I would like to personally thank everyone who has contributed to this document. The statistical information was primarily drawn from the 2011 Census, unless otherwise stated. Other sources include:

- Kent and Medway Public Health Observatory³
- Kent County Council Research and Intelligence Team⁴

Some of the data within this profiler was specially commissioned by Shepway District Council so it may not be publically available elsewhere in the displayed format. The data will evolve and expand as government agencies recalibrate their data publishing to the new ward boundaries within Shepway.

Cheriton

'Urban area with village feel' 5

The new Cheriton Ward is made up of the two former wards of Cheriton and Morehall. The map on the opposite page⁶ shows the new Cheriton Ward boundary.

The name Cheriton derives from the Old English words 'Cirice tun' meaning church farmstead ⁷. Although some may argue that its name was Cherry Town after the number of Cherry Orchards once present in Cheriton.

The location of Cheriton in the North Downs has been of strategic importance since ancient times. The Normans built Folkestone Castle on a spur of Cheriton Hill. The Church of St. Martin dates back to Saxon times.⁸

The historical area of Cheriton, which included the Shorncliffe area to the north of the Cheriton Road, was originally a civil parish in its own right, and part of Elham Rural District from 1894 to 1898, when it became a separate urban district. The area continued to grow with the large army barracks being nearby and it gradually became indistinguishable from Folkestone. The parish was abolished in 1934 under a County Review Order, and divided between Folkestone and Hythe.


Although historically Cheriton was a far larger area taking in parts of the area which is now referred to as Hythe, Sandgate and Folkestone West, the area is still popularly known as Cheriton today despite being part of the governance arrangements of Folkestone Town Council and Shepway District Council.⁹ Cheriton is a northern suburb of Folkestone in Kent. North Cheriton is home to the Eurotunnel Channel Tunnelⁱ terminal, which provides


regular services to continental Europe. The Channel Tunnel is one of the biggest engineering projects ever undertaken in the UK; the tunnel has been named one of the seven wonders of the modern world. Folkestone West (FWK) is one of the two railway stations in Folkestone in Kent, managed by Southeastern. The Venice Simplon Orient Express service uses the new facility at Folkestone West station.

Cheriton is the location of the major army barracks of Shorncliffe Camp: the 2nd Battalion the Royal Gurkha Riflesⁱⁱⁱ occupy Shorncliffe Camp. Cheriton is home to one of the main local area landmarks, the Folkestone White Horse, which is carved into Cheriton Hill.

Cheriton High Street has many small local businesses, charity shops, takeaways, betting shop and local retailers. Cheriton has enviable transport links with the M20 motorway being accessible via Junction 12, facilitating connection to the national motorway network, the major airports and greater London.


Major contributors to the Cheriton community are Cheriton Baptist Church¹², The Community Network¹³, Age UK Folkestone¹⁴, Cheriton Library¹⁵ and Caterpillars Children Centre¹⁶.





Demographics

The 2013 midyear population estimates published by the Office of National Statistics gives the total population of Cheriton as 12,640, with 6,120 males and 6,520 females.




Marital status and living arrangements

Nearly half of Cheriton residents aged over 16 are married (47.9%). With 23.4% of residents indicating they are single and have never married. 11.1% are heterosexual cohabiting unmarried couples.

Cheriton has 52 cohabiting same sex relationship/civil partnerships; 691 divorcees and 647 widowers.

Cheriton is in line with Kent and Shepway for each category of marital status and living arrangements as a proportion of people aged over sixteen:



Ethnicity

Cheriton varies significantly from Kent or Shepway for the proportion of people classified as 'other Asian' in the 2011 Census. This increased level is likely to be the Nepalese population that resides in within Cheriton due to their links with the Royal Gurkha Riflesⁱⁱⁱ who are stationed at the nearby Shorncliffe garrison. The Nepalese population in Cheriton is over 1,500.

Cheriton has lower levels of 'other white' than found across Kent and Shepway. This is likely to be people from Europe (see section 4.f).

The lower proportions of European languages spoken indicates that the lower levels of 'other white' described in section 5, are likely to be people with European heritage.

The Local Economy

The main retail section of Cheriton High Street has a linear parade of shops covering a distance of approximately 800 meters. Cheriton High Street offers a large range of specialist independent retailers¹⁷, and has the usual selection of banks, post office and minimarts. Cheriton is also home to a large number of charity shops, small local businesses, bookmakers and numerous cafes. Many of the small retailers regularly support local charitable causes.

The local economy of Cheriton also includes, the motor trade from hand car washing to large national motor suppliers.

Cheriton is often quoted as the 'takeaway capital of Folkestone' as it houses many eatery establishments. The local Nepalese community have added to Cheriton's economy through establishing, Nepali restaurants, Cash and Carry shops, driving schools, travel agents, hairdressers and boutiques.

Cheriton has a number of industrial areas to the North of Cheriton: with Shearway Business Park and Cheriton Parc. Businesses within the industrial areas of Cheriton include: Affinity Water Ltdiv, Sagav, Bannatyne Health Club Folkestonevi, Crosskeys Coachesvii and Buckingham Coversviii.

Shearway Business Park is a 25 acre business park located adjacent to Junction 13 of the M20 and the Channel Tunnel Terminal. The business park has been mostly developed with a variety of business uses including offices, warehouses/industrial and National Fitness Centre operator.¹⁸

Shearway Business Park is home to Basepoint Business Centre (Folkestone Enterprise Centre) Basepoint has 66 units, set around a landscaped courtyard car park, this managed office accommodation in Folkestone ranges from small units for one to two people, through to larger units for more established businesses.

There are spacious fully functioning workshops along with a whole range of units in between. Managed office facilities available at the site include free parking, high speed internet access, on-site cafe/restaurant and serviced meeting rooms.¹⁹

Biggins Wood Industrial Estate has ample car parking and a variety of containers to let, suitable for storage or industrial use.²⁰ The Glenmore Centre (also within the industrial North East of Cheriton), provides 24 units offering a mixture of business space which can be occupied as light industrial, warehouse or office units.²¹

Notable large businesses in Cheriton also include Eurotunnel, Tesco^{ix} and recent newcomer The Range^x. Tesco, works direct with the local community via its Community Champion^{xi} staff role. The Community Champion role at each supermarket; helps support local community causes by offering donations and staging fundraising events.

The construction of the Channel Tunnel provided employment, as well as bringing many people to the area, and on completion the running of service still provides work for many.²²

Transport Links

Bus Services: operated by Stagecoach (updated 21st March 2015): There are bus stops along Cheriton High Street, and a number of buses serve the Cheriton area.²³

Trains services: Folkestone West (FKW) is one of only two train stations in Folkestone, and is operated by South Eastern Railway.²⁴


Motorway: M20 motorway is accessible to the north of Cheriton ward via Junction 12.

Eurotunnel: the Channel Tunnel is located within the Cheriton ward. Eurotunnel is a 50.5-kilometre (31.4 mi) rail tunnel linking Folkestone, Kent, in the United Kingdom, with Coquelles, Pas-de-Calais, near Calais in northern France, beneath the English Channel at the Strait of Dover. The Tunnel carries high-speed Eurostar passenger trains, the Eurotunnel Shuttle for road vehicles – the largest such transport in the world and international freight trains.²⁵

Household earnings

The Acorn Profiler data shows that a greater proportion Cheriton households earn under $\pounds 60,000$ than the UK; and Cheriton is significantly underrepresented for households earning over $\pounds 80,000$.


The graph is from the Acorn customer profiling software and it shows how far above the UK average the Cheriton population is (a score of 50, means the proportion within Cheriton is 50% the size of the UK average).



Economic activity

The 2011 census captured economic activity, and it shows Cheriton has a higher proportion (compared to Shepway and Kent) of people working part time and it has lower levels of self employed and retired people. The area is marginally above for the levels of students, and those looking after their family.

The graph below shows activity as a proportion of the working age population (this is defined as the number of people aged 16-64)



Cheriton is underrepresented for employees operating in 'Professional, scientific and technical activities' or in manufacturing. However it is above Shepway and Kent for the proportion of people working in 'Transport and storage' 'Administrative and support service activities' and 'Public administration and defence'. This reflects the major employees within and around Cheriton i.e. Eurotunnel, Shorncliffe Barracks and Saga.

Education & Skills

Primary Schools

Cheriton has 5 primary schools offering a number of school places. Primary schools located in Cheriton are St. Martins Church of England, Cheriton Primary, Morehall Primary, All Souls Church of England and Harcourt School. Many of the Primary schools also offer crèche/nursery facilities, notably Morehall and St. Martins.

Secondary Schools

Pent Valley provides secondary level education, which attracts pupils from Folkestone, Hawkinge and Hythe. Pent Valley is the only specialist Technology College and Sports Academy in the area. Pent Valley prides itself on being a fully inclusive community which caters for students of all abilities and in which the contribution of all students is valued. The school is organised into three colleges; two for students in years 7 to 11 - Benz/Sharman & Edison/Franklin, and one for post 16 - Dyson. Pent Valley also has an exclusion zone building, for Year 9 - 10 troubled youth excluded from school. Pent Valley as a Technology College has a unique collaboration with East Kent College to deliver technical vocational education courses covering Science, Technology and Engineering. Pent Valley also offers Work Related Learning in Motor Vehicle, Engineering, Construction, Child Care, and Hair & Beauty.²⁶

Catch 22, (a social business providing services that help people in tough situations to turn their lives around), has a Folkestone Study Programme delivered at Pent Valley School. The programme is fully funded by the Department for Education initiative providing an individual learning and training experience while enhancing employability skills for 16 to 18-years-old. ²⁷

Pent Valley's Community Involvement includes: Cookery lessons, Sugar craft classes, Christmas fair, Language School, and a base for church and Sunday school.



Health & Wellbeing

Sports clubs/societies/activities

Cheriton sports and leisure facilities include 5 play areas, 2 recreation fields, and 5 football fields, tennis courts, bowling and a cricket ground.

Cheriton Bowls Clubxiii is located in Weymouth Rd.

Westbourne Cricket Club^{xiv} is located in Cherry Garden Avenue.

Folkestone Aikido^{xv} a non-profit Japanese martial art club is based in Cheriton. With junior and adult classes run from All Souls' School.

Pent Valley Leisure Centre, Bannatyne and Dynamix Leisure, all have gyms and offer a range of sports classes for the residents of Cheriton and Shepway. Cheriton is very close geographically to the Three Hills Sports Club and Folkestone Sports Centre, both located in the neighbouring ward of Broadmead.

Pent Valley Leisure Centre

Pent Valley Leisure Centre commonly known as PVLC is part of Pent Valley Technology College. PVLC opened in 2005 and was designed to provide accessible sporting opportunities to the children of Pent Valley Technology College and the local community with a focus on disability sport. In 2009 Pent Valley Leisure Centre was also awarded the Fitness Industry Association (FIA) Flame Award 2009 in the category of Educational Club of the year.

Pent Valley Leisure Centre was also selected as a pre-games training camp for the London 2012 Paralympics, offering use of facilities to paralympians training in Wheelchair Basketball, Sitting Volleyball, Boccia, Wheelchair Rugby and Wheelchair Fencing.²⁸

Pent Valley Leisure facilities include: an accessible to all fitness suite, sports hall (four courts), and dance studio. The facilities are used for 5-a-side football,

basketball, badminton, cricket, trampolining, new age curling, boccia, martial arts clubs and exercise classes. PVLC runs Valley Active; OFSTED registered holiday activities for children aged 5-14. Valley Active runs every school holiday. PVLC runs Valley Friday Fun Club; a multi-sports club for children with a disability aged 5-16 years. PVLC has an on-site bistro and offers children's birthday parties.²⁹

Bannatyne's Folkestone

Bannatyne's Folkestone is an exclusive member's only club. Situated in the Shearway Business Park, it offers solutions to individual fitness needs, from rigorous workouts to gentle exercise.

Bannatyne's offers a range of classes including: Abs Attack, Aqua, Spin, Pilates, Step, Yoga and Young at Heart. It's facilities include a 20m heated swimming pool, resistance and cardiovascular machines, spinning studio, free weights area, sauna, steam room, cafe bar, sunbeds, aerobics studios, spa pool, retail shop and functional training zone. Its services also include fitness assessments, personal training sessions, swimming lessons and nutritional advice.³⁰

Dynamix Leisure Gym

Dynamix Leisure Gym is a family run gym, located in Firs Lane. Dynamix Leisure allows none gym members to attend all fitness classes. Dynamix Leisure gym offers multiple activities for all levels to keep fit and get in shape. The gym is equipped with a large range of ISO Machines, resistance machines, separate newly built free weights room and also a fully equipped cardiovascular suite.

Dynamix Leisure facilities include a shop, studio, championship squash court, public bar and function rooms for hire. Services offered include personal trainers, physio therapists and gym instruction. Dynamix offers classes such as Zumba, Muay Thai Boxing, Spin, Body Workout, Yoga and Pilates.³¹

Youth

Cheriton Youth, in 2008 requested better youth provision, the 'What4', youth and community engagement project was set up to work with the young people of Cheriton in partnership with SDC and Folkestone Town Council^{xvi}. The resulting Cheriton Young Persons Working Group looked at regeneration of parks and leisure space in Cheriton. Young people were surveyed to consult and assess youth play facilities at Cheriton Recreation Ground³², the findings highlighted the need for skate and bmx facilities. Cheriton Recreation Ground, in recent years has had new play equipment and street lighting. Future plans, include a skatepark.

Some of Cheriton's youth provision is provided by Cheriton Baptist Church³³ they offer after school club, youth drop-ins and a school holiday club.

One night a week Kent County Council^{xviii} runs a mobile youth club from a van in Stanley Road. Other community youth work has focused on sports for example football coaching at Cheriton Recreation Ground. Pent Valley Leisure Centre offers youth sports activities. Youth sports provision can be found in the neighbouring ward of Broadmead home to Three Hills Sports Park^{xviii} and Folkestone Sports Centre^{xix}.

Cheriton has the usual providers: The Scout Association – 1st Cheriton Scouts group^{xx} is based in Hawkins Road, also St. George's Scout Group is based close to Gordon Road. The two Scout groups have Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorer Scout sections. The Army Cadets^{xxi} have their own meeting hall, located on Church Road. The Brownie and Guide packs 1st and 2nd Cheriton^{xxiii} meet at St. Andrews Church hall in Cheriton. St. John's Ambulance^{xxiii} runs a Badgers Youth Group from its hall in Broomfield Crescent.

Theatrical youth pursuits are offered by Folkestone Hythe Operatic and Dramatic Society³⁵ in the next ward of Sandgate and West Folkestone. Strange Cargo³⁶, have run many community art projects, offering art workshops to youth.

Kidz Planet^{xxiv} a commercial organisation runs a large indoor play facility that attracts families from across Shepway. The facility located in Cheriton caters for ages from and exclusively for large private events. Previous hirers have included disabled youth groups.

Organisations delivering health services

Cheriton has one GP practice The White House^{xxv} located in the High Street. Cheriton also has a community health clinic the Baker Road Clinic^{xxvi}.

There are three pharmacies in Cheriton: Tesco's Pharmacy^{xxvii}, Paydens and Taylors (both owned by Paydens Pharmacy^{xxviii}) It should be noted that Paydens and Cheriton Post Office³⁷ share the same building, this makes Paydens a very popular pharmacy with users of the Post Office.

Cheriton dentist and optical health provision is provided by Cheriton Dental Surgery^{xxix} and David Snow Opticians^{xxx}. FootHouse^{xxxi} offers foot care services and is a Podiatry and Biomechanics clinic in Cheriton.

Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services CAMHS**** are located at Cherry Tree House, Cheriton High Street. CAMHS delivers psychological and psychiatric services for children and young people up to 18 years of age who present problems in mental or emotional health.

United Response^{38 xxxiii}, Provides 24 hour support to adult clients with learning disability and mental health, either in the community, or needs residential care on or in the local community.

Safe Hand Mobility Centres Ltd^{xxxiv} located in Cheriton High Street, offers the largest range of mobility and rehabilitation aids in the South East. Also offers a home visit service.

Caterpillars Children Centre³⁹, Chart Road, Folkestone Kent, offers Health Services: Well Baby Clinic, Antenatal Clinic, Development Checks, Midwife, and Health Visitors.

Complementary Medicine is provided in Cheriton by The Clinic of Complementary Medicine^{xxxv}, whilst Joy Lane Clinic^{xxxvi} located at Dynamix Leisure⁴⁰, Firs Lane, caters for Osteopathy, Physiotherapy & Sports Injury.


Cheriton Young Persons' Clinic, located in Pent Valley School⁴¹, is a confidential drop in clinic every Tuesday afternoon, term time only. The clinic is for young people in Cheriton including those under 16 years old. The clinic is run by a qualified sexual health nurse.

Peoples health:

The 2011 Census required people to give a self assessment on how they feel about their health. Only 5.1% of Cheriton residents indicated that they feel in bad or very bad health. Generally, the proportion of people within each criterion is similar to Shepway and Kent.

10.6% (1347) residents are providing some level of unpaid care within Cheriton, of these:


- 762 provide under twenty hours a week







In 2011 there were 5112 households in Cheriton with 4,951 of them occupied:



Almost half the residential properties in Cheriton are classified as terraced housing this is considerably above the Shepway or county figure:

The lower levels of bungalows and detached housing reflect the urbanised and dense nature of the built environment in Cheriton.

Many of the terraced properties in Cheriton often have three floors (typically they are more like town houses than 'two up and two down'), this is reflected in the Acorn profile of Cheriton which shows it is above the UK average for the proportion of homes with 3-4 bedrooms:




Housing ownership


Approximately one-third of Cheriton residents are in rented accommodation, with nearly two-thirds owner occupiers of their property. A small number of people are in shared ownership or are living rent free.

Cheriton has a slightly lower proportion than Shepway or Kent of the total number of residential properties of households that are owned outright.



The majority of renters are in the private market, and Cheriton has a higher proportion of people living in a local authority home.



The graph below is from the Acorn customer profiling software and it shows that Cheriton is over represented (compared to the UK) for owner occupiers but underrepresented for renters.


Housing values:

The graph below from the Acorn customer profiling software shows that Cheriton has a larger proportion of properties with a value under £250,000 than the UK and a smaller proportion for properties over £500,000.

76.6% of homes in Cheriton are within council tax band B and C. This equates to 3,844 properties (typically Band A is for the smallest properties and Band H are the largest):

Cheriton has a higher proportion of band B and band C homes than Shepway or Kent. However, the proportion of band E and F homes is much lower.



Neighbourhood/Community

Resident Associations

Cheriton Matters is a website 'where Cheriton comes first' with the tag line 'if it's Cheriton it matters', the website is a platform for what is taking place in Cheriton, the site has heading focusing on play areas, planning, bins, road names and more. The website has an online community opinion questionnaire. 43

South Cheriton Action Group^{xxxvii} is a community group, set up by residents in the immediate vicinity of the proposed Shorncliffe development. The group has a facebook page and a page on Cheriton Matters.

Community Warden^{xxxviii} in Cheriton works closely with the community, offering support and advice. Cheriton ward has two Police Community Support Officer's (PCSO's) covering the Cheriton and Morehall area.⁴⁴

Chilham Road Association is a residents group that has been involved in monitoring anti-social behaviour and parking permits.

Key Groups

Cheriton has many community organisations committed to helping the people of Cheriton. Many activities and clubs are run from Places of Worship including coffee morning, to sports and social clubs; please see under Places of Worship, website details.

Age UK Folkestone***

Age UK Folkestone, has been supporting older people in the area for over 50 years. They offer a wide range of activities and services to support older people, from chair-based exercise, managing finances, social care advice to meals at home. Age UK Folkestone has worked on many community projects, including working with local schools and Strange Cargo.

Cheriton Baptist Churchxi

Cheriton Baptist Church offers a variety of community service: from toddler mornings, to Nepali Church services. Cheriton Baptist Church is committed to providing youth services. ⁴⁵ Cheriton Baptist Church works in partnership with local community organisation and works very closely with SDC on anti- social behaviour initiatives, such as Urban Pastors, a service assisting people in need on the Folkestone streets.

The Community Networkxii

Run by United Response located in Cheriton High Street, offers a variety of activities that help support people, build confidence and reduce social isolation. Activities offered include music, IT, drama, dance and singing. Plus a drop in group for various ages and abilities. The Community Network works closely with other community organisations, for example its recent Pantomime was held at the Cheriton Baptist Church hall.

Folkestone Nepalese Communityxiii

Established in 2005, this is a community group that offers support, advice and celebrates the Nepalese people and their culture. The Nepalese community in Cheriton meet at various groups, for example, the Nepalese Veterans meet at Cheriton Library⁴⁶ on a Monday, Tuesday and Wednesdays. The Nepalese Community hold cultural events to engage with the local community. At present some cultural events are being run outside of Cheriton at Hawkinge Community Centre.

The Schools of Cheriton have engaged with the Cheriton community, by donating Christmas Trees.

Planning & Development:

Major development site: Shorncliffe Garrison Redevelopment

Residential developers Taylor Wimpey have prepared proposals for the redevelopment of MOD Shorncliffe Garrison site in Cheriton, Folkestone. The proposed development site covers a total area of approximately 77 hectares and is largely located to the south of Cheriton Church Road; with a small section of land (St Martin's Plain) situated to the west of Church Road and Horn Street. It is proposed that Shorncliffe Garrison land will be released for development in four phases over the next 20 year.

The site is allocated in the Shepway Local Plan 2013 (Policy SS7) which establishes the principle of redeveloping the site for residential, recreation, education and community uses as part of the MOD's Shorncliffe Rationalisation Project.⁴⁷

The proposed development includes:

- 1200 houses
- 50% proposed will be 3 -bedroom properties or larger
- 30% being affordable housing
- New Primary school
- New GP Surgery
- New Cadet/community changing facilities
- Open space to be improved conservation area
- Play facilities
- Improved traffic control
- Increased bus service

Broadband

Physical Assets

Designated Space (SSSI, AONB etc)

The Kent Downs, Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) covers 878 sq. km from the White Cliffs at Dover and Folkestone to the Surrey Border⁵¹. A part of the Kent Downs run along the north of the Cheriton ward: Danton Lane, part of Eurotunnel's Terminal Service Ring Road and Crete Road West are within the Kent Downs AONB.

The Folkestone White Horse⁵² overlooks Cheriton from the Downs north of the Channel Tunnel

terminal. The earthworks of Folkestone Castle⁵³ are just to the east⁵⁴.

The North Downs are a ridge of chalk hills in south east England that stretch from Farnham in Surrey to the Whites Cliffs of Dover in Kent⁵⁵. The top of the Cheriton ward is classed as a site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), designated for biological and geological interest, the area is part of the SSSI Folkestone to Etchinghill Escarpment site.⁵⁶

Play Areas and parks

Cheriton has many areas of physical space housing, play areas, football pitches, tennis courts and a cricket ground. It has two large recreational grounds Cheriton and Morehall. Cheriton has a large number of play areas to cater for young children.

Roman Way Park. Suitable for children aged 4-10 years old. There is a small play unit with a fireman's pole and slide, and there are swings and a rocker. There is also a small football goal. This park is in the far West of Cheriton, near the superstore Tesco (Junction 12 off of the M20).

Naseby Avenue Park. Suitable for children aged 3-5 years and 4-12 years. Naseby Avenue has a park with a small play unit for children aged 3-5 years and a large play unit for children aged 4-12 years. There is bench seating, and as always; a safety surface. The park can be found in the open space in the middle of Naseby Avenue, on the south side.

Firs Lane Park. Suitable for children between six and 12 years old. Firs Lane Play Area has a play unit including a slide and a climbing wall. There are also two swings, spinning stools and bench seating. Harcourt Primary School worked hard to raise the funds for the equipment at this park and the children choose the design of the equipment.

Pine Way Park. Suitable for children of ages 4-10 years old. A small infants' park in North Cheriton. There are cradle seat swings, flat seat swings and an infants' slide. The park is located on the south side, in the open space between Pine Way and Biggins Wood Road (near Harcourt Primary School).

Cheriton Recreational Ground. Suitable for children between two and 15 years old. This is a large play area with lots of facilities ranging from a 5-a-side football pitch to balancing beams and swings. There is also a basketball hoop and a kick-around, 5- a-side hard area. The site comprises of an open grassed public recreation field on three levels with children's play equipment and a hard court area on the lower level (east) and a dog exercise area and two informal football pitches on the middle level. The park has had recent new lighting and trees. There is a Nepalese-themed wood sculpture developed with All Souls Primary School and Pent Valley Technology College and an Everest-style climbing challenge. The park is in Stanley Road.

Morehall Recreational Ground. Suitable for older children aged 6 years+. This is a large, green recreation ground it's facilities include swings, a play unit with a slide, balancing beam, stepping stones large open field area, football pitch, Basketball

hoop and a dog walking area. The park is located in Cheriton, in the open space between Cherry Garden Lane and Cherry Garden Avenue.

Allotments

Cheriton has 3 allotment areas, allowing local residents the chance to grow their own fruit and vegetables. The Allotments are managed by Folkestone Town Council and are located in Tile Kiln Lane, Exeter Close and Church Road.

Public Toilets

Cheriton has one public convenience located in Somerset Road, with disabled facilities.⁵⁷

Walking routes/bridal paths

There are 525 miles (840 km) of public rightsof-way in Shepway and Dover. The White Cliffs Countryside Partnership (WCCP) has done a lot to encourage walking and improve walking facilities.⁵⁸

North part of Cheriton Ward is part of the Folkestone Downs which has spectacular views across the town of Folkestone. It is possible to walk through Folkestone Downs area. The North Downs Way national trail passes through the area and cyclists can enjoy the Folkestone Downs on National Cycle Route No. 2 that leads from Dover through Folkestone and on to the West Country.⁵⁹

Buildings/heritage assets

Community and Village Halls: Cheriton has many community and village halls across the ward. Many of the halls are attached to churches, or are specific types of halls, for example the Red Cross Hall, Army Cadet Hall and Salvation Army hall. Some of Cheriton community space includes the potential use of Strange Cargo's premises. Community space is also available for hire in some schools and leisure facilities across the area.

Folkestone West Railway Station: is one of two open railway stations in Folkestone, Kent. This station is operated by Southeastern.⁶⁰

Cheriton Library Cheriton library is a hub for many community groups covering all ages. For example, groups who meet there include: Baby Rhyme time for pre-school children, to the more mature participants of Talk Time and the Nepali elder groups. It has been a focal point of many community projects. For example, a community artwork rug produced by the residents of Cheriton resides in the library, led by Strange Cargo.

Post Office Cheriton: Located at 38 – 40 Cheriton High Street, is very much a hub of Cheriton as it is the main post office and also shares its building with pharmacy Paydens. It is often frequented by the retired of Cheriton.

Longport Police Station, Eurotunnel Terminal: A port/border police station, headquarters for CTPU (Channel Tunnel Police Unit.) Located in the neighbouring ward of North Downs East, Longport is the local office for Special Branch and Armed Response Unit.

St. Martin's Church: St Martin's church is over a thousand years old, and is a Grade I listed building. This building is the oldest church in Folkestone and the parish church of Cheriton. The original building (consisting of the nave and tower) was built prior to 900AD. The church has an original Saxon doorway into the tower and a Saxon window above.

Folkestone Castle: Stood on a spur of the North Downs to the north of Folkestone. Known locally as "Caesar's Camp", it is not actually Roman at all, but was probably constructed as early as 1095 and was certainly occupied for some time following the Norman invasion. The hill on which it stands is known as Castle Hill and it affords splendid views over the town and coast. The fort earthwork remains of Folkestone Castle overlook the end of the M20 motorway and the entrance to the Channel Tunnel at Cheriton. 61

Places of Worship

The places of worship in Cheriton are Christian, including a number of faith groups: Catholic, Protestant and Methodist religions. The places of worship offer a variety of services from Coffee Mornings at St. Andrews Church to Toddler groups at Cheriton Baptist Church.

Two of the churches: St. Martins and All Souls are part of Cheriton Churches a four parish 'benefice.' The several churches of Cheriton are part of Churches Together Folkestone⁶³, who work together to assist the community. There is a regular church meeting held by the Pentecostal Church at Broomfield Road. Cheriton has a large Hindu population; religious provision is in the neighbouring Sandgate & West Folkestone ward.

There are a lower proportion of Cheriton residents who indicated in the 2011 Census that they are of Christian faith:

Arts & Culture

Groups

Folkestone & Hythe Operatic & Dramatic Societies

Is an amateur theatre group, just over the border of Cheriton Ward, located in Sandgate and West Folkestone ward. It is a charitable organisation, producing and performing several different shows a year at its own venue, the Tower Theatre located in North Road, Shorncliffe in neighbouring ward. The society also has a youth section, which puts on three performances a year at the Tower Theatre: the Brigadier Thomas Memorial Competition, a summer show and a Christmas revue.

Strange Cargo

Cheriton is home to Strange Cargo, the arts group that creates public and visual arts projects, celebratory events and arts programmes with the Folkestone community. Strange Cargo community projects include Cheriton Lights festival, working closely with the Cheriton residents.

Strange Cargo also organises and runs Charivari Day, a summer outdoor carnival event. The annual procession features live bands and colourful costumes and displays, designed and built by local artists and hundreds of local school children who also take part in the procession.⁶⁴

Events and venues

The 2nd Battalion the Royal Gurkha Rifles Open Day 24 April 2015, celebrating 200 years of Service to the Crown.

Cheriton Lights (biennial event last held 2014), a festival illuminating the streets of Cheriton: the High Street and some residential streets of Cheriton run by Strange Cargo working with the Cheriton community.

Tourist Attractions

The Folkestone White Horse: The landmark of the White Horse is located on the escarpment of Cheriton Hill, overlooking the Eurotunnel terminal. The White Horse on Cheriton Hill was constructed in 2003 to a design by local artist Charles Newington. The Symbol of the White Horse is the emblem for SDC.

Crime

Cheriton's Community Warden offers safety talks in the community across Cheriton, at coffee morning drop-ins, toddler groups to the more mature at Age UK. Age UK Folkestone offers community safety advice including home security and a trader's directory.
