To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

WE, the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Durham, beg leave to assure your Royal Highness that, in common with all our fellow subjects; we have bewailed that awful visitation which has rendered the whole kingdom a house of mourning; and we believe that no example of the deep and universal sorrow which succeeded the decease of the Princess Charlotte, can be found in the records of any nation.

We presume not to compare our grief for that calamitous event with the affliction of your Royal Highness, or of those with whom she was united by nature and affection; but when we reflect upon her high endowments, and contemplate the moral excellence and the genuine devotion which characterised her life, and shed on it a bright and rapid lustre, we cannot, in the present condition of society, calculate the benefits of which her death has bereaved the people.

We bend with submission to the will of God,

and trust that although he speedily resumed the blessing which he lent, she did not live nor die in vain; since the general consternation occasioned by her loss testifies how extensively her worth was known, and how greatly it was prized.

Such considerations may tend in some degree to soothe the heart of your Royal Highness; but we are well aware that the Almighty, who ordained the blow, can alone administer relief; and we fervently pray, that He will comfort and protect your Royal Highness, and will grant that the people committed to your charge may progressively abound in good morals, piety, and welfare.

To his Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, the Bishop, Archdeacons, and Clergy of the Diocese of Durham, humbly beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with sentiments of condolence on the awful event, which while it most acutely wounded the paternal feelings of your Royal Highness, disappointed the sanguine expectations of a loyal people, who indulged the hope, that they, and their posterity, should have the happiness to behold in the descendants of your Royal Highness, a long line of Protestant Princes, who by continuing the paternal government of the House of Brunswick, would perpetuate the glory of that illustrious race, and secure the happiness of their faithful and affectionate subjects.

We acknowledge, with profound humility, that no event can happen without the permission of the Almighty, for wise and good purposes; nor do we presume to assign the reasons of his dealings with mankind; the perfect justice and equity of which must ever remain unquestioned by his creatures. But when we reflect on the youth, the health, and the habits of the amiable and accomplished Princess, who has so suddenly been removed from us, in the

very prime of a life, devoted to the cultivation of the best principles and the acquisition of the most virtuous habits—a national loss so unexpected, and so irreparable cannot fail of warning us to exercise that consideration, which the day of adversity is mercifully intended to produce. That survey will discover the depraved state of religion and morals in this country to be such, that we shall not be surprised at the severity of any chastisements that have fallen, or may yet fall upon us. We see the inestimable blessings of peace, at the termination of a perilous and sanguinary war, ungratefully slighted. We observe with the deepest sorrow and heaviness of heart, the publication of licentious and profane writings, the direct tendency of which is, to sap the foundations of religion, by rendering its doctrines, and solemn services, subjects of derision; and to excite ignorant and unwary men to acts of violence and treason. But amidst this lamentable depravity, it hath pleased the gracious Providence of God to open to our view a consoling prospect of better things to come. More diligent, and better directed efforts are now, and have, for some time past, been employed, and we trust will be continued with increasing energy, to rescue the bulk of the nation and to guard and preserve its youth from the sad consequences of ignorance and vice. To this truly Christian labour your Royal Highness has been pleased to grant the most signal encouragement of your protection and patronage.

Having the same purpose most anxiously at heart, we pledge ourselves to your Royal Highness, that to the utmost of our abilities and opportunities, we will zealously exert ourselves in the promotion of this and all other means of meliorating both the spiritual and temporal condition of the people committed to our charge. We beg leave further to submit to your Royal Highness, that even from the very depth of our national grief there hath sprung a source of consolation, peculiar to itself, and, we trust, well calculated to allay the anguish of your Royal Highness's paternal heart. The voice of mourning has been heard from all descriptions of men; and that, not in the mere form and common demonstrations of sorrow, but with great affinity to the plaintive moans of a family deprived of its fondest hopes. A circumstance of peculiar interest, and by which we humbly hope your Royal Highness will graciously appreciate the devoted attachment of the nation, to your Royal person and government, and to the happy constitution which it is your Royal Highness's glory to maintain inviolate.

May those exalted virtues, the loss of which, as a living example, we so deeply deplore, be cherished in grateful remembrance by all, and more especially be contemplated as a model for imitation, by those of her own sex who in their nearer approach to the highest station of civil society, will perceive a proportional similarity of obligations and duties.

Finally, with hearts full of affection and loyalty, we commend your Royal Highness to the special favour and protection of that merciful Being, who alone can heal the wounds, which he inflicts for our good. May He bless and preserve your Royal Highness in health and prosperity, and during a long and happy future reign, may He, through

your Royal Highness's ministration, convey to your loving people all the blessings by which a highly favoured nation can feel and prove; that they have the Lord for their God!

WE, the Bishop, Archdeacons, and Clergy of the Diocese of Durham, with the utmost respect, entreat your Serene Highness graciously to accept the unfeigned assurance of our participation in the poignant grief occasioned by the sudden and calamitous removal of your Serene Highness's Royal Consort out of a world, of which we fondly anticipated the improvement from an almost unparalleled example of domestic felicity, produced by the combination of high rank, distinguished talents, and correspondent exertions of virtuous conduct, worthy and seemingly destined to check the levity, and shame the frivolous pursuits of the age in which we live.

But, notwithstanding the shortness of the time during which we were permitted to contemplate the admired pattern set before us, we are confident that its effect will not be lost. Its impression on the nation is strong and general. For the survival of its efficacy, we confide in the Almighty, to whose grace all the good qualities found in any of his creatures must be thankfully ascribed. We trust that the first pledge of His continued favour will be the restoration of your Serene Highness's mind to that tranquil resignation which the religious disposition, evinced by the general tenour of your Serene Highness's life, cannot fail to produce. PRINCE OF WALES'S COUNCIL.

At a Council of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, held at the Pavilion at Brighton, on the 26th day of January 1818, Francis Hearle Rodd, of Trebartha-Hall, in the county of Cornwall, Esq. was appointed Sheriff of the said county of Cornwall for the present year, by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, in Council.

AT the Court at Brighton, the 30th day of

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the twenty-eighth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the trade between the subjects of His Majesty's colonies and plantations in North America and in the West India Islands and the countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said subjects, and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders, to be issued and published from time to time, to authorise, or by Warrant or Warrants under His sign manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the time being, to authorise, in case of necessity, the importation into Newfoundland of bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, from any of the territories belonging to the said United States, for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing season only; provided always, that such bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, so authorised to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such rules, regulations, and restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively, and except by British subjects, and in British-built ships, owned by His Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law:

And whereas it is expedient, and necessary, that provision be made for fully supplying the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing season, with bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent doth thereupon, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing season only, bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, may be imported into the said island from any of the territories belonging to the said United States, by British subjects, and in British-built ships, owned by His Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law, and which within the space of nine months previous to the time of such importation, have cleared out from some port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain or Ireland, or other His Majesty's dominions in Europe, for which purpose a licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other person or persons who may be duly authorised in that kingdom respectively, in the manner and form herein-after mentioned; which licence shall continue and be in force for nine calendar months from the day of the date upon which such licence is respectively granted, and no longer;

provided that no such licence as aforesaid, granted after the thirtieth day of September next, shall be of any force or effect: and His Royal Highness is hereby further pleased to order, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that the master or person having the charge or command of any ship or vessel to whom such licence shall be granted, shall, upon the arrival of the said ship or vessel at the port, harbour, or place in the said Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the back of such licence the marks, numbers, and contents of each package of bread, flour, Indian corn, and the number of live stock, under the penalty of the forfeiture in the said Act mentioned; and the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland, is hereby enjoined and required to give a certificate to the master or person having the charge or command of such ship or vessel, of his having received the said licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland respectively, by whom such licence was granted. *CheWynd.*

#### FORM OF LICENCE.

Now be it known, that the said *[person's name]* hath a licence to lade on board the said ship, *[ship's name]* at and from any port or place belonging to the United States of America, bread, flour, Indian corn, or live stock, the produce of the said United States, and no other article whatever; and to carry the said bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, to some port or place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the arrival of the said ship at any port, harbour, or place of discharge in Newfoundland, the master or person having the charge or command of the said ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the back thereof the marks, numbers,

and contents of each package of bread, flour, Indian corn, and the number of live stock, and shall thereupon receive a certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

This licence to continue in force for calendar months from the date hereof.

*As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to*

*them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.*

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

**I**F any person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any artificer in wool, iron, steel, brass, or other metal, clock-maker, watch-maker, or any other artificer of Great Britain, to go into foreign countries out of the King's dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon indictment or information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions; he shall be fined any sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first offence, and shall be imprisoned three months, and till the fine be paid. And if any person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the discretion of the Court, and imprisoned twelve months, and till the fine be paid.

If any of the King's subjects, being such artificers, shall go into any country out of His Majesty's dominions, to exercise or teach the said trades to foreigners; and if any of the King's subjects in any such foreign country, exercising any of the said trades, shall not return into this realm within six months after warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the country where such artificers shall be, or by any person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and remain henceforth inhabit within this realm; such persons shall be incapable of taking any legacy, or of being an executor or administrator, or of taking any lands, &c. within this kingdom, by descent, devise, or purchase, and shall forfeit all lands, goods, &c. within this kingdom, to His Majesty's use, and shall be deemed alien, and out of His Majesty's protection.

Upon complaint made, upon oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any person is endeavouring to seduce any such artificer, or that any such artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's dominions, for the purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his warrant to bring the person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the oath of one witness, or by confession, that he was guilty of any of the said offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such person shall refuse to give security, the Justice may commit him to gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due course of law. And if any such artificer shall be convicted, upon indictment, of any such promise, contract, or preparation to go beyond the seas, for the purpose aforesaid, he shall give such security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till security given.

If any of the above offences shall be committed

in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

*Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.*

IF any person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any artificer in wool, mohair, cotton, or silk, or in iron, steel, brass, or other metal, or any clock-maker, watch-maker, or any other artificer in any other of the manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this kingdom or Ireland into any foreign country not within the dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon indictment or information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the county, &c. wherein such offence shall be committed in England, or by indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by indictment or information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such offence be committed in Ireland; the person so convicted shall, for every artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer imprisonment in the common gaol of the county or stewardry wherein such offender shall be convicted for twelve calendar months, and until forfeiture be paid; And in case of a subsequent offence of the same kind, the persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer imprisonment in the common gaol of the county or stewardry wherein such offender shall be convicted, for two years, and until such forfeiture be paid.

If any person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any ship or boat, not bound directly to some port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such tools or utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the preparing, working up, or finishing of the woollen or silk manufactures, or any part of such tools, he shall, for every offence, forfeit all such tools, or parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by action of debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's warehouses, all such tools or utensils prohibited to be exported, as such officer shall find on board any vessel not bound directly to some port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all tools so seized shall, after condemnation, be publicly sold to the best bidder; and one moiety of the produce shall be to the use of His Majesty, and the other moiety to the officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his vessel, he shall, for every such offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered

as the penalties inflicted upon persons exporting the tools; and, if the vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his employment, and be incapable of any employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any entry outward, or sign any cocket or sufferance for the shipping or exporting of any of the said tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his office, and be incapable of any office under His Majesty.

One moiety of the forfeitures shall be applied to the use of His Majesty, and the other moiety to the use of the person who shall sue for the same.

*Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.*

BY these Statutes the like penalties and forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to persons packing or putting on board any vessel, not bound directly for some port in Great Britain or Ireland, any machine, engine, tool, press, paper, utensil, or implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the cotton, steel, or iron manufactures of this kingdom, or any part or parts of such machines or implements; or any models or plans thereof; and all Captains of ships and other persons receiving or being in possession of any such articles, with an intent to export the same to foreign parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of tools and utensils used in the woollen and silk manufactures.
