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Summary

The Institute of Irish Studies/Irish News survey was completed by 1000 panel respondents. The survey is predominated by those who voted (83.1%) in the most recent Assembly election in May. The share who are nationalist was 35.3% compared to 27.7% unionist and 28.9% neither unionist nor nationalist. The sample was weighted by religion and has a 3.1 margin of error. The survey was conducted 28th June to 10th July.¹

Findings point to an accumulating body of evidence that there are more similarities in terms of opinions between communities than is assumed or commented upon. There is inter-community consensus regarding:

- 81.5% agreed that there 'should be an independent review of the Assembly and Executive to explore how they could function better'. This was supported by 74.4% of unionists, 87.2% of nationalists and 85.5% of neithers.
- Fewer agreed that if the governance structures of the Belfast/Good Friday Agreement are to be changed, this change should be led by the Irish government (16.9%), the British government (22.7%) or MLAs (38.1%). This may point to a lack of trust and a desire for more participative forms of democracy.
- The greater number agreed (45.1% compared to 18.2% disagreed) that if someone is willing to engage meaningfully to provide truth to families about harm caused to a family member, a conditional amnesty should be offered to that person. Agreement was higher among SF (58.6%) than DUP voters (33.5%).
- 75.4% of respondents believe the issues around the Protocol are complex and difficult to understand. With a high level of respondents agreeing that goods coming from GB or the rest of the world should not be checked if destined only for Northern Ireland ranging from almost 75% of unionists, to 60% each amongst nationalists and neithers. Over 70% of respondents believe access to both the EU and UK markets is vital to the economy of Northern Ireland with 78.8% nationalist, 72% unionist and 77.5% neithers in agreement.

A significant number of respondents had either no knowledge of how Northern Ireland performs against the rest of the world or significantly underestimated the contribution it makes.

- Only 11% were able to estimate that in 2022 food from Northern Ireland fed 10 million people in the UK. Less than 6% could accurately place Belfast as ranking 7th out of 179 regions in terms of contribution to the UK economy. Almost half believed it ranked no higher than 37th or as poorly as 179th. Less than 10% of respondents were able to accurately identify that reported sectarian crime has decreased significantly (i.e. by 60%), a similar number believed it had only decreased by 6%. Significantly more unionists than nationalists were likely to answer 'don't know' to this question.
- Across the EU it is estimated that an average of 22.1% of energy used (electricity) comes from renewable sources, only 5.6% of respondents knew that Northern Ireland produces 40% from renewables. 50.6% believed it be less, as low as 5% and 43.9% did not know.

¹ Please note that the figures for voters and by identity are dissimilar as the latter includes more respondents due to the inclusion of non-voters.

Voting

The Assembly

- In terms of priorities for the Executive over 60% selected economy (40.3%) or healthcare reform (22.7%) as their first priority. 42.0% of DUP voters chose economy compared to 39.5% of Sinn Fein voters.
- In terms of second priority 22.7% chose economy, 28.5% healthcare reform and just over 10% each for education and Assembly reform.
- ‘If a party refuses to nominate a First Minister, or a deputy First Minister, another party should be permitted to nominate for this position’ was agreed by 45.5% of respondents compared to 9.9% who disagreed. 44% of DUP voters compared to 87.7% of SF voters, 90.8% of SDLP voters, 85.6% of Alliance voters, and 64.3% of UUP voters agreed.
- Among voters 81.5% agreed that there ‘should be an independent review of the Assembly and Executive to explore how they could function better’. This was supported by 74.4% of unionists, 87.2% of nationalists and 85.5% of neithers.
- That such a review should be supported by citizens having a say also gained inter-community support with 65.8% of unionists, 79.6% of nationalists and 73.4% of neithers agreeing.
- Among voters 72.2% agreed that ‘the British and Irish governments should set up a constitutional convention, comprised of civic society groups, business, charities and interested parties to, to explore how the Assembly and Executive could be improved to function better’.
- Among voters 79.1% agreed that ‘if the governance structures of the Belfast/Good Friday Agreement are to be changed...the public should have a say in this decision through a referendum.
- Regarding If the governance structures of the Belfast/Good Friday Agreement are to be changed, how should this change come about fewer agreed that this should be led by the Irish government (16.9%), the British government (22.7%) or MLAs (38.1%). This may point to a lack of trust and a desire for more participative forms of democracy.

The Protocol

- 75.4% of respondents believe the issues around the protocol are complex and difficult to understand.
- 79.9% of those who voted unionist agree that Northern Ireland should fall under the same taxes and spending policies as Great Britain, compared to 45.6% of nationalist voters and 48.8% of neither.
- Almost 90% (89.6%) of unionists compared to 69% of nationalists and 74% of neithers support the UK's government's proposal that Northern Ireland should receive the same VAT cuts on energy-saving materials as Great Britain.
- Across all respondents there are high levels of support for the UK's government's proposal that Northern Ireland should receive the same Covid recovery loans as Great Britain: unionists 91.1%, nationalist 75.1% and neithers 80.3%.
- Despite extremely high numbers agreeing that the Protocol is complex and difficult to understand support for the EU's position that renegotiating the Protocol would lead to prolonged legal uncertainty and instability divides strongly along identity lines with nationalist support at 71.1%, Unionist at 28.5% and neithers firmly in the middle on 45.7%.
- However, when asked if the UK Government was correct in introducing legislation to address the Protocol whilst an expected almost 80% of unionists agreed, nearly 46% of nationalists and 49% of neithers also agreed suggesting that support is growing for the idea that the Protocol does require some changes.
- A high level of respondents agrees that goods coming from GB or the rest of the world should not be checked if destined only for Northern Ireland ranging from almost 75% of unionists, to 60% each amongst nationalists and neithers.
- Goods coming from GB or the rest of the world should not have to comply with EU rules if destined for Northern Ireland attracts similar support with 76.2% from unionists and approximately 55% from both nationalists and neithers.
- Only around 55% of respondents believe that goods from GB or the rest of the world that enter Northern Ireland before moving to the Republic of Ireland should be checked in Northern Ireland to ensure they meet EU regulations.
- Whilst 64% of nationalists and only 26% of unionists agree that the European Court of Justice is the correct place in which compliance with the Protocol should be ensured 55% of unionists and 53% of nationalists would support the creation of an independent arbitrator, as opposed to the European Court of Justice.
- Over 70% of respondents believe access to both the EU and UK markets is vital to the economy of Northern Ireland. 78.8% nationalist, 72% unionist and 77.5% neither.
- In answer to the statement that negotiations between the EU and UK are the best way to solve tensions within the Protocol there was, once again, high levels of consensus - 69% of nationalists, 62% of unionists and 62% of neithers.

- 74.1% of nationalists and 58.5% of neithers stated that an improved relationship with the Republic would persuade them to remain in the UK.
- 59.2% of nationalists and 60% of neithers stated that lower houses process would persuade them to remain in the UK.
- 67.5% of unionists, 66.0% of nationalists and 63.3% of neithers stated that unionist political parties respecting all traditions would persuade them to remain in the UK.
- In terms of considering Irish unification among the same group 37.8% of unionists agreed that lower cost of living in the Republic would persuade them to support Irish unity.
- In terms of considering Irish unification among the same group 35.4 % of unionists agreed that higher public spending in the Republic would persuade them to support Irish unity.
- In terms of considering Irish unification among the same group 72.7% of unionists agreed that secure employment would persuade them to support Irish unity.

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The Society in which we live

- A significant number of respondents had either no knowledge of how Northern Ireland performs against the rest of the world or significantly underestimated the contribution it makes.
- Only 11% were able to accurately identify that in 2022 food from Northern Ireland fed 10 million people in the UK.
- Less than 6% could accurately place Belfast as ranking 7th out of 179 regions in terms of contribution to the UK economy. Almost half believed it ranked no higher than 37th or as poorly as 179th.
- Less than 10% of respondents were able to accurately identify that reported sectarian crime has decreased significantly (i.e. by 60%), a similar number believed it had only decreased by 6%. Significantly more unionists than nationalists were likely to answer ‘don’t know’ to this question.
- Whilst less than 10% of respondents correctly chose the fall in conflict related convictions by 90%, notably nationalists estimated a higher conviction rate which is likely to reflect Republican Dissident activity and arrests.
- 20% of respondents were able to identify that almost one in five citizens is living in poverty. However, 40% of respondents were unable to answer the question suggesting increasing alienation across social classes. The responses were almost identical when the same question was asked about children living in poverty.
- Across the EU it is estimated that an average of 22.1% of energy used (electricity) comes from renewable sources only 5.6% of respondents knew that Northern Ireland produces 40% from renewables. 50.6% believed it be less, as low as 5% and 43.9% did not know.
