## TRUSTEES' REPORT

## FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2013

#### Structure, Governance and Management

The Bernard Sunley Charitable Foundation was founded on 28 July 1960 by the late Bernard Sunley (1910-1964) as a general grant making charity. Over the last 53 years the Foundation has awarded grants of £99m.

In the Trust Deed, the Trustees are given the authority to grant aid at their discretion to those charitable institutions that they may select.

The Foundation became incorporated as a limited company on 1 April 2005 with company number 5407187, resulting in a new Charity Commission registered number of 1109099. The original registered number was 213362.

During this year the Board of Trustees consisted of Bernard Sunley's two daughters, Mrs Joan Tice and Mrs Bella Sunley, and two of his grandchildren Mr William Tice and Mrs Anabel Knight (Chairman), together with Sir Donald Gosling and Dr Brian Martin. On 7 November Mr Inigo Paternina (grandchild) was elected to join the board.

Trustees are appointed by the Board of Trustees and serve for three years, after which they may seek re-election. Candidates are drawn from family and those suitably qualified, who would bring appropriate experience to the Board. The current Trustees have been associated with the charity for many years, are advised about sector regulation changes, and training is organised to suit Trustees' needs.

The Trustees meet regularly throughout the year. The day-to-day running of the Foundation is delegated to the Director and his staff, with the Director reporting to the Trustees on a regular basis. A number of the founder's grandchildren attend meetings, contribute to the discussion and carry out research on behalf of the Foundation.

A Finance Committee, which comprises the Chairman, Dr Martin, Mr Richard Tice and the Director, advises the Board on finances and investment policy. The Committee tracks and monitors the performance of the portfolio in conjunction with the Trustees' investment advisers, making changes as they deem appropriate.

The Trustees conduct a risk assessment each year with a risk assessment register being maintained and updated as required. They consider that they have taken appropriate steps to ensure that risks are assessed regularly and that the Foundation is not exposed in any unnecessary way. Trustees also monitor internal financial controls.

The Trustees are content that the requirements of the Charity Commission with regard to 'public benefit' are met wholly, and proffer this report as showing this intent. Grants are made to UK registered charities which are themselves required to satisfy this 'public benefit' test.

Furthermore, the Trustees often meet applicants and undertake visits to satisfy for themselves the validity of various projects.

## **Objectives and Activities**

The aim of the Foundation is to grant aid to charities seeking to raise the quality of life, particularly for those who are young, disadvantaged, deprived, disabled or elderly. Grants are usually confined to the United Kingdom. The Trustees have a preference for capital projects, not running costs. Once completed projects are expected to be self-financing.

There are three types of grant; major grants of £50,000 and above, medium grants between £5,000 and £50,000 and small grants of £5,000 and below. The majority of grants are for less than £5,000 but this is increased in cases where the Trustees see fit. Grants are usually paid as single payments in a one year period but, if considered particularly beneficial to the project, they may extend over three years.

In some cases where Trustees award larger grants, the Foundation has been historically involved with a particular cause and / or a Trustee has personal knowledge of the project in hand and will certainly have visited to gauge the appropriate level of support.

The Foundation maintains a rolling programme and accepts applications for grant aid at any time. Guidelines for making an application for funding are available on the Bernard Sunley Charitable Foundation website www.bernardsunley.org. The Foundation's staff are also available to give advice to prospective applicants.

In November 2012 the Trustees held a review of their objectives and have amended their website accordingly. From 1 April 2013, the number of categories has been reduced from twelve to nine, with applications concerning children and young people, the elderly and religion now covered by the remaining nine categories. Additionally awards of £25,000 or more will be considered as major grants, medium grants will be between £5,001 and £24,999 and small grants remain as those of £5,000 and below.

The Trustees have a number of objectives in order to achieve the best advantage for beneficiaries:

- a. To maintain the real value of the Foundation's assets whilst earning the budgeted income.
- b. To pay grants in line with the budget.
- c. To select for grant aid those charities that the Trustees deem meet their aspirations.
- d. To monitor the effectiveness of grants made.

#### **Achievements and Performance**

During the year, the Trustees approved 458 grants, totalling in value £2,795,423, which compares with 424 grants at a total value of £2,548,619 in the previous year. Grant payments totalling £2,471,723 were made, and are listed on pages 38 to 41.

The Trustees awarded six major grants this year. They have been long term supporters of the Imperial War Museum and have given £100,000 towards a major development to refurbish and redesign the lower areas of the museum to explain the lead up to, and events of, the First World War, on land, at sea and in the air. The result will be a better informed general public and also a focus on education for young people and historians so that future generations will realise the enormity of this conflict, which shaped the world of today. A grant of £100,000 to the Ufton Court Education Trust was aimed at helping to establish an activity centre for young people, principally those underprivileged in the Reading area but it will benefit hundreds of others from further afield too. A new centre PACE is being developed in Aylesbury to support and educate children with cerebral palsy and other disorders, and Trustees awarded £50,000 towards this much needed facility in Central Southern England. Through the Spinal Injuries Association, the Trustees awarded a £50,000 grant towards the establishment of a centre of excellence for UK, which will provide an advisory and best practice service for all those suffering as a result of a stroke or associated brain injury. Wilton's Music Hall is a unique historic working theatre which is being renovated and its associated spaces are being refurbished, much of it for educational purposes, and to that end Trustees have made an award of £50,000. The final £50,000 grant was awarded to the Godmersham and Crundale Recreation Hall, an award that ensured this building's viability for use by the local community.

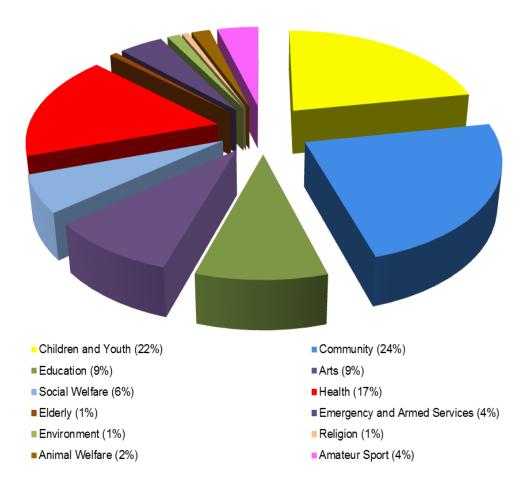

Medium grants are given to a wide range of causes. In particular, they are directed at activities and facilities for young people, helping to provide 'village hall' amenities for the whole community to assist cohesion and reduce isolation, and towards health projects which are not funded through NHS statutory funding.

Grants of £10,000 or more were approved to 110 charities during the year, and these are listed within various categories on pages 24 to 29. For grants approved below £10,000, the list of 348 benefiting charities begins on page 30.

Distribution of grants is shown below by category and highlights the Trustees continued desire to support community and young people in particular. Young people also feature strongly in Education, Arts, Health and Social Welfare categories.

Effectiveness of grants is monitored by personal contact with project managers through visits, letters, e-mails, websites, telephone calls and photographs.

#### **Investment and Financial Review**

The Foundation's investment policy is to maximise the total return from assets, balancing a need for regular sustained income against low to medium risk management of these assets.

Trustees have delegated investment decisions to the Finance Committee who advise about the appointment of investment managers and also monitor investment performance against agreed benchmarks.

Trustees have maintained their diversified portfolio throughout the year monitoring markets closely, riding the volatility and drawing income from the portfolio to achieve the Foundation's aims. Minor adjustments to holdings were made during the year. In June the holdings in Evercore Pan Asset were reduced by £3 million, and this sum was used to increase the holding of corporate bonds with Aberdeen Asset Management to improve the income capacity of the portfolio. Frequent discussions and face to face briefings took place with Aberdeen Asset Management staff, Mayfair Capital, and FF & P Private Equity.

With interest rates at their all time low, cash holdings have been maintained at minimal levels commensurate with the payment of grants and the smooth day to day running of the Foundation.

The cost of generating funds remained at a similar level. Charitable activities and governance costs of the Foundation amounted to £213,000 compared with £212,000 the previous year.

The net movement of funds during the year was £11.291 million compared with £(498,000) last year.

#### Plans for the Future

Trustees wish to maintain the momentum of the Foundation that has been built up over 52 years. A strategic review took place on 8 November 2012 at which the Trustees determined the priorities for the next five years. Income generation from investments is vital to the grant aid function and therefore is monitored closely. The Trustees intend to continue making grants to charities whilst minimising administrative costs within the constraints of current regulations and good practice.

In February 2012 a website, www.bernardsunley.org was established, the principle function being the availability of 'Guidelines' to assist applicants. This was updated in December 2012 and will continue to be monitored and adjusted as the need develops.

#### Reserves

Assets of the Foundation are held to generate sustainable income in order to meet the Foundation's aims and activities. The reserves of the Foundation were £96.048m at 31 March 2013 and they are the income generator that allows the current level of grant making to be maintained. When the financial downturn started in 2007 the Trustees made a conscious decision to maintain a £2.5m level of grant aid, content to spend some of the reserves should that become necessary. In fact it has been achieved without the need to eat into the reserves.

#### **Responsibility of Trustees for Financial Statements**

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the financial activities of the Foundation during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year. In preparing these financial statements giving a true and fair view, the Trustees are required to: -

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the activities of the Foundation will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which disclose, with reasonable accuracy, the financial position of the Foundation, and which enable them to ascertain the financial position of the Foundation and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with Companies Act 2006 and the Memorandum of Association dated 30 March 2005. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Foundation, and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In determining how amounts are presented within items in the statement of financial affairs, Trustees have had regard to the substance of the reported transaction or arrangement, in accordance with accepted accounting principles.

#### THE BERNARD SUNLEY CHARITABLE FOUNDATION

We have audited the financial statements of Bernard Sunley Charitable Foundation for the year ended 31 March 2013 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, Cash Flow Statement and the related notes. #### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

## 1. Accounting basis

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include investments at market value and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (Accounting and Reporting by Charities) 2005, and with applicable accounting standards.

#### 2. Reserves

See Page 9 of the Trustees Report.

#### 3. Incoming resources

Income from investments comprises dividends and interest on shares and stocks, income from property fund units, plus interest on all bank balances and deposits and ground rents from the freehold properties. In all cases the income is credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period that it is received.

#### 4. Resources expended

#### Cost of generating funds

Fees charged by the Foundation's investment managers, and by their investment custodians are included in the period in which they occur. All costs associated with the cost of managing the Foundation's property portfolio are also included.

#### Charitable activities

The Trustees consider that grant-making is the Foundation's sole charitable activity. Grants are included in the financial statements when approved by the Trustees and notified to recipients. The value of committed grants unpaid at the year end is accrued. The support costs are the costs relating to grant administration, grant evaluation, accounting and the day to day costs in support of the charitable purposes of the Foundation.

#### **Governance costs**

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to statutory audit and legal fees.

#### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

## 5. Investments

Fixed assets investments are stated at market valuation. Any unrealised or realised gains arising from investments are accounted for in the Statement of Financial Activities.

#### 6. Freehold properties

Freehold investment properties are stated in the balance sheet at open market valuation in accordance with SSAP 19 and no depreciation has been provided thereon.

## 7. Furniture and Fittings

Furniture, fittings and equipment with a value greater than £1,000 are reported in the balance sheet at original cost. Depreciation is charged over the estimated useful life of the assets using the straight-line method. Rates of depreciation of 20%, 25% and 33% per annum are used as appropriate.

## 8. Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds comprise accumulated surpluses and deficits on general funds. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the charity's general charitable objectives. Designated funds comprise monies set aside out of general funds and which are earmarked by the Trustees for specific purposes.
