

CLOCKS CHANGE TOMORROW

Return to Solar-Time Basis After Daylight Saving Period.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—All clocks in the United States should stop for one hour at 2 A. M. Sunday, Oct. 27, and then again take up the procession of the hours.

The country will then be back upon a sun-time basis after its first seven months of the daylight saving experiment. Some minor difficulties in transportation and industry will be involved in the return to normal time, but for most persons the change will mean nothing more than an extra hour of sleep on Sunday morning, a belated return of the hour they lost in March, when clock hands were jumped forward sixty minutes by act of Congress.

Adjusting railroad train movements proceeding over the time-changing period will present the most difficulty. Director General McAdoo has authorized a general order on the subject by which trains will continue their progress until reaching a station, and there be held one hour. At the same time the complicated system of train orders and schedules is such that the railroad administration general order specifically charges local managements to use their own discretion and to protect train movements by other methods if they find it necessary.

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
