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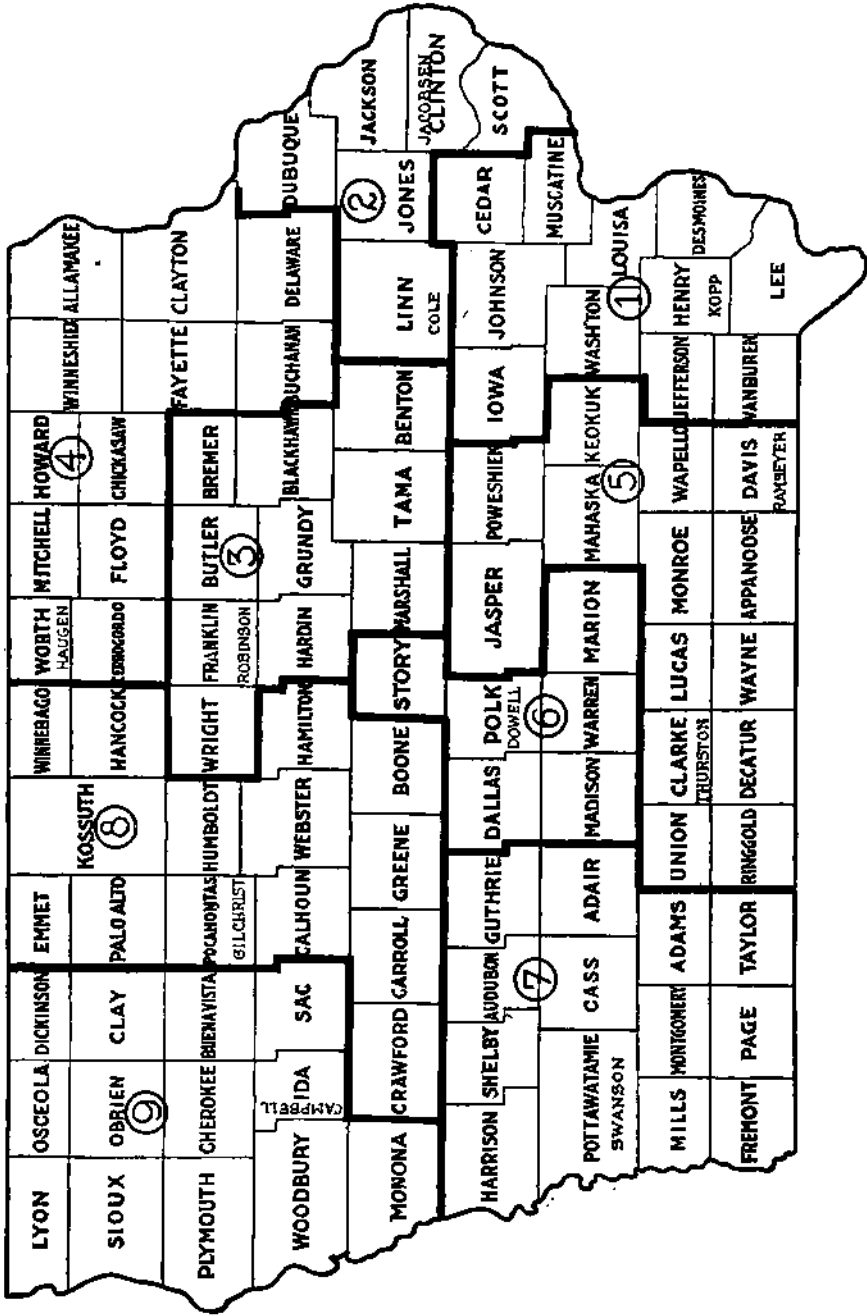
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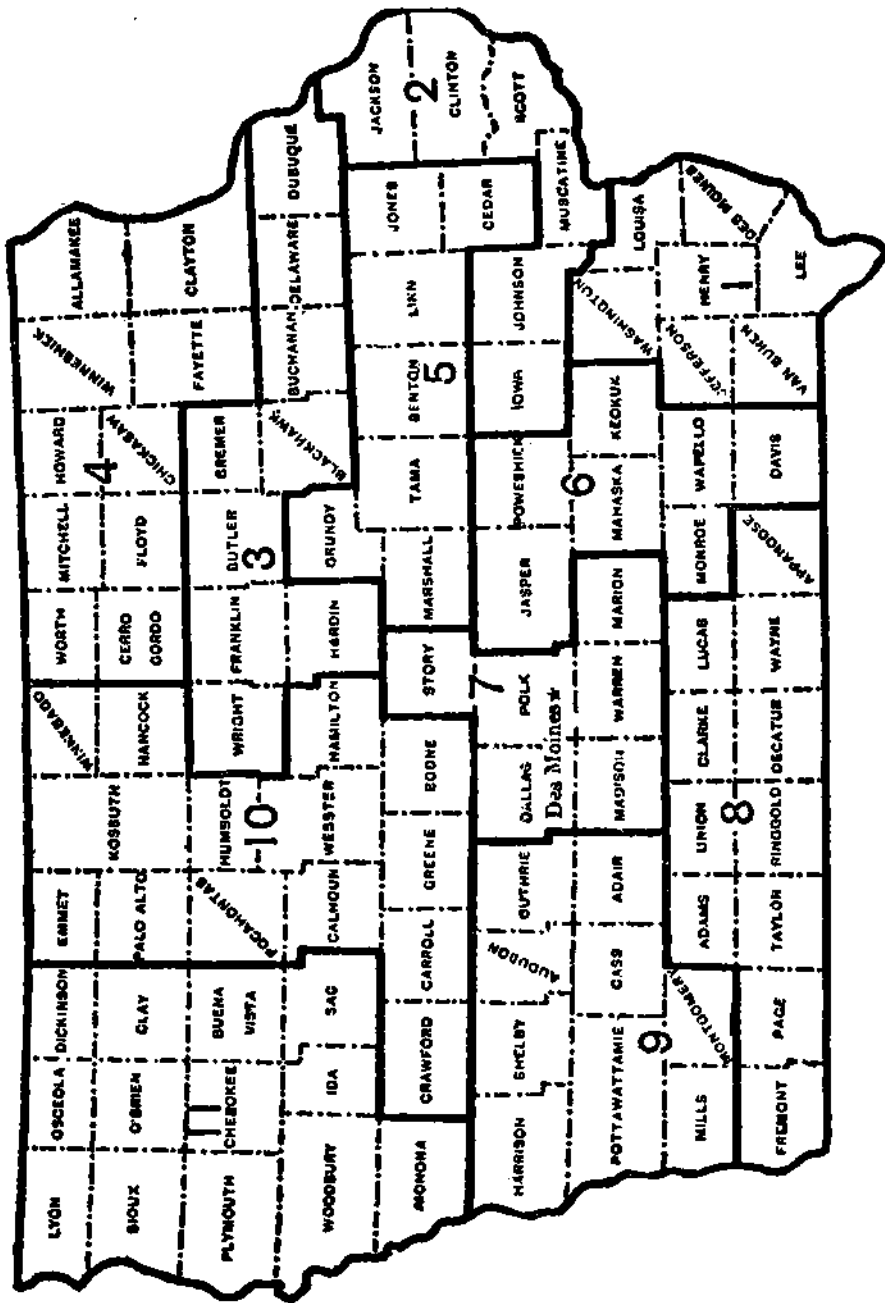

Map of Iowa showing congressional districts prior to the 1931 redistricting. Iowa continues with eleven congressmen on the basis of above districts until March 4, 1933.

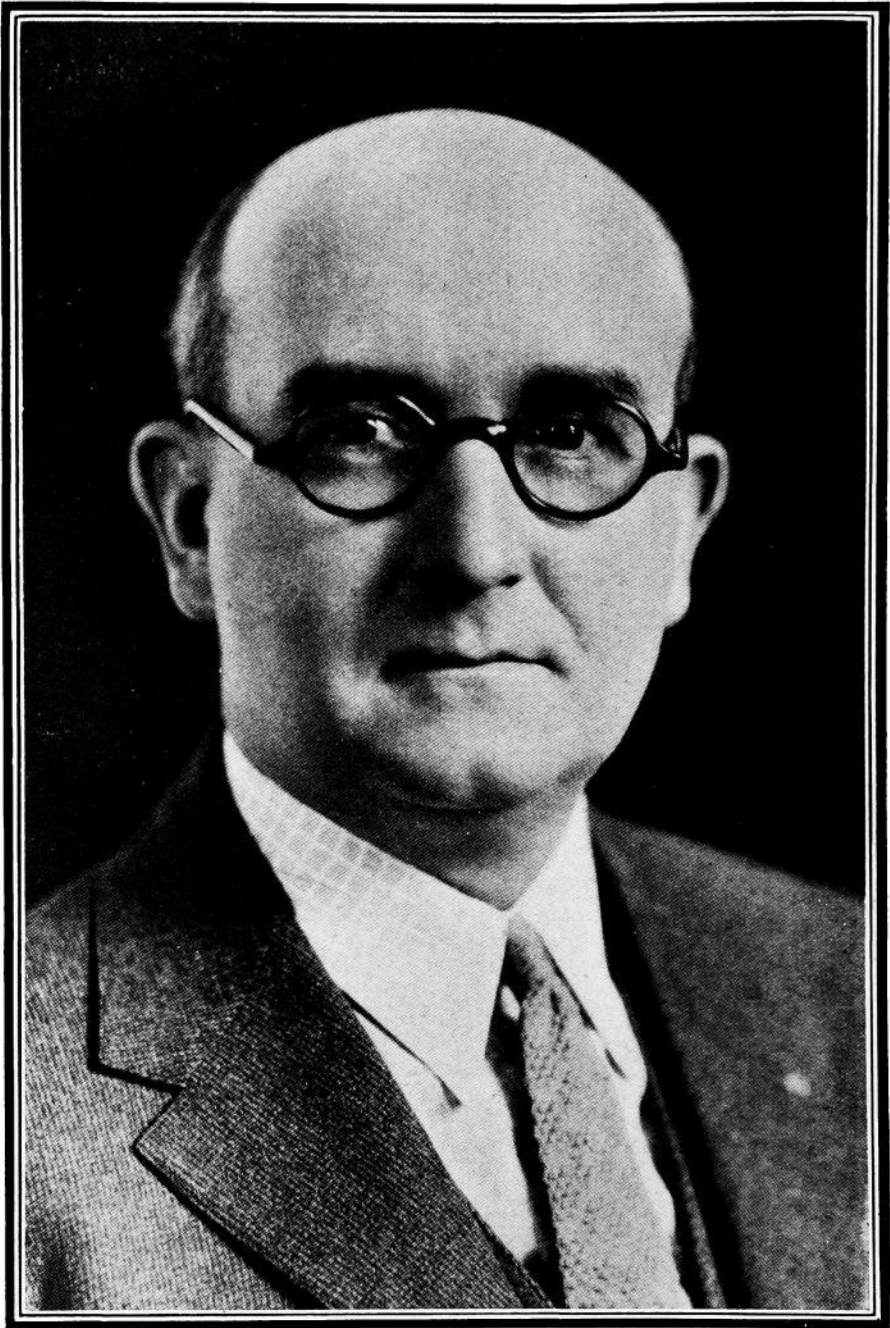
## **Explanatory—Election Statistics**

Election statistics in this book are more in detail than are the official returns to the Secretary of State. The official returns do not include the vote by precincts. The vote by precincts is furnished for this book by the County Auditors direct to the Superintendent of Printing. These precinct returns appear as submitted by the County Auditors, and all compilations of state and county returns in this volume are based thereon. This produces harmony within this volume, except for possible errors, but there may be discrepancies in given instances between the vote shown in this volume on the one hand and the official vote recorded in the office of the Secretary of State on the other, for the reason that the two sets of returns from the same source, namely, those furnished to the Secretary of State (not including the precinct vote) and those furnished to the Superintendent of Printing (the precinct vote) do not always agree. The official vote, of course, stands as such, regardless of such discrepancies, but the figures given in the Official Register, because they include and are based on the precinct vote, which is not returned to the Secretary of State, will not always tally with the official figures.

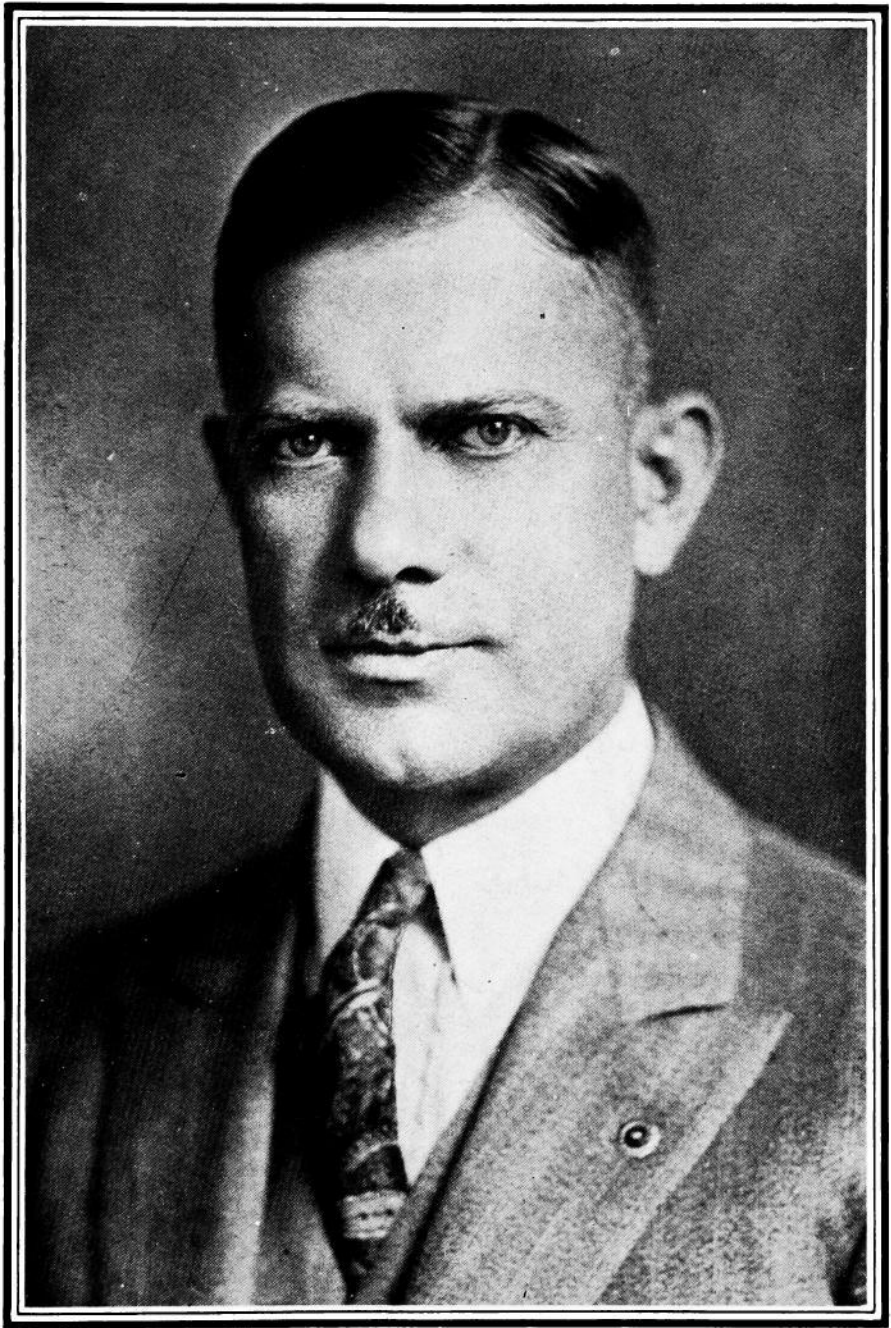
Such discrepancies have occurred with respect to all editions of the Official Register that have carried the precinct vote.



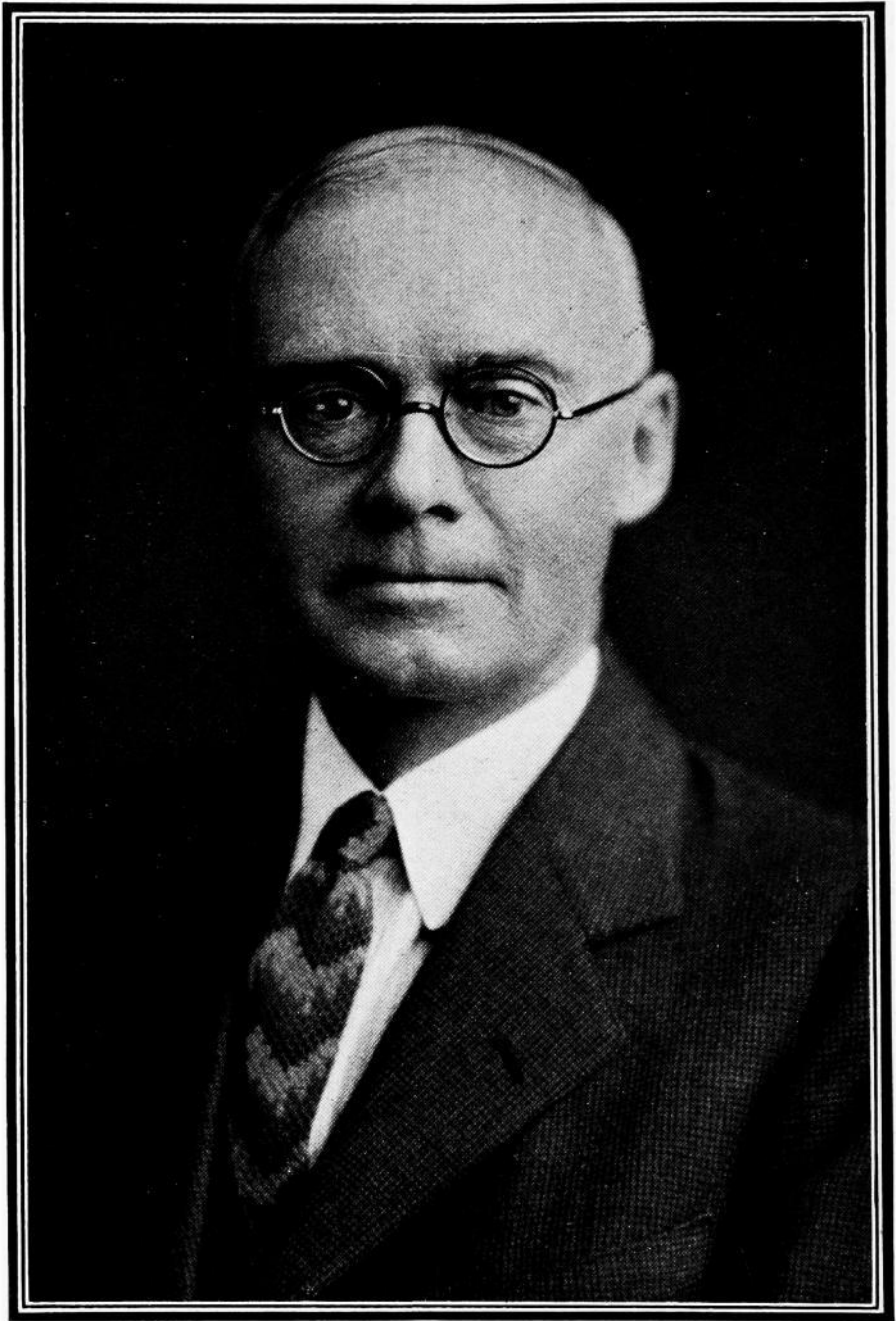

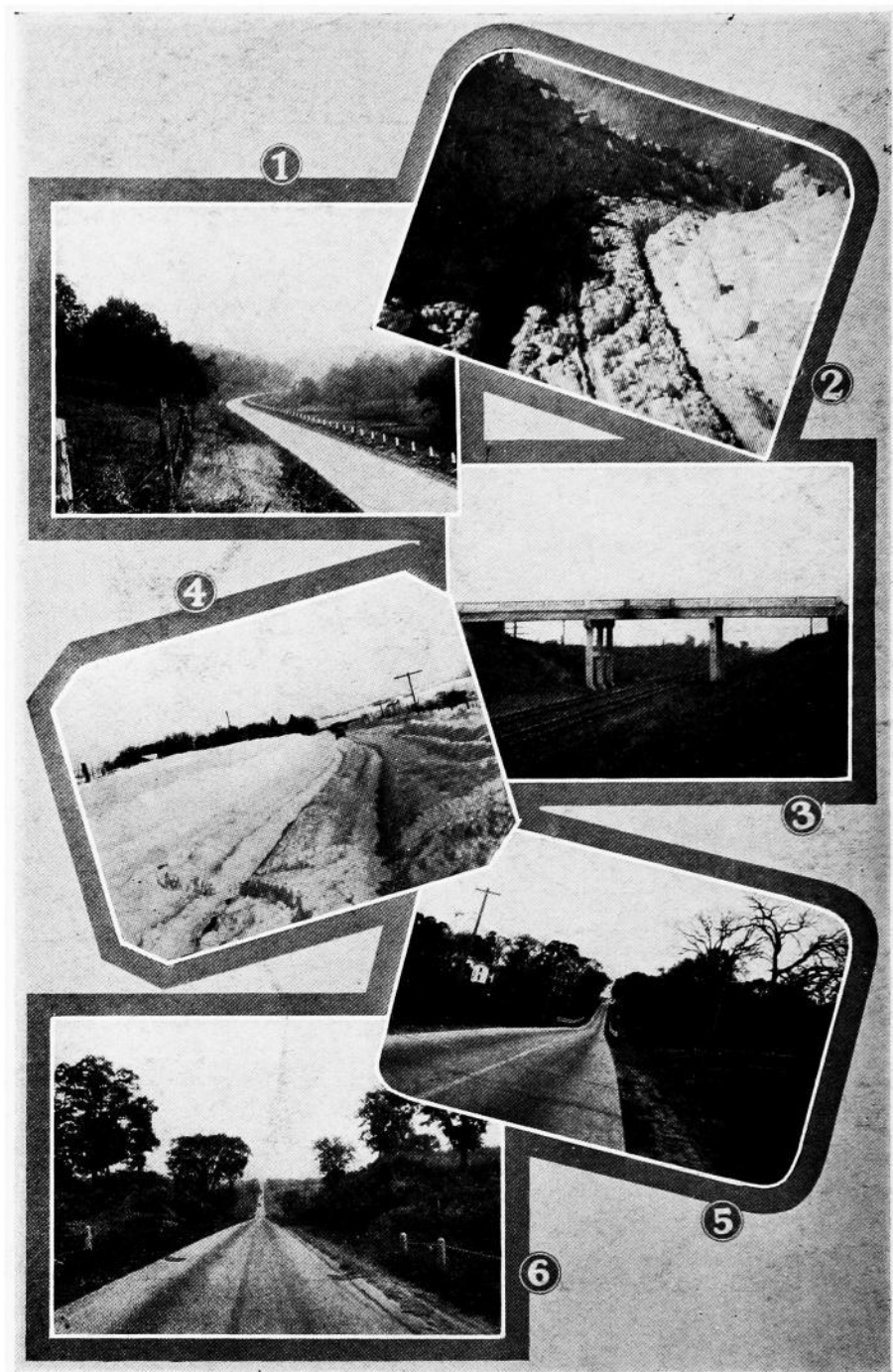

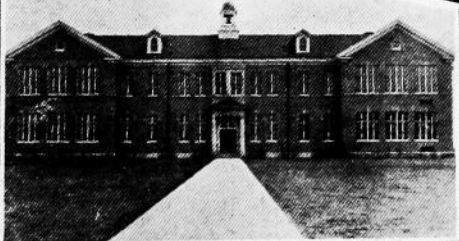
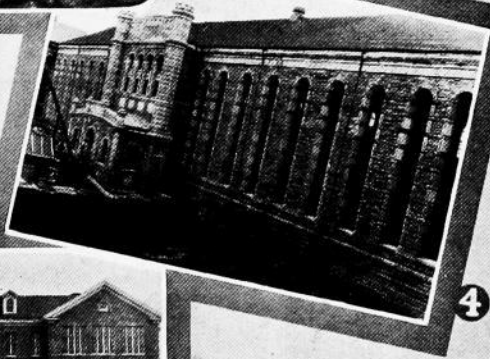
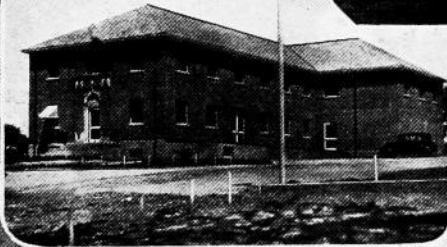
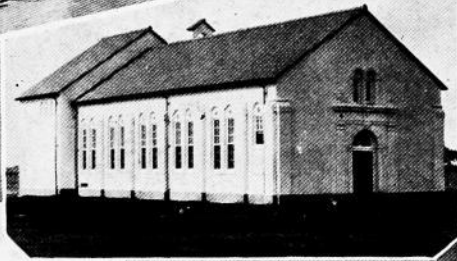

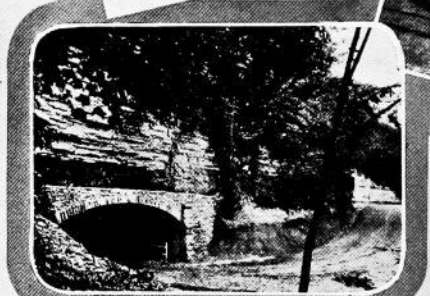

## DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

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In Congress, July 4, 1776

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### THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

(Adopted by the Continental Congress July 2, and authenticated and proclaimed July 4, 1776)

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it, and to institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world:

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained, and, when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long time after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the state remaining in the meantime exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these states; for that purpose obstructing the laws of naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislature.

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution and unacknowledged by our laws, giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation—

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us;

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states;

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world;

For imposing taxes on us without our consent;

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury;

For transporting us beyond seas, to be tried for pretended offenses;

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province; establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies;

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our government;

For suspending our own legislature, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts, by their legislature, to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity; and we have conjured them, by the ties of our common kindred, to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace, friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connections between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor.

## THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

[Recommended by the convention of the states to congress Sept. 17, 1787, and by it submitted to the states for ratification, which by the concurrence of nine states, was consummated and proclaimed and on March 4, 1789, the government commenced operations under the new constitution.]

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We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution for the United States of America.

## ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives.

SEC. 2. (1)\* The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states; and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

(2) No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

(3) [Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding, to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons.]\*\* The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each state shall have at least one representative, and, until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five and Georgia three.

- SEC. 4. Public debt, pensions and bounties not to be questioned—debts and claims incurred in aid of rebellion declared void.
- SEC. 5. Congress to enforce by legislation.
- XV. Right to vote not restricted by race, color, etc.—congress to enforce.
- XVI. Incomes, the congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on.

(4) When vacancies happen in the representation from any state, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

(5) The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

SEC. 3. (1) The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the legislature thereof for six years; and each senator shall have one vote.

(2) Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the legislature of any state the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

(3) No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

(4) The vice-president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided.

(5) The senate shall choose their other officers and also a president pro tempore, in the absence of the vice-president or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

(6) The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

(7) Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

SEC. 4. (1) The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof, but the congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

(2) The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

SEC. 5. (1) Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

(2) Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behaviour, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

(3) Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

(4) Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SEC. 6. (1) The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall in all cases, except treason, felony and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the attendance at the sessions of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

(2) No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased, during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

SEC. 7. (1) All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

(2) Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it unless the congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

(3) Every order, resolution or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SEC. 8. The congress shall have power:—

(1) To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and provide for common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.

(2) To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

(3) To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

(4) To establish a uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States.

(5) To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

(6) To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

(7) To establish post-offices and post-roads;

(8) To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

(9) To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

(10) To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations;

(11) To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

(12) To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

(13) To provide and maintain a navy;

(14) To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

(15) To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

(16) To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United

States; reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by congress;

(17) To exercise exclusive legislation, in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of congress, become the seat of the government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards and other needful buildings; and—

(18) To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. (1) The migration or importation of such person as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

(2) The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

(3) No bill of attainder or ex post facto law shall be passed.

(4) No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

(5) No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state.

(6) No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

(7) No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law, and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

(8) No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States; and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them shall, without the consent of the congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

SEC. 10. (1) No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

(2) No state shall, without the consent of the congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any state on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subjected to the revision and control of the congress.

(3) No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

## ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. (1) The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice-president chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

(2) Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with

themselves. And they shall make a list of all persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot one of them for president; and if no person have a majority then from the five highest on the list, the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the votes shall be taken by states, the representation for each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice-president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice-president.

[The foregoing clause has been superseded and annulled by the twelfth amendment, *post.*]

(3) The congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

(4) No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

(5) In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice-president, and the congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of the president and vice-president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed or a president shall be elected.

(6) The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States or any of them.

(7) Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the constitution of the United States."

SEC. 2. (1) The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion in writing of the principal officer in each of the executive departments upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

(2) He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for and which shall be established by law. But the congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

(3) The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen

during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of their next session.

Sec. 3. He shall from time to time give to the congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them and, in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper. He shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

Sec. 4. The president, vice-president and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

### ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

Sec. 2. (1) The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects.

(2) In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases, before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the congress shall make.

(3) The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the congress may by law have directed.

Sec. 3. (1) Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

(2) The congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

### ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

Sec. 2. (1) The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

(2) A person charged in any state with treason, felony or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

(3) No person held to service or labor in one state, under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

SEC. 3. (1) New states may be admitted by the congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned as well as of the congress.

(2) The congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and, on application of legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

#### ARTICLE V.

The congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this constitution, or, on application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; *provided* that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

#### ARTICLE VI.

(1) All debts contracted and engagements entered into before the adoption of this constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this constitution as under the confederation.

(2) This constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

(3) The senators and representatives before mentioned and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

#### ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the convention of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

Done in convention, by the unanimous consent of the states present, the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, and of the independence of the United States of America the twelfth. In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our names.

### AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

(Proposed by congress and ratified by the legislatures of the several states, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution. For dates of ratification see foot note.\*)

#### ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

#### ARTICLE II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

#### ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

#### ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrants

\*The first ten of these amendments were proposed by congress to the legislatures of the several states September 25, 1789, and were ratified by all of the states except Connecticut, Georgia and Massachusetts, before the end of the year 1791, thereby becoming a part of the organic law, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution.

The eleventh amendment was in like manner proposed March 5, 1794, and was in a message of the president to congress, January 8, 1798, declared to have been duly ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states.

The twelfth amendment was in like manner proposed December 12, 1803, in lieu of the original third paragraph of the first section of the second article, and September 25, 1804, was proclaimed by the secretary of state to have been duly ratified.

The thirteenth amendment was proposed February 1, 1865, and was, December 18, 1865, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fourteenth amendment was proposed June 16, 1866, and was, July 28, 1868, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fifteenth amendment was proposed February 27, 1869, and was, March 30, 1870, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The sixteenth amendment was proposed July 12, 1909, and was, February 25, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The seventeenth amendment was proposed May 16, 1912, and was, May 31, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The eighteenth amendment was proposed December 17, 1917, and was proclaimed by the acting secretary of state on January 29, 1919, to have been duly ratified.

The nineteenth amendment was proposed June 5, 1919, and was proclaimed by the secretary of state on August 26, 1920, to have been duly ratified.



shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

#### ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject, for the same offense, to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled, in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

#### ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

#### ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact, tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

#### ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

#### ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the state respectively, or to the people.

#### ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

#### ARTICLE XII.

SECTION 1. The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice-president, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice-president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president, and of all persons voted for as vice-president, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of

those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice-president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

SEC. 2. The person having the greatest number of votes as vice-president, shall be the vice-president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice-president; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

SEC. 3. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice-president of the United States.

### ARTICLE XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

### ARTICLE XIV.

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within the jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president of the United States, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

SEC. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in congress, or elector of president and vice-president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each house, remove such disability.

SEC. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. The congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

## ARTICLE XV.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. The congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

## ARTICLE XVI.

The congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

## ARTICLE XVII.

SECTION 1. The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

SEC. 2. When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

SEC. 3. This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the constitution.

## ARTICLE XVIII.

SECTION 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

SEC. 2. The congress and the several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

SEC. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by the legislatures of the several states, as provided in the constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by the congress.

## ARTICLE XIX.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

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 LAW AS TO PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION.

The presidential succession is fixed by chapter 4 of the acts of the Forty-ninth congress, first session. In case of the removal, death, resignation or inability of both the president and the vice-president, then the secretary of state shall act as president until the disability of the president or vice-president is removed or a president elected. If there be no secretary of state, then the secretary of the treasury will act; and the remainder of the order of succession is as follows: The secretary of war, attorney-general, postmaster-general, secretary of the navy, and secretary of the interior. The acting president must, upon taking office, convene congress, if not at the time in session, in extraordinary session, giving twenty days' notice. This act applies only to such cabinet officers as shall have been appointed by the advice and consent of the senate, and are eligible under the constitution to the presidency.

## THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

## HISTORICAL REVIEW.

The present constitution of Iowa was adopted in 1857. It is a revision of the constitution adopted in 1846 when Iowa acquired statehood. Since its adoption it has been amended ten times.

How the fundamental law of the land through much controversy changed from territorial to state government is set forth historically in the following sketch which appears as a preface to the official report of the debates and proceedings of the convention of 1857.

"On the 19th day of December, 1836, a resolution passed the house of representatives directing the committee on territories to inquire into the expediency of erecting a new territory of the southern portion of the then territory of Wisconsin. The committee, after investigation, reported a resolution to that effect, which passed the house of representatives on the 14th of December, 1837.

"During that session of congress various petitions and memorials were presented to both houses of congress from the people of Wisconsin territory for the formation of a new territorial government and the settlement of the boundary line between that territory and the state of Missouri. The proceedings of the territorial legislature relative to the boundary line were presented to the senate on the 2nd of January, 1838. The committee on territories of the house of representatives made a report on the 6th of February, 1838, on the expediency of establishing a separate territorial government for Iowa. This report was accompanied by a bill and on the 12th of June, 1838, the president approved an act to divide the territory of Wisconsin and to establish the territorial government of Iowa.

"On the 18th day of June of the same year an act was passed authorizing the president of the United States to cause the southern boundary line of the territory of Iowa to be ascertained and properly marked. The secretary of state reported to congress the maps and surveys in compliance with the resolution of the two houses of congress. And on the third of March, 1839, were passed and approved an act to define and establish the eastern boundary line of the territory of Iowa and an act to alter and amend the organic law of Wisconsin and Iowa.

"The difficulty in regard to the boundary line between Missouri and Iowa continued and during the session of congress of 1839 and 1840 sundry communications were made to congress from the territorial council of Iowa and from individuals in relation to the subject. A bill was reported in the house of representatives on the 4th of February, 1840, to establish and define the northern boundary line of Missouri.

"The president transmitted a message to congress on the 12th of February, 1840, with additional documents in relation to the disputed boundary line. And on the 5th of March, 1840, a bill was reported from the committee on territories of the house of representatives 'to enable the people of Iowa to form a constitution and state government, and for the admission of such state into the union.'

"In the senate on the 11th of February, 1841, a bill was reported for ascertaining and settling the southern boundary of the territory of Iowa. The committee on territories of the house of representatives made a report on the 26th of May, 1841, accompanied by a bill fixing the boundary between Missouri and Iowa, which bill passed the house but failed in the senate.

"In 1844 a convention met in the territory of Iowa and proceeded to frame a constitution for a state government, a copy of which was presented to congress in the session of 1844 and 1845. An act was passed on the 3rd of March, 1845, for the admission of the states of Iowa and Florida into the union. In December, 1845, a bill to repeal so much of the act of March 3, 1845, as related to the boundaries of Iowa was introduced into the house of representatives and referred to the committee on territories, which committee reported to the house on the 27th of March, 1846, an amendatory act.

"The people of the territory of Iowa held a second convention in 1846 and refused to agree to the change in the boundaries as previously fixed and a copy of the constitution affirming those boundaries was presented to congress in December, 1846. And on the 28th day of that month an act for the admission of Iowa into the union was passed and approved.

"The question of altering and amending this constitution was more or less agitated for several years. The people of Iowa were anxious to repeal the restrictions upon banking in this state and other amendments were desired in relation to the election of judges of the supreme court, etc.

"Finally on the 24th of January, 1855, the legislature of Iowa passed 'an act for the revision or amendment of the constitution of this state' which provided for the submission to the people of the question of calling a convention to revise the constitution. The call of the convention was adopted and an election for delegates held in November, 1856. The convention assembled in Iowa City on Monday, January 19th, 1857, and organized by electing Hon. Francis Springer of Louisa county, president."

## PREAMBLE

We, the people of the State of Iowa, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free independent government by the name of the State of Iowa, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, at a point

due east of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines river, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river, to a point on said river where the northern boundary line of the state of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that state—adopted June 12th, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river; thence westwardly along the said northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river then up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux river, according to Nicollett's map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux river, according to said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes north latitude; thence east along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, then down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi river to the place of beginning.

## ARTICLE I—BILL OF RIGHTS

SECTION 1. All men are by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

SEC. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right at all times to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

SEC. 3. The General Assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister or ministry.

SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law, or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this state who may hereafter be engaged, either directly or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the constitution and laws of this state.

SEC. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the general assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

SEC. 7. Every person may speak, write and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the general assembly may authorize trial by a jury or a less number than twelve men in inferior



courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

SEC. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

SEC. 11. All offenses less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a justice of the peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury, except in cases arising in the army or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 12. No person shall, after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

SEC. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion, or invasion the public safety may require it.

SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the state in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

SEC. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 16. Treason against the state shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open court.

SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishments shall not be inflicted.

SEC. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.\*

SEC. 19. No persons shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

SEC. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for redress of grievances.

SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

SEC. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this state, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property, as native born citizens.

SEC. 23. There shall be no slavery in this state; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

SEC. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

ARTICLE II—RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE

SECTION 1. Every white\*\* male‡ citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this state by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military or naval place, or station within this state.

SEC. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

SEC. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.†

ARTICLE III—OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS

SECTION 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the legislative, the executive, and the judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

SECTION 1. The legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a general assembly, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Iowa."

SEC. 2. The sessions of the general assembly shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the governor of the state shall, in the meantime, convene the general assembly by proclamation.

SEC. 3. The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November; and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.‡

SEC. 4. No person shall be a member of the house of representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a free white male citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this state one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the county or district he may have been chosen to represent.\*

SEC. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age and possess the qualifications of representatives as to residence and citizenship.

SEC. 6. The number of senators shall not be less than one-third, nor more than one-half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one-half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

SEC. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

SEC. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and, with the consent of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the general assembly of a free and independent state.

SEC. 10. Every member of the general assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

SEC. 11. Senators and representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the general assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

SEC. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the governor or the person exercising the functions of governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions, as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

SEC. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses shall be signed by the speaker and president of their respective houses.

SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the general assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two-thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the general assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the general assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the secretary of state, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

SEC. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the general assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the general assembly.

SEC. 19. The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SEC. 20. The governor, judges of the supreme and district courts, and other state officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance

in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under this state; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the general assembly may provide.

SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this state, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

SEC. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this state, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the general assembly; but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

SEC. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public moneys, shall have a seat in either house of the general assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this state, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

SEC. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

SEC. 25. Each member of the first general assembly under this constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no general assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

SEC. 26. No law of the general assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the general assembly by which they were passed. If the general assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the state.

SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the general assembly.

SEC. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this state; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

SEC. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

SEC. 30. The general assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

- For the assessment and collection of taxes for state, county, or road purposes;
- For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;
- For changing the names of persons;
- For the incorporation of cities and towns;
- For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;
- For locating or changing county seats.

In all cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the state; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until, upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

SEC. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered

into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the general assembly.

Sec. 32. Members of the general assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm (as the case may be), that I will support the constitution of the United States, and the constitution of the state of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of senator (or representative, as the case may be), according to the best of my ability." And members of the general assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

Sec. 33. The general assembly shall, in the years one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the white inhabitants in the state.\*

Sec. 34. The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white inhabitants in each.†

Sec. 35. The senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the house of representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the state, according to the number of white inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative; and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law, one-half of that number, or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereafter be formed.‡

Sec. 36. At its first session under this constitution and at every subsequent regular session, the general assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.§

Sec. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

Sec. 38. In all elections by the general assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

#### ARTICLE IV—EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

SECTION 1. The supreme executive power of this state shall be vested in a chief magistrate, who shall be styled the governor of the State of Iowa.

Sec. 2. The governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the general assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Sec. 3. There shall be a lieutenant governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the governor. In voting for governor and lieutenant governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as governor, and for whom as lieutenant governor. The returns of every election for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of

government of the state, directed to the speaker of the house of representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both houses of the general assembly.

SEC. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the general assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons governor, or lieutenant governor, as the case may be.

SEC. 5. Contested elections for governor, or lieutenant governor, shall be determined by the general assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the state, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

SEC. 7. The governor shall be commander-in-chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this state.

SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission which shall expire at the end of the next session of the general assembly or at the next election by the people.

SEC. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

SEC. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

SEC. 13. In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor shall have power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this state, execute the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

SEC. 15. The official term of the governor, and lieutenant governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for governor; and while presiding in the senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a senator, and none other.

SEC. 16. The governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting, when the general assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reasons therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

SEC. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of the office for the resi-

due of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the lieutenant governor.

SEC. 18. The lieutenant governor shall be president of the senate, but shall only vote when the senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of governor, the senate shall choose a president pro tempore.

SEC. 19. If the lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the president pro tempore of the senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of governor, the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the house of representatives.

SEC. 20. There shall be a seal of this state, which shall be kept by the governor, and used by him officially and shall be called the great seal of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the State of Iowa, sealed with the great seal of the state, signed by the governor, and countersigned by the secretary of state.

SEC. 22. A secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

#### ARTICLE V—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT

SECTION 1. The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the general assembly may, from time to time establish.

SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of three judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold court.

SEC. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the general assembly may prescribe. The judges of the supreme court so elected, shall be classified so that one judge shall go out of office every two years: and the judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be chief justice of the court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each judge of the supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The judges of the supreme court shall be ineligible to any other office in the state, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 4. The supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals throughout the state.

SEC. 5. The district court shall consist of a single judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the district in which he resides. The judge of the district court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of judge of the supreme court, during the term for which he was elected.

SEC. 6. The district court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 7. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the state.

SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

SEC. 9. The salary of each judge of the supreme court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each district judge, one thousand six hundred

dollars per annum, until the year eighteen hundred sixty; after which time, they shall severally receive such compensation as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 10. The state shall be divided into eleven judicial districts; and after the year eighteen hundred and sixty, the general assembly may reorganize the judicial districts and increase or diminish the number of districts, or the number of judges of the said court, and may increase the number of judges of the supreme court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one district or one judge of either court, at any one session; and no reorganization of the districts, or diminution of the number of judges, shall have the effect of removing a judge from office. Such reorganization of the districts or any change in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.\*

SEC. 11. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each judge shall commence on the first day of January next after his election.

SEC. 12. The general assembly shall provide by law, for the election of an attorney general by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

SEC. 13. The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of district judge, elect a district attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.†

SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the general assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the courts of this state.‡

#### ARTICLE VI—MILITIA

SECTION 1. The militia of this state shall be composed of all able-bodied white male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this state, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the general assembly may provide by law.§

SEC. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace: Provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

SEC. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia (staff officers excepted) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the governor.

#### ARTICLE VII—STATE DEBTS

SECTION 1. The credit of the state shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the state shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 2. The state may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 3. All losses to the permanent, school, or university fund of this state, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of

the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the state. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the state, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.

SEC. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the state in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this state, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each county, if one is published therein, throughout the state, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

SEC. 6. The legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrevocable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

SEC. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

#### ARTICLE VIII—CORPORATIONS

SECTION 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the general assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation the same as that of individuals.

SEC. 3. The state shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

SEC. 5. No act of the general assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

SEC. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the general assembly may also provide for the establishment of a state bank with branches.

SEC. 7. If a state bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and the branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

SEC. 8. If a general banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning, by an officer of state, of all bills, or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to

be deposited with the state treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of states in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent below their average value in the City of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

SEC. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the billholders shall have preference over its other creditors.

SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payments by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

SEC. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the general assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the general assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

## ARTICLE IX—EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LANDS

### *1st. Education.*

SECTION 1. The educational interest of the state, including common schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a board of education, which shall consist of the lieutenant governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the state.

SEC. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the state.

SEC. 3. One member of said board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this constitution the board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

SEC. 4. The first session of the board of education shall be held at the seat of government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the general assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

SEC. 5. The session of the board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the board, the governor may order a special session.

SEC. 6. The board of education shall appoint a secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the board, and the laws of the state. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the general assembly.

SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the board shall be published and distributed to the several counties, townships, and school districts, as may be provided for by the board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

SEC. 8. The board of education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to common schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the school or university fund of this state; but all acts, rules and regulations of said board may be altered, amended, or repealed by the general assembly; and when

so altered, amended, or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the board of education.

SEC. 9. The governor of the state shall be, *ex officio*, a member of said board.

SEC. 10. The board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the general assembly.

SEC. 11. The state university shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the university fund shall be applied to that institution and no other.

SEC. 12. The board of education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the state, through a system of common schools and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

SEC. 13. The members of the board of education shall each receive the same per diem during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the general assembly.

SEC. 14. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of common schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the board shall be, "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 15. At any time after the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the general assembly shall have the power to abolish or reorganize said board of education, and provide for the educational interest of the state in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.\*

#### 2nd. School Funds and School Lands.

SECTION 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the general assembly of this state.

SEC. 2. The university lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all moneys belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the state university. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said university.

SEC. 3. The general assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this state, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new states, under an act of congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several states of the union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent, as has been or may hereafter be granted by congress, on the sale of lands in this state, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the general assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of common schools throughout the state.

SEC. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of common schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the board of education shall from time to time provide.

SEC. 5. The general assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this

state, for the use of the university, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said university, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the general assembly as soon as may be, to provide effectual means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said university.

SEC. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same, that by law, receive and control the state and county revenue for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

SEC. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the general assembly.

#### ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the general assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the general assembly so next chosen as aforesaid such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the general assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the general assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the constitution of this state.

SEC. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the general assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a convention for such purpose, the general assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such convention.

#### ARTICLE XI—MISCELLANEOUS

SECTION 1. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend to all civil cases (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise), where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

SEC. 2. No new county shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the county of Worth, and the counties west of it, along the northern boundary of this state, may be organized without additional territory.

SEC. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last state and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SEC. 4. The boundaries of the state may be enlarged, with the consent of congress and the general assembly.

SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of

the United States, and of this state, and also an oath of office.

SEC. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 7. The general assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been, or may be granted by congress to this state, and the location of which may be given to the general assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred twenty acres.

SEC. 8. The seat of government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law, at the city of Des Moines, in the county of Polk; and the state university at Iowa City, in the county of Johnson.

#### ARTICLE XII—SCHEDULE

SECTION 1. This constitution shall be the supreme law of the state, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The general assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this constitution into effect.

SEC. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment, in the same manner as they would have been, had not this constitution been made.

SEC. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the state, or to any county therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the state, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the state, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

SEC. 6. The first election under this constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, at which time the electors of the state shall elect the governor and lieutenant governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such state senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and members of the house of representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the general assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

SEC. 7. The first election for secretary, auditor, and treasurer of state, attorney general, district judges, members of the board of education, district attorneys, members of congress and such state officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven (except the superintendent of public instruction), and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except prosecuting attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight: *Provided*, That the time for which any district judge or other state or county officer elected at the April election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

SEC. 8. The first election for judges of the supreme court, and such county officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

SEC. 9. The first regular session of the general assembly shall be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October,

in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by vote of the general assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this constitution (except as in this constitution otherwise provided), shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this constitution prescribed.

SEC. 12. The general assembly, at the first session under this constitution, shall district the state into eleven judicial districts, for district court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the general assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this constitution.

SEC. 13. This constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this state. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general elections of the state, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the secretary of state, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of state officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this constitution are in favor of the same, the governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such constitution shall be the constitution of the state of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

SEC. 14. At the same election that this constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "White" from the article on the right of suffrage shall be separately submitted to the electors of this state for adoption or rejection in the manner following—namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this constitution, then said word "White" shall be stricken from said article and be no part thereof.

SEC. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the county of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth judicial district of this state (Amended. See Amendment of 1904).

Done in convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty-first.

## PROCLAMATION

Whereas an instrument known as the "New Constitution of the State of Iowa" adopted by the constitutional convention of said state on the fifth day of March, A. D. 1857, was submitted to the qualified electors of said state at the annual election held on Monday the third day of August, 1857, for their approval or rejection.

And whereas an official canvass of the votes cast at said election shows that there were forty thousand three hundred and eleven votes cast for the adoption of said constitution and thirty-eight thousand six hundred and eighty-one votes were cast against its adoption, leaving a majority of sixteen hundred and thirty votes in favor of its adoption.

Now therefore I, JAMES W. GRIMES, Governor of said state, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me, hereby declare the said new constitution to be adopted, and declare it to be the supreme law of the state of Iowa.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the state of Iowa.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

from 1857 to 1928

## AMENDMENTS OF 1868

1.

Strike the word "white" from section 1 of article II.

2.

Strike the word "white" from section 33 of article III.

3.

Strike the word "white" from section 34 of article III.

4.

Strike the word "white" from section 35 of article III.

5.

Strike the word "white" from section 1 of article VI.

NOTE—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1866; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1868; ratified at the election of November 3, 1868, and proclaimed adopted on December 8, 1868.

Section 34 has been amended three times and 35 twice.

## AMENDMENT OF 1880

1.

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1878; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1880; ratified at the election of November 2, 1880, and proclaimed adopted on December 3, 1880. Amended again in 1926.

## AMENDMENT OF 1882

Add as section 26, to article I of said constitution, the following: No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1880; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1882, ratified at a special election held on June 27, 1882, and certified adopted on July 28, 1882. On April 21, 1883, the supreme court in Koehler and Lang v. Hill, 60 Iowa 543, held that owing to certain irregularities the amendment was not legally submitted to the electors and thence did not become a part of the constitution.

AMENDMENT OF 1884.

1.

The general election for state, district, county and township officers, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

2.

At any regular session of the general assembly the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of the said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

3.

The grand jury may consist of any number of members, not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

4.

That section 13 of article V of the constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section.

Section 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter, elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

NOTE—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1882; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1884; ratified at the election of November 4, 1884, and certified adopted on December 10, 1884. Section 1 relating to time of general election was repealed by the amendment of 1916.

AMENDMENTS OF 1904.

1.

Add as section 16, to article XII of the constitution, the following:

Sec. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

2.

That sections thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, be repealed and the following be adopted in lieu thereof:

Sec. 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general



assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to the population as shown by the last preceding census.

SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three-fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

SEC. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as herein before required.

NOTE—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1902; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1904; ratified at the general election of November 3, 1904, and certified adopted on November 29, 1904.

#### AMENDMENT OF 1908.

Add to section 18 of article I of the constitution of the State of Iowa the following: The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of land to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The general assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1906; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1907; ratified at the election of November 3, 1908, and certified adopted on November 23, 1908.

#### AMENDMENT OF 1916.

Repeal section 7 of article II of the constitution of Iowa and enact in lieu thereof the following, to-wit:

SEC. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1913; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1915, and ratified on November 7, 1916.

#### AMENDMENT OF 1917.

That the following amendment to article one (1) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be and the same is hereby proposed: To add thereto following section twenty-six (26) thereof and as section twenty-seven (27) of article one (1) of said constitution the following, to-wit:

SEC. 27. The manufacture, sale, or keeping for sale, as a beverage, or intoxicating liquors, including ale, wine and beer, shall be forever prohibited within this state. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1915; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1917; defeated at the special election October 15, 1917.

Yes: 214,693; no: 215,625—932.

#### AMENDMENT PROPOSED 1919

Joint resolution proposing that section 1 of article II of the constitution be repealed, and the following enacted in lieu thereof, to-wit:

SECTION 1. Every citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one (21)

years, who shall have been a resident of this state six (6) months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he or she claims his or her vote, sixty (60) days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

Resolved further, that the foregoing proposed amendment be, and the same is hereby referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election for members of the next general assembly, and that the secretary of state cause the same to be published for three (3) months previous to the day of said election as provided by law.

NOTE—This amendment in substantially this form was proposed by the general assembly 1913; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1915; but was not adopted by the people. It was again proposed by the general assembly of 1917, but was not published as provided by Sec. 1 of Art. X of the constitution and Sec. 56 of the code of Iowa, which caused its second defeat. The present amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1919.

NOTE—The general assembly was convened in special session on July 2, 1919, for the purpose of considering the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States providing that the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

Federal amendment ratified on said date which made further action on the "Amendment Proposed 1919" unnecessary.

### CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

At the general election on the second day of November, 1920, in pursuance of the law as found in section 1061 of the code (1897) and in article X, section 3 of the constitution of Iowa, there was submitted to the electors the following question:

"Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution and amend the same?"

Yes: 279,652; no: 221,763.

Thirty-ninth general assembly failed to provide for constitutional convention.

### AMENDMENT OF 1926

Strike out the word "male" from section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1923; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1925; ratified at the election held November 2, 1926.

Yes: 239,999; no: 133,929.

### AMENDMENT OF 1928

Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to section thirty-four (34) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, as said section now appears on page fifty-three (53), code, 1924, relating to the apportionment of the state into senatorial districts.

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

SECTION 1. Number of senators. That the following amendment to section thirty-four (34) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, as said section now appears on page fifty-three (53), code, 1924, be and the same is hereby proposed:

That the period (.) at the end of said section thirty-four (34) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be stricken and the following inserted: "but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator."

Sec. 2. Be it further resolved that the foregoing proposed amendment be and the same is hereby referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election for members of the next general assembly, and that the secretary of state cause the same to be published for three (3) months previous to the date of said election as provided by law.

NOTE—This joint resolution was passed by the forty-first general assembly in 1925, then by the forty-second general assembly in 1927 and voted by the people November 6, 1928.

## THE IOWA CAPITOL

The capitol was dedicated in January, 1884, when the General Assembly first met in the new halls, having formerly met in a small building located where the Soldiers' and Sailors' monument now stands. Not all the offices were occupied for more than two years thereafter. On the main floor is located the Supreme Court rooms and the Judges' Chambers. On this floor is also located the offices of the Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of State, Treasurer of State, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Budget Department, Attorney General, Clerk of Supreme Court, Railroad Commission and Secretary of Agriculture. The law department of the state library is on the second floor and is one of the most complete in the country. In the House has been installed an automatic electric voting device which supplants the roll call on votes in the legislature.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor, whose term of office is two years. He receives an annual salary of \$7,500.

No person is eligible who has not been a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which expires at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation and shall state to both houses when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have convened.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor has power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

All bills must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutation and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation or pardon granted, and the reason therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgment of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the requests of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.



## LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR

*Term of incumbent ends January, 1933*

ARCH W. MCFARLANE, Waterloo. Born in Iowa.

The lieutenant-governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the governor.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the lieutenant-governor.

The lieutenant-governor is president of the senate, but can only vote when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and expense allowance as a member and double the compensation of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building during the meetings of the general assembly.

The secretary of state is the head of the department of state, is elected by the people for a term of two years, receives \$5,000 a year. Ex-officio member executive council, department of health, printing board, commission licensing employment agencies, a trustee of the state library and historical department.

He countersigns all commissions and proclamations issued by the governor.

The enrolled copies of the constitution and laws of the state, the authenticated journals of the general assembly, and many other legislative and state papers are filed in his office. All papers pertaining to the nomination, election and qualification of state and district officers are filed in his office. All papers relative to the incorporation of cities and towns, the annexation or severance of territory, and

the consolidation or abandonment of municipal corporations are preserved by him.

Articles of incorporation of both domestic and foreign corporations are filed and certificates of authority to transact business within the state are issued by him. Applications for the registration of trade-marks, labels and forms of advertising are made to him and certificates issued thereon.

The records, files, field notes and plats of survey and other papers and documents of the state land office are in his custody.

All corporations for pecuniary profit doing business in Iowa are required to report annually, in July, to the secretary of state and pay an annual fee of \$1.

The registration in the office of the secretary of state and the filing of a \$1,000 bond is required to be made by all charitable organizations soliciting public aid in the state and a permit must first be procured from his department before any such organization or its agents may solicit public donations in Iowa except within the county in which the solicitor resides or in which such association or institution is located or in an adjoining county if location or residence is within six miles of such adjoining county.

Important work in the secretary of state's office relates to the administration of the securities (blue sky) law, passed by the thirty-sixth general assembly, and revised and enlarged in scope by the forty-third general assembly.

The motor vehicle department is also under the administration of the secretary of state. A complete record of all registrations of motor vehicles is kept in numerical order, and the enforcement of the law is carried out through twelve field men or motor vehicle inspectors.

By act of the forty-fourth general assembly, effective January 1, 1932, every operator of a motor vehicle in Iowa must obtain a license. A fee of twenty-five cents for operator for two years and \$2 annually for chauffeur is required. An owner operator pays no fee. The same legislature further extended restrictions as to weight, width and length of trucks, busses and trailers.

The forty-third general assembly created the office of real estate commissioner whose duty it is to license and regulate real estate brokers and real estate salesmen, and to enforce penalties for violation of the provisions thereof. The administration of this act is placed in the office of the secretary of state.

The auditor of state keeps the accounts between the state and the United States, or any state, public official or person; makes settlement of accounts with county treasurers and receivers of state revenues; keeps accounts of all revenues, funds and income of the state and of all disbursements; settles accounts with public debtors for debt due the state; settles claims against the state treasury; superintends and enforces payment of moneys payable into the state treasury; superintends the fiscal affairs of the state and furnishes forms for reports to be made by county officials to the state; issues all warrants on the state treasurer of money directed by law to be paid out of the treasury; has custody of all books, securities, bonds, etc., pertaining to the fiscal affairs of the state, where such are not required to be kept in some other office; reports to the governor biennially as to the revenues, funds, income, taxable property, also as to expenditures and estimates expenditures for the biennial period following; makes apportionments of interest on the permanent school fund among the counties and directs the payment of the proceeds of escheat estates to the school fund.

The auditor of state also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, as well as having supervision of companies selling bonds on the installment plan, and building and loan associations; he appoints the building and loan examiners, the county examiners, and the examiners of municipal accounts. All reports by any of the companies or associations above named are made to him, all fees, except fees for incorporation, are paid to him, and all deposits required by law of any such companies or associations to be made with the state are deposited in the auditor's office. None of the companies or associations named can transact business in the state until they have received a certificate of authority from the auditor.

The state board of audit consists of the auditor of state, the attorney general or one of his legal assistants, and the director of the budget.

This board audits all claims against the state except those for salaries of various officers which are fixed by law and claims on account of the institutions under the control of the board of control and the board of education.

The board is authorized and directed to formulate such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary to enable it to determine: that services charged for were actually performed; the time necessarily devoted to such service and the exact and necessary expenses incurred in the performance thereof.

The auditor of state and the director of the budget are *ex-officio* members of this board. The third member is designated by the attorney general from among his assistants.

The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department; books are kept in which are recorded the names of all persons from

whom money for any purpose is received, the date received, the purpose for which the money was remitted, and the amount thereof. Receipts in duplicate are issued for each item received, and the duplicate is filed with the auditor of state. When remittance of state dues is made by bank draft, check or certificate of deposit, such draft, check or certificate must be deposited for collection in some bank in the state which has been previously designated as a depository for state funds, and no receipt for any sum remitted by check or draft is issued by the treasurer until the depository receiving deposit notifies the department of the collection thereof.

All county recorders and superintendents of schools are required to remit to the treasurer of state or on before the 15th of each month all state moneys received by them during the preceding calendar month. All county treasurers are required to remit to the treasurer of state on or before the 15th of each month for the per capita costs of patients maintained in the various state institutions and who are residents of their counties, as certified to him by the county auditor, and to report to the treasurer at the same time the collection during the preceding month of taxes belonging to the state. The law provides that when the cash balance of general revenue funds in the state treasury is reduced below \$2,000,000.00 the treasurer of state may draw upon each county treasurer in proportion to the amount in his possession, a sum sufficient in the aggregate to increase said cash balance to an amount not to exceed \$3,000,000.00. The soldiers' bonus tax fund, collected by county treasurers, is drawn into the state treasury only at such times and in such amounts as is necessary to pay the interest and bonds as due.

All elective and appointive state officers, boards, commissions, and departments, except the state fair board, the state board of education, and the board of control of state institutions, are required to within ten days succeeding the collection thereof, deposit with the treasurer of state 90% of all fees, commissions and moneys collected or received. The balance actually collected in cash, remaining in the hands of any officer, board or department cannot exceed the sum of \$5,000.00 and no money collected is authorized to be held more than 30 days. Each deposit must be accompanied by an itemized statement of the sources from which the money was collected and showing the funds to be credited.

The treasurer of state, with the consent of the executive council, may designate banks in the state of Iowa as depositories of state funds in amounts not exceeding the limits to be fixed by said council. Each bank so designated shall pay interest on daily balances at the rate of 2% at such times as may be agreed upon by the banks and the treasurer of state, with the approval of the executive council.

Disbursements from the state treasury are made only upon warrants issued by the auditor of state. A record is kept of each warrant paid, showing date of issue, date of payment, to whom paid and upon what account drawn. During the last biennial period the disbursements amounted to \$115,384,630.46 and the receipts were \$115,985,185.19.

An act of the forty-first general assembly requires the treasurer of state to collect from distributors a license fee of two cents per gallon on all gasoline used in the state for any purpose whatsoever. Provision is made for the refund of the license fee paid when the gasoline is used for certain purposes. One-third of the proceeds is distributed to the primary road fund, one-third to county road fund and one-third to township road fund. The forty-second general assembly authorized an additional license fee of one cent a gallon, effective July 4, 1927; the proceeds to be added to the primary road fund after deductions to cover certain bridge refunds to counties.

The state treasurer is the custodian of the permanent endowment fund of the state agricultural college. This fund amounts to about \$680,000.00 and is loaned at not less than five per cent, secured by first mortgages upon real estate in Iowa. The interest only may be used by the college. This interest is payable to the state treasurer and is by him paid to the treasurer of the college. The accounts of the department are inspected quarterly under the direction of the governor.

The treasurer also handles funds which may be diverted under the public funds deposit guaranty act of the forty-first general assembly for covering losses of public funds deposited in any bank which may be placed in the hands of a receiver for liquidation.

## ATTORNEY GENERAL

The attorney general is elected for a period of two years.

It is the duty of the attorney general to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the governor, executive council or general assembly or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all causes in the supreme court in which the state is a party or interested.

The attorney general is given supervisory power over county attorneys and in a general way looks after the enforcement of the law over the entire state.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the general assembly or any state department.

It is also his duty to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

The attorney general is chairman of the state board of law examiners, ex-officio a member of the state printing board, and has charge of the bureau of investigation.

The fortieth general assembly passed an act consolidating into one department, to be known as the state department of agriculture, the following administrative agencies of state and the laws governing same, to wit:

1. The former department of agriculture with all its statutory activities and duties, except such as relate to the state fair.
2. The dairy and food department and all its administrative agencies.
3. The animal health commission and veterinary department and all their administrative agencies.
4. The petroleum inspection service and hotel license and inspection, and all matters pertaining thereto.
5. State horticultural society.
6. Iowa corn and small grain growers' association.
7. Iowa beef and cattle producers' association.
8. Iowa state dairy association.
9. The state weather and crop service.
10. Iowa state poultry association.

Also the office of secretary of agriculture was created, whose duties are in addition to any other duty which may be prescribed by law:

1. To encourage, promote, and advance the interests of agriculture, including horticulture, live stock industry, dairying, cheese making, poultry raising, bee keeping, forestry, production of wool, and other kindred and allied industries.
2. To promote and devise methods of conducting said industries with the view of increasing production and facilitating an adequate distribution of the same at the least cost to the producer.
3. To compile statistics and information, in co-operation with the federal government, relative to crop production, farm economics, the production and marketing of beef, pork, mutton, wool, poultry, milk, butter, cheese and all other agricultural products, in so far as such statistical information may be deemed of value to agriculture and its allied interests in the state, which statistics, when published, shall constitute the official agricultural statistics of the state.
4. To co-operate with the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts in all ways that may be beneficial to the agricultural interests of the state.
5. To include in his compilation and publication, the reports of agricultural, horticultural, live stock associations and other like associations or societies organized for the promotion of the agricultural interests of the state,
6. The forty-second general assembly provided that the state entomologist shall be responsible to and under the authority of the secretary of agriculture in the issuance of all rules and regulations, the establishment of quarantine, etc.

New duties imposed on the department by the 44th G. A. relate to tax on oleomargarine, standardization of gasoline, short courses for counties without fairs, application of weights and measures law to oranges, lemons, grapefruit and ice cream.

The superintendent of public instruction is charged by law with general supervision and control over the rural, graded and high schools, public junior colleges of the state, and over such other state and public schools as are not under the control of the state board of education or the board of control of state institutions. This does not include private, denominational, and parochial schools. The magnitude of this task is evidenced by the fact that during the school year 1929-1930, 9,486 rural schools, 932 graded and high schools, and twenty-eight public junior colleges were in operation.

In connection with these general powers, nineteen specific duties are prescribed for the superintendent of public instruction by Section 3832, Code of Iowa, 1927. These may be roughly reorganized into the following classifications:

1. Promoting interest in education including industrial, commercial, agricultural, manual, vocational, domestic science, and continuation work, and recommending such changes and improvements as are deemed necessary.
2. Preparing and distributing course of study manuals, including outlines for teaching American citizenship, civics of the state and nation, social problems, economics, health, special days, and plans and specifications for school buildings.
3. Appointing time and place for teachers' county institutes and approving the program and faculty.
4. Classifying, defining, and inspecting schools.
5. Prescribing reports for teachers and school officers, filing and preserving reports, recording business transactions, and making an annual census report to the auditor of state and a biennial report to the governor.
6. Preparing and distributing of questions for examination of applicants for teachers' certificates and pupils completing the eighth grade in rural schools.
7. Examining and determining appeals taken to him according to law and rendering written opinions upon questions submitted by school officers pertaining to their duties.

The administration of these and other official duties is done by the superintendent of public instruction with the assistance of four departments organized under the headings of: legal, with deputy superintendent in charge; inspectional, with five inspectors; certification under the board of educational examiners, of which the superintendent of public instruction is president, ex-officio; and vocational and rehabilitation, under the board for vocational education, of which the superintendent of public instruction is chairman, ex-officio.

The board of educational examiners consists of the superintendent of public instruction, who is president and executive officer of the board, the president of the State University of Iowa, the president of the Iowa State Teachers College, the president of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, three persons appointed by the governor, one of whom shall be a woman and one of whom shall be a representative of the privately endowed colleges of the state maintaining teacher training courses.

The board has charge of the granting of state and uniform county teachers' certificates. It determines what colleges may be accredited under the statute for state teachers' certificates and fixes standards for teacher training courses, what certificates of other states may be accepted under the statute for Iowa teachers' certificates and the graduates of what colleges and normal schools of other states may be given certificate recognition. It also prepares and publishes library lists for the public schools of the state.

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa, are the following: to purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for state departments

and officers; the execution of contracts for fuel, lights, repairs; the approval of articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations; and plan for liquidation of said associations; the custody of supplies for state officers and commissions; the canvass of votes cast for state and district officers; the compilation of a state census once in ten years; the declaration of changes in classification of cities; the assignment of office rooms to state officers in capitol building; the appointment of the board of examiners of mine inspectors; disposal of state documents which the state librarian, curator of historical department and curator of law department may certify are not required for state uses; approval of claims for the expense of collection of inheritance taxes and for the repayment of such taxes when wrongfully paid; the approval of plans for buildings at the state educational institutions, under certain conditions; to determine the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and the amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof. The secretary of the executive council is also secretary of the board of conservation and of the board of engineering examiners.

### CUSTODIAN

The thirty-ninth general assembly adopted an act providing that the executive council shall appoint a custodian of public buildings and grounds who shall hold office during the pleasure of said council. Said custodian shall give bond for such amount as the executive council may fix.

It shall be the duty of the custodian, except as otherwise provided by law: To have charge of, preserve and adequately protect the state capitol and grounds, and all other state grounds and buildings at the seat of government, and all property

connected therewith or used therein or thereon; to see that all parts and apartments of said buildings are properly ventilated and kept clean and in order; to see that all visitors, at proper hours, are properly escorted over said grounds and through said buildings, free of expense; to have at all times, charge of and supervision over the police, janitors, and other employees of his department in and about the capitol and other state buildings at the seat of government; to institute in the name of the state, and with the advice and consent of the attorney general, civil and criminal proceedings against any person for injury or threatened injury to any public property under his control, and plans and surveys of the public grounds, buildings and underground constructions at the seat of government; to perform all duties required by law or order of the executive council.

The custodian shall, on or before September thirtieth preceding each regular session of the general assembly, make a verified report to the executive council which shall cover all transactions for the preceding biennial period.

The forty-third general assembly created the state board of assessment and review consisting of three members appointed by the governor. To it was assigned all of the work relating to taxes formerly imposed on the state executive council, as well as many other duties. The board exercises "general supervision over the administration of the assessment and tax laws of the state, over boards of supervisors and all other officers or boards of assessment and levy in the performance of their official duties in all matters relating to assessments and taxation, to the end that all assessments of property and taxes levied thereon be made relatively just and uniform in substantial compliance with law." The board "must confer with, advise and direct boards of supervisors, boards of review and others obligated by law to make levies and assessments as to their duties under the laws." It must "direct proceedings, actions and prosecutions to be instituted for the enforcement of the laws relating to the penalties, liabilities and punishment of public officers and officers or agents of corporations and other persons or corporations for failure or neglect to comply with the provisions of the statutes governing the return, assessment and taxation of property." It must "make or cause to be made complaints against members of boards of review, boards of supervisors or other assessing, reviewing or taxing officers for official misconduct or neglect of duty."

Public officials having to do with taxes must "report information as to the assessment of property and collection of taxes and such other information as may be needful or desirable in the work of the board in such form and upon such blanks as the board may prescribe. The board holds public hearings on taxation matters and must investigate the work or methods of boards of review, boards of supervisors or other public officers in matters of assessment, equalization and taxation.

Under a recent decision of the state supreme court the powers of the board have been increased to give full authority in all matters relating to the assessment of property in the State of Iowa. The board in the first two years of its existence has been active in obtaining an equitable assessment of property and maintained a field force for the purpose of uncovering improper assessments.

All of the powers formerly exercised by the executive council in regard to assessment of property and relating to the equalization of assessments were transferred to the state board of assessment and review and are now exercised by that board. It also fixes the state millage levy. The board estimates as a result of its activities \$1,500,000.00 in taxes were collected in the year 1931 upon property which hitherto had escaped taxation.

Under legislation by the forty-fourth general assembly, the board has power to review the assessment of any piece of property, and to issue and enforce orders correcting inequalities. It was also given jurisdiction over the assessment of public utilities.

The powers and duties of the board of railroad commissioners are: To generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical condition, conduct and management of such railroads and report their condition to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their train over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to pass on necessity for spur tracks to be constructed and maintained not exceeding three miles in length to an existing industry under terms and conditions approved by the commission as set out by law; to make reasonable rules for the crossing of steam and interurban railways and to require, when necessary, interlocking switches at railroad crossings; to make report on first Monday in December in each year to the governor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied with appropriate

suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employees of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission is prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable maximum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates; unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before a railroad company may appropriate coal, coke or oil received for shipment, it must first secure the written consent of the railroad commission.

Before any railway company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the board must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used consent of the board must be obtained.

The thirty-fifth general assembly gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale, or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power, or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes over, along and across any public land, highways or streams or the lands of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time, prescribe."

The board is directed by an act of the thirty-ninth general assembly to "undertake and carry forward such investigation and preparation as shall be necessary to properly represent the interests of the state in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission."

The thirty-ninth general assembly authorized the railroad commission upon application to them to issue to any warehouseman a license for the conduct of a bonded warehouse under the provisions of chapter 119, laws of the thirty-ninth general assembly, and such rules and regulations as might be made thereunder.

The fortieth general assembly conferred on the commission the power to issue certificates authorizing motor carriers to operate over the public highways of the state, upon a showing that the proposed service would promote "the public convenience" and authorized the board to prescribe rules and regulations for the operation of motor vehicles used by such carriers "for the protection and safety of the public." The forty-first general assembly revised the laws on this subject, but left their administration with the railroad commission.

The forty-third general assembly provided for the supervision or regulation by the commission of persons operating motor trucks principally used for the public transportation of freight for compensation, not operating over regular routes nor between fixed termini. It also provided that the cost of regulating truck operators



and motor carriers and the maintenance of the motor carrier department be paid from fees and taxes collected from such carriers.

Under the act of the forty-third general assembly before an airport is acquired by any city or town plans and specifications must be approved by the board.

#### COMMERCE COUNSEL

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the board of railroad commissioners for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the board of railroad commissioners.

The duties of the office briefly are as follows: legal advisor of board of railroad commissioners; investigate and present matters with reference to interstate rates to board, prosecute same before said board, or before any court to which same may be taken; investigate on his own motion, or at request of board, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested, and present same to interstate commerce commission and prosecute same to final determination; act as attorney for and represent board in all courts of this state or of the United States, in which the validity of any order of said board is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary to proper enforcement of any rule or order of said railroad commissioners or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be called in question.

The forty-fourth general assembly provided that pine lines shall be subject to regulation by the board under a permit issued by the board.

The commissioner of insurance is the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa and has direction of all insurance business transacted in the state and the execution of laws relating to insurance.

The commissioner is authorized to conduct examinations of insurance organizations transacting business in the state. Domestic companies, associations and societies are required to be so examined at least biennially. The companies are visited and the audits made in their offices.

All deposits required by law to be made with the state by any such company, association or society, are directly in charge of the commissioner and a careful record is kept thereof, showing each item. The amount of approved securities representing capital stock and the legal reserve value of policies of Iowa life companies and associations on deposit in this department on February 1, 1931, was \$386,717,869.00.

All fees due the state from insurance companies and associations are paid to the commissioner of insurance and turned over to the treasurer of state and placed in the general funds.

The commissioner passes upon the articles of incorporation of new insurance organizations. He has entire control over the organization of new insurance companies in the state. No policies may be sold in the state until the policy forms have been approved by him, and all agents appointed by the companies and associations to represent them in the state must be licensed by the insurance department.

The forty-third general assembly provided that in the event of a receivership for an insurance company the commissioner becomes receiver.

The superintendent of banking is the head of the banking department of Iowa and has general control, supervision and direction of all banks and trust companies incorporated under the laws of Iowa and he is charged with the execution of the laws of the state relating to banking, including the public funds deposit guaranty act passed by the forty-first general assembly.

The deputy superintendent and bank examiners are appointed by the superintendent of banking, and their salaries are fixed by him within certain limits prescribed by law. The banking department is self-supporting.

The superintendent of banking is ex-officio a member and chairman of the state banking board created by act of the forty-first general assembly. This board acts in an advisory capacity concerning all matters pertaining to the banking department and the Iowa banking laws. There are four other members, appointive by the governor, with compensation of \$10 a day and expenses while engaged in the state's business.

The work of the department of banking has increased greatly during the last few years on account of the superintendent of banking being the official receiver of all closed state and savings banks and trust companies. The total expense of all receivership trusts averages four and three-tenths per cent on the amount collected. The interest collected on notes and bank balances has been more than the total expense.

The duties of the reporter and editor are:

1. To submit such recommendations as he deems proper to each general assembly for the purpose of amending, revising and codifying such portions of the law as may be conflicting, redundant, or ambiguous, and to lay said recommendations before the presiding officers of each house.

2. To edit and compile the code after each even-numbered session of the general assembly so that the same may be printed.

3. To edit and prepare for publication a series of annotations of the statutes of Iowa containing annotations of all such statutes as have been construed by the supreme court of this state or the federal courts, and cause the same to be printed in separate volumes arranged in the same manner as the titles, chapters and sections of the code.

4. To prepare and cause to be published immediately following the issuance of the code in 1927, and every four years thereafter, a volume which shall by proper annotations show the construction placed by the supreme court of this state and the federal courts on all statutes of this state since the then existing permanent volume of annotations. The edition of 1931 and all subsequent volumes shall constitute a cumulation of the edition of 1927 and shall be so continued until said cumulation shall reach a size sufficient for a permanent volume.

5. To promptly prepare syllabi for all opinions of the supreme court and an index and proper tables for each volume of the reports.

The clerk of the supreme court shall have an office at the seat of government, keep a complete record of the proceedings of the court, file all printed matter and papers in pending cases, issue writs, orders and executions to carry out the directions of the supreme court, announce by mail to one of the attorneys on each side any ruling made or decision rendered, record every opinion rendered as soon as filed, and allow no opinions filed to be removed except by the reporter of the supreme court.

The clerk of the supreme court acts as secretary of the board of law examiners. All applications for admission to the bar are filed and recorded by him and certificates of admission to the bar are issued by the clerk. Each applicant for admission to the bar shall pay to the clerk of the supreme court an examination fee of \$5.00. Foreign attorneys admitted to the bar of this state on motion pay a fee of \$10.00. Out of the fees for the bar examination the clerk pays the board of law examiners their per diem on certificate of the attorney general.

Under a new statute the clerk pays the expense of disbarment proceedings out of the bar examination fees.

Since July 1, 1913, workmen's compensation has been provided for workmen injured in industrial pursuits, where such injury arises out of and in the course of the employment. Agricultural, clerical and domestic employment are excluded. Employers may insure with authorized companies for the payment of workmen's compensation, or upon a proper showing may be granted the right to carry their own insurance. All employers of labor are liable under the terms of law in any event. Compensation to injured workmen is upon the general basis of 60 per cent of the average wages or earnings with a maximum payment of \$15 per week. In case of disagreement between employers and employees provision is made for arbitration in which case the commissioner or his deputy is chairman of the arbitration committee. By agreement the two additional arbitrators may be dispensed with. The commissioner reviews appeals from the arbitration orders and there is provision for appeal to the district court and supreme court. There is a two-year time-limitation on claims for injuries. Employees of the state are compensated by the state and all counties and other political divisions of the state, except townships, are under the law. All employers are obligated to make reports

of accidents directly to the industrial commissioner and record is kept of all settlements. Where employers of labor reject the provision of the law, as provided by statute, they deprive themselves of common law defenses in damage cases. Settlements for injured workmen number about 5,000 annually.

The printing board has charge of all matters pertaining to state printing, including printing for institutions and officials outside of Des Moines. Contracts for all work and material are let on competitive bids. Appointive members of the board receive \$10 a day and expenses while engaged in state business.

The superintendent of printing is appointed by the board. He is ex-officio secretary of the board and its executive officer. He is in immediate charge of the work; has the custody and attends to the distribution and sale of codes, session laws, supreme court reports and public documents; supervises the compilation and publication of the session laws, the legislative bill index, and the official register. Also the journals of the house and senate are indexed under his supervision.

The staff of the commander-in-chief consists of an adjutant general, with rank of brigadier general, who is chief of staff, an assistant adjutant general, with

rank of major, and twelve aides who have the rank of lieutenant colonel, except that any person so appointed, who has held a higher rank for a period of one year or more in the guard may be appointed with the rank of the highest rank so held by him, or the thirteen aides may be detailed for such service from the active membership of the guard, but if so detailed they hold their rank in the guard and shall perform the duties of aide in addition to their regular duties.

The adjutant general is appointed by the governor. He issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all the general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military force and its duties. He holds office for a period of four years. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the general assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of this office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the national guard are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers of the Civil, Spanish-American, and World Wars are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia and national guard are given by him under the seal of the state. He is the disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the national guard and as adjutant general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the national guard, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the national guard of the state as the war department may from time to time require. As chief of staff he is to perform his duties as such officer as directed by the commander-in-chief or required by the laws of Iowa governing the national guard or by orders and regulations.

In addition to the duties above defined, the adjutant general also has the direction of the compilation of the roster for soldiers, sailors and marines in the Mexican border service of 1916-1917, and the World's War, 1917-1918 and 1919, and other historical data in connection with the World's War.

## POWERS AND DUTIES OF COMMISSIONER

The commissioner of public health as head of the state department of health exercises general supervision over the public health, promotes public hygiene and sanitation and unless otherwise provided enforces the laws relating to same. He



makes investigations and surveys in respect to causes of disease and epidemics and the effect of locality, employment and living conditions upon the public health. Also inspects sanitary conditions in any locality of the state upon written petition of five or more citizens and may issue directions for improvement of same.

He shall establish, publish and enforce a code of rules governing the installation of plumbing in cities and towns and amend the same when deemed necessary. He must exercise general supervision over the administration of the housing law and give aid to local authorities in enforcement of same. He must establish stations for the distribution of antitoxins and vaccines to physicians, druggists, and other persons at cost; exercise general supervision over the administration and enforcement of the venereal disease law; he has sole jurisdiction over the disposal and transportation of the dead bodies of human beings; he must exercise general supervision over the administration and enforcement of the vital statistics law and must establish and maintain such divisions in the department as are necessary for the proper enforcement of the laws administered by it.

#### POWERS AND DUTIES OF BOARD OF HEALTH

The board must recommend policies and practices to the department relative to any duty imposed upon it by law, which recommendations shall be given due consideration by the department; it must advise the department relative to causes of disease and epidemics, sanitary conditions, contagious and infectious diseases, venereal diseases, antitoxins and vaccines, housing and vital statistics; to advise or make recommendations to the governor and general assembly relative to public health, hygiene and sanitation.

The forty-second general assembly passed a bill requiring the licensing of barbers, and also one requiring the licensing of cosmetologists. Administration of these measures was placed within the State Department of Health.

The board is authorized to adopt rules of procedure for county health boards and specify their duties under the county health organization law passed by the forty-third general assembly. The forty-fourth general assembly provided a division of maternity and child hygiene.

The office of director of the budget was created by the fortieth general assembly, extra session, effective May 2, 1924. The director of the budget is appointed by the governor subject to confirmation by the senate.

The law provides for a state budget, for the examination, by the budget director, of the accounts of departments of state, for a review of public contracts and bond issues in certain cases, and for local budgets. The director is authorized to prescribe methods for enforcing and carrying out all of the provisions of the law, and to conduct hearings on all matters within his jurisdiction and render decisions thereon.

The first budget report to be prepared under the law was submitted to the governor and forty-first general assembly in January, 1925.

The budget report sets out in detail the actual expenditures for the preceding two bienniums, the estimated expenditures at the close of the biennium, the departmental askings for the succeeding two years and the budget director's estimates for the same period together with the governor's approval.

There is also submitted a state appropriation bill.

The director is a member of the state board of audit whose duty it is to audit claims for money due from the state.

The law further provides for an appeal board which shall consist of the director and two additional members. The two members to serve with the director are appointed by the governor in the same manner required for the appointment of the director and the term of office is four years. The director is chairman of the board. The board considers and determines appeals from the action of the state board of education, the state board of control and the state fair board, in respect to letting of contracts for buildings or other improvements in which the amount involved is in excess of \$25,000.

The statutes of Iowa provide the sentence of a prisoner convicted of a felony shall be for the maximum term provided for the crime committed thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the time of confinement. The board of parole is given authority to release on parole outside the prison, all prisoners, except those sentenced for life terms. Rules and regulations are provided which must be observed by the man while on parole, and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison.

The highway commission was first established in Iowa under chapter 105, acts of the thirtieth general assembly, which directed the Iowa State College as an institution to act as the highway commission for the state. In 1913 the thirty-fifth general assembly reorganized the entire system of road administration and created a highway commission of three members, one of whom should be the dean of engineering at Ames. In 1927 the forty-second general assembly increased the number of members of the commission to five and passed what is known as the state control law giving the commission full control over construction and maintenance of the primary road system and primary road fund. In addition to salary the commissioners receive expenses while on duty.

Under the secondary road bill passed by the forty-third general assembly the commission on request of a local board of supervisors shall advise with the board on the manner of constructing and maintaining secondary roads. Before a board of supervisors can issue anticipatory certificates it must "seek the advice of the state highway commission and issue said certificates to an amount not exceeding fifty per cent of the estimated funds which will accrue to the secondary road construction fund during any stated period of from one to two years.

Contracts for secondary road construction work estimated to cost \$2,000 or more per mile or more than \$5,000 in the aggregate must be first approved by the state highway commission.

Under a law passed by the forty-third general assembly all patrolmen and maintenance engineers are designated peace officers and have authority to arrest violators of the authorized rules, regulations and orders of the highway commission and of the law pertaining to the primary highways of the state.

The highway commission is required to file with the county auditor and recorder a map of the right of way on the completion of any primary road paving or grading project.

#### FUNCTIONS OF STATE FAIR BOARD

The Iowa State Fair as an institution has existed since the first fair was held at Fairfield October 25-26 and 27, 1854, but it remained for the fortieth general assembly in 1923 and the extra session thereof to set out the Iowa State Fair Board as a separate and distinct department.

Previous to 1923 the fair was operated under the state department of agriculture. The fortieth general assembly, however, created a new department of agriculture, consolidating therewith a number of other departments and at the extra session the law was passed creating the state fair board, effective October 28, 1924.

The law provides for a state agricultural convention to be held at the state capitol in Des Moines on the second Wednesday in December of each year. The delegates to this convention are the officers and members of the state fair board; the president, secretary or *accredited* delegate of each of the county and district fairs; the president or accredited representative of the following organizations; each farmers' institute organized according to law and receiving state aid; the State Horticultural Society; the Iowa State Dairy Association; the Iowa Beef Producers' Association and the Iowa Corn and Small Grain Growers' Association. In counties where no fair is held the board of supervisors may appoint a delegate.

The convention elects a president and a vice president for a term of one year, and a director from each congressional district for a term of two years. The directors from the even numbered districts are elected on the even year and those from the odd numbered districts on the odd year. The secretary and treasurer are elected annually by the state fair board. The law fixes the compensation of the president, vice president and directors at ten dollars (\$10) per day and expenses while in attendance at board and committee meetings. The law also fixes the maximum amount to be paid the treasurer at \$250 and the secretary at \$5,000 annually.

By statute the state fair board is made the custodian of the state fair grounds and the board of managers of the annual state fair. The state makes no regular appropriations for the operating expenses of the state fair. The law specifically provides that all operating expense, maintenance, etc., shall be paid out of the receipts of the state fair unless there is a special appropriation providing for same. The law also provides that the state will not be liable for any debts incurred by the board. The state has appropriated since 1902, \$917,000 for buildings, \$93,013 for additional land, \$14,000 for sanitary sewer system, and \$28,280 for paving assessments against the grounds. In the same period \$216,700 has been appropriated for insurance premiums and maintenance of grounds and buildings.

During this same twenty-nine year period there has been expended from the fair receipts, \$942,759 for buildings and other improvements, \$235,299 for insurance premiums and maintenance of the grounds and buildings, and the entire operating expense of the fair amounting to \$6,564,719.00.

The inventory taken November 30, 1930, shows the present value of the grounds and buildings to be worth \$2,080,816.83. This inventory takes into consideration the original cost of all permanent buildings and other improvements with the usual annual depreciation. It is safe to say that the replacement value of buildings and other improvements would be more than double the amount carried in the inventory.

The title to the state fair grounds and all property is held in the name of the state of Iowa and all deeds and abstracts are on file in the auditor of state's office.

The general assembly in 1884 provided for the creation of the bureau of labor statistics, the appointment of a commissioner, defining his duties, and his tenure of office. The work as outlined was purely statistical and was designed for the purpose of making inquiry into the conditions surrounding the employment of labor, its connection with the development of industries both mechanical and those arising from the natural resources of the state, the advantages and inducements offered in various localities for the establishment of desirable industries, the extent and productive value of industries already established and information relative to the home life and general welfare of the workers.

The inspection of factories, mercantile establishments, theaters, buildings, etc., embracing employment of over a half million workers, is one of the most important services the bureau renders to the state.

Under jurisdiction of the bureau of labor are laws relating to health and safety in factories, work shops, mercantile establishments, theaters, elevators, etc., the fire escape law, child labor law, inspection of employment bureaus, both public and private, arbitration and conciliation, report of accidents.

Another service of the bureau is that rendered by the state free employment bureau.

The office of state fire marshal was created by an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly. The principal duties of the fire marshal are to investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring in the state; to determine if any buildings or structures, by reason of want of proper repair or by reason of age and dilapidated conditions, are especially liable to fire and to order their repair or removal; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month and instruct the pupils at least four times a year in the causes

and dangers of fires; to make an annual report to the governor. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the fire marshal suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the state fire marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire he shall cause such person to be arrested. Reports are required to be made to the fire marshal by all chiefs of fire departments of each and every fire, and where there is no established fire department the report is to be made by mayors and by township clerks outside of incorporated cities and towns.

After eleven years' feeble existence as a territorial library, Iowa's state library came into being as such in 1848.

The territorial library in its time had two distinguished librarians, James Clark, afterward governor of the territory of Iowa, and Theodore S. Parvin, afterward founder of the Masonic library, Cedar Rapids, and author of many valuable contributions to Iowa history.

While the state library's legal existence began with the year 1848—eighty-three years ago, its existence as a general library began seventy-nine years ago. It owes its enlargement to the foresight and persistence of Governor Hempstead, and the liberal views of a majority of the fourth general assembly.

In 1898, fifty years after the birth of the state library, the present incumbent on entering upon his duties found the number of volumes of record in both departments of the library to be 57,501. Of these 2,500 were included in the traveling library section. In 1900 these were turned over to the Iowa library commission, thus reducing the number to 55,001.

Thirty-three resultful years have elapsed since then.

In 1900, "the miscellaneous portion of the state library" was consolidated with the historical department; but that department was placed under direct supervision of the library board and not made a department of the state library.

The total number of books of record, as per inventory, in the several departments of the state library on June 30, 1928, was -----203,640  
The total additions to the several departments during the period ending June 30, 1930, was -----11,713  
These additions make a grand total of books in the state library, June 30, 1930, of -----215,353

The additions during the last biennial period by departments are as follows:

Figures do not alone attest the growth of a library in usefulness; but they do show the physical growth and strength. As has already been shown in the two departments in existence in 1898, when the present incumbent entered upon his duties as state librarian, there were of record 55,001 volumes. In the four departments in operation in 1930—thirty-three years later—there were of record 215,353 volumes.

In the early days when there were few libraries in the state, assistance was given in establishing libraries, but inasmuch as there are only two or three towns remaining without libraries, which are large enough to support one, the attention of the commission, and therefore of the secretary, is now being given to extension through county libraries and in creating interest and giving information concerning that form of library service.

Assistance is also given to existing libraries by visits for conferences with boards and librarians, and by correspondence and library publications.

The second activity of the commission is the traveling library from which books are loaned to schools, communities, small libraries to supplement their own collections, and to individuals.

For the two-year period beginning July 1, 1929, the appropriation for the commission for maintenance and operation was \$24,320.

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The department, founded July 1, 1892, has for its chief purpose the collection of historical data relating to Iowa and the territory of the middle west, the care-taking of the public archives and the stimulation of private and public enterprise in noting and commemorating through artistic means notable achievements of Iowa citizens. The department publishes the Annals of Iowa, an illustrated quarterly historical magazine of eighty pages. It also issues from time to time publications of historical interest. Portraits of distinguished Iowans are secured and hung in the art gallery.

Since January, 1918, the department has engaged in assembling original materials relating to the contribution of Iowa in the world war and the collections include invaluable material.

In the library division of the historical department special efforts are made to collect works of state and general western history, biography and genealogy, war histories, works relating to the North American Indians, county histories, maps, Iowa pamphlets, biographies, documents relating to early settlers and settlements and every species of data which can throw light upon local, state, or western history.

The museum includes many remarkable specimens of mammals and birds mounted by the director, who is a taxidermist. The mammals include moose, buffalo, elk, deer, wolves, foxes and other animals. There are several large cases of mounted birds such as eagles, pelicans, loons, and wild turkeys. Indian relics and handiwork, weapons used in the nation's wars, historic medals, pottery and many other items are preserved. The museum is open to visitors every day in the year.

## NEWSPAPER DIVISION

Special efforts are made to collect Iowa newspapers from the earliest dates to the present time. Three hundred weeklies and thirty dailies are currently received and the department endeavors to acquire all Iowa newspapers. It has ceased the collection of papers from other states, with the exception of the New York Times.

## PUBLIC ARCHIVES DIVISION

The public archives material is derived from the state departments, boards, bureau, etc., and dates from 1838 down to a ten-year period prior to the date of removal. These materials are taken from the vaults, garrets and storage places and in most cases they are a chaotic mass covered with dust and dirt. These must all be read, classified, cleansed, repaired, filed and indexed.

Organized in January, 1857, its purposes are to preserve the history of Iowa and further its dissemination among the people of the state. In fulfillment of these purposes a permanent program of activities has been gradually developed and put into execution. This includes (1) the discovery, collection, and preservation of materials of Iowa history; (2) researches in the field of Iowa history; (3) publication of the materials of Iowa history; (4) dissemination of the materials of Iowa history through public depositories and members. The library of the society now includes about 80,000 titles. There are more than fourteen hundred active members and twenty-nine auxiliary members. The official depositories within the state number one hundred and eighty-two.

The thirty-seventh general assembly created the state board of conservation consisting of four members of which the curator of the state historical department was an ex-officio member. Subsequently the legislature amended the act, providing a board of five members appointed by the governor. The secretary of the executive council is ex-officio secretary of the board.

The state board of conservation makes recommendations for the purchases of park areas and has entire charge of the management of these parks. The executive council either approves or rejects the recommendations. The board also has jurisdiction over the meandered streams and lakes in the state, the construction of dams and the improvement of lakes.

The parks are created for four purposes: first, recreational; second, scientific; third, historical; fourth, scenic. Donations have been made by public spirited citizens as at Ft. Defiance, Eldora-Pine Creek, Lacey-Keosauqua, Lepley, Pilot Knob, Ledges, Dolliver Memorial, Farmington, Oak Grove, King, Wild Cat Den, Ambrose A. Call, Bixby, Bellevue, Barkley Preserve, T. F. Clark, Clear Lake, Elbert Tract, Flint Hills, Lost Island, Oakland Mills, Okamanpedan, Palisades-Keppler, Pammel, Pilot Knob, Rice Lake, Storm Lake, Wall Lake, Waubonsie, Wapispinicon, Wood Thrush Preserve, Woodman Hollow Preserve.

Under act of the forty-fourth general assembly, the board of conservation and the fish and game commission, with a joint fund of \$25,000, are instructed to recommend within two years a state-wide twenty-five year program for state parks, fish hatcheries and recreational areas.

All persons who shall desire to conduct the business of selling at retail, compounding or dispensing drugs, etc., for medical use, must be registered pharmacists and their names registered in a book kept by the board for that purpose, showing also their residence, together with the date of issuing their certificate. Fee examination and certificate, \$10.00. The license fee for itinerant vendor of drugs is \$100 a year. The *penalty* for selling without a vendor license is \$10 to \$100.

The state board for vocational education was established by the thirty-seventh general assembly in the act accepting the terms of the federal law on vocational education commonly known as the Smith-Hughes Act.

The membership of the board is ex-officio. The board co-operates with public schools in formation of day classes in agriculture, trade and industries, and home-making. Also in each of these lines part-time and evening classes are conducted by public schools working with the board.

In all cases mentioned above the districts receive reimbursement on teachers' salaries from federal funds alone.

The board also co-operates with the proper authorities at Iowa State College at Ames in preparing teachers of the above subjects.

The thirty-ninth general assembly approved the federal law of June 2, 1920, called the industrial rehabilitation act, for operation in Iowa. By the federal law the state board for vocational education became the board for conducting rehabilitation for all eligible disabled cases excepting those coming directly under the federal government for persons disabled as a result of enlisted service in army and navy.

The forty-fourth general assembly created the state fish and game commission to take over the work heretofore done by the state fish and game department. The commission was also given power to acquire areas in which persons may hunt, fish and trap.

Under act of the forty-fourth general assembly, the board of conservation and the fish and game commission, with a joint fund of \$25,000, are instructed to recommend within two years a state-wide twenty-five year program for state parks, fish hatcheries and recreational areas.

The members of the board receive as compensation \$10 per diem for the time actually employed and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties. Under the provisions of the law the board meets at least once annually to examine persons desiring to practice in Iowa as certified public accountants and issue certificates to those qualifying. The office of state mine inspector was created by the eighteenth general assembly in the year 1880. The entire time of the inspectors is taken up with the work of inspecting the mines of the state and seeing that they are worked in conformity with the mining laws of the state as regards safety to the employees therein, proper ventilation, condition of the shafts, escape ways in times of danger, safety catches on cages, condition of the cables for hoisting men and coal, and everything that would tend to guard against accidents to men employed in the mines.

A general office for the inspectors is maintained in the state house and a complete record is kept therein of all inspections, accidents, etc., in record books for that purpose. A monthly report of the general conditions of all mines is made to the mine inspectors and a general report of the conditions of the mines of the state, tonnage, accidents, number of employees, and other information relative to the coal industry, is published every two years. Copies of the state mining laws are also published and circulated. Blue prints of maps of all mines in the state, brought up to date once each year, are on file in the offices of the mine inspectors subject to public inspection. A secretary, elected by the inspectors, has charge of the general correspondence and books in the office, as the duties of the three inspectors keep them almost constantly in the field.

The state board of mine examiners was created by the twenty-second general assembly, and is composed of five members; two coal operators, two miners, and one engineer. Their duties are to examine and issue certificates to those qualified to act as state mine inspectors, hoisting engineers and mine foremen. An examination for state mine inspectors is held the first Monday in March in even-numbered years in the office of the state mine inspectors in the state house. Examinations for hoisting engineers and mine foremen are held at various times during the year in different parts of the state. A fee of two dollars for registration, and an additional fee of two dollars is required of those taking and passing the examination for mine foremen and hoisting engineers. The law requires that each certificate issued by the board shall be recorded in the office of the examining board, and shall show the name, age, residence and years of experience of the person to whom it was issued.

The present geological survey was organized in 1892 and since that time has been engaged in two lines of research. The first of these is the detailed study of the geology of the state by counties. In this work all the natural features of interest and value are studied and described, such as the general character of the surface, its soils, water courses, deposits of valuable minerals and other topics.

The second line of work has been that of special investigation of the minerals of the state. In this work studies have been made of the coal and peat beds, lead and zinc, gypsum, clays and shales, limestone and sandstone, and the surface and underground water resources. The different geological formations are being studied as units.

For several years past the state survey has co-operated with the national survey in the making of topographic maps of the Des Moines valley. These maps show character of the surface, the drainage, and elevations above sea level, as well as cultural features. They are of especial value in coal prospecting, engineering and drainage prospects.

The Iowa commission for the blind was created by the forty-first general assembly. Under the law the commission "shall consist of the superintendent of the state school for the blind and two other members to be appointed by the governor." The commission must prepare and maintain a complete register of the blind of the state; assist in marketing products of blind workers; ameliorate the condition of the blind by promoting visits to them in their homes for the purpose of instruction; make inquiries concerning causes of blindness to ascertain what portion of such cases are preventable; discourage begging; provide for suitable vocational training whenever the commission shall deem it advisable and necessary and establish workshops for the employment of the blind.

The board of control of state institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the twenty-seventh general assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the following named institutions:

Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown; Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport; Institution for Feeble-Minded Children at Glenwood; State Sanatorium for the Treatment of Tuberculosis at Oakdale; Training School for Boys at Eldora; Training School for Girls at Mitchellville; Mount Pleasant State Hospital at Mount Pleasant; Independence State Hospital at Independence; Clarinda State Hospital at Clarinda; Cherokee State Hospital at Cherokee; Hospital for Female Inebriates at Mount Pleasant; Hospital for Male Inebriates at Independence; State Penitentiary at Fort Madison; Men's Reformatory at Anamosa; Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City; Hospital for Epileptics and School for Feeble-Minded at Woodward; Juvenile Home, Toledo

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept, associations and societies receiving friendless children and detention homes provided for juvenile offenders.



Prior to July 1, 1898, the foregoing state institutions, except the reformatory and penitentiary, were in charge of separate boards, each of which had its officers and each had a secretary and treasurer.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control. At that time the various boards of trustees and commissioners ceased to exist.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial condition of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the board or its agent is required to visit each hospital for insane once each month. The board is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to publish a bulletin, to require official bonds of certain institution officers, to make a semi-annual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to perform other duties provided by law.

The board of education of nine members is appointed by the governor for six-year terms, subject to approval by the senate. The board chooses from outside its own membership a finance committee of three members. The committee selects its president and secretary, the secretary of the committee also serving as secretary of the board, his compensation being \$4,000 a year. The committee members receive \$3,600 a year. The secretary is in charge of the general offices and has his office at the seat of government.

There is appropriated \$5,400 a year for compensation for members of the Board. This is drawn by board members at the rate of \$10 for each day devoted to the business of the board.

The educational institutions in charge of the board are: Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts, Ames; State University of Iowa, Iowa City; Iowa State Teachers' College, Cedar Falls; Iowa School for the Blind, Vinton; Iowa School for the Deaf, Council Bluffs.

#### IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND—VINTON

Superintendent, Francis Eber Palmer; physician, J. E. Luckey, M.D.; and visiting ophthalmic surgeon, head of Department, State University.

The aim and purpose of the Iowa School for the Blind is purely educational. The course of study includes not only the subjects leading up to and required for admission to the colleges and the university of the state, but also subjects that aim to prepare our students for some of the occupations in which it has been demonstrated that the blind are usually successful. After a pupil of this school reaches the high school department, he is given some latitude in the choice of courses of study, and in the making of his choice he always has the guidance and advice of teachers and matrons. However, the courses are so arranged that a student who chooses one course, say, one of the vocational courses of study, has the benefit of subjects in other courses. In fact, both literary and industrial work is required of all students, besides some music.

#### IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF—COUNCIL BLUFFS

##### HISTORICAL

The Iowa School for the deaf was founded in 1885, in answer to the demand that the deaf children of the state be given the same opportunity for an education that was provided for those who could hear. Because such deaf children are fewer and very much scattered, as well as to secure better grading, it was found more economical to get them together and provide board as well as tuition. The school was first located at Iowa City and later moved to Council Bluffs. In 1902 fire completely destroyed the main building which housed the executive quarters and dormitories for pupils. A substantial fireproof structure now stands in its place where sufficient room is provided for 300 pupils. A separate building to accommodate seventy-two of the younger pupils is also provided. More than ninety per cent of the pupils are taught by means of the oral method, which employs for the purpose, speech, lip-reading and writing. A well equipped industrial department is maintained for the purpose of teaching trades. Students become skilled workmen and graduates, with remarkably few exceptions, are self-supporting, useful citizens of the state.

## SUPREME COURT OF IOWA

## ORGANIZATION

The supreme court consists of nine judges, five of whom constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but one alone may adjourn from day to day, or to a particular day, or until the next term.

Through a provision passed by the forty-fourth general assembly, the senior in time of service is chief justice for six months instead of a year as formerly and so on in rotation until all judges shall have been chief justice.

## JURISDICTION

The supreme court has appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery and constitutes a court for the correction of errors at law. It has appellate jurisdiction over all judgments and decisions of all courts of record, except as otherwise provided by law.

An appeal may also be taken to the supreme court from:

1. An order made affecting a substantial right in an action, when such order, in effect, determines the action and prevents a judgment from which an appeal might be taken.
2. A final order made in special actions affecting a substantial right therein, or made on a summary application in an action for judgment;
3. An order which grants or refuses, continues or modifies a provisional remedy; grants or refuses, dissolves or refuses to dissolve an injunction or attachment; or grants or refuses a new trial; or sustains or overrules a demurrer;
4. An intermediate order involving the merits or materially affecting the final decision;
5. An order or judgment on habeas corpus.

If any of the above orders or judgments are made or rendered by a judge, the same are reviewable, the same as if made by a court.

The supreme court has power to issue all writs and processes necessary to secure justice to parties, and to enforce its appellate jurisdiction, and it may exercise supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals.

It may enforce its mandates upon inferior courts and officers by fine and imprisonment, which imprisonment may continue until mandates are obeyed.

#### SALARY

The salary of each justice is \$7,500 a year. Each general assembly also appropriates sufficient funds for the payment of stenographers, bailiffs and such other incidental expenses as may be incurred by the court.

### THE DISTRICT COURT OF IOWA

There are at the present time seventy judges of the district court of the state of Iowa. The state is divided into twenty-one judicial districts and each district is entitled to from one to six judges, the number being fixed by statute. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary of \$4,000; by act of the forty-third general assembly increased to \$5,000, the increase, under the constitution, not to apply to any sitting judge during the term for which he had been elected. Also district judges receive necessary hotel expenses not to exceed \$3 per day when away from home, and transportation expenses. Each judge appoints a shorthand reporter, who receives \$10 per day for each day's attendance upon said court, and in case the per diem does not equal \$2,400, then the county or counties composing the district make up the deficiency in proportion to the number of days of court held in such county or counties.

The following is in sections 10761 to 10766 of the code governing the jurisdiction of the district court.

The district court shall have general original and exclusive jurisdiction of all actions, proceedings and remedies, both civil and criminal, except in cases where exclusive or concurrent jurisdiction is or may hereafter be conferred upon some other court or tribunal by the constitution and laws of the state, and shall have and exercise all the powers usually possessed and exercised by courts of record. It shall also possess and exercise jurisdiction in all appeals and writs of error taken in civil and criminal actions and special proceedings authorized to be taken from all inferior courts, tribunals, boards or officers, under any provisions of the laws of this state, and shall have a general supervision thereof, in all matters, to prevent and correct abuses, where no other remedy is provided.

The district court of each county shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction to probate the wills of, and to grant administration upon the estates of, all persons who at the time of their death were residents of the county and of non-residents of the state who die leaving property within the county subject to administration, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

To appoint guardians of the persons and property of all persons resident in the county subject to guardianship.

To appoint guardians of the property of all such persons non-residents of the state who have property within the county subject to guardianship or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

It shall have jurisdiction in all matters in relation to the appointment of executors and trustees, and the management and disposition of the property of and settlement of such estates; *provided*, that where jurisdiction has heretofore been acquired, the same shall be retained until such estate is closed.

The district court shall succeed to and exercise full authority and jurisdiction over the records of the circuit court, and may enforce all judgments, decrees and orders thereof in the same manner and to the same extent as it may exercise like jurisdiction and authority over its own records, and for the purpose of the issuance of process, and of any and all other acts necessary to the due and efficient enforcement of the orders, judgments and decrees of the circuit court, the records thereof shall be deemed records of the district court.

Transcripts and process from the judgments, decrees and records of the circuit court shall be issued by the clerk of the district court and under the seal of his office.

## MUNICIPAL COURTS

Any city, whether organized under a special charter, commission form of government or the general law for the incorporation of cities or towns, now or hereafter having a population of five thousand or more, as shown by the last preceding state or United States census, may establish a municipal court. All civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located shall constitute the municipal court district.

The salary of municipal court judge is \$3,000 in cities with population less than 30,000, \$3,400 with population between 30,000 and less than 75,000, \$3,600 with population 75,000 or over. Compensation of court reporter is fixed by the judge at not to exceed \$8.00 per day. Salary of clerk is \$1,800, \$2,200 and \$2,600 according to population of city as above indicated.

*Jurisdiction.* Municipal courts have concurrent jurisdiction with the district court in all civil matters, where the amount in controversy does not exceed one thousand dollars, except in probate matters, actions for divorce, alimony, separate maintenance, those directly affecting the title to real estate, and juvenile proceedings unless otherwise authorized.

In all criminal matters the court shall exercise the jurisdiction conferred on justice of the peace courts, mayor's courts, and police courts, except that the mayor's court of any incorporated city or town within such municipal court district other than the city in which said court is established shall have exclusive jurisdiction of prosecutions for violations of city ordinances.

In all matters of which the municipal court has jurisdiction, it has the same powers in reference to injunctions, writs, orders and other proceedings in and out of court as are possessed by the district court and the judges thereof.

## SUPERIOR COURTS

The statutes provide that any city containing four thousand inhabitants, may establish a superior court. There are at present six such courts, located as follows: Cedar Rapids, Grinnell, Iowa Falls, Keokuk, Oelwein and Shenandoah. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which court is located. Salary of judge, \$2,000 per annum in cities up to 25,000 population; \$3,000 in cities of 25,000 up to 40,000, and \$3,750 in cities of 40,000 or more.

The judges appoint a shorthand reporter, whose compensation is fixed by order of the court not exceeding \$8.00 per day for the time actually employed.

The following is a copy of sections 10704 and 10705 of the code, governing the jurisdiction of the superior court:

Said court shall have jurisdiction concurrent with the district court in all civil matters except in probate matters and actions for divorce, alimony, and separate maintenance.

It shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to try and determine all actions, civil and criminal, for the violation of city ordinances and all jurisdiction conferred on police courts as now or as may hereafter be provided by law and concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace.

## THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

The legislative department of the state of Iowa is vested in a general assembly, which consists of a senate and house of representatives.

The senate consists of fifty members. Senators are elected for terms of four years; twenty-one senators being elected at one general election and twenty-nine at the next.

The house of representatives consists at present of one hundred and eight members, who are elected for a term of two years.

Sessions of the general assembly are held biennially in the odd-numbered years, and they commence on the second Monday of January.

The compensation of the members of the forty-fourth general assembly was \$1,000 for the session. This is in accordance with an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly which went into effect July 4, 1911. They were also allowed five cents a mile from their homes to the capital and return for traveling expenses. Members are permitted to draw such stationery as they need during the session, the cost to the state for the supplies varying from \$1.50 to \$14.00 per member. No allowance is permitted for postage. The forty-third general assembly passed an act allowing each member of the assembly not to exceed \$500 per session to cover expenses while attending the session.

The lieutenant governor is the presiding officer of the senate. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session of the forty-fourth general assembly.

The speaker of the house is chosen by the members from among their own membership. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session.

The lieutenant governor appoints all committees in the senate and the speaker of the house all committees in the house.

In the regular proceedings of the senate motions made by members are not seconded but are put directly by the presiding officer, the formality of a second being waived. In the house all motions are seconded before being placed before the house by the speaker.

Sessions in both branches of the general assembly are opened by prayer. No regular chaplains are employed, but ministers from Des Moines and elsewhere over the state are assigned dates for these services and are allowed \$5 for each opening prayer.

Bills passed are re-written (enrolled) by the enrolling clerk of the branch of the general assembly where the bill originates; they are then signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house in presence of these respective bodies, in open session; then by the governor, if meeting with his approval, and then are filed with the secretary of state. Following adjournment they are printed under the direction of the superintendent of printing.

## BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE OFFICERS

**DAN W. TURNER.**—Governor. Born in Corning, Adams county, Iowa, March 17, 1877. Educated in Corning public schools and Corning Academy. Served in Spanish-American war, May 30th, 1898 to November 2nd, 1899, Philippine expedition. Ten years in Iowa national guard. Member state senate in thirtieth, thirty-first and thirty-second general assemblies. Farmer and merchant. Married, three children. Elected governor, November, 1930. Republican.

**ARCH W. McFARLANE.**—Lientenant Governor, was born in Waterloo, Iowa, April 14, 1885, educated in the public schools, and was graduated from high school in 1904. Was married April 6, 1908, to Miss Elsie V. Hawkins. He is now engaged in the wholesale fuel business, with headquarters at Waterloo. Is a member of Christ Episcopal church, being a vestryman of that church. Is a member of the various branches of the Masonic order, including El-Kahir shrine, Knights of Pythias, Elks, Loyal Order of Moose, and is a supreme officer of the United Commercial Travelers. Elected a member of the Iowa house of representatives in 1914, re-elected in 1916-18 and 1920. Was speaker pro tem of the thirty-seventh general assembly; speaker of the house of the thirty-eighth, thirty-eighth special and thirty-ninth general assemblies. Elected to the senate in 1926 as a member of the forty-second general assembly. Was nominated for lieutenant governor by the state central committee in 1928, elected lieutenant governor in the November election of that year and re-elected in November, 1930. In politics he is a republican.

**G. C. GREENWALT.**—Secretary of State, was born at Hastings, Mills county, Iowa, March 23, 1889. His father, L. L. Greenwalt, was born in Fremont county, Iowa; his mother, Lula Wood Greenwalt, is a native of Kansas. He attended the public schools of Hastings, graduating from the high school in 1907. He entered Simpson College, Indianola, graduating from the department of business in 1911. He taught and coached athletic teams in the Creston high school and in 1913 was appointed instructor in North high school, Des Moines, where he remained until May, 1917, when he entered service in the World War. In August, 1917, he was commissioned second lieutenant infantry and was assigned to the 88th Division, at Camp Dodge, Iowa. In July, 1918, he was promoted to first lieutenant and went to France with his division. He was returned to United States and honorably discharged in August, 1919. When the Iowa national guard was re-organized after the war, he was commissioned captain and assigned to command Company A 168th infantry. In May, 1923, he was promoted to major and since that date has commanded the first battalion 168th infantry. After leaving the service in 1919 he again took up school work at East high school, Des Moines. In 1922 he was appointed to an administrative position with the United States Veterans Bureau, which he held until 1930. He was married in August, 1917, to Margherita Cook, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Cook, formerly of Hampton. They have three sons. He is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, the American Legion, and the Masonic order. A republican in politics.

**J. W. LONG.**—Auditor of State, was born on a farm in Ringgold county, Iowa, June 26, 1873. He received his early education in the rural schools, attended Simpson college, Indianola, Iowa, and Western Normal college, Shenandoah, Iowa, graduating from the latter in 1896. He taught in rural schools two years; served as superintendent of city schools for five years; and was elected county superintendent of Decatur county, Iowa, in 1906; re-elected in 1908 and again in 1910. Moved to Ames, Story county, Iowa, in 1916, and became a traveling salesman for county officials' supplies, until elected auditor of state November 2, 1926. He was married June 22, 1898, to Emma M. Laney, of Decatur, Iowa, and has a family of three

sons and one daughter. They are James D., Lois Margery, Lewis T. and Lyman W. He is a member of the Methodist church and the Masonic order. A republican in politics.

**RAYMOND E. JOHNSON.**—Treasurer of State, was born in Wilton Junction, Muscatine county, Iowa, March 26, 1886. Son of Silas L. and Nellie E. Johnson. Moved to Muscatine in 1894 and graduated from public schools there. Appointed deputy treasurer of Muscatine county January, 1908, and in January, 1910, was appointed county treasurer to fill vacancy. He served as treasurer of Muscatine county for five terms and resigned February 1, 1920, to accept the position of secretary of the state executive council. Elected treasurer of state in November, 1924. Married May 22, 1907, to Edna I. Ryan of Muscatine, Iowa. Has one son, Charles S., and one daughter, Janet. A republican in politics.

**M. G. THORNBURG.**—Secretary of Agriculture, was born in Linden, Dallas county, Iowa. Educated in country school in Dallas county and the Des Moines high school; entered Iowa State college in 1900, spending two years. Married Blanche Scholes of Des Moines, 1904. From 1902 to 1908 associated with his father in farming and stock business. Re-entered college in 1908, graduating from the animal husbandry course of Iowa State College in 1910. As a student was a member of the Royal and International live stock judging teams. Received professional degree of master of agriculture in 1920 from the same institution. Member of the animal husbandry faculty of Iowa State college. Enlisted in world war in March, 1918. Commissioned captain remount service in August. After being discharged in March, 1919, took up the management of several farms in Palo Alto county. Appointed assistant secretary of agriculture in June, 1923. Appointed by Governor Kendall as secretary of agriculture in July, 1924, to fill the office made vacant through the death of Raymond W. Cassady. Elected secretary of agriculture, general election in the fall of 1924, re-elected in 1926, 1928 and 1930. Republican in politics.

**JOHN FLETCHER.**—Attorney General, was born in Scott county, Iowa, January 5, 1876. Educated in a country school, the Iowa State Teachers college, and the law department of the state university. Admitted to the practice of law in 1899. Practicing attorney at Avoca ten years, during which time he held the positions of city attorney and mayor. In 1910 he moved to Des Moines as assistant attorney general to Attorney General H. W. Byers. He continued to serve as assistant attorney general to Attorney General George Cosson, and later with Attorney General Ben J. Gibson. In May, 1925, he was appointed by Governor Hammill as a judge of the district court of Polk county, Iowa, where he presided over the court of domestic relations. He was married June 14, 1905, to Miss Marie D. Schmidt, of Avoca, Iowa, now deceased. He has three children, Maurice, Warren and Margaret. Republican in politics.

**AGNES SAMUELSON.**—Superintendent of Public Instruction, born in Page county, Iowa. Graduate Shenandoah high school, Western Normal college, and State University of Iowa. Phi Beta Kappa. Professional experience as rural teacher, high school principal, town superintendent, county superintendent, and member of faculty of Iowa State Teachers college as extension worker in rural schools. Professional membership in National Council of Education, board of directors of rural department of National Education Association and of National Council of Women in Administration in National Council of State Superintendents and Commissioners of Education. National Society for the Study of Education. Active in various civic, social and service organizations, and in school and church work.

**ELMA G. ALBERT.**—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born June 5, 1866, near Gettysburg, Pennsylvania; came to Iowa in 1870. Graduated from the law department of Drake University in June, 1891, and entered upon the practice of law. County attorney of Greene county, Iowa, for six years commencing January 1, 1900. District judge of the 16th judicial district from January 1, 1915, until elected to supreme bench in November, 1924.

**LAWRENCE DE GRAFF.**—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Apple River, Illinois, June, 1871. Educated at Morgan Park academy, Dixon College (A.B.). University of Chicago (Ph.B.), Northern Illinois college of law (LL.M.) Began the practice of law in Chicago, and removed to Des Moines in 1898 as secretary and instructor in the Highland Park college of law, and entered upon the practice in Des Moines with the firm of Miller, Wallingford and De Graff. First assistant attorney general of Iowa under Hon. Chas. W. Mullan, 1904-1907. County attorney, Polk county, Iowa 1907-1910. District judge, ninth judicial district, 1910-1921. Elected justice of the supreme court 1920; re-elected second term 1926. Married Grace L. Clark August 4, 1901; two children, Lawrence, Jr., age 21, and Barbara, age 15. Author of several legal textbooks. Republican in politics. Resides at 4920 Country Club boulevard, Des Moines, Iowa.

**WILLIAM D. EVANS.**—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Marquette county, Wis., 1852. In 1858 he came with his parents to Williamsburg, Iowa. Here he attended the public schools. In 1873 he entered the state university. While a student at the university he taught school and was an instructor in a number of teachers' institutes during vacation. He graduated from the liberal arts course of the university in 1878 and the following year took the law course from which he graduated in 1879. Following his admittance to the bar in 1879, he located at Hampton. In 1902 he was elected judge of the district court for the eleventh judicial district. During the year 1907-8 he was law lecturer at the state university. In September, 1908, he was nominated for judge of the supreme court by the republican state convention to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Charles A. Bishop. He was elected at the general election and by reason of statute served as chief justice of the supreme court in 1909, 1916, 1921, and 1927. Was re-elected in 1910, in 1916, in 1922 and again in 1928. Grinnell college conferred the degree of LL.D. upon him in 1916. He is a republican in politics.

**FREDERICK F. FAVILLE.**—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Mitchell county, Iowa. He attended the public schools at Mitchell, Iowa, and later the Cedar Valley seminary at Osage, Iowa. He attended Iowa State college at Ames, from which he graduated with the degree of bachelor of science. He attended the law department of the university of Maryland at Baltimore and completed his course in law at the State University of Iowa in 1891. After being admitted to the bar, he began the practice of law at Sioux Rapids, Iowa, and moved from there to Storm Lake in 1895. He served two terms as county attorney of Buena Vista county. He was presidential elector from the eleventh congressional district in 1904. In 1907 he was appointed by President Roosevelt as United States attorney for the northern district of Iowa, and served in that office over six years. In 1918 he moved to Fort Dodge, Iowa, and continued the practice of law. In 1920 he was elected to the supreme bench, and re-elected in 1926. By reason of statute chief justice in 1925 and 1931. Republican in politics.

**JOHN M. GRIMM.**—Judge of Supreme Court, was born in Henry county, Illinois, December 21, 1866. In 1877 he removed with relatives to a farm near Williamsburg, Iowa, where he attended the country school. In 1880 he attended the high school at Marengo, from which institution he later graduated. He entered the liberal arts department of the University of Iowa at Iowa City and graduated in June, 1889. He graduated from the law department of the University of Iowa in 1890 and immediately thereafter began to practice law at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, under the firm name of Rothrock and Grimm, the senior member of the firm being James H. Rothrock, Jr., a son of James H. Rothrock, Sr., then on the supreme bench of Iowa. He was elected county attorney of Linn county in the fall of 1892 and held that office for three consecutive terms. After Mr. Rothrock, Jr., went on the superior court bench, the firm became Preston, Grimm and Moffit. When Mr. Preston and Mr. Moffit went on the district bench, the firm name became Grimm and Trewin. Later the firm name became Grimm, Wheeler, Elliott and Jay, and afterwards Grimm, Wheeler, Elliott and Shuttleworth. He had charge of nine counties, comprising the seventh federal reserve district in Iowa during the war,



handling both certificates of indebtedness and the bonds of the third, fourth and fifth loans. He served as a member of the board of directors of the Iowa state chamber of commerce; as president of the alumni association of the state university and as a member of the board of directors, a member of the executive committee and the building committee of the Iowa Memorial Union at Iowa City, and also as its president. Was president of Iowa State Bar Association for the year ending June, 1930. A member of the executive committee of the judicial section of the American Bar Association. Member of the Delta Tau Delta college fraternity. A republican in politics. He was appointed by Governor Hammill as a justice of the supreme court February 13, 1929, and was elected in 1930.

**JAMES W. KINDIG.**—Judge of Supreme Court. Born at Welton, Clinton county, Iowa, December 3, 1879. Moved to Woodbury county with his parents in March, 1887, and attended the public schools. Graduated from Morningside academy in 1902, and received the degree of A.B. from Morningside college in 1906, and the degree of LL.B. from the University of Washington in 1907 and the degree LL.D. from Morningside college in 1930. Entered the practice of law at Sioux City in June, 1907. Was assistant county attorney of Woodbury county and advisor of the board of supervisors from January 1, 1915, until August, 1, 1917. Was assistant attorney general of Iowa under Hon. H. M. Havner in 1917 and 1918, and then again entered the general practice of law in Sioux City. Was appointed justice of the supreme court April 19, 1927. Elected November, 1928, for six year term. Married Gertrude Crossan September 3, 1908. Has two children, Burdette and Lowell.

**EDGAR A. MORLING.**—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Boonville, New York, April 21, 1864. Graduated Albany Law school and admitted to the bar at Albany, New York, 1886. Practiced one year in New York state. From 1887 to 1889 engaged in legal editorial work at St. Paul, Minnesota. Came to Emmetsburg, Iowa, in 1889, and has ever since resided there, engaged in the practice of law until appointed to office of justice supreme court October 1, 1925, by Governor Hammill. Elected 1926 to fill balance of term of the late Justice Arthur. Re-elected in 1930. Married 1888 to Flora B. Tripp, who died October 6, 1920. Four children, William E. Morling (died October 29, 1926), Mrs. Ruth M. Shover, Max M. and Maynard A. Morling.

**TRUMAN S. STEVENS.**—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Tama county, Iowa, in 1868. Attended the public schools, the Guthrie county high school; graduated from the law department of the state university and in 1892 located at Hamburg, Fremont county, where he still resides. Was appointed judge of the fifteenth judicial district February 1, 1917, and to the supreme court May, 1917. Was elected to said office in 1918 and re-elected in 1922 and 1928. Has held no other public office except that of county attorney of Fremont county for one term. Was married in 1893 to Miss Cora Patterson. They had one daughter born to them, Velma, who died December 14, 1910, at the age of thirteen.

**HENRY F. WAGNER.**—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Lancaster township, Keokuk county, Iowa, February 11, 1874. Graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1898. Engaged in the practice of law at Sigourney, Iowa from 1898 to January 1, 1919. Elected judge of the district court of the sixth judicial district of Iowa at the general election in 1918. Re-elected in 1922 and in 1926. Appointed justice of the supreme court September 5th, 1927, by Governor John Hammill. Elected in 1928 to fill remainder of term of the late Justice Charles W. Vermilion. Married October 12, 1898, to Lillian Updegraff. Has one daughter, Gladys, wife of J. C. Eichhorn, an attorney located at Oskaloosa, Iowa. Two grandchildren, John and Patricia Eichhorn. Republican in politics.

**ULYSSES GRANT WHITNEY.**—Reporter of the Supreme Court and code editor, was born July 10, 1864, on a farm near Union, Iowa. Was admitted to the bar in June, 1890. Was county attorney in Woodbury county for ten years. Was a member of

the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth general assemblies from Woodbury county. Was appointed by the judges of the supreme court to his present position in 1914. Was a member of the Iowa code commission in 1919.

**BURGESS WILSON GARRETT.**—Clerk of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Van Buren county, Iowa, February 24, 1872. When a small child his parents moved to Davis county, and later, to Decatur county. Mr. Garrett was educated in the public schools, Simpson college and St. Joseph university, from which institution he graduated. He educated himself, being dependent upon his own resources from the time he was fourteen years of age. He taught school for a number of years, being principal of the Decatur high school. Has been chairman of the county central committee; member of the senatorial and congressional committees. He was pardon secretary under Governor Cummins. Served in that capacity until July 4, 1907, when he became the first secretary of the board of parole. He resigned to become a candidate for the office he now holds. During his first term the office was made appointive; he has been five times appointed by the supreme court and is now serving his sixth term. He has been active in politics, church and benevolent activities. Was temporary chairman of the republican state convention in 1916. Was temporary and permanent chairman of the state judicial convention in 1928. Presided over a great convention of his church in Kansas City in October, 1928. A republican in politics.

**A. B. FUNK.**—Iowa Industrial Commissioner, administering workmen's compensation service. Born in Adams county, Illinois, January 12, 1854. Came to Hamilton county in 1865. Identified with the Spirit Lake Beacon for thirty-five years. Established the Enterprise at Flandreau, Dakota, in 1878. In 1879 elected first mayor of Flandreau, and, returning to Spirit Lake, was in the same year chosen as its first mayor. Postmaster at Spirit Lake, 1882-5. Delegate to republican national convention in 1884. State senator 1888-1900. For three sessions president pro-tem and chairman of ranking committee. President capitol improvement commission by appointment of Governor Cummins. For six years vice-president of state board of education under two appointments by Governor Carroll. Resigned to accept present position upon resignation of Hon. Warren Garst, January 1, 1916, by appointment of Governor Clarke. Re-appointed by Governors Harding, Hammill and Turner.

**OSCAR ANDERSON.**—Director of the Budget, was born in LaSalle county, Illinois, January 22, 1872. In the same year his parents removed to a farm in Decatur county, Iowa, and he has resided in or near Lamoni ever since. He attended the rural schools and the Lamoni high school, graduated from Highland Park college of Des Moines, and taught school in Lamoni, Iowa, three years. Is president of the State Savings Bank of Lamoni, having been connected with it since its organization July 1, 1898, and also owns and operates a farm by hired help. Was elected state representative in 1924 and served in the forty-first general assembly. Was elected mayor of Lamoni in 1920 and served two years. Was a member of the Lamoni school board twenty-seven consecutive years. Married Ella Belle Kelley June 28, 1906. They have three children, Oscar Kelley, Richard Carroll, and Margaret Belle. Is a member of the Reorganized Church of Latter Day Saints. Was appointed director of the budget February 19, 1929, to fill the unexpired term of the Hon. E. L. Hogue, deceased, terminating June 30, 1933. A republican in politics.

**CHARLES WEBSTER.**—Railroad Commissioner, was born on a farm in Waucoma, Iowa, and still resides on the old homestead entered by his father from the government in 1854. Married Dolly G. Potter of Lawler, Iowa. Three children were born to this union, Joe C., Neil A. and Bennett A. Webster. Was appointed first station agent and telegraph operator at Waucoma, formed a partnership with his brother Ace under the firm name of Webster Brothers who have since been extensive raisers and shippers of live stock, grain, and produce, as well as dealers in lumber. President of several retail lumber companies. Has been extensively interested in the building of telephone lines and exchanges. Has promoted and built

gas and electric companies in Arizona. Delegate to the national republican convention in 1908. Member of the state council of defense during the war and federal fuel administrator. Was appointed railroad commissioner by Governor Harding November 5, 1917, and has been elected four full terms since that date.

**FRED P. WOODRUFF.**—Railroad Commissioner, was born at Knoxville, Iowa, September 21, 1876. Captain Woodruff was educated in the Knoxville public schools. In the Spanish-American war he served as first sergeant of Co. D, 51st Iowa infantry, in the Philippines. For meritorious service in action he was commissioned second lieutenant and brevetted a captain by Governor Shaw. On his return home he engaged in the retail clothing and shoe business and continued in that line until the spring of 1927. He is also engaged in the operation of a number of farms. During the World war Captain Woodruff was active in promoting various war work activities, was a member of the Marion county council of defense and war work council, and later was commissioned captain and assigned to duty in the quartermaster department. He was married September 18, 1901, to Myrtle M. Elliott, and they have one son, Elliott. Was elected for full term in 1920 as railroad commissioner, was appointed by Governor Hammill to fill vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. Dwight Lewis, July 1, 1927, elected for short term in 1928 and for long term in 1930. A republican in politics.

**B. M. RICHARDSON.**—Railroad Commissioner. Residence, Cedar Rapids. Born at Brighton, Iowa, February 19, 1896. Attended Washington county schools and academy at Pleasant Plain. Married September 22, 1917, to Idamae Sieg of Topeka, Kansas. Has one son, Donald. Has served in various capacities in the field of transportation and traffic. Was for eight years connected with the western weighing and inspection bureau. Has been a member of various committees of the national association of Railroad and Utility Commissioners of the United States. Is a fellow of the International Institute of Traffic. Served in the World war. Is a member of the American Legion, a Mason and Knight Templar. A republican in politics. Elected for full term as a member of the railroad commission November 4, 1924. Re-elected November 6, 1928, for the full term.

**J. H. HENDERSON.**—Commerce Counsel, born in 1848 in Warren county, Iowa, on the present site of the town of Ackworth, and has ever since resided in Warren county. Received his education in the public schools and in college at Indianola. Admitted to practice of law 1870. Secretary of the board of trustees of Simpson college from 1869 until 1919, during which time was and is now a member of the board of trustees of that institution. Delegate to the republican national convention in 1904. Elected as circuit judge to fill vacancy in 1885. Elected district judge of the fifth judicial district in 1886. Re-elected in 1890, and again in 1894. Resigned January 1, 1896. In 1901 formed a partnership with his son and continued the practice of law under the firm name of Henderson and Henderson until his appointment as commerce counsel July 1, 1911. Re-appointed July 1, 1915, 1919 and 1923. Term ended July 1, 1927. Re-appointed April 1, 1928, to fill vacancy, term ending July 1, 1931. Re-appointed and confirmed for term beginning July 1, 1931. Member of the state board of law examiners four years; member of the Methodist church. Belongs to the Odd Fellows, is a Mason, a Knight Templar, and a member of the Consistory. Member of Grant club and Des Moines club, also Professional Men's club.

**GEORGE T. BAKER.**—Member of State Board of Education, was born July 9, 1857, on a farm in Iowa county, Iowa. He was educated in the district schools of Iowa, Hall's school for boys, at Ellington, Conn., McClain's academy at Iowa City, and the Iowa State University. He remained one year at the state university and then completed four years of special work in civil engineering at Cornell university, Ithaca, class of 1879. During the years from 1879 to 1889 he was engaged in railway location, construction and maintenance work, after which he was chief engineer for the high bridges built across the Mississippi river at Muscatine and Clinton, and consulting engineer of the high bridge at Winona, Minn. From 1893

until January, 1910, he was engaged in general construction work on railways, paving, sewerage, water works, and heavy building construction. President Davenport Industrial Commission, organized in 1925 to encourage industrial plants to locate in the middle west. Served as a member of the general assembly in the twenty-sixth regular and special session, was a member of the house of representatives from Scott county, was elected mayor of the city of Davenport in 1898 serving two years, and was delegate at large to the democratic national convention in 1900. A democrat in politics.

**PAULINE LEWELLING DEVITT.**—Member of State Board of Education, born April 10, 1877, in the girl's department of the Iowa State Reform school which her father and mother, Lorenzo D. and Angie Cook Lewelling had recently organized near Mt. Pleasant. In 1887, shortly after the death of Mrs. Lewelling, Mr. Lewelling, then president of the board of the state teachers college, moved his family to Kansas of which state he was elected governor in 1892. The daughter, Pauline, was graduated from the Wichita high school and from the state university of Kansas, then taught for four years in the high schools of that state. In 1901 she was united in marriage to James Arthur Devitt of Oskaloosa, Iowa, at that time county attorney for Mahaska county. To this union were born three children who have the distinction of being third generation Hawkeyes. Mrs. Devitt was president of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association in 1919 when a special session of the legislature ratified the federal suffrage amendment. During the war she was appointed by Governor Harding a member of the state council of defense and served also as sixth district chairman of the liberty loan committee. In 1920 she was delegate-at-large to the national republican convention. At the time of her appointment to the state board of education in 1921 she was a member of the local school board in Oskaloosa. In 1926-27 she served as vice-president of the state conference of social work and in 1927 was re-appointed by Governor Hammill to the state board of education.

**GEORGE W. GODFREY.**—Member of State Board of Education, residence Algona, was born at Luverne, Iowa, in 1883. Graduated from Luverne high school in 1899, from Cornell college academy in 1905, and from Iowa State college in 1909. Received master's degree in agriculture from Iowa State college in 1921. Awarded master farmer medal by Wallaces' Farmer in 1927. Except for one year teaching at Iowa State college, 1919-20, and three winters in agricultural extension work, chief vocation has been farming.

**ANNA B. LAWThER.**—Member of State Board of Education, born in Dubuque, Iowa, the daughter of William Lawther and Annie Elizabeth (Bell) Lawther. Her grandparents were among the earliest settlers of the state. Received early education in public schools of Dubuque and prepared for college at Miss Stevens' school, Germantown, Pa. Received her bachelor of arts degree from Bryn Mawr college in 1897. The year following her graduation she became assistant bursar of Bryn Mawr college. From 1904 to 1905 she was the warden of Merion Hall, Bryn Mawr college, and from 1907 to 1912 she was the secretary of Bryn Mawr college. After resigning her position at her alma mater Miss Lawther returned to Dubuque where she became interested in local activities. During the campaign for equal suffrage in the spring of 1916, Miss Lawther was the chairman of the Dubuque County Equal Suffrage league and in the autumn of the same year was elected president of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association and was twice re-elected to that position. She was a member of the state council of defense during the war. When presidential suffrage was granted to the women of Iowa by the thirty-eighth general assembly, Miss Lawther was made the democratic national committeewoman for Iowa. Was sent as a delegate to the democratic national convention at San Francisco in 1920, and to the democratic national convention in New York City in 1924. Miss Lawther was an alumnae director of Bryn Mawr college from 1923 to 1928.

**EDWARD P. SCHOENTGEN.**—Member of State Board of Education, was born August 16, 1873, in Council Bluffs. Attended local school until twelve years of age;

1885-88 attended an academy in Milwaukee, Wis.; 1889-91 attended manual training school of Washington university, St. Louis; 1891-95 attended Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston, taking the course in architecture, receiving the degree of S.B. in architecture. Then followed about three years' foreign study, two of which were spent in Paris, France, at the Ecole des Beaux arts as a pupil of Jean Louis Pascal, Member L'Institute. The balance of the time was spent in the French provinces and Italy. Upon returning to this country, he was identified with architectural work in St. Louis and in 1899 opened an office in Council Bluffs, practicing in that city during the next ten years. He then relinquished the practice of his profession and entered the wholesale grocery business. He was married in 1901 to Miss Mable Pratt of Des Moines, daughter of M. M. Pratt. In 1902 appointed a member of the capitol commission by Governor A. B. Cummins. He rendered no other public service until appointed to the board of education by Governor Carroll. A democrat in politics.

**JOSEPH H. ANDERSON.**—Member of the State Board of Education, was born in Winnebago county, Iowa. Received his education in the rural schools of his home county and in the Iowa State Teachers College at Cedar Falls, from which institution he graduated in 1898. For two years after graduation he was principal of the schools at Fairbank, Iowa. Since that time he has been engaged in farming except from January 1, 1905, to January 1, 1913, during which time he was clerk of the district court. Was elected to the legislature in 1914 and served continuously in the house from 1915 to 1923 inclusive, being speaker of the house in the fortieth and fortieth extra general assemblies. Appointed by Governor Turner member of the state board of education in 1931. Republican.

**HARRY M. NEAS.**—Member of State Board of Education, was born in Sigourney, Iowa, September 1, 1883, the son of A. M. Neas and Mary Mackey. He was educated in the Sigourney public schools, and graduated from the state university law school in 1906, and has since been associated with his father in the retail lumber business. He was one of the organizers and first president of the Sigourney library board. Served twelve years as a member of the Sigourney board of education. One term as a member of the Keokuk county board of education. Seven years as president of the Sigourney board of education. Two terms as the sixth district member of the Republican state central committee. His wife is Byril M. Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Jones, of Oskaloosa, Iowa. He has one daughter, Gertrude Edith Neas. A republican.

**WILLIAM R. BOYD.**—Chairman of the finance committee of the Board of Education, is a native of Iowa, having been born in Lisbon, Linn county, May 19, 1864. His boyhood was spent in Tipton, Iowa, where he attended the public schools. He was graduated from the college of liberal arts of the state university in June, 1889, having earned his way by teaching school and clerking in a store. He was principal of the school at Mechanicsville, Iowa, two years. He was editor of the Tipton Advertiser two years, editor and associate editor of the Cedar Rapids Republican sixteen years. Mr. Boyd served as postmaster of Cedar Rapids from 1899 to 1909, resigning this office to accept his present position. He has long been interested in educational matters, and was for several years a member of the board of trustees of Coe college, and for a time lecturer on political economy in that institution. Mr. Boyd is a director of the American Trust and Savings bank, and president of the Perpetual Savings and Loan association, both located in Cedar Rapids. Member Board of Trustees Cornell College, Mt. Vernon. A republican in politics.

**JACKSON W. BOWDISH.**—Member of the finance committee of the Iowa State Board of Education, was born in Merwinsville, Litchfield county, Connecticut, on the border line between New York and Connecticut. His parents and all the other members of the family except himself were natives of New York state. When he was a child his parents moved from Dutchess county, New York, to Linn county, Iowa, and located on a farm in Maine township. He resided on the farm until after he was of age, having completed his education at Cornell col-

lege, Mount Vernon, Iowa. He left the farm to enter the banking business, which he pursued the greater part of his life. In 1880 he was engaged in the banking business in Canisteo, New York, where he married Charlotte Allison. On his return to Iowa in 1886, he was elected clerk of the district court of Linn county, after which he followed the grocery business for a short time. In 1892 he assisted in the organization of the Bohemian American State Bank, and the Iowa Savings Bank of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, which, by merger, became the present American Trust and Savings Bank. In politics he is a democrat.

**W. H. GEMMILL.**—Secretary of the State Board of Education, was born in Ontario, Canada, March 14, 1871. In September of that year his parents moved to Keokuk county, Iowa, and settled on a farm near South English. He attended the rural schools and graduated from the South English high school in 1889. He entered the Iowa State college at Ames and graduated in November, 1894, with the degree of bachelor of science. During these years, he taught several terms in country schools. He has taken about two years of advanced study in education, history and economics in Highland Park college, Drake university and Des Moines college. He was principal of schools at Gibson, Iowa, two and one-half years; county superintendent of Keokuk county four years; superintendent of schools at Dallas Center 1901 to 1911, and superintendent of the Carroll schools 1914 to 1917 and resigned to become secretary of the board of education. He was married in 1895 to Birdie D. Richards. They have four children, Agnes, John, Helen and Iva.

**E. H. FELTON.**—Member of the Board of Control of state institutions, born in New Virginia, Warren county, Iowa, November 11, 1890, the son of Z. T. and Sara Felton. Educated in the New Virginia schools. Married Velda Frederick of New Virginia March 24, 1913. Father of five children, four sons and a daughter. Is engaged in the coal and grain business, wholesale flour and feed along with a general merchandise store in New Virginia. Owner of the Indiana Feed and Supply Company. Operates his own farm with hired help and is actively engaged in the feeding and breeding of livestock. Chairman, Warren county republican central committee, eight years. Selected as member Iowa republican state central committee from the seventh district in 1930. Member of the Methodist church, a thirty-second degree Mason, a member of the Mystic Shrine, and a republican.

**OLIN H. MICHAEL.**—Member of the Board of Control of state institutions, was born in Ansley, Nebraska, May 13, 1889, the son of H. W. and Elinor Michael. Moved to Wapello county with his parents when he was nine months of age where he has since resided. Educated in the Wapello county public schools, the Ottumwa high school and the Ottumwa Commercial college. Married Alice Spry, 1910. Resided on a farm until twenty-three years of age and since that time engaged in the cigar business in Ottumwa. Chairman, Wapello county republican central committee, 1922-1926. Selected as member Iowa republican state central committee from the sixth district in 1928.

**CHESTER M. ROBERTS.**—Member of Board of Control of state institutions, democrat, residence, Independence. Born in Fayette county, Iowa, December 28, 1866. Moved with parents into Buchanan county when one year old. Attended public school at Fairbank, Iowa. Married to Myrtle M. Higbee. Has two married daughters and one son, a law student in the University of Iowa. Has served as deputy clerk of district court, city collector, treasurer of Buchanan county and for many years cashier of Peoples National Bank, Independence. Appointed to board of control May 11, 1928, to fill unexpired term of G. Norman Clark, deceased. Member of Presbyterian church and all Masonic orders.

**HIRAM KINSMAN EVANS.**—Member of Board of Parole, son of Capt. Hiram and Sarah Jane (Robison) Evans, was born on section 9, Walnut township, Wayne county, Iowa, March 17, 1863, and has lived in the same county continuously for more than sixty years. Attended the country schools, Seymour Academy, Seymour

high school, and the Allerton high school, graduating from the latter in its first graduating class in 1883, and from the State University of Iowa, class of 1886, with the degree of LL.B. Admitted to practice law before the state and federal courts, 1886. Served as county attorney, 1891-1895; house of representatives, twenty-sixth general assembly of Iowa, 1896-97; board of regents, State University of Iowa, 1897-1904; elected judge of the district court of the third judicial district, 1904, and re-elected five times, serving eighteen and one-half years and until he resigned on his election to the sixty-eighth congress at a special election held June 4, 1923, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. H. M. Townner on his appointment as governor of Porto Rico. Married to Harriett Belvel, January 1, 1891. Mrs. Evans is also an attorney, having been admitted to practice before the supreme court of Iowa and the United States supreme court. They have two daughters, Portia, married to Judge James D. Cooney of West Union, Iowa, and Genevieve, married to Vincent Starzinger of Des Moines, Iowa. Declined to be a candidate for nomination or election to the sixty-ninth congress. Engaged in the general practice of law at Corydon. Was appointed a member of board of parole by Governor John Hammill for the term commencing July 1, 1927. A republican.

**JOHN S. CROOKS.**—Member of the Board of Parole. Was born in Boone, Iowa, and has since been a continuous resident of his birth city. Second son of Hon. George W. Crooks, one of the early attorneys of Boone county and a member of the seventeenth general assembly. Both parents were among the earliest pioneers in this section of Iowa. After finishing school he engaged in the abstract and loan business for fifteen years. Secretary of the Boone chamber of commerce four years. As the democratic party nominee, was elected and served as the mayor of Boone for four years. Now engaged in the real estate and insurance business. Married to Luella M. Parks. Have two children—George W. and Mildred.

**EDWARD W. CLARK.**—Commissioner of Insurance, senator from the forty-third district including Cerro Gordo, Franklin and Hancock counties in 1929 and 1931, was born at Villisca, Iowa, June 12, 1876. Has been a resident of Mason City, Iowa, practically all of his life. Attended the public school and graduated from the Mason City high school. Was engaged in the banking business for some twenty-five years. Served as clerk of the district court of Cerro Gordo county, Iowa, six years. Served as sergeant in Company "A" of the fifty-second Iowa Infantry of Volunteers. Served in the World war for twenty months with the commission of captain, both in this country and France. Is now engaged in the real estate loan business. Was elected to the Iowa senate at the general election, November 6, 1928. Appointed insurance commissioner by Governor Turner for four year term beginning July 1, 1931. Is a republican in politics. Was married April 29, 1903, to Emma H. Engaged in business in Dubuque. Married Winifred Kennedy, Aug. 16, 1899. Four children, Thomas, Marguerite, Mildred and Robert Emmett. Elected state representative in 1916, 1918, 1920, 1922, 1924 and 1926. Appointed by Gov. Hammill on state highway commission for two year term, re-appointed in 1929 for four year term ending July, 1933. A democrat.

CARL C. RIEPE.—Member of State Highway Commission, born in Burlington, Iowa, March 9, 1885. Graduate of State University of Iowa. Admitted to the bar, 1912. United States commissioner, 1917—1925. County attorney, Des Moines county, 1919 to 1921. Member of the highway commission since 1926 under appointment by Governor Hammill and Governor Turner. A democrat.

LOUIS H. COOK.—Chairman of the State Board of Assessment and Review, was born August 23rd, 1890, at Council Bluffs, Iowa. He was the son of Ernest E. and Julia (Judson) Cook. Educated in the public schools and high school. Married Marguerite Graham, September 25th, 1914, at Council Bluffs, Iowa. Member and secretary of the Iowa secondary road commission 1928-29; in charge of drafting new secondary road legislation, entirely revising old system of secondary road construction and maintenance in Iowa adopted by Iowa legislature in 1929. Active in Iowa political affairs 1916-30. First secretary of the Iowa Good Roads Association. Associated with republican national committee in the campaign of 1928. SMITH WILDMAN BROOKHART.—Progressive Republican, of Washington, Iowa; born in log cabin on a farm in Scotland county, Mo., February 2, 1869; educated in country schools and high school of Iowa, and Southern Iowa Normal; studied law in offices at Bloomfield and Keosauqua, Iowa; admitted to bar of Iowa in supreme court, 1892; farmer, teacher, lawyer, and soldier; married Jennie Hearn, June 22, 1897; six children: Charles E., John R., Smith W., Florence H., Edith A., and Joseph W. Served in Iowa national guard from 1894 until World war, except about five years; Spanish-American war, second lieutenant, fiftieth regi-

ment, Iowa Volunteer Infantry; Mexican border, major, First Iowa Brigade; World war, major and lieutenant colonel of Infantry; chief instructor in marksmanship in Camp Perry and Camp Benning schools; captain American Palma Rifle Team, 1912, winning world championship; elected four terms as president of the National Rifle association of America; served as county attorney of Washington county, Iowa, three terms; chairman of republican state convention in 1912; elected to United States senate to fill unexpired term of Hon. William S. Kenyon, resigned; elected November 4, 1924, for term of six years, beginning March 4, 1925, having received certificate of election certified by the executive council of the state of Iowa, which showed his election; but notwithstanding, the senate of the United States disregarded the Iowa election laws and seated his democratic opponent on April 21, 1926, after a prolonged contest; he immediately entered the republican primary as opponent of Senator A. B. Cummins and defeated him for the republican nomination on June 7, 1926, by 71,527 votes; re-elected November 2, 1926, for term beginning March 4, 1927, receiving 323,409 votes, democratic candidate receiving 247,869; term expires March 3, 1933.

L. J. DICKINSON.—Republican, residence, Algona, Iowa, was born in Lucas county, Iowa, October 29, 1873; descendant of Nathaniel Dickinson, of Hadley, who settled in Massachusetts in 1630; graduate Cornell College, Iowa, B.S., 1898, State University of Iowa, LL.B., 1899; admitted Iowa bar 1899; located in Algona, Iowa, 1899; married, August 21, 1901, to Miss Myrtle Call; two children, L. Call and Ruth A.; served as county attorney Kossuth county two terms; committeeman tenth Iowa district on republican state central committee 1914-1918; elected to the sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth, sixty-ninth, seventieth, and seventy-first congresses. Elected United States senator in 1930. A lifelong republican.

Is a Thirty-second degree Scottish Rite Mason, member of Odd Fellows, Elks, Eagles, the Turner Society, Rotary, Kiwanis and Wapsipinicon Clubs. Member of Lutheran church. Residence Clinton.

THOMAS J. B. **LLOYD THURSTON.**—Eighth district, republican, of Osceola, born in Clarke county, Iowa, March 27, 1880; served in Spanish-American, Philippine, and World wars; married; graduate of State University of Iowa, 1902; county attorney Clarke county four years; state senator four years; elected to sixty-ninth, seventieth, seventy-first, and seventy-second congresses.

**CHARLES E. SWANSON.**—Ninth district, republican, of Council Bluffs, was born on a farm near Galesburg, Illinois, January 3, 1879; came to Ringgold county, Iowa, with his parents in 1890; received his early education in public schools at Clearfield, Iowa; graduated from Knox College in 1902 with A.B. degree; graduated from Northwestern University school of law in 1907 with degree of LL.B.; admitted to bar in 1907 and located in same year at Council Bluffs which has since been his home; was married June 29th, 1910, to Ione Westcott of Hopkinton, Iowa, and they have one son, Charles E., Jr.; was elected county attorney of Pottawattamie county, Iowa, in 1914, and served in that capacity until 1923. On November 6th, 1928, was elected to the seventy-first congress. Re-elected to seventy-second.

**FRED C. GILCHRIST.**—Tenth district, resident of Laurens, was born in Pennsylvania in 1868, removed to Iowa, 1871, and has lived here since. CAMPBELL.**—Eleventh district, republican, of Battle Creek, Iowa, born on a farm near Battle Creek, March 6, 1882; attended rural school until fourteen years of age, graduated from Battle Creek high school in 1900; from the University of Iowa, law department, in 1916; served as mayor of Battle Creek three terms; member of Iowa house of representatives in thirty-fourth general assembly; member of Iowa state senate from 1921 to 1929 inclusive; elected to congress from eleventh Iowa district in 1928 and 1930. Married Esta Fein in Los Angeles, Calif., October 25, 1913. Son, Romeo Campbell, born August 31, 1915. Member of law firm of Campbell and Campbell, Battle Creek, being associated with his twin brother, Jed H. Campbell.

## BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE SENATORS

**C. E. ANDERSON.**—Senator from the twenty-seventh district consisting of Webster and Calhoun counties, was born on a farm near Stratford, Iowa, June 24, 1886. His parents, C. G. and Clara Anderson, were among the early settlers of the Stratford community. Received his early education in the rural schools and the Stratford high school. At the age of twenty-seven he was appointed city marshal and street commissioner of Stratford. Has served as constable, president of the school board, republican township committeeman and township trustee. Was married to Anna Ahlstrom, August 26, 1913. They have one child, Frank G. Is a member of the Methodist church and the Modern Woodmen of America. Was elected state representative from Webster county in 1922, re-elected in 1924. Elected state senator in 1928. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM S. BAIRD.**—Senator from the nineteenth district, composed of Pottawattamie county, was born in Council Bluffs, June 3, 1863. Parents native of Pennsylvania. Father, Rev. Samuel Baird, Methodist preacher. Mother, Matilda Hanks (Akers) Baird. Married Anna E. Wood, now deceased, of Logan, Iowa, January 9, 1895, daughter of John W. and Eliza A. Wood. Children, John W., William S., Jr. (deceased), Lucy W. (deceased), Robert M., Donald P., and Margaret (deceased). Married Cecelia B. Mulqueen, February 3, 1930, also born in Council Bluffs, daughter of John and Mary Mulqueen, natives of Ireland. Graduated from high school, Council Bluffs, 1880. Graduated from Cornell college, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, 1884. Admitted to practice law, 1887. Trustee Cornell College. Trustee free public library, Council Bluffs. Member of Masonic order and Knights of Pythias. Elected senator, 1920, re-elected 1924 and 1928. A republican in politics.

**FRANK M. BEATTY.**—Senator from the twelfth district composed of Keokuk and Poweshiek counties, is a lawyer by profession and is engaged in practicing law at Sigourney, Iowa. He is a graduate of Iowa Wesleyan college and of the Northwestern University law school. A republican in politics.

**OLIVER P. BENNETT.**—Senator from the thirty-fourth district comprising Crawford, Harrison and Monona counties, was born at Elgin, Illinois, October 10, 1892. His parents, James L. and Mary Potter Bennett, homesteaded in Buena Vista county, Iowa, removed to Illinois for three years returning to Monona county in 1895. Lived on a farm in Monona county until 1911. Graduated Mapleton high school 1911, liberal arts Amherst College, Amherst, Mass., 1911-1912, attended State University of Iowa, 1912-1913. Graduated college of law, Drake University, 1915. Admitted to the bar of Iowa June, 1915. Veteran World war. Eleventh district adjutant American Legion 1922-1923, eleventh district commander American Legion 1924. County attorney, Monona county, two terms, 1925 to 1929. Engaged in farming and stock raising in Monona county. Married Helen Kirk of Des Moines, daughter of Professor Sherman Kirk of Drake University. Has a daughter, Dorothy, and three sons, James Louis, Kirk and Oliver, Jr. Member Field Artillery Reserve Corps. Phi Alpha Delta legal fraternity, Phi Gamma Delta, Masonic lodge. Has practiced law at Mapleton since 1919. Elected to the senate in 1928. A republican in politics.

**C. A. BENSON.**—Senator from the thirty-sixth senatorial district, Clayton county, was born on a farm in that county, where he is now engaged in general farming, cattle feeding, and breeding of pure bred Shorthorn cattle, in partnership with father and two brothers under firm name of August Benson and Sons. Received his early education in the country grade school, and took a course in banking at the Capital City Commercial College, Des Moines, Iowa. He graduated in agriculture in 1914 at Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa. Served as deputy clerk of the district court, as secretary and manager of the Elkader Fair Association, as secretary and manager of the Highland Telephone Company, as president of the Clayton County Shorthorn Breeders Association, and as secretary of the Clayton county farm bureau from the time of its organization until he resigned to run for the office of senator, to which office he was elected in 1924. He is a member of the Lutheran church, a Master Mason, and a republican.

**FRANK BISSELL.**—Senator from the seventeenth district, composed of Dallas, Guthrie and Audubon counties, was born January 12, 1878, on a farm in Cass county. As a young man he worked by the month and engaged in farming, until the spring of 1905. In June, 1905, he moved to Dexter, Dallas county, and there engaged in the real estate business until 1920. At the present time he operates a number of farms, and is interested in the Ford garage business. He was elected to the office of senator in 1928; is a member of the Masonic order, and a republican in politics.

**AARON VALE BLACKFORD.**—Senator from the second district representing Jefferson and Van Buren counties, was born on a farm near Hillsboro, Iowa, December 18, 1871. He is a descendent of Martin Blackford, who came to this country in 1751, and settled in York county, Pennsylvania. His parents, John W. and Nancy Altland Blackford, came to Iowa in 1858, and settled on a farm near Hillsboro. His father was a member of the thirty-fifth general assembly, representing Henry county. Senator Blackford secured his early education in the rural schools of Van Buren county, then attended Iowa Wesleyan academy. In 1897 he was graduated from Iowa Wesleyan college at Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, with an A.B. degree. During his college course he was on the college debating team; he was also a member of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity, and was chapter delegate to the national convention during his junior year. After leaving college, he taught school two years, then entered the hardware, implement and automobile business with his brother in Bonaparte, and he is still engaged in the same business. He is also engaged in the insurance and real estate business. For twenty years he has served on the Bonaparte school board. Member of the Methodist church, a thirty-second degree Mason, a Knight Templar, a member of the Mystic Shrine and the order of the Eastern Star. Republican in politics. Served as representative from Van Buren county in the forty-first and forty-second general assemblies. Elected senator from the second district in 1928. Mr. Blackford has been twice married, and has one son by his first marriage, Kenneth S. Blackford. On December 20, 1925, he was married to Miss Katherine Alice Lundgren of Burlington, a member of the faculty of the Quincy senior high school. Their present home is in Bonaparte.

**CHAS. D. BOOTH.**—Senator from the eighteenth district, comprising Cass and Shelby counties, was born in Stockton, California, January 2, 1870. In 1871 the family moved from California to a farm two miles east of Harlan, Shelby county, Iowa, where they lived until 1881, at which time they moved to Harlan. He graduated from the Harlan high school in 1888, and afterward finished one year's work at the Iowa State college at Ames. Following this he assisted his father in the farm machinery business in Harlan, and when of age was made partner in the business. He still holds a substantial interest in the business, which is continued under the name of the Booth Motor Company. Although living in Harlan he operates four hundred acres of land which is well stocked. Has served as township clerk of Harlan township, and city councilman of Harlan, and ten years in the Harlan volunteer fire department, two years of which he was chief. Has been president of the

Harlan commercial club, the Kiwanis club, and the Masonic Temple Association. Has served as presiding officer of all the Masonic bodies up to and including the Commandery. Was director in the Shelby County Farmers Mutual Telephone Company fifteen years. County chairman of three successful war drives. Served in the Iowa senate during the forty-second, forty-second extra, forty-third, and forty-fourth general assemblies. Married October 31, 1895, to Edith Pickard of Harlan, and they now have one daughter, Estella May. The family holds membership in the Congregational church. Has been a consistent republican in politics, county chairman from 1920 to 1926.

**WILLIAM CARDEN.**—Senator from the tenth senatorial district including Washington and Henry counties, was born on a farm near Middletown in Des Moines county, Iowa. Attended the country school, later took a course at the state normal school and finished his education at Parsons college, Fairfield, Iowa. Mr. Carden taught school about three years and then entered the hardware and implement business at Winfield, Iowa. He served as postmaster under President Taft, after which he engaged in the insurance and loan business. He is vice-president of the Winfield National Bank. He is a member of the different lodges of his town, as well as having been active in its civic affairs. He is a member of the Presbyterian church and has been moderator of the Presbytery as well as vice-moderator of the synod of Iowa. He was first district manager of the Coolidge campaign in 1925. Has previously served in the lower house and is now serving his second term in the senate.

**HERBERT B. CARROLL.**—Senator from the third district, composed of Davis and Appanoose counties, was born on a farm in Van Buren county, Iowa, June 12, 1881. His parents, John M. and Alice Dyer Carroll, moved to the old Carroll homestead in Salt Creek township, Davis county, when he was two years of age. There the father lived until his death and there the mother still resides. He received his early education in the rural schools, later attended the Southern Iowa Normal, and in 1908 was graduated from the Iowa State Teachers' college. Taught in the public schools, was county superintendent, county chairman of the Y. M. C. A. and the united war drives, chairman republican county central committee of Van Buren county, and later of Davis. For seven years was an employee of the Green Bay and Tisdale lumber companies. Eight years ago he became a partner in the hardware and implement business with the firm name of Carroll and Carroll, operating stores in Bloomfield and Pulaski, Iowa. In 1914 was married to Bess Dundore of Perry, Iowa. Has one daughter, Pauline. Member of Knights of Pythias. Elected senator in 1928. Always a republican.

**GEORGE W. CHRISTOPHEL.**—Senator from the thirty-ninth district, Bremer and Butler counties, was born December 7, 1881, in Pilot township, Kankakee county, Illinois. He attended school in that county and later taught in the school from 1902 to 1905. He was married to Miss Edith Wehling of Reddick, Illinois, on January 23, 1906, when he moved to Iowa on a farm near Bremer, Bremer county. Has two sons, Floyd and Clarence, and two daughters, Mildred and Luella. In 1911 and 1912 served as secretary of the Bremer Creamery company; made president of the Bremer county farm bureau two years and vice-president two years. Elected twice to the Iowa federation. Awarded a gold medal January 13, 1927, in master farmer's contest. In 1913 he moved to a farm two miles northwest of Waverly. Helped organize the Farmers Reload association at Waverly. In 1930 was elected as the first president of that association and was re-elected president in 1931. Chosen state representative in the fall of 1924 and re-elected in 1926. Chosen state senator in the fall of 1928. A republican in politics.

**CHARLES FRANCIS CLARK.**—Senator from Linn county, Iowa, was born at Belle Plaine, Iowa, August 13, 1871. He has lived in Cedar Rapids since 1876, and has practiced law there continuously since graduating from the law department of the university of Iowa in June, 1894. He is a graduate of Coe college, and a member of its board of trustees; a director of the American Trust and Savings Bank, a member of the Congregational church, Sons of the American Revolution,



Military Order Loyal Legion, Knights Templar, Consistory, K, P., American and state bar associations. Married Elizabeth Besler, Cedar Rapids, Nov. 29, 1900. One son, Herbert F. Served in house 1918 to 1922, senate since 1928. Vice chairman code supervising committee, 1924, chairman legislative tax commission, 1930-31. Republican.

**EDWARD W. CLARK.**—Senator from the forty-third district including Cerro Gordo, Franklin and Hancock counties. Biography appears as state insurance commissioner.

**W. A. CLARK.**—Senator from the fifteenth district composed of the counties of Marion and Monroe, was born on a farm near Gallipolis, Gillia county, Ohio, April 22, 1867, where he attended public schools. He came to Marion county, Iowa, in the year 1886. Here he has since resided with the exception of two years spent in Warren county, Iowa. He was married to Edna McQuerry in 1890, now deceased. To this union three children were born, only one living to maturity, Callie E., now Mrs. H. H. Phillips of Pleasantville, Iowa. He spent several years in the mercantile business and in the year 1900 moved to the farm where he resided twenty years. He was deputy county auditor in 1895-96; was treasurer of Marion county from 1921 to 1925 and took the oath of office as state senator January 12, 1925. A republican in politics.

**GEORGE M. CLEARMAN.**—Senator from the twenty-fifth district comprising Johnson and Iowa counties, was born on a farm in Johnson county, October 5, 1870. Was educated in the public schools. Has been engaged in farming and stock raising in the same locality all his life. Was married in 1892 and has three children, Ray, Harold and Stella. A member of the Episcopal church and a thirty-second degree Mason. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM COCHRANE.**—Senator from eighth district, including Mills and Montgomery counties, was born February 10, 1867, in Warren county, Iowa, of Scotch descent. Educated in public schools of Des Moines and Monroe, Iowa, and Monroe high school. When thirteen his father died. Began business career as clerk in a country store, later as proprietor. In 1900 he joined his brother-in-law, the late Thos. D. Murphy, in organizing a company for the manufacture and sale of art calendars at Red Oak. For the first eighteen years he was sales manager. A sales force was built and a market established in all English-speaking countries. For the past eleven years he has been general manager and is now president of the company. During the World war he was a member of the district exemption board for the southern district of Iowa and president of the Montgomery county Red Cross. He has served as alderman and park commissioner of Red Oak. Is now president of National Advertising Specialty association, director of the Employers Mutual Casualty company, vice-president Red Oak Trust and Savings and of the Red Oak National bank, and past president of the Iowa Manufacturer's association. His wife, whose maiden name was Myrtle Murphy, died May 13, 1924. He has three daughters, Mrs. Malcolm D. Lomas, Mrs. J. Lyman Turner and Frances M. Cochrane, all of Red Oak, Iowa.

**C. G. COLE.**—Senator from Buchanan and Delaware counties, was born on a farm near South Owego, Tioga county, N. Y., October 4, 1890. Attended public school at Greeley and Dr. Holbrook's school at Ossining, N. Y. Graduated from Wesleyan University at Middletown, Conn., June, 1916. Enlisted in the navy and was aboard the U. S. S. *Aurore*. Returned to Greeley where he is actively interested in Delaware county land. A member of the board of directors of Security Savings bank at Greeley, and treasurer of Delaware county farm bureau. A republican in politics.

**MATT D. COONEY.**—Senator from the thirty-fifth district, composed of Dubuque county. Residence, Dubuque. Was born and reared on a farm in Dubuque county. Attended Columbia College, Dubuque, University of Iowa, and Georgetown University. Began the practice of law in Dubuque in 1912, forming a partnership with Allan J. Kane, under the firm name of Kane and Cooney, which firm still

exists. Has continuously practiced law in Dubuque except during the time he served in the World war. Was in the prosecuting attorney's office for six years and the city attorney's office six years. Married to Margaret Whelan. Has five children, John L., Margaret Elizabeth, M. D., Jr., Terance W. and Judith Ann. Democrat in politics.

**FRANK I. COYKENDALL.**—Senator from the seventh district, composed of Page and Fremont counties, was born in Jefferson county, Iowa, March 13, 1878. Moved to Fremont county in 1884. Educated in the country schools, a farmer and breeder of shorthorn cattle. Member of the Masonic fraternity, associated with the May Seed and Nursery Company as a speaker on farm matters. Republican in politics. Elected state senator in 1930.

**L. H. DORAN.**—Senator from Boone-Story, thirty-first senatorial district, was born at Beaver, Iowa, May 4, 1893. Is one of thirteen children born to Justin R. and Olive F. Doran. Resided on the farm with his parents except for the time spent in school and in the army. His father served as a member of the Iowa house of representatives from Boone county in the thirtieth, thirty-first, thirty-second and thirty-second extra general assemblies, and as a member of the state senate from the thirty-first senatorial district in the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth general assemblies of Iowa. Graduate of the public school at Beaver, Iowa. Graduate of Drake University law school in 1920. October 10, 1917, enlisted in Battery C, 339th Field Artillery, and on April 12, 1918, while stationed at Camp Dodge, Iowa, was injured in a motor truck accident which resulted in his being confined to the army hospital until the 4th day of January, 1919. While a patient in the army hospital at Fort Des Moines, Iowa, in 1918, he met DeElda Kinson, of Minneapolis, Minn., a Red Cross nurse, whom he married following his graduation from the university in 1920. He has one daughter and two sons. Since 1920 has been engaged in the practice of law in the city of Boone, Iowa, and is a member of the firm of Baker, Doran and Boone. Has never held any other political office. Member of the American Legion, A. F. and A. M., B. P. O. E., A. T. O. fraternity, and the Lions club of Boone. Elected to state senate November 6, 1928. Republican in politics.

**JOE R. FRAILEY.**—Senator from the first district, composed of Lee county. Occupation, lawyer. Residence, Fort Madison. Was a member of the senate from the thirty-sixth to the thirty-ninth inclusive, re-elected to the forty-second, forty-second extra and forty-third, and again to the forty-fourth and forty-fifth sessions.

**O. E. GUNDERSON.**—Senator from the forty-first district, composed of Mitchell, Winnebago and Worth counties, was born in Worth county, Iowa, February 25, 1875. He was educated in the rural schools, St. Ansgar Seminary and Institute, and the Northern Illinois Normal School. For several years he was engaged in farming, merchandising and teaching. In 1903 was elected county superintendent of schools of Worth county and served nine years. He moved to Forest City in 1913 and engaged in banking with the Forest City National bank from which institution he resigned as vice-president in 1928. The communities in which he has lived have been served by him as town clerk, councilman, member of the county fair board, as member of board of directors of the city commercial club and as president of the board of trustees of the city library. At present he is a member of the board of trustees of St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, and also a member of the board of trustees of the Norwegian Lutheran Church of America. Married in 1897 to Gurine Finnesgaard of Kenyon, Minnesota. They have two children: Esther is a teacher at the Hibbing, Minnesota, high school, and a son, Clarence Harvey, a graduate of West Point, is a lieutenant in the United States army and stationed at Fort Des Moines. Elected senator in 1924 and re-elected in 1928. Has recently been appointed postmaster of his home city. A republican in politics.

**J. H. HAGER.**—Senator from Allamakee and Fayette counties, was born in Allamakee county, August 30, 1871. Received his education in the rural schools and at

the Breckenridge Preparatory and Business Institute of Decorah, Iowa. Was quartermaster sergeant, company I, 49 Iowa Vol. infantry, during the Spanish-American war. In 1895, he engaged in the farm implement business at Waukon, and in 1908 added the Buick line of cars and has since continued in that business. Was married June 14, 1905, to Grace Falby, formerly of Burlington, Vermont. Member of the Presbyterian church, Shrine, Consistory, and K. P. lodge, a charter member of the Kiwanis club. Served three years as president of the chamber of commerce. Elected representative in 1924 and 1926. Elected state senator in 1928. Republican in politics.

**EDWIN R. HICKLIN.**—Senator from the twentieth district, composed of Louisa and Muscatine counties, was born in Wapello, Iowa, March 1, 1895, where he has since resided. Son of Edwin Hicklin and Millicent (Richley) Hicklin, both of whom were natives of Louisa county, Iowa. Graduated from the Wapello high school in 1911, from Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa, in 1915, with degree of A.B., and from the State University of Iowa law school in 1917. Served in World war, Company E, Second U. S. infantry. Practiced law in Wapello, Iowa, since 1919, was elected county attorney of Louisa county in 1922, and served two terms. Was elected member of the republican state central committee for the first congressional district in 1924, in which capacity he is still serving. Was secretary of the republican state central committee, 1926 to 1928. Married Irene Anderson in 1919, and has three sons, Edwin Anderson, Martin Dale, and Charles Willis. Is a member of the Masonic lodge, Lions club, and American Legion.

**LAFE HILL.**—Senator from the sixty-fourth district, including Chickasaw and Floyd counties, was born in Ringgold county, Iowa. At the age of fourteen years was thrown on his own resources. He worked on a farm, in a brick yard and on railroad construction, attending school at odd times until about the age of eighteen, when he had saved sufficient money to enable him to enter academic and college work. During that time he read law for two years with C. W. Mullen of Waterloo, afterwards state's attorney general. He then took up teaching at Troy Mills and Walker, in Linn county, and was later superintendent of schools at Seymour and other places in southern Iowa. At the close of his school work he entered the newspaper business, and is now publisher of the Advertiser at Nora Springs. His father was a veteran of the Civil War. He was married to Florence A. Fay of Troy Mills. Their three children grew to manhood and womanhood, a daughter, Fausta, and sons, Brant and Lyle. Both sons served in the World war, and Brant gave his life for his country. Throughout his life he has been an active republican and has attended a large number of the state and district conventions for the past thirty years. He was elected a delegate from Iowa to the National Yeoman Conclave held at Colorado Springs in 1904. He was appointed by Governor Kendall a delegate from Iowa to the National Laymen's Educational convention called by the United States commissioner of education in Des Moines in 1922. He received his education in the country schools, the Creston and Afton high schools and the Afton business college. Has lived on the farm where he now resides for the past fifty-six years. Connected with the farm bureau since its organization. Director of the Farmers Co-operative company and a director of the First National Bank of Creston. A member of the Masonic and Woodman fraternities. A republican in politics.

**H. L. IRWIN.**—Senator from Clinton county, residence De Witt, was born on a farm near Belle Plaine, Iowa, May 15th, 1897. Educated in grade schools, grad-

uated from high school in Belle Plaine, Iowa. Served in the field artillery, officers training camp in Zachary, Ky., during the World war in 1918. B.A. degree 1919; graduate of college of law with LL.B. degree, 1921, from State University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa. Attended University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Mich. Married to Helen Muriel Shoemith of Guthrie Center, Iowa, 1921. Practiced law in the city of Cedar Rapids for a period of about one year upon graduation from the state university, and thereafter practiced law in Clinton county in the town of Grand Mound, and the city of De Witt, Iowa. Member of the state bar association, P. A. D. law fraternity, Phi Kappa Sigma literary fraternity, and Masonic and K. P. orders. Church preference Methodist. Parents Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Irwin, Belle Plaine, Iowa. One daughter, Marjorie Ellyn, born June 15th, 1930.

**JOHN W. KENT.**—Senator from the fourth district, including Lucas and Wayne counties. Born in Cook county, Illinois, March 9, 1867. Moved to Lucas county, Iowa, with his parents in 1869, where he has since resided. Educated in the public schools. A farmer, stock raiser and pure bred Hereford breeder. Owns three hundred and seventy acres of land. Republican in politics. Member of the Masonic fraternity; has been trustee of Jackson township and school treasurer for a number of years; was member of board of supervisors six years. Elected representative in 1924, and re-elected in 1926. Elected senator in 1928.

**DAVID W. KIMBERLY.**—Senator from Scott county, was born in Deadwood, S. D., August 6, 1878. When he was six months old his parents moved back to West Liberty, Muscatine county. He has lived on the farm most of his life. He received his education at the West Liberty, Springdale high school and Bryant-Stratton's business college of Chicago. He was married to Elsie King, of Chicago. He is a member of the Mystic Shrine, Knights Templar, Scottish Rites, Mohassan Grotto, Eastern Star, Elks, Eagles, Odd Fellows and Turner society. Was elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916, and to the senate in 1918, 1922, 1926, and 1930. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM H. KLEMMME.**—Senator from the forty-second district, composed of Winneshiek and Howard counties, was born in Franklin county, Ind., February 17, 1849. He came to Iowa with his parents in the spring of 1862 and located on a farm of 200 acres, which his father purchased from the government in 1857 for a dollar and a quarter per acre. He remained there until he was twenty-one years old. He was married to Mary Augusta Bolles in 1870. They have one daughter, Mrs. J. G. Parker, of Fayette, Iowa. He was postmaster during McKinley's term of office, and justice of peace in Lincoln township thirty-two years. He was a member of the house of representatives during the twenty-fifth, twenty-sixth, and twenty-seventh general assemblies and the extra session. Elected senator in 1926, re-elected in 1928. Has been engaged in the lumber and coal business since 1873. A republican in politics.

**IRVING H. KNUDSON.**—Senator from the thirty-seventh district, comprising Hamilton, Hardin and Wright counties, was born April 28, 1896, at Jewell, Iowa. Received his education in the Jewell public schools, the Jewell Lutheran college, and the State University of Iowa. In February, 1919, he enlisted as a private in the World war, and was discharged in April, 1919, as sergeant first class. Upon leaving the service, he took a position with the State Bank at Jewell, and at the same time became a partner with his father, Gilbert Knudson, in the general and live-stock auction business. In the fall of 1921 he was married to Miss Leafy Bergum of Westby, Wisconsin. They have two sons, Irving Howard, born October, 1922, and John Gilbert, born March, 1928. He is a member of the Lutheran church; was president of the Jewell community club for two terms; was a charter member of the Hawkeye Post No. 550 of the American Legion. Returning from the forty-first general assembly, he moved to Ellsworth, Iowa, where he is now engaged in the real estate, insurance and auction business. During the same year he was elected president of the Hamilton county bankers association and elected a director in the State Bank of Jewell, Jewell, Iowa. This same year he joined the Chris

Christenson Post No. 598 of the American Legion, Ellsworth, Iowa, and has been a member ever since. He was elected state representative in 1924 and re-elected in 1926 and 1928. Elected senator in 1930. A republican in politics.

**LEW MACDONALD.**—Senator from the forty-sixth district, comprising Cherokee, Ida and Plymouth counties. Was born of Scotch parentage on the second day of March, 1884, near Aurora, Illinois. His parents moved to Cherokee county, Iowa, in the fall of 1885 and to a farm in the spring of 1886. He received his graded school experience in the rural schools, taught in the rural schools for one year, graduated from the Iowa State Teachers' College at Cedar Falls, Iowa, in 1907, was superintendent of schools at Hopkinton, Iowa, from 1907 to 1909, attended the law school of the University of Michigan during the school year of 1909-1910, a member of the Northwestern debating team of 1911, graduated from the University of Chicago, Illinois, in 1912, with degrees Ph.D. and J.D.; county superintendent of schools of Cherokee county, 1913 to 1917; county attorney, Cherokee county, 1917 to 1927, the general practice of law since 1917; a member of the Presbyterian church and affiliated with the following lodges: Masons, Yeomen, and Knights of Pythias. Married Olive M. Johnson June 11, 1914. Has three children, Helen Esther, Jimmie Lew, and Billy Bruce. A republican in politics. Residence, Cherokee, Iowa.

**WM. E. McLELAND.**—Senator from the twenty-eighth district, was born in Van Buren county, Iowa, April 16, 1867. In 1869 he moved with his parents to Marshall county, Iowa, and has been a resident of that county ever since. He was educated in the public schools and in the Marshalltown high school. Was married to Minnie M. Robinson, January 25, 1889. They have four children, two sons, Robert McLeland, of Armstrong, Iowa, and John W. McLeland, of Marshalltown, and two daughters, Mrs. Arthur Harris, of Mason City, and Mrs. Leslie Boomhower, of Mason City. He was elected and served as county auditor from 1903 to 1907 and again in 1916 to 1919. Served as secretary of the local exemption board during the World War. Has served as president of the consolidated school board in his district and the various township offices in his township. Is secretary of the Iowa Valley Mutual Insurance Association, Albion, Iowa. Member of the Marshall county farm bureau. Member of the Christian church. He is a farm owner and is engaged in general farming and breeding of registered Shorthorn cattle. Elected to the state senate in 1924 and again in 1928. Served as president pro tempore of the senate during the forty-fourth general assembly. A republican in politics.

**WESLEY C. LOWE.**—Senator from the eleventh district, composed of Clarke and Warren counties, was born May 14, 1875, on a farm in Clarke county, near where the town of Weldon is now located. His parents were early settlers of this locality and settled on the famed Morman Trace road which crosses the southern part of that county. There they broke the virgin prairie and established their home, the farm where Senator Lowe now resides, and where he has always been actively engaged in the occupation of farming and live stock production. He received his education above high school at Humeston Normal College and Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa, completing business courses at both schools. He was married December 25, 1898, to Florence M. Eddy and has a family of three children: Mrs. Lois E. Fairall, Ora Ileen and Uriel Wendell. He has always been active in politics and aside from various township offices, was elected and served as county auditor of Clarke county during the years 1907 to 1911. He is affiliated religiously with the Christian church, fraternally with the K. P. order, and politically with the republican party.

**ARTHUR LEONARD.**—Senator from Taylor and Adams counties, was born on a farm in Taylor county, Iowa, September 14, 1870. Received his education in the rural schools, and then engaged in farming. His farm adjoins the farm on which he was born. Is a member of the firm of Daniel Leonard and Sons, Iowa pioneers, breeders of Shropshire sheep. Was married to Esther Coulter, February 25, 1893. Two sons and one daughter have been born to them. Was elected representative in

1922 and re-elected in 1924. Elected state senator in 1928. Is a Royal Arch Mason, a member of the Fairview Christian church. Republican in politics.

**JOHN N. LANGFITT.**—Senator from the sixteenth district, composed of Adair and Madison counties, was born in Scott county, Iowa, May 9, 1866. On his father's side he is of Scotch-Irish descent. His mother was of English descent. His early education was received in the rural schools. He also attended Wilton Academy and Davenport Business College. When twenty-one years of age he went to Adair county. Four years later he married Clara A. Martin, daughter of W. B. and Lucy E. Martin, of Greenfield. Mrs. Langfitt died on July 14, 1924. There are four surviving children, Harry M., of Marshalltown, Iowa, Bernice Louise, of Des Moines, Clara Mildred, and John N., Jr., of Greenfield. He lived several years in western Washington, but returned to Adair county in 1898, purchasing the family homestead on which he still resides. His religious affiliation is Presbyterian and he is a republican in politics. He is a Blue Lodge and thirty-second degree Mason. He was representative from Adair county in the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies; was elected senator in 1924 and re-elected in 1928.

**T. E. MOEN.**—Senator from the forty-ninth district, Lyon, Osceola, O'Brien and Sioux counties, was born in Lyon county, October 10, 1870, the first child born in Logan township. He attended the rural school, Augustana College at Canton, South Dakota, and St. Olaf College at Northfield, Minnesota. Married Rachel Davidson in 1892 and has five children, two sons and three daughters. A member of the Lutheran church. Was engaged in the grain business fifteen years; spent four years in the chamber of commerce at Minneapolis, a member of Skewis-Moen company. Was county supervisor from 1911 to 1919, being chairman of the board four years. Elected representative in 1918, re-elected in 1920 and 1922. Elected senator to fill vacancy for the special session of the forty-second general assembly and re-elected in 1928. Republican in politics.

**OLIVER P. MYERS.**—Senator from the twenty-ninth district, Jasper county, was born in Cedar township, Washington county, Iowa, July 30th, 1856. Graduated from the State University of Iowa in 1880. From 1895 to 1899 he was county superintendent of schools in Beadle county, Huron, South Dakota. He married Leah McFarlane in 1897, and they have three children—Kenneth, Ruth, and Dorothy—all graduated from state schools. By profession he is a lawyer at Newton, Iowa. Elected state senator in 1930. He is a democrat.

**G. W. PATTERSON.**—Senator from the forty-seventh district, including Emmet, Palo Alto, Clay, Dickinson and Kossuth counties, was born at Burt, Iowa, September 4, 1887, of Scotch parentage. Graduate of Burt high school. Graduated from Iowa State college, animal husbandry department, 1909. Married December 28, 1914, to Miss Eva M. Stensrud, Lake Mills, Iowa. Has three children, Donald W. Patterson, Virginia Mae Patterson, and Kenneth Howard Patterson. Business, farming and stock feeding. Elected to house of representatives, 1922; re-elected in 1924 and 1926. Elected senator in 1928. A republican.

**L. T. QUIRK.**—Senator from the forty-eighth district, including Carroll, Greene and Sac counties. (Biography appears elsewhere as member of State Highway Commission.)

**C. L. RIGBY.**—Senator from the twenty-fourth district, composed of Cedar and Jones counties. Was born in Stanwood, Iowa, February 20, 1874. Received his early education in the Stanwood public schools. Attended Cornell college, from which he graduated in 1894. Member of the Sigma Nu fraternity. Immediately after graduation started farming and is still engaged in that occupation. Married Jennie Davis Billings, to which union was born two children, Edward and Isabel. Has been actively engaged in banking for about twenty-seven years, and has been president of the Union Trust and Savings bank at Stanwood for the past twenty

years. Is a trustee of Cornell college, and a member of the Masonic and Knights of Pythias lodges. Elected senator in 1924, re-elected in 1928. Republican in politics.

**W. R. RITCHIE.**—Senator from the fiftieth district, comprising Buena Vista, Humboldt and Pocahontas counties, was born at Port Andrew, Richland county, Wisconsin, July 8, 1867, of Scotch-Irish parents. His father came to America from the north of Ireland in 1860, enlisted in the army the first call for volunteers in the Sixty-seventh New York Infantry, and served till the close of the war, serving six months in Libby prison. His mother was a native of Scotland. Senator Ritchie came to Alta, Iowa, and worked on the farm as a hired man till the spring of 1894 when he bought his first farm, and began farming for himself. He was married February 26, 1896, to Anna Jackson. They have four grown children, one girl and three boys. Elected senator in 1930. A republican.

**F. C. STANLEY.**—Senator from the fourteenth district, consisting of Mahaska county, was born November 26, 1881, on a small farm near Ackworth, Warren county, Iowa. Moved to Indianola in 1890. Attended the district school. Graduated from Indianola high school in 1899. Interested in general stock farming three or four years. Graduated from Simpson college in 1907 with a degree of B.S. A partner in the Indianola Herald. Read law at odd times with O. C. Brown of Indianola. Attended the University of Wisconsin, 1909-1910. Head of the department of chemistry, Penn college, from 1910 until the present time. During the year 1916-1917, was engaged in the financial interest of the college. Spent the year 1913-1914 in Europe on leave of absence, specializing in chemistry at the University of Berlin, Berlin, Germany. Traveled extensively through Europe, Egypt, Palestine and Turkey. Was married July 27, 1915, to Ada C. Whitney, and has four daughters, Isabel, Kathryn, Margaret, and Barbara. Was elected senator in 1924. Re-elected in 1928. Republican in politics.

**ROY E. STEVENS.**—Senator from the thirteenth district, composed of Wapello county. Was born on a farm in Wapello county, January 8, 1878, attended the local schools. In 1902 he succeeded his father in the retail shoe business in Ottumwa, Iowa, in which business he is still engaged. Married Marie Van de Ven in 1907 and has one daughter, Martha. Has also been engaged in farming since 1912, specializing in dairy farming. Was president of the chamber of commerce and retail merchants of Ottumwa. Was president of the Iowa retail shoe dealers association. Has been chairman of the Wapello county good roads committee for several years and has been very active in the work of bringing about the good roads program not only in Wapello county but in the state of Iowa. Member of First Presbyterian church of Ottumwa. Mason and member of Rotary club of Ottumwa. Democrat in politics.

**BERTEL M. STODDARD.**—Senator from the thirty-second district, consisting of Woodbury county, was born at Minonk, Ill., January 21, 1871. Graduated from Illinois college, Jacksonville, Ill., in 1891. Engaged in the grain business at Toluca, Ill., for seven years, moving to Sloan, Iowa, in 1901. He was married in 1897 to Wilhelmina E. Simater. They have a son, Bela M., and a daughter, Jane M. He has been a member of the school board for twenty-seven years, a member of the county board of supervisors, drainage trustee, chairman of the local board for Woodbury county, county chairman for the Y. M. C. A. and Red Cross drives, the United War Service fund, and the third and fourth liberty loan campaigns. With his son he operates a grain elevator at Sloan, Iowa. They are also engaged in farming and stock raising. He was elected in 1918 to fill the unexpired term of Senator C. F. Lytle, resigned. He was re-elected in 1920 for the full term and again in 1924 and 1928. He has always been a republican.

**GEOGRE W. TABOR.**—Senator from the twenty-third district, comprising Jackson county, was born near Baldwin, Jackson county, Iowa, December 6, 1862, son of Andrew J. and Nancy L. Tabor. He completed the Baldwin high school course at

the age of seventeen. On November 27, 1890, he was united in marriage to Miss Ella Gilmore, of Monmouth, Iowa. To this union was born five children: Howard, Clifford, Muriel, Dorothy, and Eloise, all of Baldwin. He has always followed the occupation of farming and stock feeding, and, with the assistance of his two sons, he operates successfully 1,370 acres of land in Jackson and Jones counties. The farm is well stocked with horses, cattle, hogs and sheep at the present time. He has never asked for or held any kind of office whatever prior to this one as senator. In politics he is a democrat.

**CLYDE H. TOPPING.**—Senator from ninth district, Des Moines county, was born on a ranch near Utica, Ness county, Kansas, January 8, 1884. His parents were John W. Topping and Ida (nee Johnston) Topping, both of whom were born in Van Buren county, Iowa. In the year 1888 the family returned to Iowa, and moved to Burlington in 1896. Attended the public schools in Burlington, then the State University of Iowa, leaving there in 1906 for Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada, where he and his father operated a ranch in connection with a colonization project of theirs. They had one of the first steam plows in Saskatchewan. Was married in 1908 to Miss Helen Welsh Young, of Burlington, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. H. B. Young. They have three children, Alice Hamilton, Eugenia Young, and Clyde Hamilton, Jr. After the disposal of the Canadian ranch, he entered the employ of the Canadian Pacific railway, and was connected with the land department of that railway at Calgary, Alberta, for ten years, leaving the Canadian Pacific railway to again engage in the real estate business with his father at Burlington. He was elected to the Iowa senate in 1926, and again in 1930, republican member from Des Moines county. He is a member of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity, a member of the Rotary and Elks clubs, and a member of the Congregational church.

**EDWARD J. WENNER.**—Senator from the thirty-eighth district, composed of Black Hawk and Grundy counties, residence Waterloo. Born July 3rd, 1880, on a farm in Jackson township, Benton county, Iowa. Son of Christian Wenner, Jr., who was born in Ohio and came with his parents to Benton County, Iowa, in 1855, and of Margaret Cokely Wenner, who was born in West Virginia and came with her parents to Benton county, Iowa, in 1860. The father passed away in 1894, and the mother, now eighty-three years of age, survives, and lives in Benton county. Married August 17th, 1910, to Elizabeth P. Parrott, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Parrott, of Waterloo, and a grand-daughter of the late Matt Parrott, former lieutenant governor of Iowa. Has three sons, Frank William, Edward Robert, and Jackson Carl. Educated in public schools and at Tilford Collegiate Academy at Vinton. Graduated in 1900. Matriculated in college of law at the State University of Iowa, and graduated with degree of LL.B. in 1903. Admitted to Iowa bar in June of 1903. Attended the law school of Yale University, at New Haven, Connecticut, and graduated therefrom with the degree of M.L. in 1904. Commenced the practice of law in Waterloo in October, 1904, and since has continued the active practice at that place. Member of Christ Episcopal Church in Waterloo. Holds membership in various fraternal orders, having advanced to grand and supreme lodges. Connected with several local and national organizations. Member of Black Hawk county bar association and of Iowa state bar association. A republican in politics. Three times nominated and elected as county attorney of Black Hawk county, having served from 1915 to 1921. President of Iowa state association of county attorneys in 1916-1917. Nominated in the primary of 1930 for the position of state senator in a field of three candidates. Elected senator in the general election of 1930, without opposition.

**HARRY C. WHITE.**—Senator from the forty-fifth district, comprising the counties of Benton and Tama, was born in Guernsey county, Ohio, October 6, 1869, of Irish parents. When he was six months old his parents moved to Benton county and settled on a farm near Garrison. Educated in the district schools, Tilford academy and Cornell college, Mount Vernon. Taught school for several terms. Now owns and operates a large stock farm. For many years president of the



Peoples Savings Bank of Garrison. Was married in 1894. Elected representative in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Elected senator in 1914, re-elected in 1918, in 1922, and again in 1930. A democrat in politics.

**GEO. A. WILSON.**—Senator from the thirtieth district, Polk county, Iowa. Born on a farm in Adair county. Youngest son of James H. Wilson and Martha G. Wilson. Married Mildred Zehner, December 8, 1921. Graduated from Menlo high school, attended college at Grinnell, graduate of the law school of the State University of Iowa in 1907. Began practicing law immediately in the city of Des Moines. Was elected county attorney for one term. Served as judge of the district court of Polk county, Iowa, for a period of over two years, resigning from this position to again enter the practice of law. Republican in politics.

### BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE REPRESENTATIVES

**JOHN H. AIKEN.**—Representative from Ida county, was born at Iowa City, March 27, 1875. He was taken by his parents, Benjamin Franklin Aiken and Patience (Williams) Aiken, to Ida county in 1876, where he has since resided. In October, 1903, he was married to Henrietta Hass, of Holstein, Iowa. Mr. and Mrs. Aiken have three daughters, Patience, Louise, Thelma Norine, and Virginia Helen. Mr. Aiken is a republican in politics and was elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922, 1924, 1926, 1928, and 1930.

**BYRON G. ALLEN.**—Representative from Pocahontas county, seventy-seventh district, was born at Laurens, Iowa, September 13, 1901. He is the son of ex-Senator Joseph H. Allen, who served the fiftieth senatorial district from the thirty-second to the thirty-seventh general assemblies, and is the nephew of F. C. Gilchrist, who now represents the eleventh district in congress. Educated in the public schools of Pocahontas and graduated from West high school, Des Moines, and Pocahontas high school in 1919. Attended the State University of Iowa for one term and was a student in the agricultural economics department at Iowa State College from 1920 to 1924. Upon leaving college he returned to Pocahontas and engaged in farm management work. After the adjournment of the forty-second general assembly he became the editor and publisher of the Pocahontas Democrat, which, under his management, is an independent newspaper. On December 18, 1926, he married Miss Elsa Erickson of Marathon, Iowa, whom he had met in college. They are the parents of one daughter, Virginia, and a son, Joseph Warne. A republican in politics, Mr. Allen was elected to the assembly in 1926 as an independent candidate and in 1928 and 1930 was re-elected as the nominee of his party.

**F. D. AUGUSTINE.**—Representative from Ringgold county. Born near Orient, Iowa, Adair county, August 31, 1887, where he grew to manhood. Graduated from Orient high school in 1906, afterwards attended Drake University. In 1909 he moved to Fillmore, where he lived five years. In 1912 he was united in marriage to Miss Jessie Wade. In 1913 he moved to Benton, Iowa, where he has since been engaged in business. A democrat.

**AMPLIAS HALE AVERY.**—Representative from Clay county, was born on a farm near Excelsior, Richland county, Wisconsin, May 20th, 1870. After completing the work in the rural schools of his home county, he moved to Osage, Iowa, where he attended Cedar Valley Seminary for several years. In 1889, he moved to South Dakota where he taught in the rural schools, and in the town schools of Ashton and Woonsocket. He moved to Spencer, Iowa, in 1901, being superintendent of city schools there until 1915 when he resigned to go into the life insurance work which he has since followed. He married first Grace Cornwall (deceased). To this union was born one child, Theta Avery Tucker, of Minneapolis, Minn. He married second Grace Dunham. To this union three children were born, Margaret Avery Dunning, who died February 8, 1931, Alden D. Avery, and Barbara Avery. A republican.

**J. F. BABCOCK.**—Representative from Chickasaw county, was born October 19, 1875, at New Hampton, Chickasaw county, Iowa, and has lived there continuously. He was educated in the public schools, State Teachers College and Wormalley Business College of New Hampton, Iowa. He is the owner of a large dairy farm which he operated himself for a greater part of his life and which he now rents on shares. He is a member of the local board of education, secretary of the New Hampton Farmers Creamery; belongs to the Methodist Episcopal church, Masonic lodge, Odd Fellow lodge, and M. W. A. Democrat in politics.

**J. PARK BAIR.**—Representative from Buena Vista county, Iowa, was born March 17, 1864, in Perry county, Pennsylvania. When he was one year old he moved with his parents to Gerardston, Berkly county, West Virginia. When six years old, his parents moved to Bedford, Indiana. He received his education in the county schools and southern Indiana Normal school at Mitchell, Indiana. When twenty-one years old he went to Arcola, Illinois, where he was married to Clara Belle Louthan. To them were born four children, two girls and two boys. The oldest boy died when seven years old. For sixteen years the family lived on a farm in Arcola, coming to Storm Lake, Iowa, March 1st, 1901, where he purchased a farm of 320 acres and lived on it one year. For the past thirty years he has lived in Storm Lake. For fifteen years he was engaged in buying and shipping live stock. For the past fifteen years he has farmed eighty acres of land, which he owns within and adjoining the city of Storm Lake. He has served as township trustee, school director sixteen years, city councilman of Storm Lake, and member of the Buena Vista county board of supervisors ten years. A member of the Storm Lake chamber of commerce, the Masonic order, A. F. & A. M., and the Royal Arch Chapter, the Eastern Star, K. P. lodge, M. W. A., R. N. **F. H. BEATH.**—Representative from Adams county, was born on a farm near Nodaway, Adams county, Iowa, February 17, 1872, and since 1875 has lived on the farm where he now resides. Received his education in the rural schools of his community. On January 15, 1896, was married to Nellie Cramer. Served as township assessor two years; president of the school board ten years; township trustee seven years. Is charter member of the Adams county farm bureau, serving as president four years. Is chairman of boys' 4-R club, and is also a member of local shipping association. Was chosen master farmer in 1927. Is republican in politics.

**H. S. BERRY.**—Representative from Monroe county, was born on a farm in Wapello county, Iowa, July 22, 1857, moving with his parents to Monroe county in 1865. Received his education in the country schools; taught school four years; served as member of the board of supervisors six years; served as mayor of the city of Albia eight years. Is married and has three children. His occupation is that of a farmer and live stock dealer. Elected representative in 1920, re-elected in 1922, 1924, 1926, 1928, and 1930. A republican.

**A. H. BONNSTETTER.**—Representative from the eighty-fifth district, Kossuth county, was born on a farm near West Bend, Iowa, November 20th, 1892. He was educated in the schools of this locality and took a two year normal course at Highland Park college. He taught in the public schools of Iowa three years and completed four years of work at Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, Indiana. In August, 1919, he was married to Miss Charlotte Anderegg. They have one son, Rex. About the time of his marriage Mr. Bonnstetter went back to farming. He

has since acquired and is managing a pure bred herd of dairy cattle. An active member in farm organization activities. He has been serving on the school board for a number of years and is a member of the Masonic order. A democrat in politics.

**ED. R. BROWN.**—Representative from Polk county, was born in Adair county, November 11, 1876. Attended the public schools in Greenfield, and later the Capital City Commercial College, Des Moines, graduating in 1895; official court reporter two years in the tenth district, under appointment by Judge J. J. Tolbert, of Cedar Falls; confidential secretary for Governor Leslie M. Shaw two years. Attended Drake University, law department, graduating in June, 1900; admitted to the bar January, 1900, and commenced the practice of law at Stuart, Iowa, in November, 1900, where he practiced seven years. Elected county attorney Adair county and served two terms. Returned to Des Moines in 1914, and was associated with James B. Weaver of Des Moines fifteen years. January 1, 1930, he formed a partnership with Paul G. James and Dring D. Needham, and is now practicing law in Des Moines under the firm name of Brown, James & Needham. Became active in Polk county politics after he came here in 1914, and was elected to the forty-fourth general assembly November 4, 1930. Is a member of the First Methodist church of Des Moines and of the Masonic bodies, including Za-Ga-Zig Temple of the Shrine. He married in 1900 Katherine Cowell of Manchester, Iowa.

**FRANK C. BYERS.**—Representative from Linn county, was born in Alden, Hardin county, June 20, 1883. Attended public school at Alden and graduated from the Alden high school. Attended Grinnell college. Graduated from the law department of the University of Iowa and admitted to the practice of law in 1904. Married October, 1909, to Myra Lyon of Iowa City. Has three children, Katherine, Ganson L. and Frank C., Jr. Located at Cedar Rapids, Iowa in 1905. Has practiced law there since that time. Served as assistant city attorney and assistant county attorney. Member of the Cedar Rapids board of education since 1924, president of the board for the year ending March, 1928. Member of Mt. Hermon lodge, A. F. & A. M., the Iowa Consistory at Cedar Rapids, El Kahir Temple of the Mystic Shrine, Cedar Rapids Chamber of Commerce, B. P. O. E., Cedar Rapids Country Club, the Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity and Sigma Nu general fraternity. Member of the Episcopal church. Republican.

**JAMES E. CRAVEN.**—Representative from Jasper county, was born on a farm near Kellogg, Jasper county, Iowa, September 6, 1866. His parents were both born in the state of New York, coming to Iowa in the early sixties. After leaving the country school he took a three years course in Hazel Dell Academy, at Newton, Iowa. Is engaged in farming, stock raising and various other occupations. Was married to Miss Julia Smith of Poweshiek county, Iowa, December 14, 1892. Has four children—two boys and two girls. Has served as township trustee, and member of the board of education in his community for a number of years. Was a candidate for county supervisor, also a member of the legislature a few years ago, being defeated by a very small majority each time. Was then elected to the thirty-sixth general assembly November 3, 1914. Was elected to the forty-fourth general assembly again November 4, 1930. Is a democrat in politics.

**LARENCE W. DAVIS.**—Representative from Delaware county, a farmer, was born in Marion county, May the 13th, 1886, educated in the rural schools, married June 4th, 1907, to Fern Mason, of Knoxville, Iowa, and is the father of seven children, five girls and two boys. In the spring of 1908 moved to Wyoming, where he resided until 1918, then moving to Delaware county, where he has resided since that time. A republican.

**C. O. DAYTON.**—Representative from Washington county, was born in that county, December 11, 1871. Received his early education in the rural school located on the farm that he now owns. He was never able to attend school in the summer time, having to work on the farm to make a living. Thus he succeeded in gradu-

ating from the Keota high school in the class of 1891. For four years thereafter he taught school in the winter and farmed in the summer. In the year 1894 he was married to Miss Louella Davis. Two sons were born to this union, Kenneth and Raymond. He is a United Presbyterian by faith. A republican in politics. He has held the following offices of trust: School director, secretary and treasurer, township clerk and assessor, mayor and councilman of Keota and member of the board of supervisors of Washington county. Was elected to the general assembly in 1928 and again in 1930.

O. J. DITTO.—Representative from Osceola county, Iowa. Was born at Onawa, Iowa, on January 26, 1894. Parents moved to Sibley, Osceola county, Iowa, in 1895. Attended public school at Sibley, graduating in 1912; attended Cedar Rapids Business College. Enlisted in World war; discharged in January, 1919. Served one year as deputy county auditor of Osceola county. Married in June, 1921. Owner of Osceola County Abstract Company. Member of Masonic order, Sibley Rotary club, American Legion, president, Iowa fair managers association and secretary of the Osceola county fair.

P. H. DONLON.—Representative from Palo Alto county, grew to manhood in northern Illinois working on a farm, in a coal mine and as public school teacher. Was a student at Illinois State Normal and the University of Illinois. Came to Iowa in 1883 and for forty-eight years has been a continuous resident of Palo Alto county, working at farming, teaching, banking and in the postal service. For the past nine years he has resided on his farm near Ruthven, Iowa. A democrat in politics.

J. LEROY DRAKE.—Representative from Keokuk county, was born in Scott county, Iowa, September 2nd, 1892, the son of Rev. and Mrs. S. R. Drake. Moved with his parents to Louisa county where he grew to manhood. Entered a banking business in 1910, in which vocation he has since been continuously engaged in Louisa, Washington and Keokuk counties with the exception of the years 1917 and 1918, during which time he served in the World war. Was married May 28th, 1925, to Francis Lee Chacey of Richland, Iowa. A democrat in politics.

THEODORE DRAKE.—Representative from Muscatine county. Born in Fruitland township, Muscatine county, in 1871. Educated in public schools. Has engaged in farming, growing and shipping of watermelons, cantaloupe, and sweet potatoes his entire life. Was member of board of supervisors from January 1, 1919, to January 1, 1931. Member of the Presbyterian church. Was married December 12, 1911, to Allie B. Contryman, who died February 12, 1917. On October 16, 1921, was united in marriage to Mabel C. Zeidler. There being three children, Charles Theodore, Rodney Milton, and Florence Elizabeth, twins. Was elected to state legislature in 1930. A republican.

S. B. DURANT.—Representative from Hancock county, was born on a farm in Madison township, Hancock county, January 9, 1873, where he and his family now reside. He grew to manhood in this neighborhood. At the age of seventeen he passed a teacher's examination. Taught school twelve years. Since 1903 his principal occupation has been farming. Was farm bureau director eight years, school treasurer twenty years, is stockholder and member of a number of co-operative organizations. Is chairman of the official board of the Calvary Baptist church at Forest City. Married Miss Edith A. Howland, November 5th, 1902. Has one daughter, Velma, and two adopted boys, Donald and Leo. Served in the thirty-sixth general assembly as state representative, re-elected to the forty-fourth general assembly. Republican in politics.

FRANK W. ELLIOTT.—Representative from Scott county, was born on a farm in Sumner county, Kansas, in 1887, educated in the public schools and graduated from high school. He has been a resident of Iowa since 1909, during which year he came to Davenport, taking up the study of chiropractic. Graduated from the Palmer School of Chiropractic and since that time has been connected with this school in

an official capacity, as registrar and general manager. Also manager of radio stations WOC and WHO. Was married in 1910 to Hazel D. Johnson, at Winfield, Kansas; has no children. He is a member of all Masonic bodies and of the B. P. O. E. Elected representative in 1919, 1921, 1922, 1928, and 1930. A republican in politics.

**E. O. ELLSWORTH.**—Representative from Hardin county, was born in Iowa Falls in the county he represents and where he is still engaged in the banking and farm loan business. Was actively identified with the construction of the Des Moines, Iowa Falls and Northern Railroad from Iowa Falls to Des Moines, now a part of the Rock Island system. During the World war was assigned to the preliminary military training of all boys called into service from Hardin county. Member of both York and Scottish branches of Masonry. Elected to forty-third assembly. Re-elected to forty-fourth. Republican.

**ERNEST H. FABRITZ.**—Democratic representative from Wapello county, born near Eddyville, Iowa, May 17th, 1895. Finished school at seventeen and took up office work four years. Then entered the Lewis Institute, Chicago, and after two years at college enlisted in the United States army. During the World War served more than a year in France where he was commissioned lieutenant of infantry. Engaged in the hardware business and is now president of Ernest H. Fabritz, Inc., with two stores at Ottumwa, Iowa. Served as commander O. B. Nelson post American Legion, as president of the Iowa implement dealers association, and as director of Ottumwa chamber of commerce. Is a director of the Iowa retail hardware dealers' association. Married and has four children. A Catholic, member of the Knights of Columbus, and the Holy Name Society.

**VICTOR FELTER.**—Elected republican representative of Warren county in 1930, was born in Tama county, Iowa, in 1877. He received his high school education at Washta, Cherokee county, where his father was a farmer and nurseryman twenty-five years. He attended the first farmers' short course held at Ames in 1901 and has attended most of the short courses held since that time. Was secretary of one of the first corn clubs, also secretary of the Cherokee county farmers Institute. He purchased his first farm near Cherokee, later farming three years in Dallas county. In 1915 Mr. Felter assisted in the installation of the Iowa agricultural display at the San Francisco Panama-Pacific international exposition and was in charge during the entire judging period when Iowa won the grand prize on the famous horn of plenty. Re-elected in 1930. He is a member of the I. O. O. F. and Masonic lodges and the Presbyterian church. A republican.

**HENRY C. FINNERN.**—Representative from Crawford county, was born at Fredesdorf, Holstein, Germany, August 13, 1877. Came to Crawford county in 1891,

spending one year working on a farm and then started his career as printer and newspaper publisher. Is at present senior member of the firm of Finnern & Vosgerau, publisher of The Denison Bulletin at Denison. Married May 27, 1903, to Miss Frieda Vosgerau, native of Crawford county. They have four children: Lillian, Ruby, Arnold, and Norma. One son died September 4, 1923, on the seventh anniversary of his birth. Member of Zion's Evangelical Lutheran church and has been an official of same for the past fourteen years, now holding the office of financial secretary. President of the Denison Opera House Company since its organization in 1913. Was elected representative of the fifty-sixth district in 1928 on the democratic ticket. Re-elected in 1930.

L. B. FORSLING.—Representative from Woodbury county, was born in Sioux City, March 23, 1890. Attended grade and high school in Sioux City, graduated in law from Cumberland university; general practice in law in Sioux City since 1915. Police judge of Sioux City, 1918. Married Lillian Nash, February 12, 1914. Elected representative, 1920; re-elected 1922, 1924, 1926, 1928, and 1930. Republican in politics.

J. P. GALLAGHER.—Representative from Iowa county, was born on a prairie farm near Williamsburg, and his home has always been near the place of his nativity. For thirty years he has edited the Williamsburg Journal-Tribune. He served in the fortieth general assembly and in the extra session devoted to the revision of the code. He is a product of the country school, a progressive democrat in politics, and is a member of the Catholic church.

HARRY F. GARRETT.—Representative from Wayne county, Iowa, was born December 24th, 1887, at Corydon, Iowa. He graduated from Corydon high school in 1907, and from the law department of the state university of Iowa in 1911. Married Louie Oneall in 1927. He is a member of the Phi Alpha Delta legal fraternity, Masonic lodge, American Legion, and Methodist Episcopal church. Served three terms as county attorney of Wayne county. Engaged in the general practice of law at Corydon. Member of the democratic party.

WM. T. GILMORE.—Representative from Cedar county, was born in Bellefontaine, Ohio. He was graduated from Iowa State College. Taught country school two terms; afterward engaged in the clothing business for some years. Is president of the Cedar County State Bank. Is a member of the Knights of Pythias, Consistory, Mystic Shrine, state historical society and the farm bureau. Served on the city council five years and was an alternate to the republican national convention in 1920. Member of the Iowa house since 1917 with the exception of 1925. Republican in politics.

W. H. GISSEL.—Representative from Buchanan county, was born in Buchanan county, September 16, 1872. Was reared on a farm and attended the public schools in his community. In 1893 he married Emma J. Bantz. They settled on a farm near Independence where they still reside. Representative Gissel was converted in 1894 and united with the Methodist church of which denomination he is still a member. Has family of nine children, four sons and five daughters. All of the daughters have been school teachers. Elected representative in 1930. A democrat.

LEWIS GREASER.—Representative from Benton county, born February 19, 1894. Graduated from Vinton high school in 1913 and from Iowa State College in 1917 in agricultural engineering. Actively engaged in farming since 1919. Veteran of the World War with overseas service from May, 1918, to February 1, 1919, Battery E, 337th F. A. Township farm bureau president two years. County farm bureau secretary two years. Member of the United Presbyterian church holding the office of treasurer. Co-winner in farm bureau state debate in 1929. Held the office of township assessor two years. Elected to the legislature in 1930 on republican ticket.

**H. M. GREENE.**—Representative from Pottawattamie county, was born on a farm near Avoca, Iowa, September 6, 1882. He attended rural school and Avoca high school; graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1906. He was admitted to the bar the same year but returned to farming, at which he is engaged at the present time. He enlisted as a private in L company, 168th infantry, Rainbow division, and was later made a sergeant. He was twice wounded. He is a charter member and first commander of Fred Funston Post, American Legion, at Avoca, Iowa. He is a Mason, a Shriner, and in politics a republican. Member of the forty-second, forty-second extra, forty-third, and forty-fourth general assemblies.

**JOHN T. HANSEN.**—Representative from Scott county, was born in the city of Davenport, Iowa, November 28, 1858. He attended the rural schools and afterwards received some private instruction. Learned the blacksmith trade, but went to farming when he became of age. Was married March 12, 1887, to Emma Horst of Scott county, who died October 6, 1897. There were born to them four children, two boys and two girls. Both boys are World war veterans. One served with the 88th division in France. Has served on the board of education of Sheridan township, one term as justice of the peace and as vice-president of the Scott county farm bureau. A member of the Iowa farm bureau federation. Served in the house since 1917 with the exception of 1921. A member of the Woodmen of the World. A republican in politics.

**PETER HANSEN.**—Representative from Audubon county, Iowa, was born of Danish parentage on a farm in Carroll county, July 16, 1885. He acquired his education in the common schools of the county and later attended Elk Horn college. When not attending school, he helped his father with the work on the farm. At the age of twenty he rented part of his father's farm for four years until he acquired a farm of his own. In 1916 he moved with his family to Audubon, where he engaged in the banking business until the spring of 1927, when he resigned his position as assistant cashier of the First National bank. He was married January 26, 1910, to Edna Anderson, of Audubon, and has a family of two girls. Elected representative in 1930. A republican in politics.

**HENRY N. HANSON.**—Representative from Winnebago county, was born on a farm in Webster county, Iowa, September 3, 1876. He received his education in the rural schools of his county, in Luther Academy at Bode, Humboldt county, Iowa, and at the Humboldt college, Humboldt, Iowa. He engaged in the general merchandise business with his father in 1893 until moving to North Dakota in the fall of 1902, filing on a homestead on which he lived and proved up in 1909. He then returned to Iowa and settled on a farm in Winnebago county. He served as a member of the board of supervisors, resigning to better look after his duties on the farm. Since 1914 he has acted as auditor of the co-operative elevator and creamery association at Leland. In June, 1928, was elected president of the Leland Co-operative bank; served in the forty-first, forty-second, forty-second extra, forty-third, and forty-fourth general assemblies. A republican.

**J. N. HAYES.**—Junior representative from Dubuque county. Born in Dubuque, educated in the parochial schools, and Campion College, Prairie Du Chien, Wisconsin. Entered the World war in August, 1917, served in the navy in foreign waters from April, 1918, to April, 1919. Honorably discharged. Engaged in general insurance business up to the present time. Married in 1922 to Florence McVay. They have five children: Robert, James, Marian, John, and Joan (twins). A democrat.

**E. O. HELGASON.**—Representative from Emmet county, was born in Mason City, Iowa, November 7, 1872. At the age of seven he moved with his parents to a farm in Seneca township, Kossuth county. He attended district school, completed a commercial course in a business college and attended Iowa State College at Ames two years. Except for three years in Louisiana, associated with his brothers who were levee contractors along the Mississippi, he has always lived in Iowa. Taught school

two years. Moved to a farm adjoining Armstrong in 1909 and at present resides in Armstrong. Married in 1900 to Mary Jenson and to this union were born five children: Lloyd, Ione, Lorenzo, Marietta, and Viola. Among other offices of trust filled by him he has served as road superintendent, township trustee and clerk, secretary of the Seneca township district school board eight years, director of the Armstrong consolidated school district eleven years, president of the board eight years, and republican county committeeman. Elected state representative to fill the vacancy in the forty-second extra session of the Iowa legislature caused by the death of R. B. Crone. Re-elected to the forty-third and forty-fourth general assemblies.

**G. H. HESSE.**—Representative from the eighty-second district, comprising O'Brien county, was born in Minonk, Illinois, on October 13, 1894. In 1899 the family moved to Hartley, Iowa, O'Brien county. Graduated from the Hartley high school in 1913 and from the University of Minnesota school of agriculture in 1916. Attended the University of Minnesota until World war was declared. World war veteran. Engaged in farming in O'Brien county. Married Margaret Olson of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Has three daughters—Billie, Betty Lou, and Gail Hesse. Charter member of the O'Brien county farm bureau. Charter member of the Arthur Krichoff American Legion post and served as its commander in 1930. Phi Kappa Epsilon and Masonic fraternities. Elected to the house of representatives in 1930. A republican in politics.

**FRANK HOLLINGSWORTH.**—Representative from Boone county, was born in Wisconsin. When two years old he moved with his parents to a farm in Dallas county, Iowa, which was his home until 1894. Entered the State University of Iowa in the fall of 1894, and graduated from the liberal arts and law school of the university in 1899. Began the practice of law at Boone, Iowa, in 1899. Married in 1901. He served as republican county chairman for many years. Was assistant county attorney of Boone county four years and elected county attorney in 1910 and 1912. City solicitor of Boone from 1917 to 1919. Served as county chairman for Boone county in liberty loan campaigns during 1918 and 1919. Aside from the law business, interested in farming and banking. A farm land owner and a director in the Boone State bank. A member of the various Masonic bodies, including the Shrine and the Consistory. Also a member of the Elks. Elected representative in 1926. Re-elected in 1928 and 1930. A republican.

**CHAS. A. HOLLIS.**—Representative from Black Hawk county, born in Black Hawk county in 1867, oldest of a family of six boys and three girls. Father enlisted in the army from Troy, N. Y., and served three years. Was married in 1887 to Miss Carrie Buck of Black Hawk county and immediately went to farming for himself, at all times handling purebred and high-grade stock. Active in all organizations for the betterment of rural conditions. Moved to Cedar Falls in 1906 to educate his children, one boy and one girl. Traveled three years for the Independent Telephone association and promoted the first independent copper toll line between Burlington and Des Moines. Assisted in organizing and was president and manager of the Black Hawk Oil Company, Cedar Falls. At the present time is in partnership with his son in the business of raising purebred Holsteins. Member of the First Brethren church. Elected representative in 1922, re-elected in 1924, 1926, 1928, and 1930. Republican in politics.

**CHAS. S. HOOK.**—Representative from Taylor county, was born near Waynesburg, Pennsylvania, October 14, 1864. He was educated in the rural schools. In the spring of 1887 he came to Hancock county, Illinois, where he was engaged in working by the month on a farm. In the fall of 1892 he was married to Alice Anderson of Disco, Illinois. They immediately came to Taylor county, Iowa, and began housekeeping on the farm they still own and on which they continued to live until the spring of 1925 when they moved to New Market. They have two children, Bertha Madden, living near the old home north of New Market and Byard L., living on the home place. While living on the farm he bred



and showed purebred stock with marked success besides feeding cattle. A member of the Methodist church, Farmers Union, Modern Woodmen and subordinate and encampment branches of the I. O. O. F. A democrat in politics.

**GEORGE M. HOPKINS.**—Representative from Guthrie county, was born October 16, 1866, in Bear Grove, Iowa. He was educated in the rural schools and the Guthrie county high school, the Western Normal college at Shenandoah, Iowa, and the Valparaiso Normal school, Valparaiso, Ind. He taught four years in the rural schools of Iowa and Nebraska, served seven years as principal of the Bassett village schools, eight years as county superintendent of Rock county, Nebraska, twelve years as president of the township school board and eleven years on the county board of education. He was married in 1894 to Anna Laura Green of Kirkwood, Nebraska. They have five children: Margie, Mark, Macey, Dorothy, and Donald. In religious faith he is Unitarian. He has always taken an active part in politics and in the public welfare work of his community. He was elected representative in 1926, 1928, and 1930. A republican.

**RALPH R. HUNT.**—Representative from Louisa county, was born in Marshall township, Louisa county, 1879. Educated in the public schools of Wapello, Iowa. Worked at printer's trade four years, taught school nine years and was elected county superintendent of schools, 1906, serving in that capacity six years. He superintended the schools at Oakville, Iowa, one year after returning to his farm, in 1912. There are two children, Reed L., and Helen D., by his first wife, Mary Pearl Parsons, who died in December, 1913. November 22, 1924, he was united in marriage to Sofie Kramer. The past eighteen years he has devoted his entire time to farming. Elected to the legislature in 1926, re-elected in 1928 and 1930. A republican.

**HOMER HUSH.**—Representative from Montgomery county, was born in West township, Montgomery county, on the farm which he now owns and operates, July 14, 1889. His parents settled in Montgomery county at an early time and lived for more than thirty years on this same farm. Educated in the schools of Montgomery county and Simpson college. Married Ada M. Fryrear in 1910. They have three boys, Howard, Clarence, and Merle. He is a member of the Methodist church, Masonic lodge, and Eastern Star. Served as president of the Montgomery county farm bureau, and is now serving his second term as representative.

**ORA E. HUSTED.**—Representative from Madison county, was born in Ohio township, Madison county, March 20, 1876. Has spent his entire life except seven years in the community in which he now resides. Received his education in the schools of that county. Was married January 23, 1899, to Etna E. Kale. To this union was born four children: Cresley, Esther, Merrill, and Maurice. Maurice died at the age of four years. A member of the Methodist Episcopal church, having served on the official board for more than thirty years. A member of the county and state Sunday school associations. Has given Sunday school talks in almost every church in Madison county and in a great many churches in adjoining counties, often being called on to fill the pulpit for pastors of his county. Active in Hi. Y. and boys club work. Active in farm bureau and local activities. Rendered a great many years of service on township school boards. Was on local finance board during World war. Was reared on a farm and has always been actively engaged in farming and stock raising, especially of hogs. A republican, serving first term as representative twenty-eighth district.

**W. E. S. HUTCHSON.**—Representative from Greene county, was born in Webster county, Iowa, May 30, 1896. Graduated from the Jefferson high school in 1913. Attended the University of Iowa, receiving degrees of L.A. in 1918 and L.L.C. in 1920. Married to Elsie Hubbard of Elliott, Iowa, on February 20th, 1924. Has two children, James Francis and Elsie Jean. Is a member of the Presbyterian church, Masonic lodge and American Legion. Engaged in the practice of law in Jefferson, Iowa. A republican.

**FRANCIS JOHNSON.**—Representative from Dickinson county, was born in Butler county, August 6, 1890. With his parents, F. H. and Anna Johnson, moved to

Dickinson county in 1904. Was graduated from Terril and Spirit Lake high schools. Attended Iowa State University, graduating from the College of Law, and admitted to the bar in 1912. Since that time he has been actively interested in all of the affairs of his home community. Member of the farm bureau, served as county president. Is a member and Past Master of Richloyd Lodge of A. F. and A. M. at Terril. Is superintendent of the Methodist Sunday school and is a member of the official church board. His wife was formerly Miss Sara Thompson whom he married in 1914. A republican in politics. Elected to the legislature in 1922, serving continuously since then and elected speaker of the house of representatives of the forty-fourth general assembly.

**JOSEPH H. JOHNSON.**—Representative from Marion county, was born on a farm in that county July 26, 1878. Attended the district school, graduated from Central college at Pella, Iowa, in 1908, and from the law department of the University of Chicago in 1905. Engaged in the general practice of law at Knoxville. He is president of the board of education of the independent school district of Knoxville, a member of the national council of the Y. M. C. A., member of the state committee of the Y. M. C. A., a member of the Masonic lodge. Married Pearl Eastburn July 31, 1907, and has four children. Elected to legislature in 1924, re-elected in 1926, 1928, and 1930. Chosen speaker of the house of representatives of the forty-third general assembly. Republican in politics.

**GEORGE A. KERN.**—Representative from Polk county, born in Ft. Madison, Iowa, September 6, 1900. Graduated from the Des Moines high schools and Georgetown University. Was admitted to the practice of law in Iowa, in 1922. Married February 16, 1924, to Hazel Plummer. Has two sons and a daughter. Elected to the forty-fourth general assembly. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM W. KOCH.**—Representative from Bremer county, was born in that county, October 17, 1886. Attended rural school and later Wartburg College at Waverly, graduating from its commercial course in 1905. Was teller in bank at Readlyn three years, then entered in the general merchandise business at the same place, later entering grocery business at Waverly, selling it in 1925 and since then he has engaged in several other interests. Married in 1908 to Wilhelmina Diekmann, have one boy, Kenneth. Lutheran in faith and democrat in politics.

**HENRY KOHLER.**—Representative from Plymouth county, was born in Fayette county, March 6, 1874, and moved with his parents to Plymouth county, 1879. Like many native Iowa boys he received his early education in a rural school. Later in life he attended normal and business college in Le Mars. Married Lucy Weber in 1899 and has five children: Elmer, Frank, George, Herbert, and Doris. Mrs. Kohler died April 12, 1929. On June 10, 1930, he married Henriette Degner. For twenty years he has operated and lived on the same farm. In 1919 he retired to Le Mars. In 1930 he was elected state representative from Plymouth county on the democratic ticket.

**C. W. LAMB.**—Representative from Dallas county, was born in Dallas county, June 7, 1868. He received his education in the Panora and Redfield, Iowa, schools. Employed in the harness making trade two years. For many years has been engaged in extensive farming. He has held every township and school office in his community and has given much of his time to the duties of those positions. Was instrumental in placing a consolidated school at Redfield, Iowa. Appointed on important committees during the World war. Had two sons overseas. His father was a veteran of the Civil war, being with Sherman on that memorable march from Atlanta to the sea. He was married to Carrie M. Mohr, of Redfield, Iowa, in 1892. To them were born six children: Virgil H., Charles H., Roy M., Willard D., Colwell, and one daughter, Lorena. Has always been affiliated with the republican party. Served on the state staff of Sons of Veterans organization of Iowa. A member of the Christian church. Elected representative in 1928 and again in 1930.

**CHARLES M. LANGLAND.**—Representative from Winneshiek county, Iowa, was born November 25th, 1870, in Pleasant township, Winneshiek county. At the age of six years the family moved over into Highland township of the same county, settling on the farm which now is the representative's home. He received his early education in the rural schools and later attended Breckenridge's Decorah Institute after which he entered the teaching profession which he followed for seven years. In the fall of 1899 was appointed deputy county auditor of Winneshiek county, continuing in this work until March 1st, 1903, when he resigned and went back to the old homestead which is now his home. On October 1st, 1906, he assumed the duties of assistant cashier of the State Bank of Spring Grove, at Spring Grove, Minnesota, which position he held until March 1st, 1921. Completed Imogene public school and the Christian Brothers college in St. Joseph, Missouri. Taught school in Fremont county in 1900, 1901 and 1902. Was married April 20, 1909, to Theresa O'Brien. They have three children: Matthew, Lucille, and Louis. Farmer and stock raiser. Started raising pure bred polled Shorthorn cattle in 1908 and has improved and enlarged the herd. Elected representative in 1926 and 1930. In politics democrat.

**ELLET LEPLEY.**—Representative from Grundy county, was born near Gifford, Hardin county, Iowa, February 15, 1869. Educated in the district schools, New Providence Academy, and the Iowa State College. Taught in the public schools of Hardin and Grundy counties for several years. Was married in 1895 to Miss Cora M. Walton, of New Providence, Iowa. Moved near Beaman, Grundy county, Iowa, in 1897, where he has since been continuously engaged in farming. Has five children: Marion C., Maud E., Katie H., William M., and Silas R. Has held several county and township offices, and was for two years president of the Grundy County Farm Bureau organization. Elected to the legislature in 1924 and 1930. Is a democrat in politics.

**E. M. LICHTY.**—Representative from Black Hawk county, was born in Orange township, Black Hawk county, Iowa, February 2, 1867. When he was six months old his parents moved on the farm where he has lived continuously ever since, and which he now owns. He received his education in the rural schools and business college at Waterloo; married in 1889 to Emma Miller of Somerset county, Pennsylvania. To this union were born seven children, one of whom died in infancy. He has made farming his life work, always raising and feeding a large number of hogs, besides dairying and cattle feeding. After being elected to the fortieth general assembly he resigned as president of the consolidated school board, secretary and treasurer of the telephone company, (which office he held for twenty years), township trustee, and chairman of township farm bureau. schools. Attended medical department of the Illinois State University in Chicago. Graduated in 1899. Located in Rockford, Iowa. In 1904 moved to Mason City and has lived there since that time. One of the founders of Park Hospital in 1909. Still a member of the staff. Member of the American Medical Association. Treasurer of the Austin Flint-Cedar Valley Medical Society. Assistant councillor of the Fourth district of Iowa. Served as County Coroner twenty consecutive years. Knight Templar, Shriner, member of the Kiwanis Club in Mason City. Member of the Congregational Church. Married Sue Lyon in 1901. Has two children: Mrs. M. F. Miller, of Mason City, and son Draper, who is a student in Rush Medical College, Chicago. Republican in politics.

**CHARLES E. MALONE.**—Representative from Cass county, was born in Cass county, Iowa, October 24, 1881. Attended country school, became interested in agricultural work, the growing and exhibiting of purebred seed corn, and other grains. Served as assistant superintendent Iowa department of agriculture at the World's Fair held at St. Louis, Missouri, in 1903. Was married to Edna E. Harris, April 18, 1906. Have two sons: Claude and Cecil. Engaged in farming. Served four years as county treasurer of Cass county; also six years as a member of the board of supervisors. Chosen by Dante Pierce of the Iowa Homestead to represent the farmers of the middle west in Chicago in 1930 at the installing of the new equipment by the C. R. I. & P. R. R. A lifelong democrat and farmer.

**HOWARD A. MATHEWS.**—Representative from Des Moines county, was born on a farm September 27, 1866, attended district school and was graduated from the Danville, Iowa, high school in 1887. He was married to Miss Emma A. Gugeler, October 29, 1896. Four children were born to them. Alvin, George, and Grace, are married; Alvin living in Buffalo, New York, and the latter two at Danville, Iowa. Lorin lives at home. Mr. Mathews taught school twelve years in the fall and winter, working on a farm during the spring and summer. In 1899 he was elected county superintendent of schools and moved to Burlington. This office he held nine years. He was then elected principal of the Washington school, Burlington. The following year he was unanimously re-elected, but gave up school work and moved to the farm, his present home, in the spring of 1910. A few years ago he was chosen a director of the Danville State Savings Bank; and of the Burlington Joint Stock Land Bank. He was elected state representative in 1922, 1924, 1926, 1928, and 1930. Studied law in the office of Mayne and Green in Council Bluffs, was admitted to practice in 1914 and has been in the active practice of law since that time. Elected in 1930 to the forty-fourth general assembly. Is a member of B. P. O. E. and Masonic orders and Delta Tau Delta fraternity. Republican in politics.

**MARION R. McCAULEY.**—Representative from Calhoun county, was born in Calhoun county, June 4, 1894, son of F. M. and Margaret Barr McCauley. Attended and graduated from the rural schools and city schools of Lake City, Iowa. Attended Waterloo Business College, State University of Iowa, State University of Kentucky, and graduated LL.B. in 1915. Since graduation in law partnership at Lake City with Honorable John W. Jacobs, a former member of the legislature. Married in 1915 to Miss Blanche Hinton, Lake City, Iowa. Have one child, Marion R., Jr., born in 1923. Enlisted in regular army, World war; later commissioned as second lieutenant; holds rank of captain of infantry. Member of Masonic orders, including Shrine; Alpha Delta Sigma and Delta Chi, national col-

lege fraternities. Member of American Legion and was post commander for some time. Member of school board; independent school district, Lake City, for several years. Baptist in religion. County attorney of Calhoun county two terms, city attorney, Lake City, several years. Elected representative in 1924. Member of forty-first, forty-second extra, forty-third and forty-fourth general assemblies. A republican in politics.

D. R. McCREERY.—Representative from Linn county, was born on a farm near Cedar Rapids, February 14, 1881, and has lived in Linn county all his life, where he received his education in the public schools. Was married to Letitia M. Quass in 1906. Has always been actively engaged in farming and stock raising and is now a breeder of purebred Duroc Jersey swine. He was elected representative in the forty-third general assembly and re-elected in the November election of 1930. A republican.

JOHN McDERMOTT.—Representative from Adair county. Born in Richland county, Ohio, February 17, 1858. Moved with parents to Iowa the same year and settled on farm in Benton township, Cass county. Educated in the public schools, moved to the south part of the county, Massena township, in 1880, on a farm and continued farming. Married Anna Marsh, March 11, 1884. They have six children living, three sons and three daughters. Remained in Cass county until 1892, then moved to Bridgewater, Adair county, and engaged in the lumber business, still continuing farming and stock raising. In 1900 added the grain business to his other lines which he continued fifteen years. He still continues the other lines. A democrat in politics.

W. J. McLAIN.—Representative from Poweshiek county, was born in Illinois, January 21st, 1866. He came with his parents to Poweshiek county in 1873. Attended the public schools of his home county including three terms at Grinnell. Married at Fort Collins, Colorado, December 24th, 1896, to Minnie L. Breniman. To this union five children were born. He was engaged in farming and stock raising until 1929 when he and his wife returned to Brooklyn, the sons taking over the farms and managing the land on a partnership basis. A republican.

F. D. MEAD.—Representative from Howard county, was born at Cresco, Iowa, August 8th, 1870. He attended the Cresco public schools, graduating in 1886. He is editor and publisher of the Cresco Plain Dealer, established in 1859 by his father and uncle at New Oregon, a village abandoned when the railroad reached Cresco, two miles distant, in 1866. Since the establishment of the Plain Dealer, now in its seventy-second volume, it has been continuously in the possession of the Mead family, and a complete file of all issues has been kept. Postmaster at Cresco from 1915 to 1923, is now member of the school board and is past president of Community Club. Secretary of Howard county fair since 1925 and is also treasurer of Iowa fair managers association. Married in 1902 to Pearl Buchanan and has two sons both associated with him in the publishing business. Is a member of the Episcopal church, Masonic Blue Lodge and Chapter, all branches of Odd Fellowship, Woodmen of the World and A. O. U. W. Democrat.

GEO. E. MILLER.—Representative from Shelby county, was born November 6, 1876, in the same county which he represents in the legislature. Attended the district school and completed the high school course at Harlan, Iowa. He taught school five years in earlier life; has held various offices of trust in his township and county, acting as president of school board, assessor and county supervisor for nine years. He was elected representative in 1922, serving during the fortieth, fortieth extra, the forty-first, forty-second, forty-second extra, forty-third, and forty-fourth general assemblies. Was married in 1903 to Della Ramsey of Portsmouth, Iowa. They have three daughters. Mr. Miller has been engaged in active farming ever since married. Is a member of the Masonic order and is a Shriner. A democrat in politics.

**PAUL L. MILLHONE.**—Representative from Page county. Was born on a farm in Page county, Iowa, December 8, 1892. Was educated in the public schools of Page county and graduated from Simpson College at Indianola, Iowa, in 1917, and from Western Reserve Law School of Cleveland, Ohio, in 1922. Practiced law in Shenandoah and Clarinda, Iowa, since 1922. County attorney of Page county, Iowa, from January 1, 1925, to January 1, 1931. Married to Margaret Griffith, of Des Moines, in 1926. Has two children: Martha Mary and Ruth Margaret. Member Alpha Tau Omega, college fraternity, and Phi Delta Phi, law fraternity. Member of the Masonic lodge and the Presbyterian church. Republican in politics.

**O. P. MORTON.**—Representative from Wright county, was born in Bremer county in 1860. Spent the years 1862 and 1863 with his parents in Fort Randall and Fort Sully, South Dakota, where his father was stationed as a member of the 7th Iowa Cavalry. Lived in Iowa Falls from 1864 to 1875, when he, with the family, moved to the farm in Wright county which has since been his home. Attended school in the country and at Iowa Falls. Taught school during the winters from 1878 to 1891. Has helped to form and carry on many of the farm organizations of the county. Has been a director and member of the executive board of the Farmers' Insurance Company of Wright county since its organization in 1890. Has always been interested in schools and has served as secretary or treasurer of the local school board since 1896. In 1892 was married to Anna H. Birdsall, who passed away in 1927. Is a member of I. O. O. F. A republican.

**FRED W. NELSON.**—Representative from Story county. He came to Cherokee county in Iowa in May of that year and maintained residence in the county so that when the necessary five years had elapsed, he was granted citizenship papers at the first term of court held there in September, 1896, presided over by Judge Scott M. Ladd, later justice of the supreme court. In 1899, he was married to Marie Erikson, to which union eight children were born—four sons and four daughters. Has lived on and farmed the same place in Pilot township since purchasing it twenty-five years ago. Served as school director seventeen years and as trustee several years. **GEORGE O'DONNELL.**—Representative from Carroll county, was born in Stephenson county, Illinois. Came with his parents to Carroll county and lived on a farm five miles northwest of Carroll. Was township trustee of Maple River township six years, superintendent of road and road dragging eight years. Employed with Chicago and North Western railroad the last seven years. Elected in 1928 and 1930. A democrat.

**CREIGHTON J. ORR.**—Representative from Clayton county. Born in Postville, Iowa, April 26, 1885. Moved with his parents when six years old, to Monona, Clayton county, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the public schools. Has been engaged in farming and is now in the mercantile business. Has served as township clerk and mayor. Was married June 9, 1909, to Jean McClelland, of Monona. They have one son, Thomas M., born September, 1918. Member of I. O. O. F and Masonic orders including Shrine. Elected in 1928 and 1930. In politics a republican.

**ISAAC WALTER OSBORN.**—Representative from Decatur county, was born on a farm in Burrell township near Davis City, March 30, 1878. Resided continuously on the farm on which he was born for thirty-six years, until 1915, when he removed to Leon, Iowa, because of educational advantages for his children. Has always been interested in farming, operating his farm either by hired labor or on stock share plan. Was united in marriage to Nelle Mae Jackson November 2, 1898. To this union six children were born, four girls and two sons, one of whom, Marion J., has passed to his reward. In early life taught rural school in connection with farming activities, having received a rural school education and graduating from the Davis City high school, 1898. Has taken active part in community affairs and identified himself with young people's activities. Was boy scout leader six years. Member of the Methodist Episcopal church since early boyhood. Served as township assessor twelve years; secretary of school board, eight years; county auditor of Decatur county, two terms, and county agricultural agent of Decatur county farm bureau, twelve years. To this union three children were born, one dying in infancy and the other at the age of seven. A daughter, Helen, is now attending Parsons College at Fairfield. He is a Mason, Shriner, and in politics a democrat.

**H. C. PATTISON.**—Representative from Jefferson county, was born on a farm near Fairfield, Iowa, March 7, 1868. Farmer. Married Eliza Stout, March 17, 1896, who died August 13, 1924. Had three children. Earl, deceased, and Paul and Edna, still living. Served on the county board of supervisors, was secretary of the school board, township clerk and trustee, and director and treasurer of the Farmers Insurance company. Member of the Presbyterian church and Odd Fellows lodge. Elected representative in 1926. Re-elected in 1928 and 1930. Republican in politics.

**MILTON PEACO.**—Representative from Clinton county, was born in Belle Plaine, Iowa. When two years of age he moved with his parents, Thomas C. and Mary E. Peaco to Clinton county where he has since resided. He was educated in the public schools of Clinton. Entered the service of the Chicago Northwestern railroad company when he was fifteen years of age where he is still employed as a machinist. In 1899 he married Sadie E. Cook, daughter of Robert E. and Nancy M. Cook. He is a member of the Christian church, a thirty-second degree Mason, a member of the Eastern Star and democrat in politics.

**CAROLYN CAMPBELL PENDRAY.**—Representative from Jackson county, first woman to serve in the Iowa general assembly during the forty-third regular session, was born at Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, in 1881, is the daughter of the late Thomas Franklin Campbell and Harriett Emily Dutton. Received her early education in the public schools of Mt. Pleasant. Her professional record of twenty years teaching includes seven years as county superintendent of schools of Henry county and the teaching of primary methods in three summer school sessions at Iowa Wesleyan College. Is the wife of W. J. Pendray, a merchant of Maquoketa, to whom she was married in 1920. An active worker in democratic party, now a member of state central committee serving as chairwoman in second congressional district. A member of Congregational church, P. E. O. Society, Outlook Study Club, B. & P. W. League, and interested in all community activities.

**JAMES L. RANDALL.**—Representative from Lucas county, was born on a farm in Lucas county, Iowa, October 14, 1877. On October 15, 1899, was married to Marguerite Noland, formerly of Hardin county, Iowa. Have one daughter, Frances Louise. Is a member of U. B. Church, Chariton, Iowa. In the fall of 1910, purchased a farm and moved on it in the spring of 1911. Living there one year. In 1912 was chosen steward of county home, serving in that capacity four years. Then moved back to his own farm, on which he still resides. Served two terms as township assessor; three years on county board. Elected state representative 1928—re-elected in 1930. Republican in politics.

**S. F. RANDOLPH.**—Representative from Davis county, was born January 2, 1871, on a farm near Dean, Appanoose county, Iowa. Attended rural school and assisted on the farm and in the timber during vacation. At the age of fourteen he began to work as a farm hand on the farms of Appanoose county, attending school two or three months in the winter. In 1887 he moved with his parents to a farm near Bloomfield in Davis county, and continued to work as a farm hand, attending school in the home district a few weeks each winter, and studying at night during the summer to keep up with his class. In 1893 he attended the Southern Iowa Normal School at Bloomfield three months, and secured a certificate to teach. He taught in the rural districts of Davis county six years, continuing to work as a farm hand during vacation. In 1898 he married Miss Stella Good. They have two sons, both of whom graduated from the Southern Iowa Normal, taught school a number of years and are now engaged in farming. He and his two sons own and operate six hundred and forty acres of land, three miles southwest of Bloomfield in Wyacondah township. **Z. S. RATLIFF.**—Representative from Henry county, was born November 25, 1862, in the county he now represents in the legislature. He received his education in the rural schools and Whittier college. He was married to Amelia Dorcis Kramling of Kahoka, Missouri, October 7, 1891. Has one son, Paul, who is operating the home farm. He has engaged in farming and banking. Resigned as member of the executive committee of Iowa farm bureau federation when becoming a candidate for the legislature. Is an active member of the Presbyterian church. Elected to the general assembly in 1924, re-elected in 1926, 1928, and 1930. A republican in politics.

**ED. RAWLINGS.**—Representative from Monona county, was born in Platteville, Wisconsin, in 1871. He came to Monona county, Iowa, in 1875. Received his education in the common schools until he reached the age of seventeen years. Was then left to his own resources, both of his parents having passed away. Married Miss Effie Miller in 1896, who died January 8, 1929. They were the parents of four sons. He and his family have resided in Onawa for the past twenty-five years. He has held various offices, among them that of county sheriff seven years. At the present time he is a member of the Onawa board of education; president of



Monona county farm bureau and treasurer of Monona County Mutual Fire Insurance Association; secretary and treasurer of the Illinois Central Elevator Company; member of Onawa Community Club. Elected representative in 1928, re-elected in 1930. In politics a democrat.

**ISAAC M. REED.**—Representative from Mahaska county, was born near Barnesville, Belmont county, Ohio, February 22nd, 1870. Here he grew to manhood. He came to Rose Hill, Mahaska county, Iowa, June 27th, 1894, and resided there until 1911 when he moved to Oskaloosa, having been elected sheriff of Mahaska county. In this capacity, he served two terms. During his residence in Rose Hill, he served four years as mayor and six years as justice of the peace. Since 1898 has been actively engaged in the occupation of auctioneer except while he was sheriff. Has conducted purebred livestock sales in several states. For many years he has filled the capacity of judge of livestock in both state and international shows. Is also well known, not only in Iowa, but throughout the United States and Canada, because of his fraternal relations, especially those pertaining to the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, of which order he became a member in 1898. During the years 1929 and 1930, he was Supreme Monarchos of The Ancient Mystic Order of Samaritans of the United States and Canada. This is the play ground order for Odd Fellows. Secretary of a township school board fourteen years, and active in community organization work. President of the farm bureau from 1919 to 1923. Elected state representative in 1924 and has served continuously in the forty-first, forty-second, forty-second extra, forty-third, and forty-fourth general assemblies. Member of the Congregational church, I. O. O. F. and Masonic orders. A democrat.

**OVE T. ROE.**—Representative from Allamakee county, was born in the county which he represents, September 4, 1887. He received his early education in the rural schools and Upper Iowa University at Fayette, Iowa. He married Emma Kolsrud of Waterville, Iowa. Four children were born to them: Thomas, Melvin, Doris, and Kenneth. The following are some of the offices which he has held and still holds: He is president of the Paint Creek farmers telephone company, was president of the Allamakee county federal farm loan association, treasurer and director of the Allamakee county farm bureau, and president of the Luther League of the West Paint Creek church. He is a member of the Lutheran church. He has always taken an active part in the church, school and public affairs and has been and still is an official in these different activities. He has followed the occupation of a farmer with the exception of eight years while he was engaged in partnership with his brother, A. H. Roe, in the general merchandise business at Elon, Iowa. He was candidate for the state legislature in 1926 but was defeated by a majority of twenty-three votes. Elected in 1930. In politics he is a democrat.

**R. L. RUTLEDGE.**—Representative from Webster county, was born on a farm near Fort Dodge, Iowa, in 1888. Was graduated from Fort Dodge high school in 1908; won a scholarship to Iowa State college in the state judging contest at the Iowa state fair in 1908. Entered Ames in fall of 1908, called home by sickness of father in the spring of 1912, and has operated the farm near Fort Dodge ever since, with the exception of seven months in the aviation service in 1918. Married in 1917 to Mabel Mears of Marshalltown, Iowa. Four girls: Jean, Ann, Alice, and Mary. Interested in farm bureau work and agricultural activities before and since the war. Member of the international committee on agriculture of Kiwans

International. Elected representative from Webster county November 2, 1926, re-elected in 1928, and 1930.

**JOHN RYDER.**—Senior member of the house of representatives from Dubuque county, was born and reared in Dubuque, Iowa. He was educated in the parochial schools. He graduated from the Bayless Business College. For twenty-five years he was the junior member of the Ryder Brothers wholesale grocery firm. In 1919, he organized the Ryder Realty Company and served as vice-president until January, 1925, when he retired from the firm. In March, 1925, he was elected member of the board of education of the city of Dubuque and was appointed chairman of the finance committee. He was married in November, 1917, to Miss Anna L. Killeen, who died in May, 1923. He was elected to the general assembly November, 1924, re-elected in 1926, 1928, and 1930. A democrat in politics.

**J. F. RYLANDER.**—Representative from Marshall county, was born in Sweden, March 29, 1876. Came to Marshall county, Iowa, in 1893. Was educated in the common and extension schools of the old country and the Friends Academy of Le Grand, Iowa. Married Gertie H. Johnson, of Le Grand, July 24, 1901, and in the spring of 1902 began operations on a rented farm in the Le Grand community. There are three children in the family, Lois H., Carl E., and Hilda Jeannette. Has always been interested in the farmer's problems and has given considerable assistance to the organization of the farm bureau in Iowa and Minnesota. Was a member of the board of directors of Marshall county farm bureau for a number of years. Was elected president for three terms, but declined the honor for the third term because of lack of time. Is a stockholder in the Central Iowa fair association and served as its president for a number of years. Is an active member of the Friends church. Is a republican in politics and a Mason.

**LEROY SHIELDS.**—Representative from Clarke county, was born January 29, 1880, near Hopeville in Clarke county, Iowa, on a farm which he now owns and where he has continuously made his home. His parents came to Iowa in early childhood and knew the hardships of pioneer life. His father, J. H. C. Shields, was a veteran of the Civil war and a leader in all community interests. His mother, Frances Lawrence Shields, to whose pure life and gracious spirit he gladly pays tribute, is still living. The subject of this sketch received his education in the local schools, was a teacher for four years, minister of the Christian church for three years, and held evangelistic meetings in several churches in the state. Grew up on farm in Colfax township, Page county. Worked on farm, attended rural school, town school in College Springs, and taught in rural school, until twenty-two years of age. Graduated Beloit College, Wisconsin, 1893, earning his own way in school. Phi Beta Kappa. Three years in Yale University. Married Mary Eliza Morse of Racine, Wis., 1896. Pastor Congregational church, Evansville, Wis., 1896-1903; Beacon Hill church, Kansas City, Mo., 1903-1910; First Congregational church, Sioux City, Iowa, March 1, 1910—Sept. 1, 1914; Central Independent church, Sioux City, Sept. 1, 1914, to Dec. 31, 1918. Mayor of Sioux City, April 1, 1918, to April 1, 1924. Received official government recognition for war work on liberty loans and other activities. Member Sons of Revolution, and of Sons of Veterans. Founder and publisher of the "Unionist and Public Forum". Became interested in union labor organization while in college; chaplain of central labor union while in Kansas City. Since coming to Sioux City, member of chamber of commerce, and active in labor and farm organization. Elected representative 1930 on republican ticket. One daughter, Mrs. Emily Vesta (R. F.) Hunter, of Sioux City; two adopted sons, Burton Harrison and John Wallace. Author of books and magazine articles.

**LEONARD SIMMER.**—Representative from Wapello county, was born in Wapello county, 1890. Graduate of public schools, Agency, Iowa, of Iowa Wesleyan college in 1914, of law school of State University of Iowa in 1920. Engaged in the practice of law in Ottumwa, Iowa, since 1920. President, Wapello Oil Company, and Simmer Oil Corporation, Ottumwa, Iowa. Member of the forty-second, forty-third, and forty-fourth general assemblies. Married in 1915 to Agnes Shank of Agency, Iowa. Has five children.

**FRANK G. SNYDER.**—Representative from Hamilton county, was born at Brooklyn, Poweshiek county, the youngest of eight children, four boys and four girls, six of whom are still alive. Martin and Catherine Snyder, the parents, were Pennsylvania Dutch and came to Brooklyn in the early fifties where the father was a merchant and farm owner until 1874 and then the collapse after the Civil war swept everything away. Frank G. attended public school at Brooklyn, Toledo and Conrad, later paying his own way at Mt. Morris, Illinois, college. In 1888 engaged in the general merchandise business with his brother-in-law at Eldora. In 1891 he went into the general merchandise business for himself at Jewell, Hamilton county. ### REPUBLICAN STATE PLATFORM

*(Adopted at Republican State Convention Held in Des Moines, Iowa, July 16, 1930)*

We, the republicans of Iowa, in convention assembled, reaffirm our faith in and renew our allegiance to the fundamental principles of the republican party.

We commend the splendid courage and unflinching devotion to public duty of that native son of Iowa, the president of the United States, Herbert Hoover.

We commend and felicitate our republican delegation in congress for their continued efforts in seeking for our basic industry agriculture, that equality with other industries which it so justly deserves. We urge them to continue their efforts and in such efforts we pledge them the loyal support of the republican party of Iowa.

We commend the republican state administration in all its branches for its devotion to the best interests of the people of Iowa.

We commend President Hoover in his efforts looking toward world peace by mutual reduction of armaments.

**LAW OBSERVANCE AND ENFORCEMENT.**—Under our form of government the citizen is the sovereign and, therefore, upon him primarily rests the responsibility for good government. Ignorance of or willful violation of law jeopardizes the continuance of individual sovereignty. **AGRICULTURE.**—Agriculture is the basic industry of Iowa and the nation. We commend the efforts of President Hoover, the republican delegation from Iowa in congress and the farm board in their efforts to secure fair prices for farm products.

Reactionary groups throughout the United States are leaving no stone unturned to defeat the purpose thus sought.

The present level of farm prices is inequitable and unfair and in their efforts to raise the level of such prices, the president, our delegation and the farm board, have our unqualified approval.

We commend the republican congress for giving agriculture the best tariff rates that it has ever had and favor such further steps as will make them fully effective.

Let there be no misunderstanding, however, as to the position of the republicans of Iowa. The fight, being waged to secure equality as between agriculture and other industries, will be continued until the operation of the farms of this nation will insure a fair, just and reasonable return.

**TAXATION.**—We recognize the increasing demand for public service for all the people and that this should be paid for by all the people. We therefore urge on the legislature a revision of the revenue laws to the end that all kinds and classes of property shall bear a just share of the tax burden. Such revision should be made in a spirit of equity and no unwise or ill-advised requirement should be placed upon either agriculture or industry. The principles of ability to pay and benefits received should not be ignored. In this connection we demand the greatest economy in the administration of public business and the closest scrutiny of requests for the appropriation of public funds.

We favor a revision of our laws on taxation such as will remove inequalities and in connection therewith, favor the adoption of a replacement income tax law with reasonable exemptions, the revenue derived therefrom to be used only to replace revenue now being raised by direct property tax.

We pledge our party to a decrease of present property taxes through the enactment of laws that will equitably distribute the cost of government among all our citizens, including corporations, and include the owners of all classes of property, both tangible and intangible, and all those who now acquire wealth from sources other than property.

**LABOR.**—The republican party has been the traditional friend of labor. It has always maintained that the American standard of wages and the American standard of living should be maintained for all who toil. This policy we now reaffirm. In connection therewith, we urge a policy both national and state, which will reasonably assure to those who labor, those comforts, opportunities and advantages to which they are as American citizens, justly entitled. We believe that such a policy will bring stability to labor and industry.

We urge the enactment of legislation such as will precisely define and limit the circumstances under which injunctions may be issued in labor disputes. We favor legislation legalizing the right of labor to organize and to bargain collectively by representatives of its own choosing.

The restriction of foreign immigration has become a policy of the republican party. We favor the continuation of the present federal policy of restricting such immigration for the protection of American labor, and favor the extension of this policy to the Latin American countries.

We urge a program looking to the stabilization of the coal industry. We urge the use of Iowa coal by the public institutions and by the public generally to the end that this industry may prosper in Iowa.

**EDUCATION.**—Iowa has taken a leading place educationally among the states of the Union owing to the splendid administration of our public school system.

We reaffirm our devotion to the cause of public education. We are especially concerned in the proper functioning of the common school law and we urge such provisions as will insure an equality of educational opportunity in all our public schools both urban and rural.



**HIGHWAYS.**—Iowa has made wonderful progress in the improvement of its highway system. Good roads are essential in the march of progress. We have entered upon the program of paying the cost of improving our highways from funds contributed by the users of such highways. We recommend the continuance of this policy of financing our highway system. The construction, care and maintenance of the highways is the largest enterprise, from a financial standpoint, in which the state is now engaged. The work should be carried on to the end that each section of the state shall have its equitable share of primary and secondary roads.

We commend our republican delegation in congress for securing an increase in federal aid for highways and we urge them to continue their efforts to the end that the federal government may pay more nearly its fair share toward the improvement of our highways. We favor a national policy of constructing free bridges over navigable rivers particularly border rivers between states.

**CONSERVATION.**—The conservation of the natural resources of our state, the preservation and improvement of its streams, lakes and public parks, the propagation, care and protection of fish and game life, for the benefit of our own and succeeding generations, is a matter in which the citizens of the state are vitally interested. We commend the wise policy adopted by our legislature in providing for the perpetuation and preservation of our public waters and places of scientific, historical and recreational interest, the adoption of laws to prevent pollution of the waters of the state, that their natural purity, beauty and recreational qualities shall be preserved for succeeding generations, and we recommend that this policy be continued and that future legislatures take such additional action as may be necessary to more adequately preserve, protect and foster fish and game life, and conserve and improve the lakes, streams, and parks of the state, for the benefit of the public.

**WATERWAYS.**—We are especially proud of the inland waterways program that has been authorized by congress under the leadership of its greatest advocate, Herbert Hoover. The benefits of cheap transportation on our two mighty rivers on the eastern and western borders of our state, will soon be felt on every farm and in every factory in the state. We commend the republican delegation in congress from Iowa in leading in the support of this waterways program, in every vote and at every opportunity. We will soon see a great system of over twelve thousand miles of navigable waters completed under republican leadership and conferring benefits on untold millions of our people. We believe this will go down in history as one of the greatest achievements of a progressive nation.

**THE REPUBLICAN TICKET.**—The republican voters of Iowa have this year chosen a splendid ticket. Congressman L. J. Dickinson, our candidate for the senate and the Honorable Dan W. Turner, our candidate for governor, are our leaders. We commend them to the people.

Congressman Dickinson has served in the congress of the United States for many years. His high character, his personal integrity, his fidelity to duty, his unfaltering courage and his ever present loyalty have endeared him to the people of his district and of the state. We pledge him our united support in his candidacy for United States Senator.

The republicans of this state present as their candidate for governor, a native son of Iowa who has grown to manhood on its soil, knowing well its interests and loving well its people. He has served his country with honor in war and his state with distinction in peace. His private and public life are above reproach. He is able, courageous, honest and faithful. We pledge our united support to our candidate for governor, Dan W. Turner.

DEMOCRATIC STATE PLATFORM

*(Adopted at State Convention Held in Des Moines, Iowa, July 22, 1930)*

Iowa Democracy is proud of its past history, of its leaders and the principles for which it has stood. It is mindful of the statesmanship and service rendered by great Americans to establish a great America. We are mindful that the present deplorable condition of this great America demands of great Americans today the same courageous, earnest and unselfish service that prompted those pioneers. This service we pledge to the people of this state and the nation, and submit to the voters the following pledges which we endorse and sincerely believe will correct many of the present day evils and result in the re-establishment of national character, and the return of envied American prosperity.

**AGRICULTURAL RELIEF.**—At each biennial election during the last decade, the republican party has reiterated its pledge to afford relief to this country's basic industry, and to place the farm on an equal basis with other industries. During this entire period, the republican party has been in power in all branches of our national government and agricultural conditions have grown steadily worse. Never has the condition of the farmer been as critical as at the present moment. The futility of the steps taken by the party in power to afford proper relief proves that its efforts have either been insincere or unintelligent, or both.

The Boulder dam project, at a tremendous cost to the taxpayers of the entire country, will result in an inexcusable addition of thousands of acres of cultivatable land competing with Iowa farms. We favor the abandonment of this and other federal subsidized irrigation projects.

We advocate the withdrawal from grain raising and in lieu thereof wherever practicable the forestration by the federal government of those lands whose fertility is such as to make the farming thereof of doubtful economic value and a money losing proposition.

The farmer of Iowa is without adequate credit facilities. These should be provided.

Prior to the presidential campaign of 1928, the citizens and legislative representatives of almost the entire middle west, and of many other parts of this country were united in the support of the equalization fee as the only reasonable means of raising the market price of those agricultural products of which this country produced an exportable surplus. The Honorable Alfred E. Smith as presidential candidate of our party accepted and advocated the equalization fee principle. The presidential nominee of the republican party opposed the equalization fee and promised adequate relief through other means. Whereupon the legislative representatives and leaders of the republican party throughout the Mississippi valley, and particularly the state of Iowa, promptly abandoned their support of the equalization fee.

President Hoover's plan was adopted a year ago and the price of agricultural products sunk to new depths.

If the majority of the voters of the state of Iowa are to continue to support the republican ticket merely because they have been in the past, and may now be nominally republicans, the state can be assured that it will continue to receive the same lack of consideration from the republican party in congress which it has received in the past. We are confident that the continued and repeated disappointments and betrayals of the farmer at the hands of the republican party will establish his faith and confidence in the democratic party as the sole source of adequate relief.

The only step which the republican administration has accomplished toward placing agriculture on a parity with other industries is to create an industrial depression effecting all enterprises, including the farm by reason of its failure to exert at the proper time a check through the federal reserve system on the recent orgy of speculation, which culminated in the stock market crash last fall and which crash in turn brought about the severe depression in all lines of business.

**PROHIBITION.**—Millions of otherwise law abiding citizens including not a few federal legislators and other officials are frequent or habitual consumers of prohibited beverages, and are therefore moral if not legal accessories to law violation. The result is a nationwide scandal. Whether or not they compose a majority, the number of violators is so vast, that respect for law essential to orderly government has been undermined. The youth of the land are reared in this atmosphere, many in homes where illicit manufacture is carried on. Recently a republican candidate for the United States senate in the house of representatives openly advocated official countenance of home manufacture of intoxicants without forfeiting the support of the most extreme advocates of present enforcement measures. Huge profits in supplying an unabated demand, for prohibited beverages have in many communities contributed to official corruption; an unholy alliance for mutual profit is maintained between office holders, enforcement agencies and racketeers, which renders impossible honest law administration. The Republican party for a decade in complete control of our national government, has failed to devise and put into operation any plan of effective enforcement and has demonstrated its inability to cope with the deplorable conditions which prevail.

Pending an expression of all the voters upon the question of the continuance, repeal, or revision of the eighteenth amendment, we favor the immediate enactment in lieu of the present federal enforcement laws of a law defining intoxicating beverages according to a reasonable non-intoxicating standard of alcoholic content based upon the opinions of physicians and scientists.

And also the enactment of a law relegating to the several states the right within the boundaries of each state to permit, or as it may elect to forbid or restrict, the sale or consumption of beverages not prohibited by such definition, and thus take from the federal courts and other federal agencies a burden which experience has shown they cannot successfully carry, and restore to the sovereign states a rea-

sonable measure of local control. As the eighteenth amendment is not self-executing and as concurrent power of the states is therein recognized, such course is not inconsistent with the constitution.

We favor prompt legislative action to ascertain the will of the voters for retaining the eighteenth amendment, repealing it, or revising it as the voters shall decide.

**LABOR.**—The democratic party under the administration of President Wilson for the first time gave national recognition of the right of labor to organize and bargain collectively through representatives of its own choice. We reaffirm our adherence to this policy.

We advocate such legislation as may be necessary to eliminate the abuses in the issuance of injunctions in labor disputes. We denounce the failure of the republican party to carry out the party platform promises to eliminate such abuses.

All Iowa industries have felt the harmful effects of present business conditions. Iowa's coal industry has been badly depressed. It, like all other industries, is entitled to the support of all Iowans, but no permanent relief will be found for this coal industry and the many unemployed miners until prosperity is restored in this country.

In view of the existence of millions of unemployed American citizens, we believe the time has arrived when all further admission of immigrant laborers should be prohibited. Proper exceptions can be made for educational and business purposes and for the uniting of families.

The failure of the party in power to completely eliminate the continued unrestricted entrance of thousands of Mexican laborers is particularly inexcusable in view of the appalling numbers of unemployed.

American standards of food, housing, clothing, saving and recreation can only be maintained by affording to all who are willing to work, a reasonable opportunity for employment. That opportunity does not exist today.

We direct the attention of not only the laboring man, but also the farmer and the business man to the difference in business conditions as they are today and as they were under the last democratic administration.

**TARIFF.**—The business enterprises of our country have been kept in a constant state of turmoil and uncertainty for over a year, while congress was engaged in a protracted debate on tariff schedules. The rates on numerous commodities were repeatedly altered. Individual senators changed their respective votes on different schedules without attempting any justification or explanation of these changes.

Congress was called into special session by President Hoover for the purpose of a limited tariff revision for the benefit of a few depressed industries, particularly agriculture, but the titular head of the republican party did not display sufficient leadership even in his dealings with the legislators of his own party to accomplish this result. Congress indulged in a general and unlimited revision accompanied by inevitable trading and log rolling tactics.

A tariff on a farm product of which this country produces a surplus is useless. The new tariff bill contains some desirable increases on agricultural items, but these increases will not afford benefit to the major products of Iowa farms.

The unwarranted increase on certain manufactured articles has already led to reprisals by foreign governments directed at the exported surplus from our farms and factories. These increases will inevitably lead to further and more severe reprisals.

The honesty of the intentions of the leaders of the republican party in congress to afford substantial agricultural relief through tariff schedules can well be tested by the vote on the increase on the tariff on black strap molasses.

This would have resulted in the manufacture of millions of gallons of industrial alcohol from corn, instead of the monopoly controlled refuse of the cane sugar industry and would have thereby produced an additional market for millions of bushels of Iowa corn and would further have brought about the establishment of factories for this purpose in Iowa cities.

If Iowa continues to vote the republican ticket in spite of such treatment, it can unquestionably count on a continuance of this treatment.

**PRIMARY.**—The present primary system has been thoroughly tested and found lacking. The caliber of our elective officials has not improved. The primary has made it almost impossible for a man of modest means, unless a member of a political machine, to successfully aspire to office. In some states where nomination is normally considered the equivalent of election, we have witnessed the expenditures in republican primaries of sums of money which have shocked the conscience of the American public. We therefore favor the repeal of our primary laws and advocate the establishment of a legally controlled and properly safeguarded caucus and convention system.

**TAXATION.**—We are unalterably opposed to the adoption of a state income tax. No state income tax has ever operated as a replacement tax. Its inevitable result has been to supply an additional source of revenue from the farmers, laborers and business men and to furnish an additional excuse for further extravagant expenditures of public funds.

The solution of the Iowa tax problem lies in the adoption and enforcement of a program of rigid economy of state expenditures, a careful revision and endorsement of our tax system so as to uncover tax evaders and untaxed property and to equalize the unfair burden borne by real estate, and the encouragement of the location and development of industries within the state, thereby materially increasing the state's revenues from taxation.

A gradual process of decentralization of manufacturing operations is taking place in many American industries. Factories will not be located in those states whose taxation systems result in the double taxation of manufacturing income by adding a state income tax to the present national income tax.

**ROADS.**—We favor the rapid completion of Iowa's splendid primary road system. The completion of our primary road system should be immediately followed by the rapid building and completion of our secondary road system.

The construction and maintenance of both systems should be paid through motor vehicle licenses, gasoline tax and federal aid and without the addition of one dollar raised from a levy on real estate.

We advocate the national construction of free bridges over border rivers between states.

We advocate the speedy transformation of our inland waterways into suitable arteries of commerce. We believe that this will result in a ready access to market at reduced rates of Iowa farm and industrial products.

We advocate the election of our state judiciary through non-partisan judicial conventions and recommend the repeal of the present law which plunges this judiciary into partisan politics.

**DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATES.**—We are proud of the safe, sane, able and dignified record of Iowa's democratic senator, the Honorable Daniel F. Steck.

We commend to the earnest consideration of the voters of Iowa, the candidacies of the Honorable Daniel F. Steck for United States senator, the Honorable F. W. Hagemann for governor and the candidacies of the other democratic candidates for state and congressional offices. We pledge to them our loyal support.

**PRIMARY ELECTION**

The term "Primary Election" is construed under the law to apply to an election by the members of various political parties for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for public office, for selecting delegates to conventions, and for the selection of party committeemen. The law provides that the primary election shall consist of an election by all political parties and shall be held at the various voting places of the several precincts on the first Monday in June, in each even-numbered year, for the nomination of candidates for such offices as are to be filled at the general election in November next ensuing (except candidates for judge of the supreme court and district court, which shall be by a judicial convention), and for senator in the congress of the United States, in the years in which senators are to be elected.

The board of supervisors of each county (acting as a county board of canvassers) meets on the second Tuesday following the primary election in June and canvasses the votes cast at the several precincts and makes an abstract thereof. A separate abstract of the canvass duly certified is then forwarded to the secretary of state for the following offices:

United States senator.

All state officers.

Representatives in congress.

Senators and representatives in the general assembly.

On the second Monday after the June primary election, the executive council meets as a state canvassing board, and opens and canvasses the abstract returns received from each county in the state. Said board makes abstracts of its canvasses, showing the number of ballots cast for each person voted for, and the person having the highest number of votes in the state or district (provided he receives 35 per cent of all the votes cast by the party for such office), is duly and legally nominated and is entitled to have his name printed on the official ballot for the general election.

Iowa was organized as a territory in 1838 and was admitted to the union as the twenty-ninth State in December, 1846. Its population on April 1, 1930, according to the Fifteenth Census, was 2,470,939, which represents an increase of 66,918 or 2.8 per cent, as compared with the population on January 1, 1920. The total land area of the State is 55,586 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1930 was 44.5, as compared with 43.2 in 1920.

## PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS FROM 1789 TO 1928

## AGGREGATE POPULAR VOTE AND ELECTORAL VOTE FOR CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT AT EACH ELECTION

The record of any popular vote for electors prior to 1824 is so meager and imperfect that a compilation would be useless. In most of the states, for more than a quarter century following the establishment of the government, the state legislatures "appointed" the presidential electors, and the people, therefore, voted only indirectly for them, their choice being expressed by their votes for members of the legislature. In this tabulation only the aggregate electoral votes for candidates for president and vice-president in the first nine quadrennial elections appear.

(e) Eleven southern states, being within the belligerent territory, did not vote. (f) Three southern states disfranchised. (g) Horace Greeley died after election, and democratic electors scattered their votes. ## ELECTORAL VOTES

1789. Previous to 1804 each elector voted for two candidates for president. The one who received the largest number of votes was declared president, and the one who received the next largest number of votes was declared vice-president. The electoral votes for the first president of the United States were: George Washington, 69; John Adams, of Massachusetts, 34; John Jay, of New York, 9; R. H. Harrison, of Maryland, 6; John Rutledge, of South Carolina, 6; John Hancock, of Massachusetts, 4; George Clinton, of New York, 3; Samuel Huntington, of Connecticut, 2; John Milton, of Georgia, 2; James Armstrong, of Georgia, Benjamin Lincoln, of Massachusetts, and Edward Telfair, of Georgia, 1 vote each. Vacancies (votes not cast), 4. George Washington was chosen president and John Adams vice-president.

1792. George Washington, Federalist, received 132 votes, John Adams, Federalist, 77; George Clinton, of New York, Republican (a), 50; Thomas Jefferson, of Virginia, Republican, 4; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 1 vote. Vacancies, 3. George Washington was chosen president and John Adams vice-president.

1796. John Adams, Federalist, 71; Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 68; Thomas Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 59; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 30; Samuel Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 15; Oliver Ellsworth, of Connecticut, Independent, 11; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 7; John Jay, of New York, Federalist, 5; James Iredell, of North Carolina, Federalist, 3; George Washington, of Virginia, John Henry, of Maryland, and S. Johnson, of North Carolina, all Federalists, 2 votes each; Charles Cotesworth Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 1 vote. John Adams was chosen president and Thomas Jefferson vice-president.

1800. Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 73; Aaron Burr, Republican, 73; John Adams, Federalist, 65; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 64; John Jay, Federalist, 1 vote. There being a tie vote for Jefferson and Burr, the choice devolved upon the house of representatives. Jefferson received the votes of ten states, which being the largest vote cast for a candidate, elected him president. Burr received the votes of four states, which being the next largest vote, elected him vice-president. There were 2 blank votes.

1804. The constitution of the United States having been amended, the electors at this election voted for a president and a vice-president, instead of for two candidates for President. The result was as follows: For president, Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 162; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 14. For vice-president, George Clinton, Republican, 162; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 14. Jefferson was chosen president and Clinton vice-president.

1808. For president, James Madison, of Virginia, Republican, 122; Charles C. Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 47; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 6. For vice-president, George Clinton, Republican, 113; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 47; John Langdon, of New Hampshire, 9; James Madison, 3; James Monroe, 3. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen president and Clinton vice-president.

1812. For president, James Madison, Republican, 128; De Witt Clinton, of New York, Federalist, 89. For vice-president, Elbridge Gerry, of Massachusetts, 131; Jared Ingersoll, of Pennsylvania, Federalist, 86. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen president and Gerry vice-president.

1816. For president, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 183; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 34. For vice-president, Daniel D. Tompkins, of New York, Republican, 183; John Eager Howard, of Maryland, Federalist, 22; James Ross, of Pennsylvania, 5; John Marshall, of Virginia, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, 3. Vacancies, 4. Monroe was chosen president and Tompkins vice-president.

1820. For president, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 231; John Q. Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 1. For vice-president, Daniel D. Tompkins, Republican, 218; Richard Stockton, of New Jersey, 8; Daniel Rodney, of Delaware, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, and Richard Rush, of Pennsylvania, 1 vote each. Vacancies, 3. James Monroe was chosen president and Daniel D. Tompkins vice-president.

1929

April 2—Board accepted the gift of 40 acres in Boone County to be known as the Alonzo J. Barkley Memorial Park Preserve. Board recommended to the Highway Commission the establishment of a Primary Road, as a Scenic Highway, from Clinton to Dubuque, as near the Mississippi River as possible.

May 14—Survey to be made of Rice Lake for purposes of restoration of lake. M. L. Hutton employed as Engineer and Superintendent of State Parks, effective July 1, 1929.

June 14—The Bellevue State Park lodge and one acre upon which the lodge stands was purchased from the Bellevue Park Association for the sum of \$5,000.

July 1—Lots in Kepler State Park that cannot be purchased at a reasonable price were ordered condemned.

July 15—Dedication of Ambrose A. Call State Park.

August 6—Rules and regulations made for camping in state parks.

September 3—50,000 folders describing state parks ordered for distribution to the public. Plans were approved for a pavilion at Farmington State Park, and also for remodeling of custodian's house at Clear Lake State Park. After a thorough inspection the Board recommended to the Governor and Executive Council that no spillway be built in the outlet of Spirit Lake at present.

October 2—A public hearing was held in regard to rules and regulations for the operation of boats on state owned waters.

November 5—Rules adopted for the use of State Park lodges.

December 10—4 acres of adjacent land donated to Elbert State Park in Polk County. Superintendent authorized to secure uniforms for all regular custodians of state parks. A custodian's house was built at Bellevue State Park during the year of 1929.

1930

January 7—Rules and regulations for operating boats on Iowa lakes and streams adopted.

March 4—Board ordered lantern slides of the state parks for use over the state.

April 1—Board appropriated \$2,600 for the purchase of state park land along the shore of Rush Lake in Palo Alto County. The citizens donated 23.01 acres and the community donated the balance of the purchase price. Arrangements made by the Forestry Department of the Iowa State College to co-operate with the Board in regard to reforestation in state parks.

May 6—5,000 trees ordered planted at Lewis & Clark State Park in honor of Stephen T. Mather who created and organized the National Park Service. Superintendent of State Parks authorized to let contract for construction of a public dock and board walk at Arnolds Park on West Okoboji Lake.

June 9—Construction of auditorium authorized at Backbone State Park in Delaware County.

June 30—Dedication of Pammel State Park in Madison County.

August 5—Speed limit of boats on state owned waters was set at 20 miles per hour for balance of season. Four fords were ordered built at Backbone State Park to be paid for by the Board and Fish & Game Department jointly. Supervisor of State Roads authorized to award a contract for the building of a road

in the Palisades State Park. Appropriation of \$400 approved for the purchase of one lot at Eldora Pine Creek State Park.

During 1930 the Board of Health began Sanitary surveys of the State Parks. Custodians houses were built at Ambrose A. Call State Park and Elbert State Park during 1930.

October 7—Committee authorized to secure options on additional land for Fort Defiance State Park. Landscape Architect authorized to arrange for the planting of suitable trees and shrubs on shore of Wall Lake in Sac County. \$1,400 appropriated for the purchase of 40 acres of land for the Ledges State Park. Diseased trees in state parks authorized to be removed.

November 6—\$627 appropriated for purchase of 15 acres at Dolliver Memorial State Park.

December 9—\$6,740 appropriated for purchase of 138½ acres of land for state park purposes in Appanoose County; the citizens of the community to provide roads, shelter house, power line, water supply, foot bridges and other improvements.

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### CENTRAL COLLEGE—PELLA

Established in 1853, and for sixty-three years under the administrative control of the Baptist Church, Central College was transferred to the Reformed Church in America in 1916. It aims to be thoroughly Christian in all its departments, but is in no sense sectarian. The student enrollment has representatives of ten different church denominations, coming from eleven different states. A four-year collegiate course of liberal arts is offered leading to the A.B. degree. The academy department was discontinued in June, 1928. The college maintains twenty departments, including bible, biology, chemistry, education, English, German, history, Latin, mathematics, piano, voice, pipe-organ, philosophy, physical education, physics, psychology, French, Spanish, social science, and speech arts.

The primary aim of Central College is to prepare young people for Christian leadership in the various walks of life. By a thorough course in the liberal arts it seeks to help the student to acquire for himself a Christian world view by which his whole life will be dominated. A teaching staff of nineteen professors and instructors seek to train the minds and hearts of the young people entrusted to their care. It has \$339,000 invested in buildings and equipment; about \$200,000 endowment; and a library of 12,000 volumes.

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### COE COLLEGE—CEDAR RAPIDS

In 1929-1930 there were 814 students in attendance in the four college classes. With departmental, unclassified, summer school and extension division students, the sum total in attendance in 1929-1930 was 1221. Graduating class in 1930 was 127. In all, Coe has granted degrees to 2095 men and women (932 men and 1163 women). The faculty numbers seventy-five.

## IOWA INDUSTRIAL SURVEY

## POPULATION

Almost within the span of a human life, practically unoccupied prairie has become the home of two and a half million Iowans, and, in the main, that population has been reached by consistently steady development.

Although some traders and trappers came to the region before 1800, the early policy of the government was to rout out squatters and to prevent migration to the territory. In 1832, however, the Black Hawk purchase opened the territory for settlement, and in the rush that followed, the trappers and traders were replaced by settlers. Forty thousand persons settled here during the tide of western migration between 1830 and 1840. The table below shows the population at various census dates as well as the increases during the intervening periods.

Means of transportation had much to do with the regional settlement of Iowa. The Mississippi river afforded a ready means of travel which brought the earliest settlers to the southeastern corner of the state. The whole eastern section was settled soon after. From here and from the southwestern corner, settlement spread over the state, reaching the northwestern corner last.

Iowa is moving to town. While more than seventy-five per cent of her people lived in open country in 1870, now less than half live outside of cities, towns and incorporated villages. The rural population of Iowa was 26,000 less in 1930 than in 1920. Two factors were mainly causal in this: increased size of farms and decrease in size of farm family. Other and perhaps more basic factors were the increased use of labor-saving machinery, which enabled the farmer to dispense with the hired man or grown son and the tendency for grown daughters to find employment in the city. In addition there has been an increasing tendency for farmers to retire earlier in life than formerly, many of them moving to nearby towns or villages.

The small Iowa village is seemingly on the decline. Three out of five of the villages with population of 500 or less lost in total population during the decade 1920 to 1930. Taken as a whole, villages of 1000 or less lost population, too. With but two exceptions, however, cities of 5000 or more people made significant gains during the period.

Until about 1890, native born Iowans were in the minority, with most of the people coming from other states, and a lesser number from foreign countries. In 1925 eight per cent were foreign born, 19.9 per cent were born in other states, and 72.1 per cent were native born Iowans. Most of the migrants into Iowa from other states were of English descent. But all of the strains represented in the population of the older states were to be found among these early immigrants.

Germany has contributed a larger number to Iowa's foreign born population than has any other country—more than sixty thousand were here in 1925. Of the remaining foreign born Iowans at that time, more than ten thousand came from each of the following countries: Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Netherlands, England and Austria. Canada, Russia and Ireland had contributed more than five thousand each, and more than one thousand came from each of the countries: Italy, Scotland, Mexico, Switzerland, Greece, France, Luxemburg and Belgium.

### CLIMATE

In Iowa, extreme temperatures occur so infrequently as to afford an interesting topic for conversation. Not every winter has zero temperatures, and few summers have as much as 100-degree temperatures. Blizzards have been overcome by modern homes and sheltering trees. Severe thunderstorms and terrifying wind squalls are very rare. Rain or snow and sunshine are sandwiched in regular and pleasing cycles. Drouths and downpours are infrequent. Crop failures and famines are unknown. Rainy days in a year average 85; total annual rainfall, 32.15 inches; total snowfall, 29.9 inches; sunshine, 59 per cent of the possible amount; average relative humidity, 73 per cent; very little fog and dampness; prevailing wind northwest, though much southerly wind in summer.

The rainfall is usually more than needed. Someone has said, "Iowa—where it rains 15 minutes before it is too late." The most serious drouths in 58 years of record were in 1886, where the average yield of corn was reduced to 24 bushels, and in 1894, when corn was about one-third of a crop. The total rainfall of June, July and August, 1886, averaged only 4.25 inches, and in 1894 only 4.88 inches; 1911, 7.41; and 1910, 7.73. The wettest summer was in 1902, with 22.41 inches; next stands 1875 with 17.90; 1924 with 17.12; 1907 with 16.95; and 1928 with 16.23 inches. The average annual rainfall ranges from about 36 inches in the extreme southeast to about 26 inches in the extreme northwest.

The average decrease in rainfall from east to west is about 0.92 inch in 50 miles, and from south to north about 1.00 inch in 50 miles.

Iowa rainfall has shown an apparent tendency to decrease during the last 50 to 60 years at an average rate of about 0.036 inch per year. The greatest decrease is in the southwest counties in the summer months, where it exceeds 3.00 inches in 57 years. The center of decreased precipitation appears to be about Omaha, Nebraska, where it amounts to more than 0.25 inch per year. The least decrease is in the northwest and north-central counties. In fact, one station, Algona, Kosuth County, having a long and fairly comparable record, shows a slight tendency to increase.

In the past 57 Iowa winters, there is a noticeable up trend in temperature, but this period is too short to base conclusions upon. For the month of January, 1912, the statewide mean of 4.2 degrees is the coldest month of record. January, 1875, stands next with a mean of 4.9 degrees. The warmest January was in 1880, when the state mean was 32.0 degrees.

The summer of 1901, with an average temperature of 76.2 degrees, was the hottest of the 58 summers of record. Next in rank is 1921 with 74.9 degrees; 1873, 1894 and 1913 with 74.7 degrees; and 1874 with 74.5 degrees. The notably cool summers were 1915, 66.8 degrees; 1891, 1903 and 1904, 68.9 degrees; and 1902, 69.1 degrees.

The average date of last killing frost in spring is May 3, ranging from about April 20 in the extreme southeast to about May 10 in the more elevated

localities on the divide between the Big Sioux and Des Moines rivers. The average date of first killing frost in autumn is October 5, ranging from about September 25 in the extreme northwest to October 15 in the extreme southeast. This makes the average length of the crop growing season 155 days, ranging from about 140 days in the northern part of the Big Sioux-Des Moines divide, to about 170 days along the Mississippi River from Scott to Lee Counties. Records made in cities and larger towns must be disregarded in compiling frost data.

The last killing frost in spring comes about 10 days later than it did 40 years ago, while the first killing frost in autumn comes about one day later than 40 years ago. The growing season is thus slightly shortened.

## MANUFACTURING

In 1929, the last year for which census figures are now available, Iowa manufacturers employed more than 82 thousand laborers, purchased materials worth 580 million dollars, and turned out products valued at 908 millions. Their value added by manufacture was 328 millions.

Iowa ranks 20th among the states in manufacturing. It has held this position since 1921, in which year it advanced from 21st to 20th place. Iowa's industrial output is greater than that of any state west of the Mississippi river except Minnesota, Missouri, Texas, Washington and California; and any state south of the Ohio river except Maryland, Virginia and North Carolina.

Although long recognized as the premier farm state, Iowa exceeds 22 states in *per capita* manufacturing. Iowa factories each year turned out more than \$300 worth of products for every man, woman, and child in the State; their purchases amount to nearly \$200 per capita; and their value added by manufacture to more than \$100 per capita.

Although the concentration of industries in large cities is characteristic of most parts of the country, Iowa's manufacturing is distributed among a number of centers. No city has more than one-seventh of the state's industry. Iowa had 18 cities with populations of greater than 10,000 in 1920. In 1927, 14 of these reported 1,500 or more factory laborers, and the largest reported only 7,250 laborers.

This decentralization of industry has many advantages. Smaller cities frequently have lower manufacturing costs because items of rent, taxes, and many other expense factors are less than in larger cities. Crowding and congestion in large cities makes land expensive, transportation difficult, distribution complicated, and communication costly. These factors not only make overhead expenses high, but also cause increased living costs. Laborers in smaller towns spend less for food, housing, transportation and other necessities of life. Per capita taxation usually rises with increases in population. It costs more per person to maintain a large city than a small one. To these advantages may be added greater living comfort, an opportunity for fresh air and sunshine, and other conditions which produce a more stable and better satisfied labor force.

All of these advantages accrue to the Iowa manufacturing cities. Dominated by no single city, the Iowa industrial structure promises to develop along ideal as well as efficient lines.

Analysis of the history of American industries leads to the conclusion that Iowa is probably a most logical location for future industrial development. The history of the American people is one of westward migration. Decade after decade has witnessed a westward movement of population, and following the people have come factories and industrial activity. As the pioneers crossed the Appalachian highland to settle the rich prairies of Ohio, Illinois and Iowa, so in a later day has industry crossed these mountains into the same territory.

For three hundred years industry has moved constantly westward toward Iowa. It is illogical to conclude that it will come to a standstill at our very doorstep. Nor is there reason to believe that its course will be altered and swerve north or south. Iowa certainly possesses industrial facilities superior to those of either her northern or southern neighbor. Provided by nature with a

part of the earth's richest soil and a most invigorating climate, and by man with an excellent network of railroads, highways and power transmission lines, Iowa today stands ready to provide materials, power, transportation, low living costs, and healthful surroundings of a quality which can be equaled by few other areas.

We must recognize that in modern days of intense competition, the manufacturer is most interested in locating at that site from which he may deliver goods to his customers at the lowest possible cost. And the community which offers a manufacturer the lowest combined cost of obtaining materials, fabricating and marketing the product, has the best chance to obtain his factory. He is chiefly concerned with the cost elements in this transaction. The Iowa situation may be analyzed with respect to each of these elements.

1. *Nearness to markets.* Students of the problem generally give this factor greatest weight. In this respect, Iowa is well situated. Not only may Iowa manufacturers easily serve their own two and a half million people, but in addition they are located near the center of the nation and may serve all sections with ease. Iowa manufacturers are especially well situated to serve the great middle west farm market.

2. *Materials.* The cost of hauling materials to a factory is very important and many industries find it economical to locate near their source. Iowa as the greatest producer of livestock, corn, oats, poultry, and many other farm crops, offers an abundance of agricultural raw materials. In addition, the development of cheap river transportation promises to bring in other materials very cheaply. Among these are iron ore, wheat, lumber, and many other products now produced in out-of-the-way localities from which marketing is difficult. One can easily vision the development in Iowa of important industries using ores, wheat and lumber to manufacture products which will be distributed throughout the middle west.

3. *Fuel and Power.* Each year industry becomes more highly mechanized, dependent upon machinery and power. Iowa, has already developed important water power sites, promises to utilize even more, and in addition has immense deposits of good steam coal. Electricity is distributed over an amazingly thorough system of power lines to nearly every hamlet in the state. Engineers tell us that the generation, transmission and utilization of electricity has now progressed to the point where small factory installations are practicable.

4. *Labor.* Iowa manufacturers state they "have no labor problem." Compared to other industrial centers that statement certainly rings true. Iowa laborers are efficient and stable. Frequently they own their homes, are permanent residents, take a genuine interest in their work. Furthermore, lower living costs make the purchasing power of their wages greater than in the higher-priced industrial centers.

5. *Transportation facilities.* All manufacturers are interested in adequate transportation facilities both to bring in their materials and market their products. Some demand cheapness, some speed. Iowa has or is rapidly obtaining all types of modern inland transportation. Its railroads net the state thoroughly, and its paved highways are rapidly coming to serve every community. Cheap transportation is being added on east and west borders by the use of the great rivers and finally, air transport, monarch of all in speed, has been added to the list. These agencies leave little to be desired in transportation facilities.

While the above list is not exhaustive, and the consideration given each factor is far from thorough, enough has been given to indicate that Iowa is well adapted to further industrial development. Apparently Iowa is well qualified to receive the accession of new industries which the trend of history seems ready to give her.

## AGRICULTURE

The cash income from farm products in Iowa amounted to an average of \$639,828,000 for the five years, 1924 to 1928. This estimate of cash income gives Iowa the rank of second highest in the country, exceeded only by Texas, a state

whose total area greatly exceeds that of Iowa. California ranks third.

Iowa ranks first in production of more different types of agricultural products than any other state in the Union. She ranks first in corn, producing 14 per cent of the total; oats, producing 15 per cent of the total; hogs, 18.6 per cent; horses, 7 per cent. She is first in the number and value of fat cattle, first in the number and value of poultry, first in number and value of egg production, first in popcorn, timothy seed, total value of grain crops, value of farms and buildings, farm implements and in percentage of farm land which is improved and productive.

Livestock furnishes the principal market for Iowa's farm crops. Her agriculture is based primarily around livestock production. Instead of marketing most of the products directly as raw materials, as some other states are forced to do, Iowa farmers convert the bulk of their crops into a more finished product. Located centrally, Iowa is favorably situated for fattening western cattle or sheep, the production of hogs or the shipment of surplus crops to eastern markets.

Iowa's agricultural products serve as the most important source of raw material for the production of manufactured products within the state. During recent years there has been a continuous growth of packing houses to process livestock which is produced on Iowa farms. At the present time 29.8 per cent of the hogs are packed in Iowa packing houses, whereas in 1920 only 15.6 per cent were killed at home. Over 25 per cent of the hogs killed under federal inspection in United States come from Iowa farms so that it can be readily seen there is still opportunity for growth along this particular line.

Iowa creameries now manufacture 215,000,000 pounds of butter annually. This is more than double the amount of butter manufactured ten years ago. Most of this increased volume has been brought about without a marked increase in the number of creameries.

Many manufacturers have found that Iowa is a profitable location for the manufacture of products from grain, both for human and livestock consumption. Located in the center of surplus producing area, such products can be manufactured and shipped to consumers in other sections of the country, thereby gaining in distribution costs over manufacturers located in other sections. During recent years manufacturers have developed satisfactory outlets for products manufactured out of cornstalks, oat hulls and many other agricultural products that were formerly waste products.

There is still room for a continued growth of industry along agricultural lines. Practically three-fourths of Iowa livestock is shipped out of the state for slaughter and processing. A large portion of the surplus corn, oats and miscellaneous grains are shipped out of the state and are processed before being sold to the ultimate consumer. Canning and pickling factories have not only proved profitable to the people that have installed them in Iowa, but they have demonstrated the feasibility of opening up new lines of agricultural production.

Industries that are not directly allied with agriculture have also found Iowa a suitable place for the manufacture and distribution of their products. Iowa is in the center of a big home market, she provides excellent living conditions, good schools and many other valuable factors from the standpoint of satisfactory labor conditions and industrial investments. Further growth of such industries will benefit agriculture by expanding her home market without causing such industries to suffer from the congestion found in many manufacturing centers.

As the needs of the country become greater Iowa can respond with increased production to a greater extent than any other section. Her agricultural possibilities are only limited by a satisfactory market demand for production.

## NATURAL RESOURCES

*Clay.* Most Iowa counties have deposits of clay that are suitable for the manufacture of some type of clay ware, and plants have been operated in nearly every county at one time or another. With the exception of three

counties along the north border of the state every county has in the past attempted to utilize its clay resources.

Iowa's clay resources belong in two groups: the non-indurated silts and clays of glacial or recent origin and the indurated shales of the bedrock series. In the former group belong the loess, a fine, wind-blown dust piled up along the larger stream courses, the glacial clays themselves, and the assorted silts and clays of the larger flood plains. Several geological formations contribute shales of excellent quality for clay wares of high grade. The important formations are the Maquoketa (Ordovician), Lime Creek (Devonian), Kinderhook (Mississippian), Des Moines (Pennsylvanian), and Colorado (Cretaceous). The materials of glacial and recent age, however, are suitable for only the common grades of ware, and so, in many cases, the plants using them have not been able to compete with those to which the high grade shales were available. Thus, in 1898 clay wares were made by 349 producers in 37 counties, while in 1928 there were 46 active plants in 30 counties.

Glacial and recent clays are readily accessible as they lie at the surface or under only a thin veneer of soil. In some cases even this latter material is used. The statewide distribution of these materials and their soft nature make one or another of them easily accessible in most parts of the state. The indurated shales are more restricted in their surface distribution and the fact that they lie, in most cases, beneath some younger material, either glacial or older, renders them somewhat less accessible. However, their superior quality goes far to counterbalance this handicap, as is shown by the survival of a much greater proportion of the plants using them than of those using surface clays. The amounts of material of various kinds that are present are, of course, practically limitless, but the amounts actually available for any given plant may be sharply limited by a number of factors, such as distance from the plant, thickness of required stripping, proximity to other property, gradual change in character of material, either horizontally or vertically, and possibly others.

Some striking changes are evident in the making of different classes of ware, notably the decrease in making drain tile, coupled with the great increase in making hollow building ware.

*Portland Cement Materials.* Materials suitable for making portland cement have been found in several localities in Iowa, but the fact that two kinds of rock, each conforming closely to a standard composition, must be used makes the possibility of combining all the necessary factors less easy than in the case of clay.

Limestone suitable in character for use in cement-making occurs in the Platteville stage of the Ordovician, in several stages of the Devonian and of the Mississippian and in the Kansas City stage of the Missouri series. Shales of proper quality occur in the Maquoketa stage of the Ordovician, in the Lime Creek stage of the Devonian and in the Cherokee stage of the Des Moines. Perhaps to these should be added the Kinderhook shales of the Mississippian and the shaly members of the Missouri. The former are not very widely exposed in Iowa and the latter are thin, are interbedded with limestones and for the greater part are under a heavy cover of glacial drift. The Ordovician system occupies a strip extending from Jackson county north into Minnesota, the Devonian likewise underlies an area reaching from Scott to Worth counties and the Des Moines series covers a broad belt reaching from Webster county southeast into Missouri. The Kinderhook shales are present in a few southeastern counties and the Missouri series forms the bedrock under southwestern Iowa from Earlham and Leon to the Missouri valley.

The limestones and shales of eastern Iowa are in general fairly accessible either for open pit and quarry work or for underground mining. This holds true also of the shale in central Iowa. Western Iowa, however, except in a few favored localities such as Earlham and Winterset, is overlain by a heavier blanket of drift and loess and so its bedrock is less easily available. Except as availability may be limited by such factors as stripping, nearness to towns



or other such factors the supply of materials is in general great enough to satisfy the needs of the industry for a long time to come. The gentle inclination of the Iowa strata and the absence of severe faulting or folding render the securing of great quantities of material a relatively simple task.

*Gypsum.* Iowa is the second state in the union in the value of its gypsum products. Gypsum has been found in commercial quantities in two localities in the state. The better known deposit and the one that has been worked longer is that at Fort Dodge. The other is at Centerville. The Fort Dodge deposit lies in a basin cut into the Pennsylvanian and Mississippian rocks and is thought to be of Permian age. It is overlain by only glacial drift and so is readily accessible. The earliest operations were open pit quarries. Then some companies sank shafts and ran tunnels into the bed. Recently large scale stripping and sluicing operations have made the deposits again more readily available and have allowed the removal of the entire bed, while with underground methods some had to be left for floor, roof and pillars. Wilder estimated in 1918 that the deposit probably covers an area of twenty-five to thirty square miles and can sustain an annual output of two million tons for seventy-five years. Doubtless the increased possibilities of stripping would lengthen the life of the field somewhat. Wilder estimated the average thickness that could be mined as ten feet, which probably is less than the average thickness of the bed where it can be used. Naturally not all the bed can be uncovered, as the overlying farm land is too valuable.

The Centerville gypsum deposit, in contradistinction to that at Fort Dodge, lies 547 feet below the surface. It is considered as belonging in the St. Louis stage of the Mississippian system. The gypsum was discovered in the course of deep drilling for possible coal beds underlying the Mystic seam, which is the one mined in the Centerville district. Several other prospect holes have been sunk, but the extent of the bed is not known. The gypsum is thought to have been altered from anhydrite, which in turn was derived from the original limestone by the action of sulphurous waters. Part of the bed is still anhydrite. Only one shaft has thus far been sunk and where it is being mined the gypsum is four to eight feet thick, although one prospect hole showed nineteen feet.

*Coal.* Coal is found in a broad belt on either side of Des Moines river from Webster county to the Missouri line, and also in Adams, Page and Taylor counties in southwestern Iowa. The coal in these three counties is known as the Nodaway bed and belongs in the Missouri series. It averages about eighteen inches in thickness, but because of its distance from other coal fields and its continuity it is mined profitably and furnishes a very convenient coal supply. It lies interbedded with shales and limestones and is nowhere very deep below the surface. The deepest mine operated at present is that of the New Market Coal Company and is 210 feet deep. The mines in Adams County are shallower, ranging from fifty to ninety feet in depth. The coal is mined by the longwall system, without use of explosives.

The coal of central and southeastern Iowa belongs in the Cherokee stage of the Des Moines series. Most of the coal lies in lenses which range in size from a few acres to hundreds or thousands of acres, but the lenticular form restricts mining operations somewhat. In Upper Cherokee time, however, a bed of coal was formed over an area several hundred square miles in extent. This is known as the Mystic seam and it is present in the western part of Appanoose and the eastern part of Wayne counties. It averages about thirty inches in thickness, but its continuity enables it to be mined readily and so to compete with coals from thicker beds. Some rather thin but fairly persistent beds in Madison, Dallas and Guthrie counties are thought to belong to the Henrietta formation, just above the Cherokee beds. These yield only small supplies and are reached either by drifts or by shallow shafts. The lenticular beds of the lower Cherokee coal average about four feet in thickness as worked, but they range up to ten and even thirteen feet in the "swamps." None of these beds lie at excessive depths and no coals will ever be found in

Iowa at what may be called great depths. The deepest mines at present are between 300 and 400 feet to the coal and coal does not seem to be present where the Cherokee shales lie very deep or under great cover of younger rocks.

Several estimates have been made as to the extent of the Iowa coal fields. The Nodaway coal seems to underlie about 1500 square miles of 960,000 acres and should yield about 1,150,000,000 tons. The Cherokee coals cover an area of perhaps 11,250 square miles or 7,200,000 acres and may yield 28,000,000,000 tons. Probably 400,000,000 tons have been mined or rendered unusable through mining operations. The available supply, then, should last nearly three thousand years at rates of mining that are comparable with the present output.

## UTILITIES

*Electricity.* Iowa has an enviable position in the development of electrical power. There is a wide distribution of electric lines in Iowa, 99.8 per cent of the urban population having this service available. This is due to the rapid expansion of high voltage lines, carrying energy to towns which could not afford individual lighting plants. Only 22 towns in the state do not have electric service, the average population of these towns being less than 132.

There are now more than 13,000 miles of high tension transmission lines connecting and interconnecting the cities and towns of the state. These lines radiate from many strategically-located centers where modern plants of large capacity have been built.

Central stations are now building toward the electrification of Iowa's greatest industry, the farm. This phase of electrification is yet in its infancy although most recent estimates place the number of farms now served by central stations at about 18,000.

*Gas.* According to a summary of statistics on gas service in Iowa as of October, 1929, 69 towns having a total population of 866,141 were served. The population of these towns constituted 61.8% of Iowa's total urban population.

The total annual production of gas in the state amounted to 5,386,855,550 cubic feet, and this was carried thru 2,164.16 miles of street mains to 176,136 customers.

*Telephones.* It may be said that in telephone development, Iowa ranks high in the nation. In this state agriculture is a predominant influence, yet Iowa with telephones on 86 per cent of its farms, is first in the nation and the world in rural telephone development.

Probably most significant of telephone development figures is that of the number of residence telephones according to population. This figure might indicate to what extent the telephone is woven into the social life of the people of the state. Iowa ranks first in residence telephone development with a residence telephone for each 5.3 persons. This approaches being one for each family. Next to Iowa is California with one residence telephone for each 6.3 persons.

In total number of telephones Iowa ranks fourth among the states of the nation. In the number of telephones per 100 population, California has 24.2, Illinois 23.7, New York 23.3 and Iowa 23.0. The higher development in the three first-named states is due to extensive installations of telephones in hotels, large business organizations and similar institutions.

There are about 570,000 telephones in Iowa. Of these, 272,400 are owned and operated by the Northwestern Bell company while 536 other telephone companies whose lines connect with the Bell system, own and operate 297,600 telephones. All but 3,250 of these telephones connect with the Bell System for long distance service. The Northwestern Bell company operates in 159 cities and towns in the state while connecting companies operate in 778.

## TRANSPORTATION

*Aviation.* According to a recent survey made by the aeronautics branch of the United States Department of Commerce, there were 154 airplanes in Iowa.

Of this number 112 were licensed, leaving 42 without the department's certificate of approval. There were 12 gliders in the state, and two pilots held government licenses to fly these.

The survey showed 229 licensed pilots in the state, of whom 76 had transport licenses, 51 limited commercial and 102 certificates in the private classification. There were 138 licensed airplane mechanics in Iowa.

Great improvement has been shown in Iowa airports during the past year. More landing fields, both emergency and permanent, have been built. In addition to improvement in airport conditions, Iowa's interest in aviation has been reflected in the great increase in volume of airmail carried to, from and through the state. The Boeing System, carriers of air mail and passengers through the state, report that mail carried by plane along their lines stretching from Chicago through Iowa to San Francisco has increased nearly 50 per cent during the past year.

*Railroads.* In 1928 there were 16 railway companies operating on 14,415 miles of track in Iowa. In addition, there were 495 miles of interurban lines operated in the state by 11 companies.

Iowa's railway systems cover the state so thoroughly that the greatest distance from a shipping point is less than 12 miles.

*Motor freight and passenger carriers.* There are about 140 freight motor carriers in the state with a total one way route mileage of 8,900 miles. There were approximately 70,000 trucks licensed in Iowa during 1930, indicating that a large percentage of trucking in the state is done by private or company lines. Two thirds of the trucks are owned in rural counties where they are used for transporting livestock to packing plants and for general farm trucking. Sioux City receives more livestock by truck than any other packing town.

Twenty-three passenger carriers operate on 6,450 miles of routes covering every section of the state. But many people make use of Iowa's system of good roads and operate vehicles of their own. Automobile registration in 1930 was nearly 700,000.

*Road system.* On January 1, 1931, Iowa's public roads or highways of all classes, exclusive only of town and city streets, totaled 101,800.73 miles. At that time 3,279.77 miles were paved, 16,406.42 graveled, 3,708.46 graded, and 78,405.08 maintained only.

Iowa ranks fifth in miles of paved primary roads, with Illinois, Pennsylvania, North Carolina and Ohio ahead.

By 1930 there were seven east and west cross-state roads continuously surfaced and two entirely surfaced across the state from north to south. Many diagonal and combination routes continuously surfaced give access to all parts of the state.

There are 8,527 miles in the primary or heavy traffic-bearing system and 94,558 miles in the secondary system. Roads in the secondary system, all rural roads in the state, are divided into two systems, county trunk and local county.

*Mississippi River.* Navigation on the Mississippi river will be greatly facilitated when plans for a nine-foot channel from the Twin Cities to the Gulf are carried out. Eighty million dollars will be spent on the channel between the mouths of the Illinois and Wisconsin rivers. Eleven sets of locks and dams will be constructed along Iowa's border, and work has already begun on the project Lock and Dam No. 15 at Davenport, the first to be built.

A new channel depth of nine feet will permit the use of much larger barges than can now operate on the six-foot channel. It is thought that with this improvement river transportation will contribute materially to the development of industry in the state.

## URBAN STATISTICS

*Cost of Living.* On account of the nearness of Iowa to the sources of raw material, food prices in Iowa cities are, on the whole, much lower than prices on the same products for the United States. A considerable portion of the

saving in the price of food in Iowa cities is due to the fact that only very small transportation charge must be added to the cost of the food. The majority of the items which constitute the list of staples are produced on Iowa farms. As a consequence of these lower prices, the dollars of the urban population go farther in Iowa than in the United States generally.

*Housing.* According to the 1925 Iowa census, a total of 171,302 persons living within incorporated towns and cities occupy and own their own homes free of encumbrance, valued at \$663,398,000. The record shows that 66,964 additional persons owned city and town homes with a combined value of \$305,147,600 and a total encumbrance of \$135,715,500.

The costs of construction in the central western district of the United States, of which Iowa is a part, are very close to the average cost of construction for the entire United States.

*Libraries.* Iowa is well supplied with library facilities. Almost every urban district has its own library. There are 140 public libraries in the state, housed in buildings especially constructed for their use and maintained by local taxation. In addition to the public libraries there are school, private, and state college libraries. According to the census of 1925, approximately 4,125,000 books were available to the public.

*Urban Wealth Per Capita.* Iowa may be characterized as a state in which there is a greater equality in the distribution of wealth than is true of the nation. There is no exceedingly large and old fortune in Iowa, neither is there the extreme poverty which is found in the older settled sections of the nation.

A considerable portion of the saving in the price of food in Iowa cities is due. The wealth of Iowa has, for the most part, been wrung from the natural resources and the trade of the state by the generation which holds the wealth at present. The 1925 census of Iowa places the per capita wealth of the state at approximately \$2,584. In a study made by the National Bureau of Economic Research, some interesting comparative figures appear. The average yearly income of those persons gainfully employed in Iowa was \$1,977 as compared with an average income of \$1,668 per person for the entire western north central section of the United States. For the United States as a whole the average income was \$1,572. This condition can be explained in part by the fact that Iowa has offered the individual greater opportunity for profit through individual initiative than has been true of the entire country. The study mentioned also gave the per capita income for Iowa as \$706, for the western north central district \$610, and for the United States \$625. These figures portrayed the facts as they were in 1919. With the increased urbanization of Iowa, however, and the continued falling price of farm products, the figures are probably at the present time more nearly comparable to the national figures than was true in 1919.

## EDUCATION

Census figures for 1930 reveal the fact that Iowa has retained her rank as the most literate state in the union. In keeping this distinction, Iowa has reduced the illiteracy of her population from 1.1 per cent in 1920 to 0.8 per cent in 1930. Nebraska ranks second with 1.2 per cent, and Idaho and Kansas rank third and fourth.

In maintaining this high standard of education, \$57,486,062.07 was spent on Iowa public schools during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1930. The cost of instruction for each student during the year was more than \$103. There were 12,522 schools with buildings valued at \$123,307,361.75.

Enrollment during this period was 554,655, a gain of 7,803 students over the 1928-1929 year. Of this number, 416,981 were enrolled in grade schools and 117,229 in high schools. In addition, 162,210 more children were obtaining education in schools not under direction of the state department.

Junior colleges are gaining in popularity in the state. The first public junior college was established at Mason City in 1918. In 1930 there were 30 such institutions in the state.

In 1928 there were 25 colleges and universities in the state. Iowa ranked fifth among the states on a basis of colleges per total population with one college for every 56,500 people. The total enrollment at the 25 colleges in 1928 was 37,000.

### RECREATIONAL FACILITIES

Iowa's 36 state parks have a total area of 7,539.72 acres. The state also has jurisdiction over approximately 53,000 acres embracing the meandered lakes and 50,000 acres embracing the meandered straits. There are 50,000 acres more in amusement, city, county and private parks and other recreational areas.

Attendance at state parks during 1930 is estimated at 2,200,000, an increase of 500,000 over the estimated attendance in 1929. Backbone, Clear Lake, Eldora Pine Creek, Ledges, Pilot Knob and Wildcat Den state parks reported the largest attendance in 1930.

### IOWA PUBLICATIONS

The publication of newspapers and magazines is a very considerable business in Iowa. The combined circulation of all Iowa daily newspapers, weekly newspapers and magazines is in excess of 5,700,000.

Iowa has a total of 690 publications listed in the American Newspaper Annual and Directory for 1930. These publications may be classified as follows: 514 weekly newspapers, 44 daily newspapers, 19 college newspapers, 14 foreign language newspapers, 12 college magazines, 12 twice-a-week newspapers, 10 farm magazines, 7 religious magazines, 6 miscellaneous magazines, 6 labor weeklies, 6 animal breed papers, 4 fraternal magazines, 4 poultry magazines, 3 merchandising magazines, 3 military magazines, 3 foreign language magazines, 2 journalism magazines, and one each of a negro magazine, philanthropic magazine, medical magazine, garden magazine, banking magazine, general magazine, insurance magazine, and creamery magazine.

Iowa ranks ninth among all the states in the number of publications issued. It is fourth in the number of weekly newspapers; fourteenth in the number of daily newspapers; and sixteenth in the number of monthly publications.

Iowa has a large number of very fine weekly newspapers. Their standing in comparison with the weekly papers of other parts of the country is shown by the many awards Iowa papers have received in newspaper competitions, such as that to determine the "best" newspaper in the country conducted annually by the National Editorial Association.

Des Moines is an important center of magazine publishing. It has two magazines with circulations over a million. It is the home of several outstanding farm publications.
