## MERCHANDISE TRADE

June 2017 quarter

## Highlights of the quarter

- Exports value rose 20.4 percent to $\$ 31.1$ million from the March 2017 quarter.
- Imports value rose 0.3 percent to $\$ 210.7$ million from the March 2017 quarter.
- Trade deficit valued at $\$ 179.5$ million


## Overview

## Value of Exports

In the June 2017 quarter, exports were valued at $\$ 31.1$ million following a 27.1 percent fall in the March 2017 quarter. The current increase was mainly driven by higher values of fish exports. In comparison with the same quarter of 2016 , the current value of exports decreased 11.3 percent.

The four quarters ending June 2017 showed a 6.5 percent fall in the total value of exports when compared with the four quarters ending June 2016. (See Table 1,2,3 and Graph 1).

## Top export commodities ${ }^{1}$

Fish exports maintained the top commodities exported in the quarter under review, valued at $\$ 10.7$ million, representing 34.3 percent of total exports value. This value was almost tripled its value in the previous quarter and 5.0 percent higher than the corresponding quarter of 2016. Petroleum oils ${ }^{2}$ exports followed with a total value of $\$ 8.3$ million, contributing 26.6 percent share of total exports value. This value was 12.6 percent and 6.5 percent higher than the previous quarter and the corresponding quarter of 2016 respectively.
Taro exports came third with its value increasing to $\$ 3.5$ million from $\$ 2.0$ million in the previous quarter, accounting for 11.3 percent of total exports value. In comparison with the June 2016 quarter, the current value of taro was three times higher.
Fruit juices exports had a total value of $\$ 1.5$ million, accounted for 4.8 percent of total exports value, increasing 16.4 percent from the previous quarter but 41.9 percent lower than the corresponding quarter of 2016; with nonu juice the main driver for the current increase.
Beer exports recorded a total value of $\$ 1.1$ million, accounted for 3.5 percent of total exports value. This value was 18.4 percent and 56.1 percent higher than the previous quarter and the corresponding quarter of 2016 respectively. The current increase was mainly driven by higher values of exports to American Samoa.

[^1]Ignition wiring sets, other wiring sets for vehicles had a total value of $\$ 838$ thousand, representing 2.7 percent of total exports value. This value was 85.8 percent and 90.6 percent lower than the previous quarter and the corresponding quarter of 2016 respectively. Continuous shortfalls recorded from previous quarters as the exporter nears official close down this year.
Coconut oil exports valued at $\$ 711$ thousand, representing 2.3 percent of total exports value, decreasing 28.3 percent from the previous quarter and 35.2 percent from the same quarter last year.
Coconut had a total value of $\$ 658$ thousand, accounted for 2.1 percent of total exports value, increasing 56.4 percent from the previous quarter.
Exports of tobacco and crisp savoury food products were decreased, valued at $\$ 99$ thousand ( 0.3 percent of total exports value) and $\$ 43$ thousand ( 0.1 percent of total exports value) respectively while exports of other commodities valued at $\$ 3.7$ million, representing 11.9 percent of total exports value. ## Country of Destination for Exports

In the June 2017 quarter, American Samoa became the largest export market with its value increasing to $\$ 9.1$ million from $\$ 3.4$ million in the previous quarter, representing 29.1 of the total exports value. In comparison with the corresponding quarter of 2016, the current value of exports to American Samoa increased 13.0 percent; with fish the main driver of the current rise.
Exports to New Zealand had a total value of $\$ 6.3$ million, accounting for 20.3 percent of total exports value, increasing 29.1 percent from the previous quarter and 47.0 percent from the same quarter last year; mainly driven by higher values of taro exports.
Exports to Australia were valued at $\$ 5.7$ million, accounting for 18.3 percent of total exports value, decreasing 41.7 percent from the previous quarter and 55.6 percent from June 2016 quarter; driven by lower values of ignition wiring sets, other wiring sets for vehicles exports.
Exports to Tokelau increased 66.1 percent (to $\$ 2.6$ million) from the previous quarter, accounting for 8.3 percent of total exports value. In comparison with same quarter of 2016 , the current value of exports to Tokelau was three times higher.
Exports to USA had a total value of $\$ 2.0$ million, accounting for 6.4 percent of total exports value, decreasing 6.3 percent and 14.7 percent from the previous quarter and the same quarter last year respectively.
Exports to Taiwan were valued at $\$ 1.4$ million, contributing 4.5 percent of total exports value, increasing 24.8 percent from the previous quarter but 20.1 percent lower than the corresponding quarter of 2016.
Exports to Japan and Singapore were increased from the previous quarter, accounting for 3.9 percent and 0.9 percent of total exports value respectively. While exports to Fiji and China were decreased, representing 3.8 percent and 0.4 percent of total exports value respectively. Other countries of destination for exports
represented 4.0 percent of total exports value. (See Table 4 and Graph 3).

## Value of Imports

In the June 2017 quarter, imports were valued at $\$ 210.7$ million. This value increased slightly ( 0.3 percent) from the previous quarter but 7.2 percent lower than corresponding quarter of 2016. (See Table 1 and Graph 4).

The four quarters ending June 2017 showed decrease of 2.9 percent in the total of imports compared with the four quarters ending June 2016.

## Composition of Imports

In the June 2017 quarter, mineral products maintained the largest share of all commodity groups imported with a total value of $\$ 39.8$
million, contributing 18.9 percent of total imports value. This value was 2.3 percent and 3.5 percent higher than the previous quarter and the corresponding quarter of 2016 respectively. Imports of base metals \& articles thereof increased to $\$ 24.1$ million from $\$ 17.7$ million in the previous quarter, accounting for 11.4 percent of total imports value. In comparison with the June 2016 quarter, the current value of base metals \& articles thereof increased 32.6 percent.
Prepared foodstuffs, beverages, spirit \& tobacco imports recorded a total value of $\$ 23.3$ million, representing 11.1 percent of total imports value, decreasing 4.3 percent and 1.5 percent from the previous quarter and the same quarter last year respectively.
Live animals, animals products imports were valued at $\$ 21.2$ million, representing 10.1 percent of total imports value, decreasing 12.5 percent and 23.3 percent from the previous quarter and the same quarter last year respectively.
Machinery \& mechanical \& electrical appliances \& parts thereof products had a total value of $\$ 20.3$ million, accounting for 9.6 percent of total imports value, decreasing 27.1 percent and 31.7 percent from the previous quarter and corresponding quarter of 2016 respectively.
Chemicals and allied products imports valued $\$ 14.0$ million, contributing 6.7 percent of total imports value, increasing 11.4 percent from the previous quarter but 2.0 percent lower than the corresponding quarter of 2016.
Imports of wood pulp, paper \& paperboard \& articles thereof products had a total value of $\$ 11.7$ million, representing 5.5 percent of total imports value. This value was twice its value in the previous quarter and tripled its value in the same quarter of 2016.
Imports of vehicles, aircraft and associated transport equipment had a total value of \$11.0 million, accounting for 5.2 percent of total imports value, decreasing 31.4 percent and 32.0 percent from the previous quarter and the corresponding quarter of 2016 respectively while the remaining HS Sections accounted for
less than 5.0 percent each with a combined total of $\$ 45.2$ million, representing 21.5 percent of total imports. (See Table 5 and Graph 5).

## Imports by Broad Economic Categories

For the three main broad economic categories in the June 2017 quarter, capital goods were valued at $\$ 20.8$ million, accounting for 9.9 percent of total imports value, decreasing 13.1 percent from the previous quarter.
Intermediate goods were valued at $\$ 99.0$ million, accounting for 47.0 percent of total imports value, increasing 7.2 percent from the previous quarter.
Consumption goods were valued at $\$ 70.2$ million, accounting for 33.3 percent of total imports value, decreasing 0.7 percent from the previous quarter. (See Table 6 and Graph 6).

## Major Source Markets of Imports

New Zealand continued to be the leading source markets for imports in the June 2017 quarter, contributing 26.8 percent of total import value, increasing 0.2 percent from the previous quarter but 9.4 percent lower than the same quarter last year.
Imports from Singapore accounted for 17.5 percent of total imports value, decreasing 2.2 percent from the previous quarter but 0.4 percent higher that corresponding quarter of 2016.

Imports from Australia accounted for 12.0 percent of total imports value, increasing 27.7 percent and 1.4 percent from the previous quarter and the corresponding quarter of 2016 respectively.
Imports from USA accounted for 10.9 percent of total imports value, increasing 13.2 percent from the previous quarter but 7.7 percent lower than the same quarter last year.
Imports from Fiji and China accounted for 5.1 percent each of total imports value. Imports from Fiji decreased 10.4 percent and 38.8 percent from the previous quarter and the same corresponding quarter of 2016 respectively while imports from China decreased 50.3 percent and 50.5 percent from the previous quarter and the same quarter last year respectively.
All other countries of imports accounted for less than 5.0 percent each of total imports value with a combined total of 22.6 percent. (See Table 7 and Graph 7).

## Merchandise Trade Balance

In the June 2017 quarter, the value of imports ( $\$ 210.7$ million) exceeded that of exports ( $\$ 31.1$ million), resulting in a trade deficit of $\$ 179.5$ million. (See Table 1 and Graph 8).

## Technical Notes

The main source of imports and exports data comes from the administrative document, a completed customs form (Single Administrative data) required to be filled in by importers and exporters or customs agents when clearing merchandise inward and outward through the Ministry for Revenue (Custom Department)

## Definitions

June 2017 quarter: (April, May, June 2017)
Capital goods: are produced assets that are used repeatedly or continuously, for longer than one year, in industrial production processes. Examples are machinery, trucks, and aircraft.
cif: is the cost of goods, including insurance and freight to Samoa.

Consumption goods: are goods used (without further transformation in industrial production processes) by households, government, or non-profit institutions serving households.

Exports (domestic): are goods of domestic origin exported from Samoa to another country. Exports in this release are valued fob and are shown in Samoan tala.
fob: is free on board (the value of goods at Samoa ports before export).

Imports: are goods imported into Samoa. Imports in this release are valued at cif and are shown in Samoan tala.

Intermediate goods: are goods used up, or transformed in, industrial production processes.

Merchandise trade: covers exports or imports of goods that alter the nation's stock of material resources.

Provisional: statistics for the latest three months are provisional, to allow late data and amendments to be included.

Re-exports: are exports of foreign goods which were previously recorded as Samoa's imports.

Trade balance: is calculated by deducting imports (cif) from exports (fob). These two valuations are not entirely comparable, because the cif valuation includes insurance and freight to Samoa, while the fob valuation excludes insurance and freight from Samoa.

Trade deficit: occurs when the value of imports is more than the value of exports.

Trade surplus: occurs when the value of exports is more than the value of imports.
