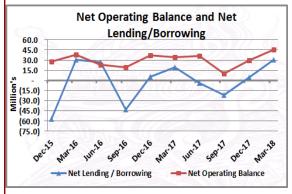

The Budgetary Central Government operations during March 2018 quarter recorded a surplus of \$45.6 million in the Net Operating Balance. This was attributed to excess revenue amounted to \$162.8 million with operating expenses at \$117.2 million. Contributing to the increase in revenue was grant received from the EU as budget support of around \$20.0 million and notable increase in other revenue, following a downward trend in the past 5 quarters.

The Net Lending (+)/Borrowing(-) Balance also recorded a surplus of \$30.3 million for the quarter under review. The favorable performance compared to the previous quarter is indicative of Governments commitment to contain operating expenditure, at \$132.5 million. The two balances for the last ten fiscal quarters is depicted in chart one below.

Chart 1: Net lending/borrowing (-) & Net Operating balance as % of GDP: December 2015 - March 2018



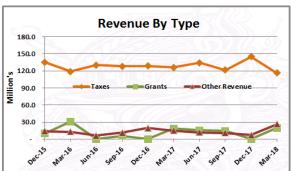
It is clearly depicted in the chart that net operating balance for the March 2018 quarter recorded the highest amount over the past 10 consecutive quarters, and has impacted a lot in pulling the net lending/borrowing balance to record a notable surplus of \$30.3 million for the period.

As a result, the Government resources with the banking system went up by \$24.8 million as at the end of March 2018.

REVENUE BY TYPE:

Total revenue for the quarter under review stood at \$162.8 million. Of the amount, Taxes contribute \$116.3 million, 71.5 percent of total revenue, Other Revenues contribute \$26.4 million which is equivalent to 16.2 percent of the amount, Grants contribute the least amount of \$20.0 million which is translated to 12.3 percent of total revenue. Total receipts increased by \$2.8 million (1.7 percent) on a yearly basis.

Chart 2: Revenue by type from December 2015 - March 2018

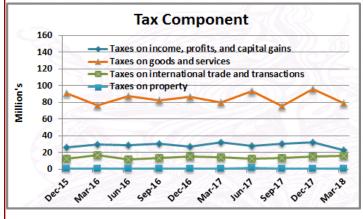


As shown in chart 2, both grants and Other revenue components were at their highest in March 2018 compared to the last nine quarters. For Other Revenue in particular, the trend went up by \$2.6 million on average with the March quarter of 2018 being the highest of all.

TAXES

Tax collection declined by 7.8 percent or \$9.8 million in the period under review compared to March 2017. Attributed to the decline in revenue were decreases recorded in Income tax and Excise Tax of \$9.2 million and \$3.1 million. Details are in Table 2 (attached). VAGST on the other hand recorded an increase of \$2.5 million for the period. Trends in the collection of the four major Tax components in the last ten quarters including March 2018 is shown in the chart 3 below.

GRANTS

Grants received in the period ending March 2018 amounted to \$20.0 million, \$1.4 million (7.7 percent) higher compared to March Quarter 2017 and \$19.5million over the previous quarter.

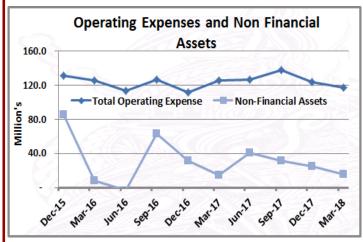
OTHER REVENUE

Significant increases were recorded in the March quarter compared to December 2017 and March 2017 quarters with increases of \$11.1 million and \$19.0 million respectively. The favorable result was primarily due to the increase in collection of Administrative fees amounting to \$13.5 million. This was translated into a \$9.9 million increase from December and \$3.9 million from March 2017.

EXPENDITURE

Total expenditure amounted to \$132.5 million, comprised of operating expenses with 88.6 percent (\$117.2 million) and \$15.3 million for the Acquisition of Non-Financial Assets. Total expenditure declined by \$16.1 million from December 2017 and \$8.4 million compared to the same period last year. As shown in the chart below, total spending on non financial assets started to decline at a trend growth rate of 26.9 percent from June 2017. This was consistent with the tailoring off and completion of some of the infrastructural projects in the period, namely the upgrade of the Faleolo international airport and the Samoa Submarine Cable.

Operating expenses during the quarter amounted to \$117.2 million, \$8.8 million (7.0 percent) lower than its comparable 2017 quarter. The notable drop in overall operating expenses was mainly fueled by the decrease in Grant expenses to other government units of \$18.1 million (14.4 percent) to stand at \$23.4 million in March 2018.

On the contrary, Compensation of Employees and Use of Goods and Services exceeds its previous year's levels by \$5.0 million and \$6.2 million. Details of operating expenses by the Central Government is given in the table below for ease of reference.

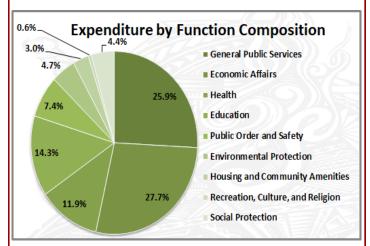

EXPENDITURE BY FUNCTION OF GOVERNMENT:

Illustrated in chart 5, Economic Affairs which include almost all sectors of the economy received the highest share of \$36.7 million, 7.4 percent higher than last year. Of these amount, the transport sector comprised 55.0 percent to Economic Affairs overall amount reflecting the completion of another phase of the new airport.

General Public Services had the second highest share of expenditure of 25.9 percent equivalent to \$34.3 million. Health and Education sectors received a combined total of \$34.7 million where 56.0 was spent on Education operations and 44.0 percent was accounted for the health sector. 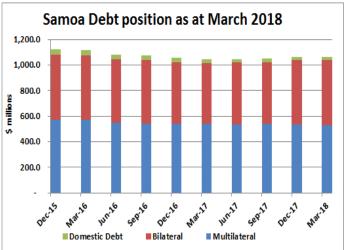
GOVERNMENT DEBT:

Government outstanding Debt as at end of March 2018 amounted to \$1.06 billion. External debt was at \$1.04 million with domestic loans at \$21.9 million.

Outstanding loans based on bilateral arrangements was \$511.8 million, exceeding previous quarter balance by \$6.8 million. Multilateral loans on the other hand stood at \$528.4 million which was \$3.8 million lower than the previous period. The chart below illustrates the composition of the three components in the last ten quarters. Details are provided in table 6 as attached.

Domestic Debt position amounted to \$21.9 million, reduced by \$2.5 million from the last quarter.

What are Government Finance Statistics?

Government Finance Statistics provide statistics that enable policymakers and analysts to study developments in the financial operations, financial position and liquidity situation of the government sector in a consistent and systematic manner. Balancing items have been created to provide summary information such as Net Operating Balance (NOB) and Net Lending (+) or Borrowing (-). The detailed data can also be used to examine specific areas of government operations, example: particular forms of taxation, level of expense and the amount of government borrowing etc. The harmonization of this system with other macroeconomic statistical systems like the System of National Accounts means that data from the GFS can be combined with data from NA to assess government performance in relation to the rest of the economy. Similarly, it can also be used for intercountry analysis of government operations, such as comparisons of ratios of taxes or expense to gross domestic product.

The Bureau is currently working on improving the Framework to extend the coverage to include the Government Public Bodies.

This is expected to be published before the end of the financial vear 2017/18.
