



Instructions for Authors

Scope

The *Turkish Historical Review* (THR) is devoted to Turkish history in the widest sense, covering the period from the 6th century, with the rise of the Turks in Central Asia, until the mid-20th century. All contributions to the journal must display a substantial use of primary-source material and also be accessible to historians in general, i.e. those working outside the specific fields of Ottoman and Turkish history. Articles with a comparative scope which cross the traditional boundaries of the area studies paradigm are therefore very welcome. The editors also encourage younger scholars to submit contributions. The journal includes a reviews section, which, in addition to publications in English, French, and other western European languages, will specifically monitor new studies in Turkish and those coming out in the Balkans and Russia. The *Turkish Historical Review* has a double-blind peer review system.

File Format

Contributions should be submitted in either Microsoft Word or Word for Mac, using Unicode fonts. The use of non-Unicode fonts should be discussed with the editor beforehand.

Submission Requirements

Language

Manuscripts should be written in English or French. For English, the spelling (either British or American) should be consistent throughout.

Transliteration

Diacriticals will not be used in transliteration of Arabic or Persian. Ottoman Turkish should be rendered in modern Turkish orthography.

Length

Manuscripts should not normally exceed 10,000 words inclusive of footnotes.

Manuscript Structure

The text must be formatted with 1.5-inch margins and be double-spaced.

Abstract and Keywords

All full articles should include an abstract of max. 100 words, as well as 3-10 keywords.

Capitalization

Authors should be consistent in their use of capitalization. Overcapitalization should be avoided. The abbreviations 'vol.,' 'no.,' and 'pt.' are not normally capitalized.



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Headings

Headings should be flush left using sentence case:

This is a first level heading
