

CHARLES'S ST. HELENA LIKELY TO BE FUNCHAL

Paris Diplomats Expect Portuguese Government to Assent to His Internment There.

PARIS, Nov. 5 (Associated Press).—It is now regarded as certain in allied circles here that Emperor Charles and his wife, Zita, will be exiled to Funchal, the chief city of the Island of Madeira.

Although the Allied Council of Ambassadors, which has the responsibility of selecting a place of exile, has not yet received final approval of this plan from the Portuguese Government, arrangements are being made at Funchal for the arrival of the royal pair. Moreover, the council has abandoned consideration of all other possible places. Members of the council, which met today, expressed the opinion that Madeira was the best point of exile, since it could be very easily guarded.

The council will hold another meeting next Wednesday, and by that time it is expected that the consent of the Portuguese Government will have been received.

BERNE, Nov. 5 (Associated Press).—The seven children of ex-Emperor Charles will probably be removed from Hartenstein to Waldegg Castle, near Rorschach, on Lake Constance, Archduchess Maria will probably accompany them.

Ex-Empress Zita's father, the Duke of Parma, purchased the castle fifty years ago, when he himself was a refugee in Switzerland. It now belongs to the sisters of the ex-Empress, who passed a great part of her youth there.

BUCHAREST, Nov. 5.—Plans made public here yesterday indicate that Charles and Zita are not to be interned at Gaiatz, on the Danube, northeast of this city, as has been reported. The former Emperor and Empress left Orsova, a town on the Danube near the Rumanian frontier, yesterday morning, being placed on board a special train which did not pass through Bucharest. They were due in Galatz last evening.

It was reported here today that the couple would embark at once on the British light cruiser Cardiff, which would be under the command of a British Vice Admiral. It appeared to be the intention to have the cruiser sail at once, as it was said she would be convoyed by four Rumanian launches.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 5.—The British cruiser Cardiff left the port of Constantinople Friday for the mouth of the Danube, where she will take on board ex-Emperor Charles and his wife, and proceed to Gibraltar.
