## **CONSENT ORDER**

- A: Under s279(1)(b) of the Resource Management Act 1991, ('RMA' or "the Act'), the Environment Court, by consent, <u>orders</u> that:
  - (1) the appeal is allowed to the extent that Dunedin City Council is to amend the provisions of the proposed Dunedin City Second Generation District Plan as set out in Appendix A, attached to and forming part of this order; and

- (2) the appeal otherwise remains extant.
- B: Under s285 of the Resource Management Act 1991, there is no order as to costs.

## **REASONS**

#### Introduction

- [1] This proceeding concerns the appeal by Royal Forest and Bird Protection Society of New Zealand Incorporated ('Royal Forest and Bird') on the provisions of the proposed Second Generation Dunedin City District Plan ('2GP') regarding policies that manage the effects of activities on biodiversity (DCC Reference numbers 264, 281, 282 and 286).<sup>1</sup>
- [2] The appeal sought to amend certain policies in the 2GP that manage the effects of activities on biodiversity. The policies are located in Chapter 10 of the 2GP and are organised into three topics:<sup>2</sup>
  - (a) Topic 1: Policies applying within significant areas of indigenous vegetation and habitats of indigenous fauna;
  - (b) Topic 2: Policies relating to vegetation clearance; and
  - (c) Topic 3: Policy relating to the effects of the subdivision on biodiversity values.
- [3] I have read and considered the consent memorandum of the parties dated 31 March 2023 which proposes to resolve parts of the appeal.
- [4] I have also read and considered the affidavit by J Macleod dated 21 April 2023, who has satisfied me that the amendments proposed will achieve

the objectives of the 2GP, and that granting the relief sought will not impact on the resolution of any other proceeding.<sup>3</sup>

[5] The parties advise that all matters proposed for the court's endorsement fall within the court's jurisdiction and conform to the relevant requirements and objectives of the RMA, including Part 2.

#### Other relevant matters

[6] Several parties had given notice of an intention to become parties under s274 of the Act. Aurora Energy Limited, Federated Farmers of New Zealand Incorporated, Oceana Gold (New Zealand) Limited, Otago Regional Council, the Director General of Conservation, Kãti Huirapa Ronaka Ki Puketeraki and Te ROnanga o Otãkou are the remaining active s274 parties to the appeal. The remaining s274 parties have signed the memorandum setting out the relief sought.

[7] In the course of settlement discussions the appellant had identified further changes it wished to have made to policies in Chapter 2 (on biodiversity offsets and compensation), although other parties had raised the issue of scope. The court has issued a decision on the scope issue (dated 4 May 2023). It has concluded that such changes were not foreseeable or consequential on the changes sought in the appeal in relation to policies in Chapter 10. Accordingly, this decision resolves the appellant's appeal in relation to the policies in Chapter 10.

# [8] The parties advise that:

- (a) the parties have agreed to the amendments set out in Appendix A; and
- (b) this is a partial settlement of the appeal from Forest and Bird. The remaining parts of the appeal (DCC Reference numbers 281 and 282) remain to be dealt with at a later date; and

- (c) the amendments have been drafted to be in keeping with the 2GP Style Guide, except that, in assessment rules, new policies 10.2.1.X and 10.2.1.Y have not been paraphrased in full due to their length; and
- (d) an Advice Note will be added to the Plan by Council, as a minor amendment under Clause 16 of Schedule 1 of the RMA, when the relevant mapping has been added to the Council website. This is anticipated to take place in April or May 2023.
- [9] No other person has given notice of an intention to become a party under s274 of the Act.
- [10] The parties advise that all matters proposed for the court's endorsement fall within the court's jurisdiction and conform to the relevant requirements and objectives of the Act including, in particular, Part 2.

#### Outcome

[11] All parties to the proceeding have executed the memorandum requesting the orders. On the information provided to the court, I am satisfied that the orders will promote the purpose of the Act so I will make the orders sought.

## Appendix 1

1 Delete Policies 10.2.1.2, 10.2.1.3 and 10.2.1.4:

#### Policy 10.2.1.2

Avoid adverse effects on areas of significant indigenous vegetation and significant habitats of indigenous fauna or, if avoidance is not practicable, ensure that:

- a. there is no net loss and preferably a net gain in the biodiversity values of the area; or
- b. where there are no practicable alternative locations, any proposal for a biodiversity offset is in accordance with Policy 2.2.3.6; or
- c. where a biodiversity offset is not practicable, environmental compensation is proposed in accordance with Policy 2.2.3.7.

#### Policy 10.2.1.3

Avoid rural activities (except for rural ancillary retail, rural tourism and rural research), residential activities (except for working from home), early childhood education, commercial activities (except for restaurants or retail activities ancillary to sport and recreation, and stand-alone car parking), industrial activities, major facility activities and indigenous vegetation clearance — large scale in Areas of Significant Biodiversity Value (ASBVs) unless:

- a. there is no net loss and preferably a net gain in the biodiversity values of the ASBV including, but not limited to, those biodiversity values listed in Appendix A1.2; or
- b. where there are no practicable alternative locations, any proposal for a biodiversity offset is in accordance with Policy 2.2.3.6; or
- c. where a biodiversity offset is not practicable, environmental compensation is proposed in accordance with Policy 2.2.3.7.

## Policy 10.2.1.4

Only allow rural tourism—large scale, rural research—large scale, community and leisure—large scale, sport and recreation, restaurants and retail activities ancillary to sport and recreation, large buildings and structures, earthworks—large scale, shelterbelts and small woodlots, site development activities (except for outdoor storage, parking, loading and access, vegetation clearance, storage and use of hazardous substances), public amenities, network utility activities, transportation activities and natural hazard mitigation activities in Areas of Significant Biodiversity Value (ASBVs) where there is no net loss and preferably a net gain in the biodiversity values of the ASBV including, but not limited to, those biodiversity values listed in Appendix A1.2.





## Policy 10.2.1.X

Only allow land use, development and city-wide activities in areas of indigenous vegetation and/or habitats of indigenous fauna that meet the significance criteria in Policy 2.2.3.2, including but not limited to scheduled Areas of Significant Biodiversity Value (ASBVs), where Policy 10.2.1.Y is met, or where all of the following are met:

- a. <u>the values that contribute to the significance of the area are maintained</u> or enhanced; and
- b. <u>in the coastal environment, as described in Policy 1 of the New Zealand Coastal Policy Statement 2010, adverse effects on the values that contribute to the significance of the area are avoided; and</u>
- c. <u>significant adverse effects on other biodiversity values of the area or</u> <u>habitat are avoided; and</u>
- d. <u>other adverse effects on biodiversity values are avoided or minimised as</u> far as practicable; and
- e. <u>any proposal for biodiversity offsetting is undertaken in accordance with</u> Policy 2.2.3.6; and
- f. <u>any proposal for environmental compensation is undertaken in</u> <u>accordance with Policy 2.2.3.7.</u>

#### 3 Insert new Policy 10.2.1.Y:

#### Policy 10.2.1.Y

Only allow new roads or additions or alterations to existing roads (roads of national or regional importance only), buildings and structures that form part of rail infrastructure, airport activities, port activities, network utility activities, mining, mineral prospecting and mineral exploration, and any activities ancillary to these, including earthworks and vegetation clearance, to locate in areas of indigenous vegetation and/or habitats of indigenous fauna that meet the significance criteria in Policy 2.2.3.2, including but not limited to scheduled Areas of Significant Biodiversity Value (ASBVs), where all of the following are met:

- a. <u>the activity has a functional need or operational need to locate in the</u> area; and
- b. in the coastal environment, as described in Policy 1 of the New Zealand
  Coastal Policy Statement 2010, adverse effects on the values that
  contribute to the significance of the area (according to the criteria in
  Policy 2.2.3.2) are avoided; and
- c. <u>outside the coastal environment, adverse effects on the values that</u> contribute to the significance of the <u>area are:</u>
  - i. <u>avoided or, if avoidance is not practicable, remedied or mitigated</u> <u>as necessary to maintain the significance of the area; and</u>
  - ii. where adverse effects on these values cannot practicably be avoided, remedied or mitigated, biodiversity offsetting is proposed in accordance with Policy 2.2.3.6; and
  - iii. <u>for residual adverse effects that cannot practicably be avoided, remedied, mitigated or offset, environmental compensation is proposed in accordance with Policy 2.2.3.7; and</u>
- d. <u>adverse effects on other biodiversity values of significant areas of</u> indigenous vegetation and/or habitats of indigenous fauna are avoided or

minimised as far as practicable, including through biodiversity offsetting that is proposed in accordance with Policy 2.2.3.6, or environmental compensation that is proposed in accordance with Policy 2.2.3.7.

4 Amend Policy 10.2.1.6 as follows:

## Policy 10.2.1.6

Only allow indigenous vegetation clearance - large scale in rural or rural residential zones (outside scheduled Areas of Significant Biodiversity Value), where adverse effects on biodiversity values are avoided or, if avoidance is not practicable, no more than minor.

5 Amend Policy 10.2.1.7 as follows:

#### Policy 10.2.1.7

Only allow indigenous vegetation clearance in a wetland, or where there are in areas that do not meet the criteria for areas of significant indigenous vegetation and/or significant habitats of indigenous fauna in Policy 2.2.3.2, but that contain threatened plant or fauna species or mature trees on the important native species list present, in Appendix A10.3 where there is no net loss and preferably a net gain in biodiversity values:

- a. any mature trees are retained; or, if this is not practicable,
- b. adverse effects on biodiversity values are minimised as far as practicable, including through any biodiversity offsetting that is proposed in accordance with Policy 2.2.3.6, or where this is not practicable, any environmental compensation that is proposed in accordance with Policy 2.2.3.7.
- 6 Add new Policy 10.2.1.Z as follows:

#### Policy 10.2.1.Z

Only allow vegetation clearance within, or within the required setback from, a wetland where:

- a. biodiversity values are maintained or enhanced; and
- b. there is no reduction in the extent of natural wetlands (where natural wetlands include wetlands constructed by artificial means to offset impacts on, or restore, an existing or former natural wetland).
- 7 Amend Policy 10.2.1.11 as follows:

# Policy 10.2.1.11

Only allow subdivision activities where the subdivision is designed to design will ensure any future land use or development will:

- a. maintain or enhance, on an on-going basis, biodiversity values;
- b. protect <u>any</u> areas of significant indigenous vegetation and the significant habitats of indigenous fauna; and
- c. be in accordance with policies <del>10.2.1.2, 10.2.1.3, 10.2.1.4</del> <u>10.2.1.X, 10.2.1.Y</u> and 10.2.1.8.

#### Section 10 performance standards

Add a new note to plan users at Rule 10.3.2.3 Protected species (indigenous vegetation clearance) as follows:

## Note 10.3.2.3A - Other relevant District Plan provisions

1. Areas that contain species listed in Appendix 10A.1 or Appendix 10A.2 will meet the criteria in Policy 2.2.3.2 for identification as areas of significant indigenous vegetation and/or as significant habitats of indigenous fauna. Areas that contain mature examples (greater than 15 years old) of the tree species listed in Appendix 10A.3 are likely to meet these criteria.
