mostly sunny and temperate, and the average number of sunshine hours each day is among the highest in the world: 8,5 compared with 3,8 in London, 6,4 in Rome and 6.9 in New York. Winters are mild and clear, although snowfall often occurs on the higher mountain ranges of the Cape and KwaZulu-Natal, causing brief cold spells in the surrounding areas. The south-western Cape Province enjoys a Mediterranean climate (dry summers and winter rainfall). In general, the rest of the country experiences summer rainfall usually in the form of short afternoon thunderstorms. As the country lies in the southern hemisphere, seasons are the reverse of those prevailing in the northern hemisphere.

### **Economic diversity**

South Africa's economy is supported by a diverse variety of business. From big conglomerates and international companies to small, family businesses and street vendors, South Africa's workforce is indeed as diverse as the country.

As the economic powerhouse of Africa, the country is the leading country on the continent in industrial output, mineral production and generating most of Africa's electricity.

### **Natural diversity**

South Africa is famous for its breathtaking scenery and abundance of wildlife. The wildlife does not roam free in cosmopolitan areas, but is confined to farms, uninhabited fields, private game lodges and national parks.

Five famous inhabitants on the wild are especially popular, not only with tourists, but also with the locals. The 'Big Five', as they are known, are found mostly in the bigger national parks, however, in the last five years these animals can also be seen at some of the private game lodges. The Big Five includes: elephant, lion, rhino, leopard and buffalo, and other African icons like hippo, giraffe, cheetah and whales can also be seen.

With over 200 mammal species it is hard to identify those that stand out, but the samango monkeys, baboons, dassies and meerkats are the most entertaining and interesting.

As a country that is bounded by the Indian Ocean in the east and the Atlantic Ocean to the west, it is no surprise that eight whale species can be viewed in South African waters. Another interesting fact about our waters is that 2000 other fish species, 16% of the world's total swim around in these waters

### **Cultural diversity**

Probably the most diverse element in South African is its people and their cultures. As a country with 11 official languages, namely Afrikaans, English, isiNdebele, isiXhosa, isiZulu, Sepedi, Sesotho, Setswana, siSwati, Tshivenda, and Xitsonga, you can just imagine how vibrant, colourful and interesting life in South African can be.

South African cuisine has unusual variety derived from the culinary traditions of its diverse population. Traditional foods

curried mince dish of Malay origin), milk tart, koeksusters (sweet syrupy deepfried twisted pastries) and biltong (salty dried meat). South Africans are very fond of meat and enjoy a 'braai' (a barbecue which can include steak, chicken, sosaties (marinated meat on a skewer), and boerewors (spicy sausage), Potjiekos (meat & vegetable stew) and pot brood (baked bread), both cooked over coals in castiron pots, are also local favourites. South African wines are among the best in the world, and there are also good local beers.

As a popular tourist destination, one can find a little piece of Arica across the globe. People who visit the country however, do not only take home a curio but also a little of the spirit of Africa. This spirit of Africa gets into your bones, into your soul and makes you remember this country of sweet sorrow, and amazement, which can leave you breathless at times.

### **Tipping**

Tipping is common practice in South Africa for a range of services. In restaurant the accepted standard is around 10% of the bill, although sometimes a gratuity will be included (often in the case of large party). Service station attendants will expect a tip of two or three Rand for filling up with petrol, checking oil, water and tyre pressure and cleaning windscreens. It is also appropriate to tip taxi drivers and tour guides. Uniformed parking attendants will offer to safeguard your car for a tip from two Rand upwards.



### **Currency**

The South African currency unit is the Rand, denoted by the symbol R. (R1.00 = 100 cents.) There is no restriction on the amount of foreign currency you may bring into the country, but it must be declared at Customs & Excise when you arrive.

#### **Credit Card and Travel Cards**

Most international credit cards such as American Express, Diners Club, MasterCard and Visa are accepted, as well as travel cards. Foreign currency is accepted in South Africa, and may be converted into local currency.

Please note: A commission fee is charged every time you exchange currency.

#### **Taxation**

The Value Added Tax (VAT) rate is 14% and is included in the price you see on products. It is levied on most products except staple foods. Students should obtain proof of payment for all capital items purchased during their stay to claim refunds at the port of exit, provided the value of the items exceeds R250-00. Information leaflets on the procedure to be followed are available from the VAT Refund Administration offices at the Beit Bridge Border Post and OR Tambo International Airport (Johannesburg).

### **Government of South Africa**

Since 10 May 1994, South Africa has been governed by a democratically-elected Government. The Constitution of the Republic of South Africa contains a Bill of Rights, which makes provision for freedom of religion, belief and opinion; freedom of expression; freedom of movement; equality and equal protection before the law.

### **Provinces and major cities**

The country is divided into nine provinces: Western Cape, Northern Cape, Eastern Cape, Free State, KwaZulu-Natal, North West Province, Limpopo, Mpumalanga and Gauteng. Johannesburg is the largest industrial, financial and cultural centre in South Africa. Cape Town and Durban are two of the most popular holiday destinations. Notable cities and towns from historical and cultural points of view include Pietermaritzburg, Grahamstown, Graaff-Reinet, Port Elizabeth, Kimberley and Stellenbosch

### **Electricity**

City and town power systems mostly operate at 220/250 volts, AC 50Hz. Adapters for electric shavers and hair dryers are obtainable locally.

## Telephone & Internet communication

South Africa has a sophisticated telecommunications network. International dialling codes can be found in South African directories. South Africa has a modern and effective telephone system. A direct dialling service connects all the local centres, except the more remote rural districts. The international telephone service links South Africa with more than 111 countries around the world. All the hotels and businesses have telex and fax services. The recent introduction of the Digital GSM Cellular telephone system has developed rapidly with coverage of all the major cities and roads. The INTERNET and email are also very popular with many companies actively doing business over the World Wide Web

#### **Time**

Throughout the year, Standard Time in South Africa is two hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time, one hour ahead of Central European Wintertime, and seven hours ahead of US Eastern Standard Winter Time. Consult the local telephone directory for detailed world time zones. There is no daylight savings time in South Africa.

### **Trading Hours**

Trading hours for most retail stores are from Monday to Friday from 08:00 to 17:00. Campus Square, Cresta, Westgate and Eastgate Shopping Centres are the most accessible to students and usually remain open until 19:00. There is a special bus route that services all these shopping centers. Entertainment venues are usually open till late.

### **Health Risks**

There is a Malaria risk when travelling in the northern regions. This can be kept at bay with a range of medicines on offer. We advise that you speak to your doctor about a suitable prophylactic.

#### Immunizations / Vaccinations

Travelers entering South Africa from countries where yellow fever is endemic are often required to present their yellow World Health Organization (WHO) vaccination record or other proof of inoculation, or they must be inoculated at the airport in order to be permitted entry. It is recommended that students planning to study nursing, social work or any other subject which involves working with the underprivileged community, have a course of Hepatitis B inoculating starting, If possible, 9 months prior to arrival in South Africa. It is recommended that you consult your personal physician in your home country for further advice and information on inoculations.

Precautions should be taken if travelling to the Kruger National Park and other low altitude game parks and surrounding areas. Malaria prophylaxis should be taken before arriving in, during your stay in, and after departure from, these areas. Remember that to be effective these anti-malaria drugs must be taken regularly and in strict accordance with the doctor's instruction (www.travelclinic.co.za).

### **Passports and Visas**

Valid passports are required by all and must be valid for 6 months after departure from South Africa. Visitors' visas are required by some nationalities. Travellers should check with the relevant consulates or visit the website of the Department of Home Affairs: www.dha.gov.za

### **Road and Transport Systems**

South Africa's road and transport systems are the finest on the continent. An excellent road network encompasses 82 000 kilometres of fully tarred-roads. Comprehensive tours of the country, taking in all the major attractions may be made. A wide selection of reliable, up-to-date air, rail and motor coach services, linking the major centres, is available, as are combined air and land tours. Car and caravan rental firms operate in all the cities and in most of the smaller centres in major tourist areas. One of the world's great luxury trains, the Blue Train, links Cape Town with Johannesburg and Pretoria.

### **Tourist Attractions**

South Africa is one of the world's most exciting holiday destinations. There are many art galleries and museums in the Johannesburg area. The major tourist

attractions close to the University of Johannesburg are:

- The Lion Park where you can see the rare "white lions", walk with cheetahs and experience a diversity of African wildlife.
- Gold Reef City where the old mining past comes to life with shows, authentic costumes and buildings, fabulous restaurants and loads of entertainment.
- Apartheid Museum gives a detailed look into the lives of South Africans during the Apartheid era.
- Museum Africa a journey back into the glory years of the African continent's past, when the first civilizations were created and thrived.
- The Market Theatre was made famous as the first fully integrated theatre and houses three theatres, restaurants, bar and museum.
- Witwatersrand National Botanical Gardens is a great place to hike and admire South Africa's diverse plant heritage.
   In addition, you can walk to the top of the falls and observe the nesting pair of highly endangered black eagles.
- Johannesburg Zoological Gardens covers 81 hectares of land and was founded in 1904. Attractive animal exhibits and spacious indigenous gardens make it the perfect place for a picnic.
- Kromdraai Hiking Trails for those who love the open air, spectacular views and exploring on foot.
- Melville Koppies is the last conserved remnant of Johannesburg's ridges as they were before the discovery of gold in 1886 and its geology goes back three billion years.

 The Cradle of Humankind and the Sterkfontein Caves where some of the most valuable humanoid fossils have been found.

#### What is an emergency?






